## **Clinical Corner**

A Nurse asks: How do you handle a cranial bone flap that has fallen on the floor?

Answer: Unfortunately, nobody has published any studies to support any one solution to this problem. Your hospital should have a policy regarding contaminated autogenous flaps. If it does not, there have been several options used with no reported incidence of surgical site infection, provided appropriate post-operative antibiotic coverage has been maintained.

Option I: Discard the flap and perform a cranioplasty using methyl methacrylate, titanium mesh plate or another suitable implant material.

Option II: Using sterile gloves to handle the flap, in a sterile basin, soak the flap in a half-strength solution of povidone-iodine 10% (or use povidone-iodine 5% solution) for approximately 20 minutes. With a new pair of sterile gloves, rinse the flap with sterile saline and return it to the field.

Option III: With sterile gloves, rinse the flap with sterile saline and place the bone flap in a flash sterilizer for 3 minutes. Allow it to cool before reimplanting it.



## **AORN's Perioperative Nursing Data Set**

Working in the operating room, we frequently use terms and language which may sound confusing to those who don't work in the operating room. For patients, the names of surgeries may sound foreign because their names are derived from Greek and Latin. Even co-workers in the central processing department call instruments and supplies something different than what our surgical staff calls the same item. Having two sets of staff communicating about instruments in almost two different languages has the potential to cause some confusion and delays. Standardized language and definitions are important, and that is why language unique to perioperative nurses called the Perioperative Nursing Data Set (PNDS) was created. The PNDS was created by AORN and is recognized by the American Nurses Association (ANA) as the first nursing language created by a specialty organization.

The PNDS represents nursing knowledge in the form of a coding language used by perioperative nurses to document nursing care from preadmission all the way to patient discharge. The PNDS captures important clinical data points used in analysis aimed at improving patient outcomes. These data elements of the PNDS are collected and grouped into larger data sets which are then used for analysis (Peterson, 2011). Evidence can be generated from the data to support nursing practice and improve patient outcomes.

The PNDS contains defined terminology for nursing assessments, evaluations, implementation, outcomes, and problems. Terminology used in the PNDS must be standardized which is vital to its use with more widespread larger clinical information processing systems such as SNOMED\_CT. The PNDS must also be adaptable to the influence perioperative nurses have on patients and can be updated to reflect changes in evidence and practice (Petersen & Kleiner, 2011).

The information we place in a patient's chart is important for a number of reasons. One of the lesser-known reasons your charting is important is because those data points can be used to improve evidence-based nursing practice and patient outcomes.
