Thank you to those of you who participated in sharing your stories of leadership through the decades as we celebrated nursing leadership of the 1980s, 1990s, 2000s, 2010s and 2020s. We played a game preparing Lucy Leader for her day and embraced the gifts that each generation brings to our leadership roles. We also celebrated two extraordinary WONL Wisconsin nurse leaders who every day go above and beyond to add value to their organization. Congratulations to the 2024 WONL Nurse Executive of the year Leanne Roggemann, and 2024 Nurse Leader of the Year Liesette Rendell. What an honor to celebrate these two amazing nurse leader role models.

Some of the key highlights of the conference speakers included keynote, Dennis McIntee, who reminded us that we are ridiculously in charge of the stories we tell ourselves and gifted us a ruler to use as a visual reminder and emotional regulator to quantify issues presented to leaders with a realistic significance and energy that the issues require.

We were reminded of the importance of nurse leaders' collective impact around advocacy as November placed Wisconsin in the spotlight in the nation as a critical political swing state. WONL is always thankful for the informative updates

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from Ann Zenk from WHA who provided an overview of the 2024 healthcare workforce and highlighted the value of the WHA/WONL relationship to advance the quality of healthcare in Wisconsin.

WONL was thrilled to have Epic Systems join us to reflect on 45 years of technology innovation and future focus on nurse well-being and the importance of the voice of Nurse Leaders focusing on leveraging AI with a clear understanding of impact to the nurse's experience and well-being.

We learned from our nurse leader colleagues from the Mayo Clinic Health System about two innovations for improving patient throughput and ambulatory redesign.

WONL colleagues, celebrated our very own Wisconsin Nurse Leader, Mary Beth Kingston, who was recognized by AONL with the 2024 Lifetime Achievement Award. Mary Beth shared three key leadership lessons learned: 1) Professional organizational involvement, 2) Calculated Risk Taking, and 3) Transferable Skillsets

WONL Board member and speaker extraordinaire April Hanson shared tools and key strategies to help nurse leaders thrive in the chaos of change and become personal agents of growth.

Joshua Routh ended the conference with ideas on how to turn complainers into collaborators.

The WONL Board and Committee Chairs shared our 2024 Strategic Plan roadmap at the annual business meeting outlining the collective accomplishments that we can make together when we focus on leveraging and scaling our impact through strategic partnerships to drive innovation and progress in nursing within five key areas of our focus:

- **3. Nurse Leader Development:** Monthly webinars, Annual Conference, Nursing License Plate, Mentorships, AONL Nurse Leader Competencies, Nurse Leader recognition
- 4. Nursing Quality/Value/Innovation: WHA Quality Committee Liaison, Innovative models of care
- **5. Nursing Diversity:** WCN, The alchemy of racism on health implications for practice conference, 2024 RN Survey

- Participates in a broad range of civic and health care-related organization and a political activity for nursing and heath care.


This year, WONL is honored to select two nurse leaders as recipients of this award.



License plate sales continue to increase as the secret gets socialized across the state. Nurses change lives proudly displayed wherever we go. I must admit a sense of pride comes to my soul every time I pull up to a vehicle with nurse's plates. Solidarity in the form of nurse's license plates makes my heart happy.

To date to our current revenue cycle, we have sold 416 license plates for a total of \$10,400 collected toward nursing education in our state.


