

Clinical Corner



A Nurse asked:

"If a surgeon wants the scrub tech to staple the drapes to the patient's skin; can they do that"?

Answer:

Using the skin stapler to hold the drapes to the skin causes minor puncture wounds. Neither a nurse nor a scrub tech can alter tissue. This is under the purview of a surgeon. The Medical Practice Act describes any incision, puncture, scraping, etc. as "altering the tissues" and is defined as "Surgery". Therefore, the ST should NOT staple the drapes.

Reference:

California Business and Professions Code #2052 defines the practice of Medicine to include "clamping, cutting, tying and suturing tissue." Using a skin stapler on a patient is defined as "suturing". Therefore, any person who does not possess a medical license may not insert staples into a patient.



WHY SHOULD YOU ATTEND?

Adoption of safety scalpels in the operating room remains a challenge, as 80% of reported injuries in the OR occur utilizing a device without a sharps injury prevention feature. Consequently, the vast majority of surgical incisions are performed with a standard reusable scalpel handle and a single-use stainless steel blade that must be manually mounted and removed. Adoption of safety-engineered scalpels has remained low and efforts are underway to investigate new designs that will ultimately lead to higher use in the operating room.

WHO SHOULD TAKE THIS COURSE?

This continuing education activity is intended for perioperative nurses, or other health care professionals who wants to learn more or needs to gain knowledge and skills in sharps safety.

Free seminar will be conducted via Microsoft Teams. A link will be provided within a week of the seminar.

- List obstacles to adoption of safety controls.
