Choose to Give Thanks

This week's readings are all about making choices. The wilderness wanderers choose to complain against God. A psalmist writes of God's response to their prayers and the people choose to give God thanks. A letter to the church in Ephesus reminds us that we can choose to respond to God's grace by doing good in the world. The gospel of John tells us that God chooses to love the whole world and promises life.

Focus scripture: **Psalm 107:1–3, 17–22**

Psalm 107:1–3, 17–22 opens with people choosing to give thanks because God has saved them (vv. 1–3). After this initial introduction, the psalm follows a distinctive pattern. First, the people describe an issue or trouble, then pray to God to save them. They then describe God's saving actions and end with thanks for God's love. The psalm notes a variety of troubles: people lost in the desert (vv. 4–9), prisoners in misery and irons (vv. 10–16), people who are sick (vv. 17–22), and caught in a storm (vv. 23–30). In each instance, God responds.

The particular focus for this week's reading is on the people who are in distress because they are sick and distressed. They cry to God, and God saves and heals. They choose to give. This thanksgiving psalm reminds us that part of the nature of God is about restoring, saving, and liberating.

God guided the Hebrew people out of slavery in Egypt, and it is these same people who are encountered once again in Numbers 21:4-9. Earlier, the now-freed people had seen a miraculous parting of the waters, which allowed them to cross to the other side. They encountered God in dramatic ways (in a pillar of fire, in a cloud, and as smoke). The people are now wandering in the wilderness and perhaps have forgotten both their liberation and God's promise to guide them to a new land. Instead, they grumble and complain to Moses about a lack of food and water. The storyteller tells about poisonous serpents that bite and kill. These serpents have the power to destroy, yet faith in the bronze serpent crafted by Moses has the power to save. The people face and look at what they fear.

It might be hard to wrestle with the notion of God sending snakes to bring death upon a people. Why would God do this? This reality may be particularly challenging to reconcile with an understanding of an all-loving and grace-filled God. Perhaps the good news in this story is that God brings healing and saves the people.

Ephesians 2:1–10 also focuses on what it means to be saved – through God's grace and not good works. There is God-action, and then our response: grace is poured out upon us, and we are inspired by God's love to do good works. Works alone are not what saves; rather, we work towards justice in response to God's loving actions.

The passage describes the difference in life with Christ. Now people are "dead" to other ways of being and are alive in Christ. Now they walk in good works. Being "saved" in this passage is not about personal morality; instead, it is about God's good work in us and through us.

John 3:14–21 reminds us of God's good work in Christ. Jesus talks with Nicodemus about what it means to be saved and draws on the image of the bronze serpent that brought healing to the wilderness wanderers. The same serpent that brought death also brought life. Similarly, Jesus would also experience death, and would also bring new life. The God of love experiences life with us.

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God hears our cries of distress, outpours love over us and then invites us to respond. How will we respond to God's love and grace in this Lenten season? In what ways can we choose to give thanks?



Focus scripture Psalm 107:1-3, 17-22

Additional scriptures Numbers 21:4–9 Ephesians 2:1–10 John 3:14–21

The Focus for Ages 3–5

From their birth, children must trust in the constant love of family and other caregivers. They know what it is like to depend on someone for virtually all their needs. They may understand, but they are not likely to be able to articulate their vulnerability. Being part of a faith community helps them to learn about and to trust in the constant love of God. Generous themselves, young children assume that God's love is for everyone, and they react with concern when someone seems to be hurting or excluded.

This week's Bible story encourages children to act out and repeat the phrase "over

and over and over again" to highlight a generous love that is great enough for all people. Children this age often recognize others in hard situations and may try to find help for them or offer it themselves. Without coaching, they respond appropriately to God's unconditional love and grace by offering their own love freely and generously. Build on their natural inclination to express concern for others by encouraging a caring attitude within the group. Pray that every child will thrive in God's unconditional love and experience this love expressed by the people around them.

Prepare

Before the session

- ☐ Read and prayerfully reflect on this week's focus scripture, Psalm 107:1–3, 17–22, and biblical background material (p. 21).
- ☐ Set a worship space with purple cloth, purple candle, matches, offering basket, Bible with the purple, blue, and green bookmarks from past weeks and a yellow bookmark placed in this week's focus passage from the Psalms.
- ☐ Bring <u>basic supply kit</u> (p. 2), and, if possible, *Seasons Songbook* (Volume 7), *Seasons Music CD* (Volume 7), *Seasons Growing Faith (SGF) Songbook, SGF Music CD*, CD or MP3 player; downloadable sheet music and MP3 recordings are available at <u>www.seasonsonline.ca</u>.

Gather

- ☐ Cut out many small paper hearts and place them around the room; bring a basket to collect these.
- ☐ Bring "Gathering Song" (on resource sheet "Additional Songs," p. 89) or song, "Thank God" (p. 28, SFG Songbook; #18, SGF Music CD).
- □ Option: bring a puppet (see information on p. 2).
- ☐ Bring several broken crayons.

Engage

- ☐ Bring this week's resource sheet "God's Wonderful Love."
- ☐ Bring songs "I've Got a Voice" (pp. 20–21 in *Seasons Songbook*, Vol. 7; #13 on *Seasons Music CD*, Vol. 7) and/or "Jump for Joy" (p. 14 in *SGF Songbook*, #10 on *SGF Music CD*).
- ☐ Bring Lenten calendar (from previous weeks) and container of stones (see p. 88 for more information about the <u>Lenten</u> ritual).
- □ Bring song "God's Promise" (on resource sheet "Additional Songs," p. 89).

Choose to Give Thanks

Scripture

Psalm 107:1-3, 17-22 **FOCUS** To hear that God's love is for everyone and for all time

Gather:

Welcome each child by name. Encourage them to search the room to find the paper hearts and place these in the basket.

Opening ritual

Gather around the worship space and remind children that we are in the Season of Lent and the colour for Lent is purple. Light the candle, saying, "This candle reminds us of God's love shining in the world." Then repeat for each child, "God's love shines in (child's name)."

Pray Dear God, thank you

thank you for being with us today. Thank you for your love. Amen.

Sing "Gathering Song" (p. 89) or "Thank God" (p. 28, Seasons Growing Faith Songbook; #18, Seasons Growing Faith Music CD).

Extinguish the candle to signal that the opening ritual has ended.

Moving into the theme

Choose one of the following:

□ Puppet conversation

Priscilla: Hi everyone (*sounding really sad*). **Leader:** Priscilla? Is something wrong?

Priscilla: Oh, I feel so bad about this (points to some broken crayons).

Leader: That's OK. Crayons do break. Why are you so sad?

Priscilla: It was my fault. I didn't mean to but I dropped some crayons and they broke.

Leader: Oh, Priscilla. Do you see any angry faces here?

Priscilla: (looks around) No...everyone looks kind and loving.

Leader: That's right, Priscilla. We will always, always love you.

Priscilla: That sure makes me feel better! (*Turns to children.*) Girls and boys, have you ever made a mistake? (*Encourage their answers.*) Who keeps loving you over and over again? (*Encourage answers.*)

Leader: We all make mistakes, but our family and friends still love us, over and over again. Today we will hear about someone else who loves us over and over again. (*Say goodbye to Priscilla.*)

□ **Heart basket** Place the basket of hearts in the middle and ask the children if they can think of times when they felt especially loved, even when they have made mistakes. Start by giving an example of your own. Then ask, "Who keeps loving you over and over again?" Each time an answer is given, take a heart from the basket and make a "trail" of hearts on the floor.



Before the story

Invite a child to bring the Bible from the worship table and use the yellow bookmark to open it to

the book of Psalms. Explain that the Psalms are a collection of songs and poems about God. Show the purple, blue, and green bookmarks from

previous weeks' stories and then return to the yellow bookmark for this week's focus passage. Use the resource sheet "God's Wonderful Love" to tell the story based on Psalm 107:1–3, 17–22. At the end of the story invite children to each take several hearts from the basket to keep as reminders of God's love.

After the story

People in the Bible felt a very special happiness when they came to the temple to worship. They sang and danced the psalms in praise to God. People today can also show their love for God in music and dance.

Music Encourage children to sing along and dance to the song "I've Got a Voice" (#13 on Seasons Music CD, Vol. 7) or "Jump for Joy" (#10 on Seasons Growing Faith Music CD).

Lenten calendar Lent is a special time to remember God's wonderful promises to us. Invite children to gather around the Lenten calendar. Explain that we are counting the days through Lent by placing stones on the pathway and when the whole path is covered with stones it will be time to celebrate Easter. Have children place stones on numbers 17–22. Read aloud the phrase beside the illustration for March 11.

Sing "God's Promise" (on p. 89)

-Respond

Choose from the following activities:

- Poster We can show the love God shows to us. Invite children to make a poster about God's love. Distribute paper heart shapes and have children draw happy faces on their hearts and decorate them with bright colours. Demonstrate how to glue these onto a sheet of poster board and draw arms and legs on each heart. Invite children to think of a title for the heart poster and display it in the church hall.
- Musical instruments People celebrate God's wonderful love with music. Invite children to make some musical instruments. Show the illustrations on the resource sheet "<u>Biblical</u> <u>Musical Instruments</u>" and help children use

the materials provided to make one or two instruments. When completed, have a parade and sing about God's wonderful love. Consider distributing copies of the resource sheet for children to take home and make other instruments.

□ Snack Sharing food together is one way of sharing love. Help children wash their hands. Demonstrate how to use a frosting/icing tube to make happy faces and smiles on the biscuits or cookies; add other decorations if desired. Thank God for the snack and share together, talking about how God loves us over and over, no matter how we feel and no matter what happens.



Gather in the worship space and light the candle again.

Pray Dear God, thank you for songs that help us to say how we feel.

Help us to always remember your love. Amen.

Sing the "Leaving Song" (on p. 89).

Send each child off with this blessing, "(Child's name), God's love is for you, always and everywhere."

Refilect

How can you continue to make God's presence known to the children? In what ways are the children building relationships with one another? What can you do to help this process?



Practice repeating the words, cued by "God loves everyone...", and guide children to roll their hands over each other with those words.

God's healing love made us well again. God loves everyone... **over and over and over again.** (*Roll hands...*) God brought us together so we can live together.



God loves everyone... **over and over and over and over and over and over again.** (*Roll hands...*)


And God loves YOU! (One at a time, show children the heart hand signal and have them signal it back to you.)









Storytelling Resources


Lenten calendar

The Rainbow Path of God's Promises is a calendar found on the poster <u>Storytelling</u>

Resources. This calendar will be used each week during the Season of Lent, to help the children mark the days as they travel through Lent towards Easter Sunday. Cut the calendar section off the Storytelling Resources poster. Place the calendar on a low table, preferably somewhere where it can remain without being disturbed during the six weeks of the season. Have a container of 40 small stones nearby. These stones can be ones collected from a beach or woodland area nearby, or you can purchase bags of polished stones from a craft store or garden centre.

Each week the children will place the required number of stones on the path for that week and sing the song "God's Promise" (on the resource sheet "Additional Songs" on p. 89). On Easter Day they will reach the empty tomb and celebrate Jesus' resurrection.

If the children will be part of an all-ages gathering on Palm/ Passion Sunday and Easter Sunday, plan how you will complete the calendar activity. You might want to "look ahead" on your last day together as a group before Palm/Passion Sunday and then "look back" on the calendar on your first day together after Easter Sunday.



Note that the 40 days of the Lenten Season refer to the week days during this time. Each Sunday during Lent is traditionally considered a "little Easter" and is not counted as part of the 40 days.

Easter storytelling figures

The <u>Storytelling Resources</u> posters include figures to use in the Bible stories during the Easter season. There are figures of Jesus, Thomas, a pair of disciples, and two figures representing Philip and the Ethiopian official. Each figure is labelled with a date but they can also be used during the telling of stories on other Sundays if desired.

Cut out the figures and mount on paper rolls or large craft sticks so that the children can hold them and move them during the storytelling times.
