THE MERCURY CELEBRATES THE 2025 SOUTH AUSTRALIAN SCREEN AWARDS

The Mercury is proud to announce the recipients of the highly-anticipated **South Australian Screen Awards (SASAs)** held on **Saturday 22 November 2025**.

A combination of cash and in-kind awards worth over \$30,000 was presented at the event, spanning a wide range of format, genre, and craft categories, with 27 award categories.

Leading the SASA recipients was *I'm The Most Racist Person I Know* taking home three awards for Best Directing (Leela Varghese) sponsored by CrewHQ, Best Music Composition (Leigh Marsh) sponsored by Australian Guild of Screen Composers, and the coveted Grand Jury Prize sponsored by South Australian Film Corporation and The Mercury, and decided by a Grand Jury of Kerry Heysen AM, ABC Radio Adelaide's Deb Tribe and Beth Neate (CEO Guildhouse, Chair of Tutti Arts).

The Mercury Legend Award sponsored by Adelaide Film Festival and The Mercury was presented to esteemed creative Tania Nehme for her contribution to the screen sector and work as a world-class editor whose artistry and generosity have shaped countless films and filmmakers.

The Mercury Rising Award sponsored by Adelaide Film Festival, The Mercury and ProAV Solutions was presented to director/producer Jack Langford who is making waves as a First Nations filmmaker completing his first feature, and in production on a feature documentary and television pilot.

Best Emerging First Nations Screen Practitioner sponsored by South Australian Film Corporation and The Mercury was awarded to proud Yankunytjatjara woman Pearl Berry (*Black Comedy, Blak Empire*, and co-writer of SAFC's Film Lab feature *The Debt*.) Best Emerging Producer sponsored by Channel 44 and The Mercury was presented to Jasmine J Leech whose Quicksilver Production Fund supported short film *Liability* was nominated for Grand Jury Prize (Best Short), Best Editing, Best Screenplay and Best Production Design.



The Audience Award by Loophole Brewing Co and The Mercury was tallied from votes across four nominee screenings and presented to the documentary *Unsung: Beyond The Board*. Festival favourite and acclaimed local animated feature film, *Lesbian Space Princess* took out Best Feature sponsored by KOJO.

Unsung: Beyond The Board also took out Best Documentary sponsored by Academy of Interactive Entertainment and was one of several films scooping up two awards. With Love, Lottie was awarded Best Hair & Make-up (Alex Jevons) sponsored by LUSH and Best Costume (Victoria Arvanitakis) sponsored by Adelaide Arcade. Two SASAs also went to The Hitcher for Best Sound Design (Anthony Cavalieri) sponsored by Australian Screen Sound Guild and Best Cinematography (Emerson Hoskin) sponsored by Urban Cine & Australian Cinematographers Society and The Knight nabbed two awards taking home the Best Screenplay award (Lotte Sweeney and Maiah Stewardson) sponsored by Australian Writers Guild SA and Best Performance sponsored by Heesom Casting, State Theatre Company of South Australia was presented to Isadora Sweeney.

Sarah Lancaster, CEO of The Mercury said: "The Mercury was a buzz on Saturday night with the energy and enthusiasm of the next generation of South Australian screenmakers. The Mercury's subscription model at \$25/month or \$300/year offers unlimited screenings to Silverscreen and Adelaide Cinematheque programs, free entry to the Script Club, Launch Lab, all industry programs, complimentary use of all production facilities and equipment, one-on-one script consultations, industry mentoring, ability to apply to the Quicksilver Production Fund and Hamilton Health and Safety Fund plus a discounted venue hire and South Australian Screen Award submission fees.

With alumni including Emmy award winners, Oscar nominees, a Cannes Special Jury Prize winner and the Best Director winner at Sundance Film Festival, our passion for quality is undeniable.

The Mercury also boasts two cinemas – a 186 seat Mercury cinema, and the 36 seat Iris - both of which offer a comprehensive film program of contemporary, classic and cult favourites films.
