PACIFIC SHOWCASE

Family Ingredients

Friday, May 19, 6:00 PM | New Parkway Theater

Emmy Award-winning *Family Ingredients* is a first-of-its-kind series that celebrates Pacific Islanders' stories through food, connecting our genealogy to what we eat. A cinematic beautyscape, *Family Ingredients* showcases Hawai'i's small town communities and highlights untold stories and exhilarating experiences that cross the Pacific Ocean. The show is a joyful ode to farmers, food producers, and families. EP 303: MOLOKA'I - POKE

Moloka'i. It's quiet. No traffic. Few tourists. Minimal development and the least populated of all the Hawaiian Islands. 38 miles long and 10 miles wide, rough around the edges but that's how the community likes it. Fiercely independent and sustainable, they will fight like hell to protect their island lifestyle. They fish, hunt deer, plant kalo, raise pua'a and tend to their gardens, proudly continuing their practices from one generation to the next. This is the island where Raiatea Helm was born and raised, created a hit song and began her musical career - never forgetting her roots.

EP 304 KAUA'I - PA'AKAI (SALT)

From Moloka'i to Kaua'i we follow Raiatea to the island where her maternal roots are deeply connected to the salt ponds of Hanapēpē, one of the most preferred natural salts in the world. What is revealed in this episode is a love story of broken hearts, a royal scandal, and a family secret. Raiatea's family genealogy becomes the well from which springs her passion for music, love of the land, and activism that she is committed to share.

Kāinga navigates the thorny terrain of home in Aotearoa New Zealand from the perspectives of 11 Pan-Asian women. Writers and directors from Māori-Chinese Aotearoa, China, Philippines, India, Iran, Japan, Korea, Malaysia, Myanmar, and Tamil Eelam, explore the historical connection to tangata whenua, feelings of isolation, community support in lieu of family, home precarity, excitement about making a home, longing to be "back home", being othered at home, and finally claiming home. Each 10-minute story, set in the same house across several decades, honors these experiences one brick at a time.

Told through visual metaphor and poetic homage, a weaver experiences a transformation when she realizes her drinking water has been poisoned by petroleum leaking into O'ahu's watersheds. *screener available
