National league of Nursing, 2018

American Society of Superintendents of Training School for Nurses was the first professional nursing organization in the United States established in 1873.

It is now known as the National League for Nursing.

NURSES ASSOCIATED ALUMNAE, 1876



Nurses Associated Alumnae was established in 1876 and is presently known as ANA.

Mission Statement:

Nurses advancing our profession to improve health for all.

ANA advances the nursing profession by facilitating standards, ethics and advocating on health care issues that affect nurses and the public.




Martha Franklin, graduated from nursing school in Philadelphia, co-founder of National Association of Colored Graduate Nurses.

Mission: breakdown discrimination, raise nursing standards, and develop leadership roles

Board members included City of NY and ANA

- 1908-1958: founded in NYC and grew to 52 members
- 1909: the first nursing convention with 26 nurses in attendance
- Helped to assist with the Bolton Act allowed for more black nurses in armed forces
- 1949: NAGCN voted for ANA to take over the functions and the organization resolved in 1951

1970s

The Council of Black Nurses of LA and the Bay Area Black Nurses Association, held a state conference for black nurses. The conference drew in nurses from everywhere, NY, and FL.

- Black nurse organizations attended the ANA conference and presented issues and a steering committee was developed.
 1971
- In December in the home of Dr. Mary Harper, NBNA was born in Ohio.

Dr. Lauranne Sams was a professor at Tuskegee University

- Dr. Sams was the first black nurse to graduate from Indiana school of nursing and first black nurse to teach there.

1972

NBNA was broken down into four regions. Chapters started to pop up around the nation.

2018

NBNA represents approximately 150,000 African American nurses from the USA, Canada, Eastern Caribbean and Africa, with 91 chartered chapters nationwide, 36 chapters in the US alone. NBNA collaborates with agencies/organizations that share common concerns for improving the health status of all people, particularly African Americans and other minority consumers



CCBNC was founded in December of 1982 by the late Dorothy Davis Cox Fisher, RN, MSN, FNP Organizational meeting were held at NCCU health science building drawing nurses from Orange, Durham and Pearson counties.
