#### SEPTEMBER MEETING RECAP

Our September meeting started with a delicious dinner provided by Texas Health Care Pharmacy. President Laurie Smith who welcomed all present and explained that this is our "kickoff" meeting for the fall season. She explained the benefits of being a member and that members can join or renew their membership on the chapter website at https://hpnafw.nursingnetwork.com/. She introduced Nancy Ritts who discussed future presentations and introduced tonight's speaker.

Tonight's speaker was Shawnta Pittman-Hobbs, MD, who spoke about The Role of the Palliative Care Physician. Her objectives were to:

[1] Describe the role of the palliative care consult, [2] List three main areas of focus of supportive and palliative care, [3] Compare and contrast palliative care vs hospice, [4] Describe key components in palliative care billing.

#### 1. What palliative care does:

maximizes quality of life manages pain and symptoms

promotes communication among physicians coordinates medical and supportive services

assists with patient decision making about care provides support for caregivers

#### 2. The National Consensus Project on Quality Palliative Care:

Structures and processes of care Physical aspects of care

Psychological, spiritual, social, and cultural aspects of care 

Ethical and legal aspects of care

#### 3. The Target Population:

Patients and families facing serious illness, with most patients having a life limiting illness. Those illness include chronic conditions tracked by Darmouth Atlas including: CHF, COPD, ERSD, ASPVD, DM, Dementia, chronic liver disease, along with a host of others, including post cardiac arrest, patients/families with complex decision making, bedbound patients with complex disease.

- **4. Case studies** with specific descriptions of issues, and pertinent questions concerning each study. (E.g. "What is the most appropriate time to consult palliative care?" Answer: Palliative care is offered simultaneously with all other appropriate medical treatmentsatany—age and any stage, or may replace treatments no longer benefiting the patient).
- 5. Billing in palliative care, which a physician will code for each patient encounter in two parts:
- 1) a procedure/service code
- 2) a diagnosis code
- 6. She closed by noting that improved communication, enhanced decision making, and respect and dignity occur as a result of the palliative care consult.

A lovely chocolate cake decorated for the "Kickoff" season was served to all 8:15pm Following the presentation and cake the meeting adjourned with reminders of next month's meeting and program "Opioid Conversion" (speaker Linda McMahan). October's meeting will be held at Baylor All Saints.
