AORN Expo Reports

AORN EXPO Report

Marisa Hamamoto was the keynote speaker for the Jerry G Peers Presentation at AORN EXPO. Her title "Be a Changemaker: Unlocking Your Choreography to Infinite Possibilities" was a challenge for us to increase our knowledge of inclusion, innovation, and transformation through movement, dance, and storytelling.

Ms. Hamamoto was born in Japan and raised in Irvine, California. She has been a dancer since childhood and during a dance class in 2006, she suffered a stroke. She was unable to eat, hold items, or use the bathroom. Two months later, after an amazing amount of hard work, she walked out of the hospital. In Dec 2010, she endured sexual assault. As a Japanese American female stroke survivor with two invisible disabilities (PTSD, Autism Level 1) she told us that "fear is a compass for growth and that our body language communicates with ourselves as well as others".

In 2014, she saw wheelchair dancing and became interested in creating something at the intersection of disability and dance. The following year, Ms. Hamamoto founded Infinite Flow Dance, an awardwinning nonprofit organization that employs disabled and nondisabled dancers who use dance to promote

inclusion and debunk biases of the disabled. She believes moving our bodies with intention and joy is more important than ever because so many people live a primarily sedentary lifestyle. She told us that movement leads to increased self-confidence, creative thinking, and connection with others.

Ms. Hamamoto stated three principles that motivated her to keep going even when faced with life obstacles.

- 1. Just because it hasn't been done, doesn't mean it can't be done.
- 2. Doing what you fear most, may lead to your next breakthrough.
- 3. Dance Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion can move hearts, move bodies, and move minds.

She closed her presentation by challenging us to face our internal bias and make changes to our practice because disability is the largest minority group, yet disability inclusion is often placed last or forgotten when addressing diversity, equity, and inclusion. Thank you Marisa for this powerful presentation.

Virtual Nurse Training

I attended the "Virtual Nurse, Immersive and Interactive Virtual Reality Training Software" session conducted by Antonia López, RN, BSN, MSc, CNOR who is creating an interactive and immersive training software to fill a need in perioperative nurse training where she lives in Spain.

Virtual reality training in nursing is currently being studied in the US, UK, and Finland, although none of those studies currently include perioperative nursing. Virtual reality is not 3D technology, 360-degree video, or augmented reality. Instead, Antonia defined

virtual reality training as "a medium composed of interactive computer simulations that perceive the position and actions of the participant and replace or increase the feedback to one or more senses, giving the sensation of being mentally immersed or present in the situation".

Virtual reality training uses the following devices: virtual reality glasses, haptic gloves, an avatar suit, and the measurement of skin conductance for stress analysis in training. The availability of these devices to measure and provide feedback to the learner allows for

immersion and for the learners' brain to engage and behave more realistically within the situation/scenario.

The learner will then adapt more quickly and efficiently to practicing as a perioperative nurse in the operating room and for a deeper integration of knowledge and clinical practice. I am excited to see how and when this new virtual reality training will be shared, integrated, and become the new standard for perioperative nurse training around the world.

2025 AORN Global Surgical Conference & EXPO

Boston, MA April 5-8 Experiences

After arriving in Boston on Friday, April 4th, and taking the bus to my hotel, I ventured to the Boston Convention and Exhibition Center (BCEC) to pick up my registration bag and then volunteer packing broccoli seeds for Seed Programs International (SPI), whose mission is to improve food security, strengthen communities, and cultivate sustainable livelihoods by enabling families to grow healthy food. SPI focuses on empowering women farmers, provide educational gardens, and crisis recovery related to conflict or climate issues. Their impact has served 94 countries and 9 million people since 1998.

For dinner, five Chapter Members and a friend gathered at the Omni Hotel's 5th Floor restaurant, Lifted, which overlooks the city streets below. A delicious time was had by all.

I started the first day of the Conference, Saturday, with the Chapter Officer Networking Breakfast at the Westin Seaport's Harbor Ballroom, followed by 7 Continuing Education sessions, one of which was a hands-on learning and interactive education, "Escape Room: A "HOT" New Way to Engage Learners" about malignant hyperthermia, and then the Welcome & Opening Keynote, "Embrace the Shake", by Phil Hansen.

I also gave our Chapter's \$300 donation to the Foundation on Saturday.

In both cases I ended up talking to leaders who helped me resolve the problems and I am so glad that I finally took the time to get it settled.


AORN Chapter Nurses walk for CHOC Sunday, August 3, 2025 • Disneyland @ 0600






AORN OC Chapter Brunch and Craft Social

May Education Report

May Education Report

Our May education topic titled "Caring for the Confused- Understanding and Managing Delirium" was presented by Patty Barnett Mouton, MSGc. I was interested to learn that although dementia and

delirium have similar features, they have distinct differences. Dementia is a chronic decline in cognitive abilities; delirium is acute confusion- lasting hours or days.

Delirium is considered a medical emergency presenting as sudden, severe confusion. A cardinal feature is abnormal attention or arousal; treating the underlying medical/ situational condition is key. Patty explained that older surgical patients are at a higher risk for post-op delirium. Things like pain, subclinical infections (like from catheter use), side effects of medications, sensory impairment, malnutrition/ dehydration, and a noisy/ confusing environment can be causes for delirium.

Patty reminded us of the importance of knowing our

patients' baseline cognition in order to ascertain what may be going on after surgery when we drop off our patients in recovery. Hand-off includes the psychosocial aspect of our patient and that knowledge can

mitigate potential issues in PACU and beyond. Risk factors for delirium include advanced age, people with depression and/or dementia, broken hip/having major surgery, prior brain damage, and sensory impairment.

The bottom line is that 50% of those over 70 years of age experience delirium as an in-patient. With those numbers, we are each likely to care for someone in their surgical journey who is affected by it. Being aware of who's at risk, and remembering to pay attention and observe our patients; utilize active listening and therapeutic communication will go a long way in improving the care we give in the perioperative setting.

May Meeting Minutes

ORANGE COUNTY AORN CHAPTER 0510 MEETING MINUTES - MAY 3, 2025

Call to order: The meeting was called to order at 8:50 am by President Kristie Koepplin.

Roll Call: 13 members were present in the room, and 3 members virtually. Two guests were present; Cathy De Guzman and Alysha Wright, a new graduate from Concordia University whom is interested in working in the operating room.

Reflection: That Little Girl, by Paula Graling RN, MSN, CNOR, CNS Falls Church, Virginia from "Tea and Toast for the Perioperative Spirit".

Review and Approval of Minutes:

The minutes from the February meeting were printed in the April newsletter. No changes were needed. The minutes were approved as written.

Financial Report & Bills: Current balance on hand is \$9937.05. Income from AORN memberships-\$926.00 for the past three months. Income from our ERAS seminar was \$1650 from 22 registrants. Expenses included the February speaker dinner, Chapter meeting refreshment, newsletter fees, and a \$300 donation to AORN Foundation made at Expo. Total expenses were \$745.33. Meredith will send our donation to Cathy for her participation on a medical mission after today's meeting.

New Business: Melinda spoke about the recent California Alliance for Perioperative Practice meeting. They are focused on 3 areas, education, implementation and seminars. Their next subcommittee meeting is on May 10, 2025. Melinda stated CAPP is currently comprised of nursing and law professionals.

Our Chapter Accountability Standard score is 4 stars. We were not able to earn 5 stars due to not enough membership growth, which comprises 20% of the score.

At today's meeting, a motion was made, seconded, and passed for the 2025 EXPO delegate stipend to be \$1000, an amount higher than previous years. EXPO was held in Boston and the delegate expenses were greater than in past years.

Sally Stredler of the Nominating Committee announced the results of the Chapter leadership election results. Sharon Kleinheinz will be President, Debbie Pettit, Treasurer. BOD will include Sylvia Adsitt, Janet Moran, and Angel Tull. Nominating Committee members will be Cathy Hjorth, Kari Dodge, and Kristie Koepplin. They will be installed into office on June 28th. The Installation and Planning meeting will be held at Prime Cut Cafe in Orange from 11-2 pm. Contact Kristie if you plan to attend. Seating is limited.

Delegate articles and any other information for publication in the August newsletter are due by July 19th to Sharon Kleinheinz.

At today's meeting, Cathy De Guzman gave a talk about her recent medical mission trip to the Philippines. Our Chapter donated \$500 to defray the cost of this mission. She has traveled with Aloha Medical Mission since 2016. This mission also does trips to several other countries, and Cathy stated they always need volunteers. An article about her mission was published in our April newsletter.

AORN Foundation is looking for Chapters to donate \$150 to help sponsor the next virtual bingo to be held on November 8, 2025.

Our Chapter will decide if we wish to participate, and select our next Chapter donation at the Installation and Planning meeting in June.

Nursing Network replaced Periop Corner in January 2025. All members are included on the Network and there is no cost to our Chapter for 3 years.

Future 2025 Chapter Officers Town Hall meetings will be held on 5/15, 8/21, 9/18, 10/16 and 11/13. Meetings can be viewed retrospectively on the Nursing Network, Officer group.

The 2025 CHOC walk will be held on 8/3, and our Chapter plans to participate again this year. A team leader has not yet been announced.

AORN announced they will be launching a refreshed modern user interface for their education platform on May 22, 2025. They have sent out an email to members announcing this change.

Sharon Kleinheinz will soon be retiring from St Joseph's Education department, and she will no longer be able to arrange for our meetings to be held at St Joseph Hospital. She asked members if they had suggestions for future meetings, starting this September. Cathy Hjorth stated is an employee at St Joseph, and work with Sharon to see if she would be able to secure this location for future meetings. Any other suggestions are welcome and should be presented to Chapter leadership as soon as possible.

Hearty and Healthful Home Cooking

Super Simple Shrimp

Ingredients:

- 1 pound large shrimp, peeled and deveined
- 2 Tolive oil
- 4 garlic cloves, minced
- ¼ cup grated parmesan cheese
- 2 T chopped parsley
- 1 tsp lemon zest

Salt and pepper to taste

Directions:

Coat shrimp with olive oil, garlic, parsley, lemon, salt, pepper and parmesan cheese. Place shrimp in a single layer on a parchment paper lined baking sheet and bake 15 minutes at 425°.



Veggie Casserole Ingredients:

- 1 head of broccoli, cut into florets
- 1 head of cauliflower, cut into florets
- 1 large zucchini, sliced
- 1 cup cherry tomatoes, halved
- 1 can (14oz) artichoke hearts
- 1 cup of mushrooms, sliced
- 1 cup sweet peppers, sliced
- 1 small sweet onion, diced
- 1/4 cup olive oil
- 1 tsp Italian seasoning
- ½ tsp salt
- ¼ tsp pepper
- 1 cup mozzarella cheese, grated

For egg mixture:

- 4 large eggs
- ½ cup milk
- ¼ cup flour
- 1/4 tsp salt
- 1/4 tsp pepper

Directions:

Mix together the olive oil, Italian seasoning, salt & pepper. Coat all vegetables in the mixture and place vegetables in a greased 10x13 baking dish. Mix together egg mixture and pour over vegetables mixing them well. Top with mozzarella cheese. Bake 45 minutes at 350F.

Instant Oatmeal Packet Cookies

Ingredients:

- 1/4 cup White Sugar
- ½ cup Butter
- 1 Egg
- 1 tsp Vanilla
- 1 Tablespoon milk
- 1 tsp Maple Syrup
- 1/4 tsp Baking Powder
- ½ tsp Baking Soda
- 2 tsp Cinnamon
- 1 cup Flour
- 1/4 tsp Salt
- 6 (maple & brown sugar) Instant Oatmeal Packets
- ½ cup Raisins
- ½ cup Walnuts, chopped

Directions:

Beat sugar and butter together. Add egg, vanilla, milk and maple syrup and beat together. In a separate bowl, mix oatmeal packets, baking powder, baking soda, cinnamon, flour, salt together. Gently mix dry ingredients into wet ingredients. Stir in raisins and walnuts. Drop 1 tablespoonful of dough onto baking sheet, 2 inches apart, and flatten tops. Bake 8-10 minutes at 350°.
