matter of the heart

Another year of 4-H is in full swing, and I was thinking about the youth organization's pledge that I recited in my younger days. It so reflects theology of John Wesley, the founder of the Methodist movement. "I pledge my head to clearer thinking, my heart to greater loyalty, my hands to larger service, and my health for better living ... (for the glory of God, I imagine Wesley saying).'

Wesley, I believe, understood the significance of all four H's nearly a century and a half before A.B. Graham started boys and girls clubs that became 4-H. Head – the theology of a Christian life founded upon the scriptures; Heart – the love, joy and hope that comes through the Holy Spirit dwelling within us; Hands a life of service in response to God's grace; and even Health as Wesley believed that physical and spiritual health were closely connected. His book, Primitive Physick, included remedies for ailments and tips on wellness through exercise, diet, and sleep.

I'd suggest that if any one of the four H's is absent in one's faith journey, your spiritual life is incomplete. Do you find yourself weak in one area or another? At Nashville UMC, we are striving to build a faith community incorporating doctrine based upon the truth of God's Word, create an atmosphere for



spiritual experience, encourage faithful service, and nurture a healthy lifestyle. For John Wesley, the Christian life was about a transformative, living

relationship with God – that we know Him and not just about Him. That's why he referred to the Christian faith as "a religion of the heart." He writes of such an experience on May 24, 1738: "About a quarter before nine, while he was describing the change which God works in the heart through faith in Christ, I felt my heart strangely warmed. I felt I did trust in Christ, Christ alone, for salvation; and an assurance was given me that He had taken away my sins, even mine, and saved me from the law of sin and death."

Only when our hearts are warmed are our minds able to understand that Jesus died for us and we are transformed. Our church leadership team and I have begun to focus on a four-point ministry that makes us available for God's Holy Spirit to move in us: that people would CONNECT with other believers; BELONG to a faith community; SERVE others; and GROW in

discipleship. Come, journey with us.

Quarterly Board of Stewards Update

Financial software being upgraded

The Board of Stewards met in April and discussed a variety of matters, including a recommendation to update the Quickbooks software used for budgeting and accounting. As a non-profit, we'll qualify for a substantial discount on the yearly subscription, expected to be about \$75 a year.

Business manager Sue Weimer submitted several recommendations regarding the General Fund to help balance expenses with income. The Board approved the following:

- Creating a working capital account to pay the taxes and electricity for the parsonage from rental income instead of the General Fund.
- Camp scholarships for 2022 will be paid from the Schrock Memorial Fund.

The audit report was received under advisement, which included a recommendation to explore online or automated giving to provide options for members and others to give faithfully and regularly – even when they are not able to attend.

Upcoming projects include trimming trees, burning brush, and reseeding around the wellhead at the parsonage; and grading and adding new stone to the church parking lots across State Route 39 and Church Street, fixing siding on the south side of the church, and general cleaning and maintenance.

The Board will work with the village to approach ODOT about installing a crosswalk and/or signage to the parking lot across the highway.

And we're exploring audio/visual options for the nursery and other areas of the church.



New study series starting

Our summer Bible Study on the Epistle of James will begin in May as we explore issues that measure our living faith and spiritual fruitfulness. Jesus says to his disciples and to future followers in John 15:16, *"I appointed you to go and produce lasing fruit, so that the Father will give you whatever you ask for, using my name."*

What does it mean to follow Christ 24/7? What does a day-to-day relationship with Jesus look like? How do we grow in our faith and Christian maturity? We'll explore those questions that motivate us to test the quality and consistency of our faith, and more.

Based upon feedback from our last small group study, we'll continue a similar format, offering a daytime session at Nashville UMC, from 10 to 11:30 a.m. on Tuesdays, beginning May 17, and from 6:30-8 p.m. on Thursdays at Killbuck UMC, beginning May 19. National Day of Prayer

Did you know the first National Day of Prayer was proclaimed by the Continental Congress in 1775, calling for a day of "public humiliation, fasting, and prayer?"

National Day of Prayer as we know it today was created jointly in 1952 by the U.S. Congress and President Harry S. Truman. In 1988, President Ronald Reagan then established the first Thursday of May as the regular observance.
