4. Being a Navigator means...Being a patient's advocate throughout their cancer experience and teaching them to become empowered patients.



5. What do you enjoy most about your job as Navigator?

I am the Vice President of Survivorship for LUNGevity so I don't work in a hospital or clinic but I do work with patients and health care providers. My team and I help to navigate lung cancer patients to resources and support programs and we help healthcare providers by providing them the information they need to better care for their patients.

- 6. What special skills do you bring to your job, including hidden or visible talents and past work/life experience? I feel like supporting patients is my calling. I am a cancer survivor. I also lost my dad to lung cancer. I have experienced barriers to care and poor health systems. I've personally struggled with feelings of isolation and helplessness. I never want another patient to feel the way my dad or I did.
- 7. Are there any tips, resources and/or words of inspiration or advice you would like to share with other Navigators? I would like to see more healthcare providers/Navigators collaborating and working together- especially across different healthcare systems in a community. I would like them to share and pool resources to better help their patients. I also encourage them to join a group like AONN so that they can keep connected, learn new methodologies and network to improve the way they care for patients.

If so please see additional questionnaire below: I've been to the AONN annual meetings and always walk away with a wonderful sense of community and new tid-bits of information that I want to put into action in our organization.
