fault in Jesus, but had him flogged and turned over for crucifixion anyway. Even though Pilate's truth was that Jesus was innocent, the mob's truth as they yelled "Crucify Him!" was that Jesus was guilty.

Truth, it seems, has become subjective. And that is dangerous. If truth changes from person to person and from situation to situation, there is no firm ground, no reference point. There becomes a contradiction for everything.

Outreach partnerships expanding

Recycling bins have been placed at Nashville UMC to support three mission initiatives long undertaken at the Killbuck United Methodist Church. Each offers an opportunity to give new life for unneeded items.

- They include:
 - Manufacturer coupons from Sunday newspaper circulars. Coupons are mailed monthly to
 Support Our Troops in Daytona Beach, Florida, which then forwards them to military families. The best part is that military canteens will honor coupons for up to three months past their expiration date.
 - Used amber-colored medication bottles. These are forwarded to **Central American Medical Outreach** in Orrville for

Pilate's question was a sarcastic response to what Jesus had just declared: "*I have come into the world, to testify to the truth.*" But on that day, the truth was nothing more than cultural consensus.

One of my favorite TV game shows is "To Tell the Truth," which in its different iterations, has spanned the five decades of my life. That's 3,800 episodes and counting of imposters spinning a yarn to convince celebrity panelists their lie is the truth. Sometimes, I feel like watching the news is a game of "To Tell the Truth," trying to determine what the real story is. Or deciphering church stances on matters of faith. Or debating the latest U.S. Supreme Court rulings.

The mob standing before Pilate saw Jesus as worthy of crucifixion, and the mob's truth held sway that day. But it wasn't really truth at all. Yet, even today the will and beliefs of those who can make the most noise seem to be regarded as truth.

Mob morality is not truth. Truth is that which is consistent with the mind, character, will, and glory of God – the same Creator that our Founding Fathers included in the preamble to the Declaration of Independence. As our pledge to the American flag says: "one nation under God" that is, one nation under the Truth" – it's a founding principle. Yet, has the truth been relegated to whatever the prevalent public opinion of the day mighty be? Have we gotten so used to that, that God is ignored as irrelevant?

Abandon a biblical definition of truth and unrighteousness results. I fear we see Romans 1 playing out before our very eyes. Paul writes about what happens when a society strays from God and truth, "They suppress the truth in unrighteousness... they became futile in their thoughts, and their foolish hearts were darkened. Professing to be wise, they became fools... who exchanged the truth of God for a lie."

Isaiah 65:16, and other scriptures, refer to God as the "God of truth." And when Jesus said of Himself, "*I* am...*the truth*" (John 14:6), He was making a profound claim about His own deity. He was making it clear that *all* truth must ultimately be defined in terms of God. Jesus was truth in the flesh — the perfect expression of God and the embodiment of all that is true.

Jesus also said the written Word of God is truth. Praying in the Garden of Gethsemane for His disciples and believers throughout all time, Jesus asked God, His Father: "Sanctify them by Your truth. Your word is truth" (John 17:17). And, the Word of God is eternal truth "which lives and abides forever" (1 Peter 1:23).



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
