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#### **Report From the Board**

The role of the board for NNYPNO is to stay abreast of trends in nursing and inform its members about important issues that affect nursing practice.

In May 2021 the report "The Future of Nursing 2020-2030: Charting a path to achieve health equity" was released. The full report can be found at <a href="https://www.nap.edu/nursing">www.nap.edu/nursing</a> 2030

The report is the result of the work of a panel comprised of several healthcare professionals who were charged to develop information on how best to address health equity and how nurses play an essential role in this effort being the largest population of trusted and respected healthcare workers.

The aims of the study include creating a culture of health and decreasing health disparities while improving the health and well-being of the nation. The report also addresses the role of nurses in improving the health of individuals, families, and communities; systematically removing barriers to improve health; achieving a diverse workforce, and training for the comprehensive skill development needed to prepare nurses.

It was noted that the US has the highest poverty rate, the greatest income inequality, and some of the poorest health outcomes. Much of what affects our health is driven by multiple factors outside of medical care.

The vision of the study is to achieve health equity in the US built on strengthening nursing capacity and expertise. Nurses have a long history of advocacy across many situations and settings. They also coordinate care and work with individuals with adverse life experiences.

Essential roles for strengthening nursing include workforce development, leadership, education, well-being and emergency preparedness. Nursing also has a role in identifying determinants of health (medical, social, structural and individual) and impacting health equity for individuals and populations.

#### Key messages:

Policymakers need to lift artificial regulation and practice barriers that keep nurses from practicing to the top of their education and training and that restrict patients' access to high quality care. Twenty-seven states do not allow full practice authority to APRNs (NYS is one of those).

Public and private payers need to establish sustainable and flexible payment models to support nurses in healthcare and public health, including school nurses so they can effectively address medical and social needs of people, families and communities.

Nursing schools need to strengthen education curricula and expand the environment where nurses are educated to better prepare nurses to work in and within communities, and to diversify nursing school classes and faculty so nurses at all levels reflect the communities they care for.

Employers must support nurses' well-being so they in turn can support the well-being of others.

Nurses need to leverage their own power. Nurses have a powerful voice – let's be heard now and into the future. If you would like to be involved in advocacy and leadership in nursing, an important first step is to join your professional organization. MARSHALL INFIRMARY AND RENSSELAER COUNTY LUNATIC ASYLUM, 1937, EAST SIDE OF LINDEN AVENUE NEAR PAWLING AVENUE. Built in 1850 by Benjamin Marshall, who originally wanted it for indigent workmen, it was used for sick people who could not afford medical care. In 1859 the county built a three-story insane asylum, followed in 1861 by another. The original buildings were torn down. The site is now a housing development.




















The Saratoga County Homestead, County Highway 16, East Galway, NY. Opened in 1914 and treated tuberculosis patients until 1960. In 1961 it became the Saratoga County Infirmary. Now offers "haunted hospital" tours.













The Albany City Dispensary Association, organized in 1867, was the forerunner to Memorial Hospital. In 1871 it was incorporated into a hospital, named the Albany City Homeopathic Hospital and Dispensary. A site was purchased at 161 North Pearl Street, and the Homeopathic Hospital of Albany opened there in April of 1909. In 1923 the name was changed to Memorial Hospital of Albany. Moved to its present Northern Boulevard location in 1956.





We are all less vigilant this time of the year, but we must not lose sight of eating smart. According to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), dietary guidelines for Americans include incorporating more fruits and vegetables into our diets as part of a healthy dietary pattern.

Adults should consume 1.5-2 cup-equivalents of fruits and 2-3 cup-equivalents of vegetables daily.

A healthy diet (that includes recommended amounts of fruits, vegetables, lean protein, and grains) helps support immune function, helps to prevent obesity, type 2 diabetes, and cardiovascular diseases (Lee, et al. 
