Clinical Corner

A scrub tech asked - During a scar revision, the surgeon discovered bullet fragments or shot. I asked if we should give these to a policeman. The nurse said "Yes", but the surgeon said it wasn't necessary because they were from an accident that happened a long time ago. The nurse said she would handle it the way evidence is handled anyway, just in case. After the case, we showed the specimen to the charge nurse but she didn't know what to do. So, we sent them to pathology. Was that right?

Answer - Even though the surgeon said these metal pieces were from on old "accident", it is possible that is what the patient told him, but it may not be true. The pieces should have been handled with a non-metal instrument and placed in a dry, plastic container. A law enforcement officer should have been consulted and the specimen turned over to the officer. The officer's name and badge number should be written in the operative record and an incident notification written stating how the specimen was handled. It would be up to the officer to determine whether to perform an investigation.

MedShare has cancelled our January 29th volunteer morning session due to the currently high transmission rates of COVID-19 in the community.


Our next scheduled volunteer morning session will be on Saturday, April 23rd.


MONTHLY GROUP HIKE
