Dorsey recognized all certified hospice and palliative nurses in attendance. National HPNA's mission is to provide expert care and encourages nurses to become certified. HPNAFW is considering a preparation course. Seven nurses indicated interest in attending a preparation course.

Nancy introduced Sam Brodsgaard, MA, MT-BC, presented a program "Music Therapy In Hospice and Palliative Care." Sam is the owner of Metroplex Music Therapy and has a Bachelor in Music degree from SMU, and an MA in Music Therapy from TWU, and is a certified music therapist. Sam@MetroplexMusicTherapy.com. Sam explained what music therapy is and how it can help patients by addressing the emotional, social, cognitive, physical, and spiritual needs of an individual, and can benefit patients, family members, friends, and support staff. The learning objectives were, 1). Discuss the history of music therapy as an allied health profession; 2) Describe treatment goals of music therapy in hospice and palliative; 3) Discuss treatment domains and interventions of music therapy in hospice and palliative care; and 4) Describe treatment outcomes of music therapy in hospice and palliative care. Sam highlighted the difference between music therapy—done only by a certified music therapist—and using music therapeutically. Sam shared stories of how to use music, song-writing, life review, relaxation, spirituality, and memorial services to help a patients and families at the end of life. The group was very engaged and asked great questions. Recommended reading - Oliver Sacks wrote *Musicophilia: Tales of Music and the Brain*.
