







### Jane Flowers

There were many highlights of EXPO 2025 for me. A breakout session that I enjoyed was "Are you a Perioperative or Operating Room Nurse." Ruth Shumaker presented this topic. She explained that each of us are more than an OR Nurse as we assess our patients in pre-op and then discharge to PACU, ICU, or a Secondary Recovery Area. The point that she left each of us with was as we introduce ourselves, for clarity we should state, "I am a Perioperative Nurse who works in the Operating Room."

A second highlight was celebrating Barbara Nalley receiving the AORN Outstanding Achievement in Volunteer Leadership Award on Friday evening. About 15 of our chapter members went to dinner and surprised Barb by recognizing her accomplishment as a group. It was a wonderful evening for all, followed by the Awards Ceremony on Sunday afternoon. Joan Spear received two surprise awards: the Jerry Peers Award for her dedication to Perioperative Nursing and then on Monday morning she was recognized with the AORN Foundation Philanthropy Award. Well deserved to both of them.

My final highlight was that my assigned AORN mentee for this year was in attendance for her first EXPO. Madelaine Catchco has worked at NYU in the OR, for about 15 months. We have been talking about EXPO for the past several weeks. She was nervous about attending alone, so I spent some time with her. The trade show will be memorable for her as we walked up to many booths and I asked the vendors to show her, teach her and let her experience their products. She drove the Davinci, picking up and moving rings. She rode the hovermat from one table to the next. She was positioned on a spinal table. Russ Scanlon showed her various vascular instruments and described the specifics of why each was important. It was fun for me to watch her joy as she experienced the wonder of EXPO.







### Linda Kempske

Enhancing Patient Safety: A Comprehensive Intervention to Prevent Foley Trauma

The extremely informative presenters were from Texas Children's Hospital. The hospital is one of the largest hospitals in the USA. It houses 973 beds, 43,00 surgical cases and 275, 000 patient's days. The presentation began with stating that multiple male foley catheters and not been fully inserted into the bladder, but rather, "the ballon was inflated into the bladder neck with no urine return. Consequently, they had iatrogenic urethral trauma secondary to urethral catheterization." Their AIM statement was "To reduce urethral catheter related trauma in the inpatient pediatric population at Texas Children's Hospital by 50% within 6 months." This was 100% achieved. The updated policy reflected their education. It was a simple graft with the acronym; HUB. **H**: Advance Foley to HUB, **U**: Obtain return of URINE and **B**: always in BOYS. The staff was educated, HUB stickers and a graft of proper foley catheter graft/size/age were placed in all supply rooms and ORs that read:

- Never inflate the ballon without urine return unless irrigation step is completed with no resistance.
- Remove catheter if irrigation is met with resistance. A second attempt at catheter placement may be performed.
- Irrigation of the urinary catheter for placement confirmation will not be performed in the NICU unit.
- Call Urology physicians if irrigation continues to be met with resistance.
- Call Urology physician if any bleeding is noted during insertion of catheter or if bleeding is noted after a failed attempted insertion.

Their voices were strong, informed, and filled with passion—and it was a vivid reminder of the importance of policy engagement and collective advocacy in driving meaningful change within our profession.

I also thoroughly enjoyed the poster sessions, which showcased an impressive range of projects—from clinical improvement initiatives and patient safety protocols to educational strategies and operational efficiencies. It was exciting to see how creative and dedicated perioperative teams are in advancing care through research and innovation.

Beyond the sessions and networking, what stood out the most was the sense of community. Being surrounded by thousands of nurses who are equally committed to excellence, education, and professional growth was uplifting. It reinforced why we do what we do, and it reminded me of the incredible impact perioperative nurses have on surgical outcomes and patient lives.

The AORN 2025 Expo wasn't just a professional development opportunity—it was a powerful reminder of our collective strength, our voice, and our future. This year's conference was a great opportunity to learn, engage, and network. It made me proud to be part of a group that includes champions of both nursing excellence and DEI. *To the point of me being 11 years into nursing before I even realized our state is a diversified anomaly.* And yes...I've been a nurse more than 11 years.

One of my favorite sessions this Expo year was titled "Operating Room Odyssey: A Surgical Escape ", and it showed attendees how to create a virtual escape room. Learners were told to bring their laptops to the session so that they could follow along with the steps to create escape rooms for their own facilities. Each registered attendees (I wasn't registered, I just crashed the party) was emailed a document with instructions for every step of the creators' process.

Unfortunately, as it often happens when relying on technology, our presenters experienced difficulties while attempting to play the videos embedded in their slideshow. Plus, in order to get through the material the presenters maintained a fast pace making it difficult for learners to keep up with the instructions. In hindsight, the laptops weren't needed, and while the videos would have been a nice addition, their lack of presence really didn't detract from the overall presentation.

After the virtual escape room presentation was over, I asked the creators how long it took them to make one and they admitted that their first attempt took three months to complete. It was only after finding their footing, taking chances, and making mistakes that they were able to cement a format that allows them to now create a virtual escape room in about four hours time. So I asked them where I could purchase it! Those instructions were Too Much!

The discussion Shola Richards had at the General session was inspiriting. Ubuntu is inspiring! Today more than ever, incivility is all around us. He provided great insights how we need to move together in all that we do. Each one of us needs to make a commitment: "true to what you said you were going to do long after the mood has left you" (Shola) in our environments and no longer stay silent in hopes that things will change. We need to be the one to walk alongside our team members and assist in the journey. We also need to actively practice self-kindness which he also terms as tough love self-care. Most importantly, we need to acknowledge what role we play in these dynamics and keep in mind the 3 principles: is it kind, is it

true and is it necessary.



### Terri Ridel

Once again AORN Expo did not disappoint! One of my favorite sessions this year was the General session on Monday, "The Courage to Go Together" by Shola Richards.

Shola spoke on team cohesiveness, civility and togetherness to maintain a healthy workplace culture. Shola once worked in a very toxic work environment. His colleagues were abusive and unkind, even stepping on his sandwich that he left in the refrigerator for his lunch. He fell into a deep depression and tried to commit suicide. Luckily, his dad reached out to him and told him to be "like the Buffalo, not the Cow." The cow lays down when a storm comes, the buffalo will face the storm and is stronger because of it.

Many people feel they do not have the power or influence to make changes in their work environment. That is not true. We can all impact change by doing it together. Shola shared his mantra with the audience, "Ubuntu" meaning "I am because we are." This is an African philosophy that we are universally connected to each other through a shared humanity, rooted in kindness and compassion. Shola Richards suggests it could transform the way we treat others, making us kinder and more respectful to others, on and off the job.

Shola says because we are interconnected, we should ask three questions: Is it kind? Is it true? Is it necessary? These three questions will increase the likelihood of civil, engaged and productive work culture. We also need self-awareness to become mindful of how our words, actions, and behaviors affect others. We must actively practice kindness and self-kindness. Self-kindness includes things like setting healthy boundaries & prioritizing rest. It's okay to say no sometimes.

Shola says to be an "upstander." An upstander is someone who doesn't gossip or make fun of others. If we live by the word Ubuntu, we can change the way we live, work, and lead. He said that the latest poll shows that 75% of Americans believe that incivility has reached crisis levels in the US. Also, that 94% of Americans believe that they are always or usually polite and respectful to others. He shared this

quote "No single drop of rain believes that it is responsible for the flood."

Live by Ubuntu!
