So begins this candid discussion by a skilled surgeon who confronts the fact that often what matters most in end-of-life care is the ability of physicians to engage patients and their family members in open and sensitive dialogs about their prognosis and the options available to them.

The hour-long documentary is narrated by Dr. Gawande and delicately follows the plan of care of several patients at the end of life, including that of his own father. Each story features the patient - ranging in age from a 34-year-old mother of a newborn to the senior Dr. Gawande - family members and physicians and offers a glimpse into the heart-wrenching but necessary discussions about options of care, future wishes, and the role of hospice.

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
