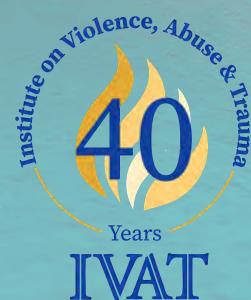

About the 23rd Hawai'i International Summit

Summit Description and Goals

The 23rd Hawai'i International Summit brings together the latest research on prevention, assessment, and intervention techniques concerning various aspects of trauma and maltreatment across the lifespan, as well as the long-term effects if left untreated. Plenary and breakout sessions will discuss various types of child, adolescent, and adult/elder trauma, the dynamics of maltreatment and trauma at home or in the community, and the psychological, behavioral, and neurodevelopmental effects. Nationally and internationally recognized presenters and local practitioners assemble to discuss the latest research, assessment methods, interventions, and prevention strategies for those who have been traumatized, abused, and/or victimized. Application of current research, information and practical techniques, along with a focus on trauma-informed care, healing-centered practices, and cultural perspectives, are emphasized throughout this Summit.

Objectives

- Identify current state-of-the-science research and practice concerning child, adolescent and adult/elder trauma and maltreatment and healing
- Explain the dynamics and overlap of different types of trauma and maltreatment
- Identify the effects of early trauma on the long-term functioning of children, adolescents, and adults/elders
- Improve skills and techniques for helping children, adolescents, adults/elders, and families recover from various types of trauma and maltreatment
- Identify issues and strategies for preventing abuse and neglect
- Enhance understanding of trauma-informed and healing-centered approaches and practices

Continuing Education & Specialty Certifications

Earn up to 18 Continuing Education Credits

The Summit is approved to offer up to 18 hours of continuing education for Psychologists, Counselors, Marriage and Family Therapists, Social Workers, Attorneys, Certified Prevention Specialists, Victim Advocates, Substance Abuse Counselors, and many more. There is an opportunity to earn up to an additional 7 hours of continuing education credit by attending one of our Affiliated Trainings on March 1st, 2026. Additional CE accreditation may be available – due to accreditation procedures, we are prohibited from advertising prior to approval. CE credits approved by California agencies are accepted in most states. Different sessions meet many licensure requirements for continuing education credits for child custody, domestic violence offender treatment, and child sexual abuse.

The Institute on Violence, Abuse and Trauma (IVAT) is approved by the American Psychological Association (APA) to sponsor continuing education for psychologists. IVAT maintains responsibility for this continuing education program and its content. The California Board of Behavioral Sciences (BBS) now accepts APA continuing education credit for license renewal for LCSWs, LMFTs, LPCCs, and LEPs. These approvals satisfy requirements for different disciplines in many states; however, requirements vary. Please check with your state credentialing Board. IVAT is approved by the California Board of Registered Nurses to offer continuing education for nurses (CEP #13737). IVAT is approved by the State Bar of California to offer Minimum Continuing Legal Education for attorneys (#11600). IVAT is approved by the California Consortium of Addiction Programs and Professionals (CCAPP) to sponsor continuing education for certified alcohol and drug abuse counselors (Provider #IS-03-499-0223). IVAT has been approved by NBCC as an Approved Continuing Education Provider, ACEP No. 7385. Programs that do not qualify for NBCC credit are clearly identified. IVAT is solely responsible for all aspects of the programs. IVAT, (#1857), is approved as an ACE provider to offer social work continuing education by the Association of Social Work Boards (ASWB) Approved Continuing Education (ACE) program. Regulatory boards are the final authority on courses accepted for continuing education credit. ACE provider approval period: 7/18/2024 – 7/18/2027.

IVAT Specialty Certifications

Affiliated Training and Summit sessions meet many of the training requirements for IVAT Specialty Certification Programs. Specialty certification assures the consumer that specialists have successfully completed the educational, training, and experience requirements for the specialty area, and that their expertise has been objectively reviewed and documented.

Specialty Certification in Domestic Violence Offender Treatment

Includes training and experience in working with both male and female intimate partner violence offenders to understand the dynamics and safety issues involved in intimate partner violence and typologies of offenders.

Specialty Certification in Child Custody Evaluations

Includes an understanding of the issues of child development, parenting abilities and issues, best interests of children, assessment techniques in general, and specifically regarding child custody cases. The dynamics of legal, forensic, and mental health issues are included.

Specialty Certification in Trauma Care

Includes an understanding of the various forms of trauma, short-and long-term effects of trauma, and assessing and treating adults and/or children who have experienced both simple and complex trauma. The dynamics of post-traumatic stress disorder are included.

Specialty Certification in Child and Adult Maltreatment (CAM) (Formerly known as CAST/CAAST)

Focuses on experiential, interdisciplinary, ethical, and culturally sensitive content that provides professionals with a common knowledge base for responding to child and adult maltreatment. This certification focuses on the development and understanding of the numerous factors that lead to child and adult maltreatment and the existing responses to child and adult maltreatment.

Partner Certifications

Post-Graduate Certification in Child Protection

Stop the Silence® - A Department of IVAT, in partnership with The University of Applied Research and Development (UARD), accredited in the United Kingdom (UK), offers a Post Graduate Certificate in Child Protection as a stand-alone program, or the credits can be used toward achieving a Master's in the field. The Program is a unique opportunity to get important, fundamental information at one's own pace, provided by experts in the field of adverse childhood experiences (ACEs), for a fraction of the cost of other programs, and in as little as three months for the certificate and 12-24 months for the Master's. The focus includes prevention, treatment, mitigation, and policy considerations regarding child sexual abuse, physical abuse, psychological abuse, and other traumatic events.

Multiplex Empirically Guided Inventory of Ecological Aggregates (MEGA)® Risk Assessment Certification

MEGA® is a tool for assessing risk for coarse sexual improprieties, and/or sexually abusive behaviors in youth ages 4-19 years. MEGA® is applicable for adjudicated or non-adjudicated males, females, and transgender individuals, including youth with low intellectual functioning. Robustly anchored in scientific methods and tested on over 4,000 youth internationally (largest validation studies in its field), MEGA® is state-of-the-art and unique. It provides a comprehensive individualized risk level over time (an outcome measure). This training provides certification on how to administer the assessment, as well as how to interpret and apply the MEGA® findings.

Plenary Speaker: Ilima-Lei Macfarlane, MA (invited)
Nā Wahine Toa Foundation

Ilima-Lei Macfarlane is a Native-Hawaiian professional MMA fighter from Honolulu, Hawai'i. She grew up the youngest of six kids and played sports for Punahou School until she graduated in 2009 and moved to San Diego to pursue higher education. There, she earned her Bachelor's Degree in Cultural Anthropology and her Master's Degree in Liberal Arts and Sciences with a focus on Indigenous issues from San Diego State University (SDSU). It was also during her time at SDSU that her interests in Native American culture and combat

sports began to grow. Originally planning to become a social studies teacher, her life took an unexpected turn when she walked into an MMA gym on her way to work. Two years after first stepping into that gym, Ilima-Lei found herself stepping into the cage of one of the largest MMA promotions in the world, making her professional debut. Since then, she has built an impressive professional record of 12-2 and, in 2017, became the inaugural Bellator MMA Women's Flyweight World Champion. She went on to successfully defend her title four times, including twice in her hometown of Honolulu, Hawai'i, at the historic Blaisdell Arena—moments many consider among the greatest in Hawai'i MMA history. When Ilima is not inside the cage, she channels her fighting spirit into her community. After learning about the MMIW movement and the epidemic of violence against Native women, she created a scholarship and her own foundation to empower young women around the world. She believes that a life worth living is one spent in service of others.

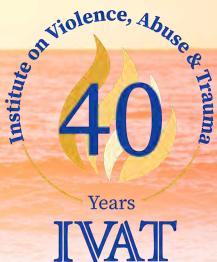
