

## The Importance of Recognizing and Respecting Culture and Lived Experience of Racism in Caring for African American Patients at End of Life

In providing care to our African American patients, we must recognize and respect the cultural values of this group, values that may differ from what we know and act upon. We also need to understand and recognize the terrible effect that racism has had on the lives of all African Americans. By partnering with African American communities, listening to and really hearing what they tell us, and by developing programs that are culturally concordant with the communities' values and that take into consideration the community's lived experience, we can provide the hospice care that is valuable to the community.



# **KEYNOTE**Driving Equity in Serious Illness Care: Centering High Quality Communication and Relationships

High quality communication that strengthens relationships and centers patients' values and priorities in their care is a powerful intervention in the lives of individuals affected by serious illness. Clinicians who engage patients and families in these emotionally supportive conversations can promote safety, trustworthiness, partnership, and empowerment. However, persons of color living with serious illness face significant inequities in access to high-quality communication. Few clinicians are trained in serious illness communication, and aspects of healthcare 'culture' mean that patients frequently receive care devoid of these relationship-centered elements. Join us for an interactive discussion about co-creating, testing, and scaling culturally adapted communication tools, clinician training, and systems-changes through partnerships with organizations, communities, and individuals engaged in serious illness care transformation.

#### **The View from Washington**

2022 is bringing many changes and challenges for hospice and palliative care providers. What are policymakers using to make recommendations about hospice going forward? What about changes in the survey process? When will enforcement remedies be implemented and how will they work? What new quality measure will be proposed? What reports will the Office of Inspector General issue that present challenging findings for hospice care? Is this the year where we will see the beginnings of a palliative care benefit? Will we see growth in the number of patients with serious illness get the care they need and deserve? This session will have up to the minute content, data points and a proposed hospice rule.



### Unriddling the Role of the End-Of-Life Doula: Science or Art?

Former biomedical research scientist, now End-of-Life Doula, Dr. Nathalie Bonafé will share how the supportive role of a doula can benefit patients, families and agencies alike; promote early referrals to home health, palliative care and hospice as well as enhance the quality of care, employee morale, and improve ratings in national health care surveys. Nathalie is a member of the National End-Of-Life Doula Alliance (NEDA) and of the NHPCO End-of-Life Council Covid19 Grief Doula support group.
