## The History, Art, and Culture of the 50th WOCN Conference



The WOCN did a fantastic job again in covering a variety of topics addressing physical and psychosocial issues affecting patients with wounds, ostomies and continence problems.

#### **History:**

This was a milestone conference, #50 for the WOCN, and it was held in one of the most historic US cities. Philadelphia is a past US capital and Benjamin Franklin's home. The WOCN highlighted the presidents and education from the past 50 years. The conference opened with a couple of surprise guests: the daughter of Norma Gill and the son of Robert Turnbull MD, the dedicated pioneers of our profession. It wasn't difficult to gain even more admiration for these legendary leaders after hearing about them from their own children.



#### Art:

Art was abundant in Philadelphia, with many historic statues, the popular LOVE sculpture, and countless museums.

Artistry is a key skill for the wound, ostomy and continence professional. Creativity and innovation were a constant theme throughout the diverse presentations, posters, and product displays.

There were many lessons on the art of working with wound, ostomy and continence patients. These included managing complex wounds, fistulas and ostomies; treating patients with too much or too little stool output; balancing factors inside (microbiomes) and outside (friction, pressure and moisture) the body; motivating patients to learn, engage and comply; communicating with patients about the potential sexual effects of surgery; and being culturally competent.

The art of overcoming obstacles and living life to the fullest was demonstrated by several ostomates who presented or were part of the vendor team. Philly, with its iconic Rocky statue, was the perfect setting for emphasizing what it means to be a champion. The next

The art of collaboration was exhibited in the joint presentations and multi-author posters. The unveiling of the <u>PSAG</u> was also a shared venture between ostomy professionals and Christine Kim, a Texan living with an ostomy and the creator of the <u>Ostomy Connection</u> website.

#### **Culture:**

Philadelphia has a diverse and vivid culture of history, art, music, sports, and food. It's similar to some of the large historic cities in the northeast, but it definitely has its own personality.

There was a culture of professionalism among the conference speakers and attendees. It was inspiring to learn with and from so many hard working peers from all over the country and across the seas. Networking with nurses, speakers and vendors is always one of the best learning opportunities at conferences. The innovation, creativity, compassion, and dedication that wound, ostomy and continence professionals display in their work is not only impressive, it's truly motivating.
