Letter from NASN President and Executive Director

Dear Friends,

Throughout the fiscal year April 1, 2017- March 31, 2018, the National Association of School Nurses' (NASN) deepened mission-minded actions to optimize student health and learning by advancing the practice of school nursing. NASN focused on being a voice for student health and learning in multiple ways.

Advocacy:

NASN advocates for the health, safety, and learning of all students – in person, on paper, and electronically.

- Sign-On Letters NASN joined with national organizations to promote children's health
 and safety including: extending and reauthorizing CHIP; support for Medicaid in schools
 and opposition to cuts to the Medicaid program; support for ESSA Title IV; and, support
 for CDC led gun violence research.
- The NURSE Act Nurses for Under-Resourced Schools Everywhere Act (HR 5251/S 2532) The NURSE Act, S. 2532 was introduced by Senator Jon Tester (D-MT) in the Senate. In the House, Representative Dina Titus (D-NV) introduced H.R. 5251.

Communication:

NASN shares who school nurses are and what school nurses do to keep students healthy, safe, and ready to learn.

- NASN spokespersons informed stories and audiences about student health and safety, as well as the work of school nurses.
- NASN introduced <u>NASN School Nurse Chat</u>, a podcast for school nurses about student health and well being. The first episode featured helping students become anti-bullying advocates.

School Nurse Education:

NASN supports school nurses as they advance their nursing practice. Several resources and tools available to support school nurses include:

- Launched the revised <u>School Emergency Triage Training (SETT)</u> live program
- A NASN cohort began work as Johnson & Johnson School Health Leadership Program
 Fellows working on a project that will result in development of message maps for school
 nurses.

Grant Funded Programs for Student Health and Learning



SETT is a program written for registered nurses employed in the specialty of school nursing. The goal of this program is to provide school nurses with the knowledge, skills, and resources to

perform as leaders of first-aid teams in response to mass casualty events occurring in schools. Effective management of school emergencies where there are mass casualties requires careful training, preparation, and planning to maximize effectiveness under less than optimal conditions.

The school nurse coordinates the collection of information from a variety of sources to develop emergency plans. Emergency response plans require coordination with school administrators, staff, and other community first responders. This program equips the school nurse with knowledge to develop and lead school first-aid teams.

Between April 1, 2017 – March 31, 2018, nine SETT programs were hosted, including in Germany and Guam and 463 participants were trained.

NICE - Nursing Infection Control Education Network

NASN partnered with the American Nurses Association (ANA) and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) to train United States (U.S.) nurses in infection prevention and control. The goal of the partnership was to provide real-time, tailed infection control training to nurses and improve infection prevention and control practices known to be effective in preventing exposure to viruses and diseases like Ebola and Zika and other emerging infectious diseases. Through this initiative NASN shared webinars and resources to assist school nurses with these efforts.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention awarded a five-year cooperative agreement beginning June 1, 2016 to NASN to implement *National Collaboration to Support Health, Wellness, and Academic Success of School-age Children* to address the priority area of school health services for managing chronic conditions. Annual funding is \$375,000. The goal of the project is to improve chronic condition management in schools by strengthening partnerships between local and state leaders in education

and health. During Year 1 it was discovered that lack of a common definition presents ongoing challenges to planning, implementing, and evaluating outcomes of care coordination for students with chronic health conditions. With that in mind, NASN planned to host in April 2018 the *Strategy to Action Roundtable* bringing leaders in education and health together to articulate a common definition of care coordination for school and community stakeholders to guide a coordinated approach to management of students' chronic health conditions. This will provide the foundation for work in Years 2-5.


Advocacy for Student Health and Learning

Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP)

NASN was at the forefront of many coalitions in the fight to re-authorize CHIP; initially given a six year re-authorization by Congress and then they went back and added another four years to the re-authorization for a total of ten years to ensure all children are covered by quality, affordable health insurance.

National Alliance of Specialized Instructional Support Personnel (NASISP)

NASISP is an extremely important coalition that NASN participates in that represents Specialized Instructional Support Personnel. School Nurses are SISP professionals along with their sister organizations including school social workers, school psychiatrists, and others to address barriers to educational success to help students achieve academic excellence. SISP professionals are recognized by the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) as integral



members of school teams to improve school and student outcomes.

Medicaid in Schools

NASN was a leading voice in the Medicaid in Schools Coalition that fought against cuts to Medicaid (or changes to the structure of the Medicaid program) that could affect the one percent of Medicaid that flows directly to schools. NASN and other organizations repeatedly made the case to the Hill that Medicaid needed to be protected and educated Congress, and their staffs, that Medicaid helped children in school. Increasingly, schools are partners in health promotion and interventions of students' physical and mental health so that they can be healthy, safe, and ready to learn.

Hill Day

NASN's Board of Directors participated in Hill Day when each of the 54 members met with their two Senators and Member of Congress as they advocated for NASN's four legislative priorities. Additionally, they explained the role of the school nurse in keeping children healthy, safe, and ready to learn.



Title IV Coalition

NASN is a principle player in the Title IV Coalition that is comprised of many national organizations working together to advance and advocate for full funding of the new flexible block grant under the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). The block grant, known as the Student Support and Academic Enrichment (SSAE) grant program, is designed to ensure that high poverty districts have access to programs that foster safe and healthy students, provide students with a well-rounded education, and increase the effective use of technology in our nation's schools.



Membership for Student Health and Learning



October 2017 - Membership Campaign

In October 2017, NASN launched a celebration on social media #TodaysSchoolNurse. We highlighted a different membership benefit each week that advances the school nursing. NASN engaged members on Facebook, Twitter, and in NASN's Weekly Digest sharing informative blogs, graphics, and conversation starters. NASN recruited non-members using segmentation marketing strategies via automated messaging. NASN Affiliates joined in the recruitment efforts by launching a membership drive.

21st Century NASN Affiliate Leadership Development Initiative

December 2017 - NASN received \$10,000 grant from ASAE to build the capacity of Affiliates to plan and implement innovative membership recruitment and retention.



Viral School Nurse Video - September - October 2017

 Offered a different kind of contact than NASN's traditional messaging to reach that broader audience by using a fun, light-hearted puppet video.

On September 13, 2017, the EepyBird school nurse viral video was released on Facebook. This was the kick-off of an overall social media campaign for the video that also included Twitter and LinkedIn. The campaign concluded at the end of October.


The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation awarded NASN the opportunity to work with EepyBird on this viral video campaign about school nurses. The goal of the viral video campaign was to reach an entirely new population with a teaser about what school nurses do and to increase engagement with NASN.

The reason we used a video is that it offered a different kind of contact than NASN's traditional messaging to reach that broader audience by using a fun, light-hearted puppet video. The video created the potential to drive more people to the NASN website and to the specific content we linked at the end of the video.

Facebook Metrics:

People Reached: 176,753Video Views: 72,332Reactions: 7,230Post Clicks: 14,737

The metrics received from FullSix, the agency that handled the paid placement on Facebook, showed that for awareness, which is just measuring how many eyeballs were reached even for a moment, the campaign generated 1.2 million impressions = 518 thousand unique people reached. This level of awareness was slightly above target.











Research for Student Health and Learning

Workforce Survey Completed - 3 infographics

- Partnered with the University of Washington to get an estimate of total number of school nurses in the United States.
- Manuscript published in the Journal of School Nursing; infographics published in NASN School Nurse (but in July 2018). The infographics are on the website.



District Self-Assessment Pilot

NASN partnered with Mansfield Texas Unified School District to pilot NASN's 21^{st} Century School Nursing Practice Self-Assessment Tool for DistrictsTM a district level self-assessment tool and review process.

The purpose of the tool and review process is to provide guidance and standards to school districts that operationalizes NASN's Framework for 21st Century School Nursing Practice ™. Currently, no other guidance or standards exist as to what a district school health services program should address. As NASN advocates for student health and advancing school nursing practice, we must address the other systems (such as school districts) that directly impact services.

Partnership with CDC's National Center of Immunization and Respiratory Disease

- Partnered to conduct a survey related to school nursing efforts to improve immunization compliance of kindergarteners.
- Results were presented at CDC's Immunization Conference; a manuscript is in the works.

Partnership with Georgetown University on Scope of School Nursing Practice

- Partnered with a doctoral student at Georgetown University to develop and conduct a survey related to working to full scope of school nursing practice.
- Tool was based on the Scope and Standards of School Nursing Practice and NASN's Framework for 21^{st} Century School Nursing Practice $^{\text{TM}}$.

Preliminary results indicate that school nurses more frequently practice to full scope within the principle of care coordination than any other Framework principle. Quality Improvement was the least frequent principal practiced to full scope. A manuscript is in the works.
