G. W. Rolle, pastor of justice ministries at The Missio Dei, a new worshiping community in the Presbytery of Tampa Bay, knows people living on the streets don't hear the information about the virus like others do. "They don't have TVs to tell them everything is closed," he said. "And most of the places where they could go for public meals are shut down." Missio Dei is one of the few places left in the community providing meals. On Saturday mornings, volunteers still give our breakfast burritos. While they're not gathering people anymore for meals, they are handing out food in bags. The Missio Dei has received support from Mission Program Grants. Available through the Racial Equity & Women's Intercultural Ministries, the grants support the transforming work of new worshiping communities and mid councils.

With many Americans losing the ability to work, school being canceled for millions of children, and child-care centers being shuttered, the challenges of people already living on or near the edge of society become magnified. "We can pretty much guarantee that there will be heightened food insecurity," said the Rev. Rebecca Barnes, coordinator of the Presbyterian Hunger Program. "I'm thankful for the conversations opening up," Barnes said. "People are using the phrase, 'We're all in this together.' This is a great invitation for us to really examine some of the policies and systems we have in place." There's still plenty more to do, particularly at the advocacy level. From the Presbyterian Mission Yearbook of Prayer:

Mission co-worker Nadia Ayoub felt a strong call to work with refugees. She has moved to the city of Katerini on Greece's mainland to serve in partnership with Perichoresis, a Presbyterian (U.S.A) global partner that works to alleviate some of the hardship suffered by refugees. Perichoresis provides housing and support for approximately 550 refugees in 115 apartments in Katerini. "When refugees had to camp out in Idomeni, Greece, members of the Evangelical Church in Greece rediscovered their own forced migration story from 100 years ago and decided to organize support," said Burkhard Paetzold, Presbyterian World Mission's regional liaison for Central and Western Europe. Now their expanded programs include a nursery school sports activities program, and socio-therapeutic groups for children, adolescents and women. It also supports refugees with medical appointments and visits with lawyers.

The Rev. Morgan Schmidt, Associate pastor of First Presbyterian Church in Bend, Oregon, launched the Facebook site Pandemic Partners on March 12. The magic of this," she said, "is the crowdsourcing of kindness – making it happen as people rise to their best selves." By posting how-to guides on its Facebook page, Pandemic Partners, located in the Presbytery of the Cascades, has taken hold in about 18 other communities, with another 15 preparing to launch in the Bend area. There are now chapters operational in large communities including Denver, Seattle and San Antonio, as well as in more rural communities in Minnesota and other states. Rev.
