In this Advent season, we gather around this wreath of candles to pray for lost hopes, broken peace, limited joys, and love so difficult to find and share in this season of isolation and virus. These candles remind us that God's light has come into the world in the One whose presence we await. These candles symbolize that nothing, not even isolation and pandemic, can diminish the light of God's love for us in Jesus Christ.

O God, send us out from Christ's table to answer his summons into new life and to follow him with joy and gladness.


Set our feet in Christ's holy way, that our lives may be signs of his life and all we do may show his love. Amen.

MUSIC IN WORSHIP

This morning's anthem, "And the glory of the Lord," is the well-known fourth movement of George Frederick Handel's oratorio for soloists, chorus, and orchestra, *Messiah*. This movement is the first appearance of the chorus and concludes the opening section that tells of God's promise of hope through prophecy. Written in a ³/₄ tempo, it is full of praise. "Glory" refers to resplendent radiance of light such as will surround the person of the Messiah. "All flesh shall see it together" means all of humankind will see this Messiah at one time. Originally an Easter offering, Handel composed *Messiah* in 1742 in just 24 days.
