History of Operating Rooms

Romans

In 65 AD, the Romans invented the operating tent, which is the basis for modern operating rooms.

Sushruta

Considered the "founding father of surgery," Sushruta lived around 600 BCE and was an innovator of plastic surgery.

Hua Tuo

In 190 BC, Chinese surgeon Hua Tuo introduced anesthesia for surgical procedures.

Abu Bakr Muhammad ibn Zakariya, "Rhazes"

In 825–925 AD, Rhazes established surgical suites and developed treatments for a variety of conditions, including the first interventions for cancer.

Gustav Neuber

In 1884, German surgeon Gustav Neuber designed and built the first aseptic operating theater. He implemented a comprehensive set of restrictions to ensure sterilization and aseptic operating conditions.

Philip Syng Physik

Physician Philip Syng Physik established the first operating theater in the United States in Baltimore.

The Old Operating Theatre

Dating back to 1822, The Old Operating Theatre is one of the oldest operating theaters on record.

Member Spotlight

As I begin a new chapter in the newsletter for the AORN retired nurses, let me introduce myself (per Cheryl Sumner suggestion). I have been a nurse in various roles for the past 40 years and was medically retired in 2011. After I retired, I decided, once a few months had passed, renos completed for my new house (first owned at an advanced age). I needed some structure to my days and didn't want my GI Bill \$\$\$ wasted, so I went back to school for my terminal degree in Health Administration and defended in January 2021. I have not let any dust gather under the diploma hanging on the wall.

Let's back up a bit. I graduated with my ADN in the early 1980s. I started my career as the proverbial GN, took boards as one of the absolute last testers using paper and pencil. Next cycle was computer-generated. My job was a med-surg nurse for the next two or so years. I bid on a critical care job in coronary care. Previously, I had floated (no one else wanted to) everywhere but OB (we didn't have one). This float nursing offered a ton of learning and further education. It also helped when our hospital was on strike, and I was a travel RN. Had the chance to take care of fresh hearts (fun times). Eventually there was an opening in the operating room, and I was selected (civilian). My boss 'stuck' me in totals for three months. Hips, knees, mostly. I finally asked him if he would let me do some other things. His response, 'I want you to become proficient in totals; that way I know you'll do well in other settings'.

Our suite had eight rooms, including the cysto room. Back then we had three uro docs and each one had their own set of instruments. If you didn't open the cookbook to determine what you needed to soak (yes, soak), you could be in trouble. What a relief when I was commissioned as an OR officer in the USAF. We had service nurses, and yep, you guessed it, I chose urology as a challenge (I hated uro as a civilian). Well guess what? We had ONE SET of instruments for the three uro docs and none of them complained. What a joy, plus I had great uro-surg techs who were awesome teachers. I was a CNOR for almost 20 years and had no knowledge of E status or trying for FAORN. I finished my career as an educator, something I had been doing for the tenure of my career in all my units and duty stations. I still educate. I also mentor doctoral students, AORN nurses, and ANA nurses. Some for a few months, and one for over 2 years as she works through her doctoral journey. Her goal is to defend and walk next summer. I look forward to getting to know folks as we share our stories. Maybe (if Cheryl says) I'll share some of my personal story.

Bob Evan's Crockpot Chicken and Noodle



Better than Bob Evans Chicken and Noodles.

4 boneless, skinless chicken breasts (I used frozen)

2 cans cream of chicken soup

1 stick of butter

1-32 oz. Swanson chicken broth

24 oz. Homestyle noodles

Directions: cook chicken, soup, butter, and broth in a crockpot on low for 6-7 hours. Take chicken out of the pot and shred. Put shredded chicken back in the pot; add noodles and cook on low for 2 hours. Stir a few times while cooking.
