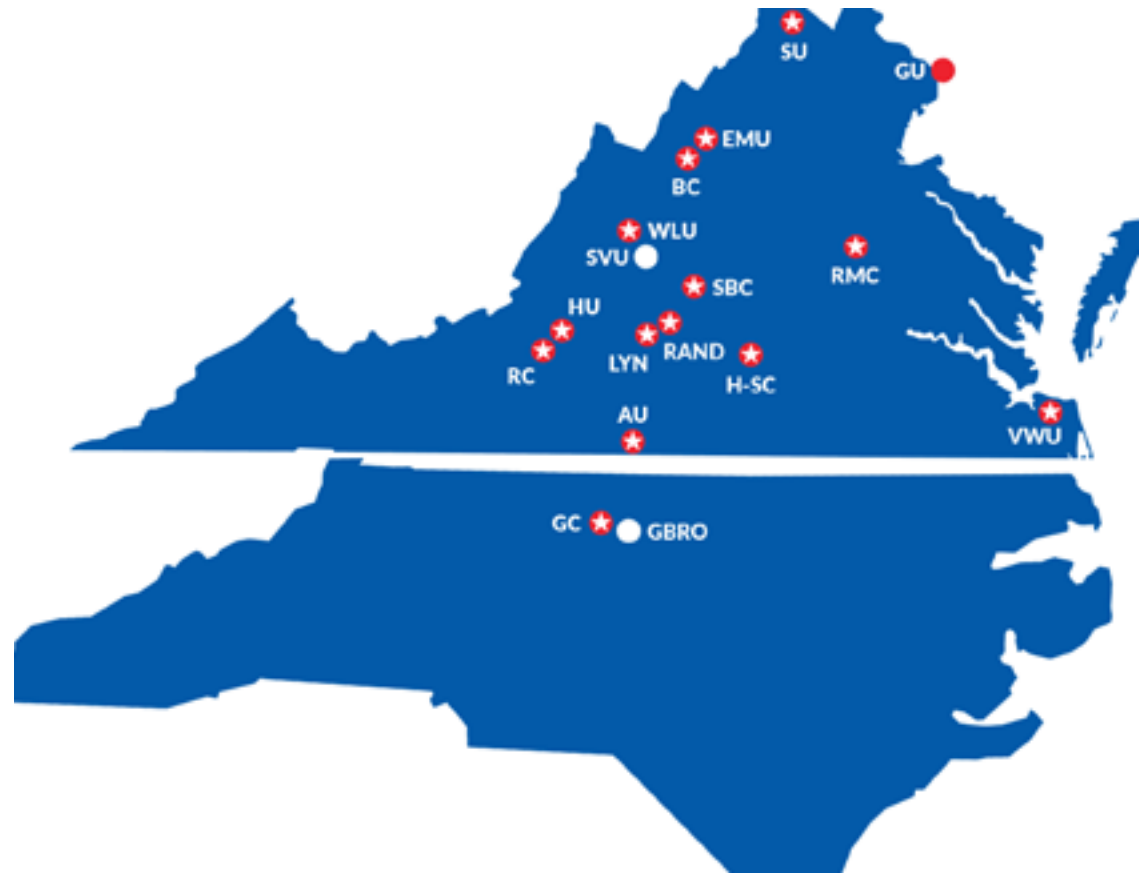

The ODAC is committed to...

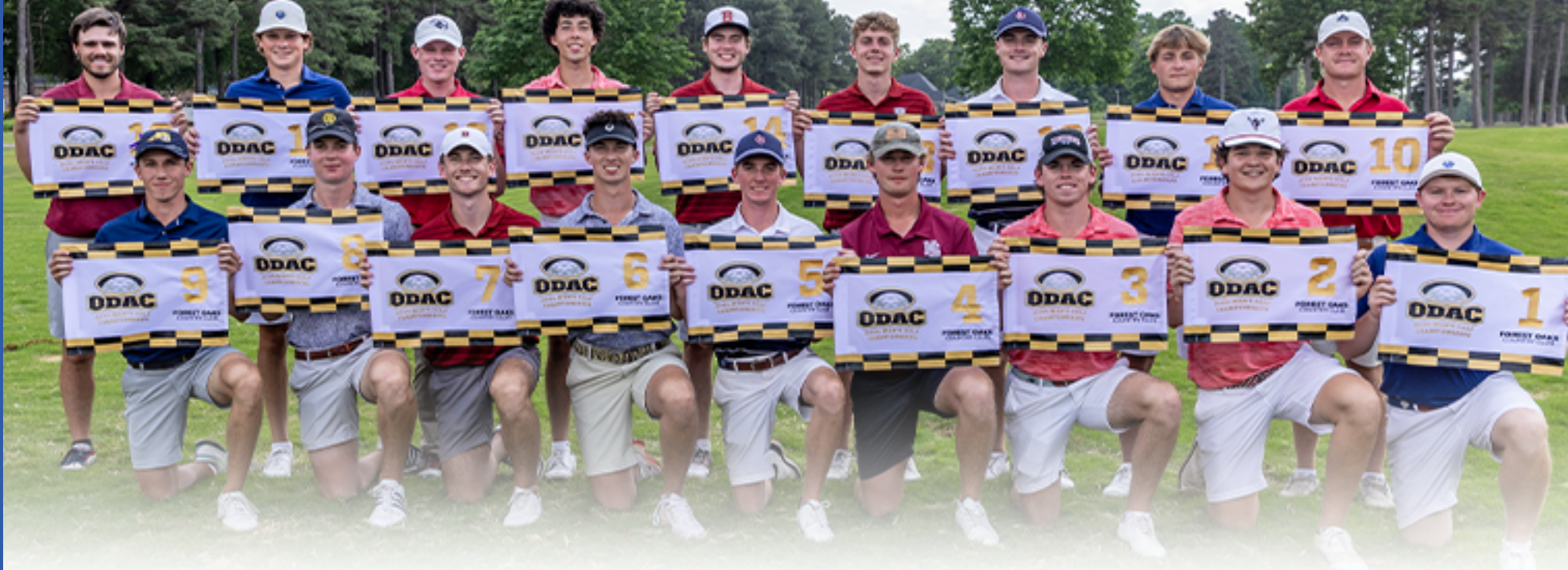
- **HOLISTIC EDUCATION:** We support academics as the primary focus at our member institutions and recognize athletics is an integral part of a well-rounded college experience.

Championship Philosophy

In 2011, the conference adopted a philosophical framework for all conference championships. The guiding principles include:

1. ODAC postseason events should be conducted in a manner that maximizes and emphasizes first and foremost, the student-athlete experience. These events should be viewed and conducted in a manner that highlights and celebrates the accomplishments and excellence that is pervasive throughout the ODAC.
2. As many student-athletes as possible should be provided the opportunity to participate/experience an ODAC postseason event. Limits placed on the number of teams and/or individual participants should be based on factors that are well-established or those that have an adverse effect on the majority of member institutions (e.g., travel costs, missed class time) or the management of the event itself. Similarly, determinations on how the postseason event is to be conducted (e.g., bracket size, location) should be based on factors that are relatively static (e.g., costs and missed class time) and not on factors that are fluid from one year to the next (e.g., competitive parity).
3. The experiential and competitive opportunities provided by conference postseason events should take precedence over other considerations (e.g., NCAA playoffs).
4. Every effort will be made to conduct ODAC postseason events at campus facilities or facilities within an ODAC campus community.

The Commissioner

- Provides leadership to the Old Dominion Athletic Conference
- Ensures that intercollegiate athletic activity on the campuses of member institutions is consistent with the philosophy, rules and regulations of the ODAC and NCAA Division III
- Directs the conference's planning, including the development of standing long-range and annual goals
- Develops and maintains conference policy and procedures as set forth by the conference's constitution and by-laws
- Oversees the planning and execution of the conference's 26 championship sports
- Serves as a resource to member institutions regarding NCAA DIII compliance and championship issues
- Functions as a liaison between member institutions and the NCAA Office and Divisional/Association-Wide Committees
- Demonstrates community involvement with active leadership in associations and service organizations that work with and in coordination with the conference
- Serves the conference membership by participating on national committees within the NCAA and outside Division III organizations (DIII Commissioners Association, other DIII administrative organizations)



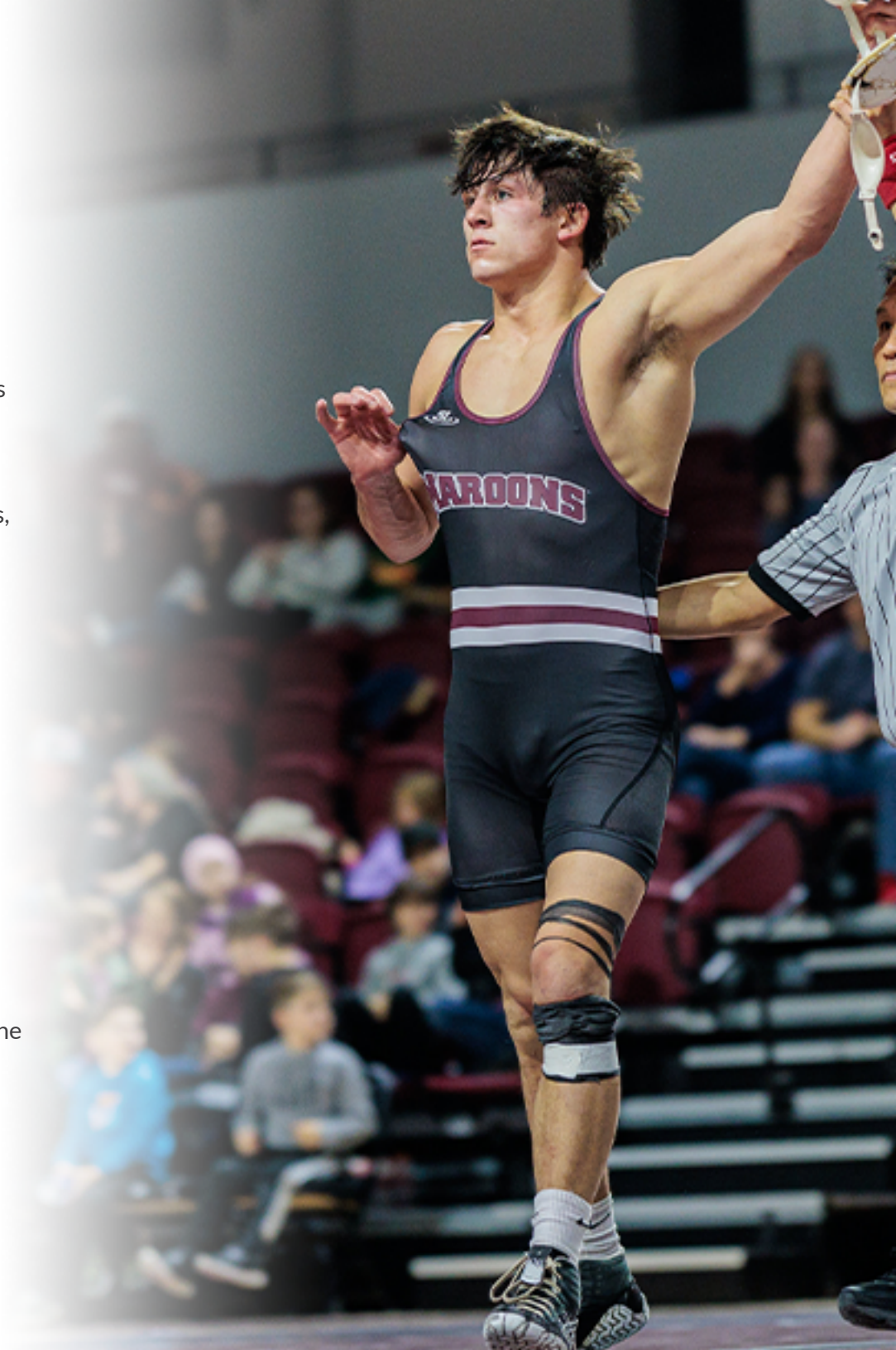


The Associate Commissioner

- Serve as the athletic communications and sports information contact for the conference office and serve as the liaison to athletic communication and/or sports information directors at the ODAC's member institutions
- Manage the conference's awards platform including weekly honors, scholar-athlete awards, all-conference processes, and preseason polls
- Design, manage, and maintain the conference website
- Manage and generate content for the ODAC's social media accounts
- Maintain a working knowledge of web-streaming solutions – both hardware and services – and serve as the primary producer of web-streaming initiatives for neutral site championships
- Develop models and serve as the primary scheduler of conference matrices for several sports, working with outside sources as necessary (i.e. Center for Athletic Scheduling)
- Produce printed and multimedia content for conference championships
- Maintain conference records and statistical histories
- Assist with operation of ODAC tournaments and championships
- Serve as the host media coordinator for NCAA championship events hosted by the ODAC and its partners
- Represent the ODAC at conference meetings, national events, conference championships, and national championships
- Assist with updating, maintaining, and distributing the conference policies and procedures

The Director of Championships

- Coordinate operations for ODAC tournaments and championships
- Manage all invoicing and payments associated with conference officiating in 13 sports
- Represent the conference at conference meetings, national events, conference championships, and national championships
- Oversee the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC)
- Work with ODAC Senior Woman Administrators on programming for women and minorities in the conference
- Assist with developing conference schedules
- Assist with maintaining conference records
- Assist with updating, maintaining and distributing the conference policies and procedures
- Assist with administration of NCAA Strategic Initiatives Grant.
- Assist with managing the conference budget
- Assist with updating the conference website
- Serve as the primary contact for ball agreements and coordinate the conference ball deals

ODAC Policies & Procedures

The policies and procedures consist of legislation adopted by the membership to uphold the principles of the conference and to ensure equal application of commonly agreed upon rules and regulations. The Conference Office interprets and enforces the rules voted on and approved by the members. We do not make the rules— you do!

The administrative policies and procedures include the Constitution, general policies that are non-sport specific or apply to all sports and sport policies, specific to each sport and group (trainers, SIDs).

The ODAC follows rules and regulations as laid out by NCAA Division III. The ODAC does not have additional eligibility or recruiting rules outside of Division III.

ODAC Institutions Are Expected To:

- Comply with all applicable NCAA and conference rules and regulations
 - Ensure that staff members, student-athletes and others associated with athletics are knowledgeable of NCAA, ODAC and institutional rules, policies and procedures
 - Monitor their programs to ensure compliance and to identify and report to the conference and/or the NCAA instances in which compliance has not been achieved
 - Cooperate fully with any investigation conducted by the conference and/or NCAA and accept whatever corrective and disciplinary actions are deemed warranted

Scheduling

The ODAC produces schedules for every team sport. Several sport schedules are created in conjunction with the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point Center for Athletic Scheduling and Sharp Scheduling. Schedules are based on formats proposed and approved by the members.

- Approved schedules are found on the ODAC website under “About the ODAC” -- “Administrative Forms.”
- Schedules are generally based off the NCAA Championship dates. We also accommodate any ODAC postseason tournaments.
- Scheduling models vary from one sport to the next. Please reference your sport committee guidelines for more details on your scheduling model.
- We try to make accommodations for graduation if possible. The Board of Directors and Presidents are mindful of potential graduation conflicts when making decisions about championship formats and timing.
- Game times are specified for both weekday and weekend contests in several sports. Please reference the ODAC manual as well as your sport committee guidelines.
- All scheduling questions should first be handled by the two schools involved, working not only with head coaches but also each school's athletics director.

Rich History

- Formed on May 18, 1975 and began operations in September 1976 to kickoff the first season of competition.
- Eight charter members -- Bridgewater College, Eastern Mennonite College (now University), Emory & Henry College, Hampden-Sydney College, Lynchburg College (now University of), Randolph-Macon College, Roanoke College, Washington and Lee University
- Sponsored 10 men's sports thru 1981-82; women's sports were added prior to the 1982-83 season along with three new members -- Hollins College (now University), Randolph-Macon Woman's College (now Randolph College), and Sweet Briar College
- ODAC has grown to include 14 full-time members and five associate members across 26 sports, making the ODAC the second-largest multi-sport conference in NCAA Division III

Competing on the National Stage

ODAC teams and individuals have been impressive on the national stage, especially in recent years.

- The University of Lynchburg claimed its first NCAA Baseball championship with a victory over Johns Hopkins in 2023.
- Virginia Wesleyan claimed back-to-back NCAA softball titles in 2017 and 2018 and earned a third title in 2021 in Salem, Va. VWU finished as the runner-up in 2025.
- Virginia Wesleyan men's basketball hoisted the 2006 walnut & bronze trophy and finished as the runner-up in 2007
- ODAC golfers won three straight individual titles: men's championships by Virginia Wesleyan's Evan Cox in 2016 and Washington and Lee's Brian Peccie in 2018, and a women's title by Bridgewater's Christina Herbert in 2017. Lynchburg's Eddie Coffren V added the men's title in 2025.
- Lynchburg women's soccer went unbeaten (26-0-2) on the way to claiming the 2014 NCAA crown, while the Hornets' men's soccer team finished as the national runner-up in 2010
- Former Bridgewater All-American Amber Celen won the indoor 60-meter and 200-meter dashes and the 100-meter dash in 2017, while fellow Eagles standout Davonta Womack won the outdoor 100-meter dash in 2019
- Randolph-Macon College became the second ODAC men's program to win the Division III men's basketball crown as the Yellow Jackets posted a 33-1 record on the way to hoisting the 2021-22 national championship trophy.
- Greensboro College's Josh Wilson and Roanoke College's Mark Samuel won men's wrestling titles at 141 pounds in 2024 and 2025, respectively.

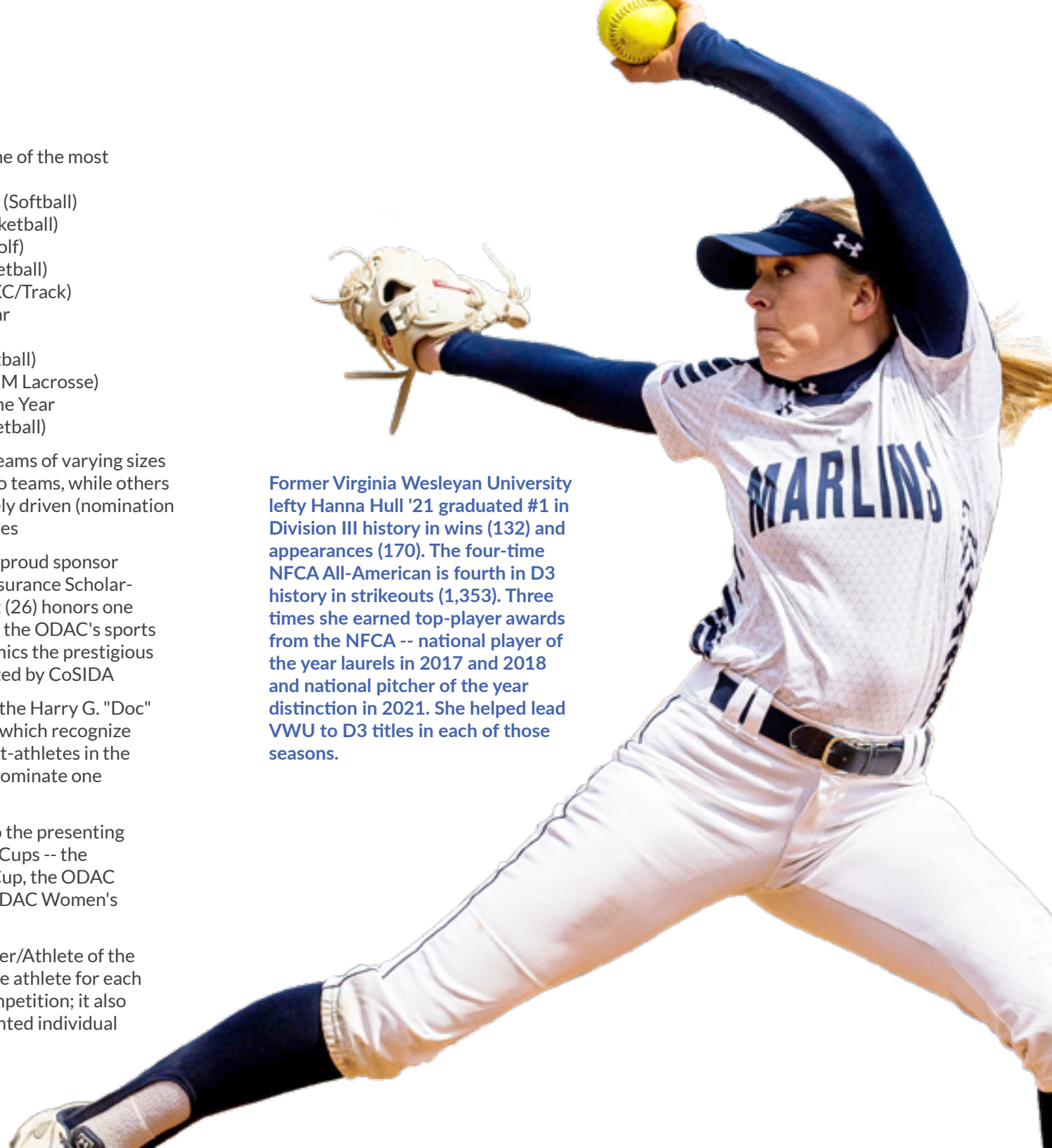
Hosting Champions

- Each ODAC sport honors All-ODAC Teams of varying sizes based on merit; some sports honor two teams, while others feature three; this process is completely driven (nomination and voting) by the league's head coaches
- Virginia Farm Bureau Insurance is the proud sponsor of the ODAC/Virginia Farm Bureau Insurance Scholar-Athlete of the Year awards; each sport (26) honors one student-athlete per season; chosen by the ODAC's sports information directors, the process mimics the prestigious Academic All-America awards presented by CoSIDA
- The ODAC Board of Directors selects the Harry G. "Doc" Jopson and Marjorie Berkley Awards, which recognize the top male and female senior student-athletes in the conference; each school is eligible to nominate one student-athlete for each award
- Virginia Farm Bureau Insurance is also the presenting sponsor of the ODAC Commissioners Cups -- the Dan Wooldridge Overall Champions Cup, the ODAC Men's Commissioner's Cup, and the ODAC Women's Commissioner's Cup
- The conference features a robust Player/Athlete of the Week platform that honors at least one athlete for each sport each week of regular season competition; it also includes an honor roll of select highlighted individual performers

Former Virginia Wesleyan University lefty Hanna Hull '21 graduated #1 in Division III history in wins (132) and appearances (170). The four-time NFCA All-American is fourth in D3 history in strikeouts (1,353). Three times she earned top-player awards from the NFCA -- national player of the year laurels in 2017 and 2018 and national pitcher of the year distinction in 2021. She helped lead VWU to D3 titles in each of those seasons.





ODAC SAAC

The ODAC has a long history of giving back to its surrounding communities as well as regional and national programs through various outlets. The ODAC SAAC has embraced two conference-wide initiatives. The first initiative takes place in the fall semester, with each member institution conducting food drives on their respective campuses. The second is conducted during Division III Week in the spring. The ODAC SAAC has previously partnered with Water Mission, a non-profit clean water charity that builds sustainable clean water solutions in developing countries and disaster areas. The conference also has a long-standing partnership with Special Olympics Virginia, a collaboration which pre-dates the adoption of a national support program for Special Olympics by NCAA Division III.

The canned food drive, conducted as a friendly competition among all full-time ODAC members, has been immensely successful over its years long feature of ODAC SAAC programming. In 2024-25, ODAC members collected more than 39,000 non-perishable items with Averett (above) winning the competition with 10,371 items. All proceeds go to local charities identified by each school.





Sportsmanship

The ODAC Presidents Council, as well as conference and campus SAAC organizations, has identified sportsmanship as a point of emphasis over the past few years. The ODAC has dedicated considerable resources to improving and maintaining positive, respectful atmospheres at all contests, ranging from increased signage to specialized training for athletic staff members. The league also redrafted its sportsmanship statement into a more encompassing and robust two-part message that is reflective of the ODAC's focus on sportsmanship.

GameDay the DIII Way

Gameday the DIII Way is an innovative and unique approach designed to achieve better fan decorum at athletics events around the country. The program was created by the Division III Sportsmanship and Game Environment Working Group, in conjunction with the Disney Institute, with the goal of improving the behavior of parents and fans and ensuring that all Division III student-athletes have a rewarding experience.

Training is built around four key service standards:

- **SAFETY:** Ensuring the game environment accounts for the health and well-being of all in attendance.
- **RESPONSIVENESS:** Anticipating and addressing situations as they arise by initiating interventions in a welcoming, informative and timely manner.
- **DIGNITY:** Demonstrating respect and value for others, even those who may be causing problems.
- **EXPERIENCE:** Ensuring the game environment is hospitable by delivering a clean and presentable appearance and proactively addressing fan behavior.

Conference Programming

The ODAC has provided immersive professional development and alternative programming on topics including sportsmanship, student-athlete wellbeing, and minorities in athletics in addition to comprehensive women in athletics symposiums. Programming has focused on those working in conference athletic departments, student-athletes competing in league sponsored sports, or a combination of both.

The ODAC conducted its most recent Women in Athletics Symposium in 2024-25, serving more than 80 administrators, coaches, athletic trainers, athletic communications personnel, and student-athletes.

Webinar Series

The ODAC has been at the forefront of providing programming via virtual means for its constituents over the past several years. The ODAC Senior Woman Administrators (SWAs) began a Professional Enhancement Webinar Series for all women staff members in the ODAC in 2018-19. The conference has seen an evolution of that programming with the inclusion of WeCOACH mentoring programs and the conference's SAAC conducting informational sessions. Partnerships with NACDA, Women Leaders, the Division III Commissioners Association (D3CA), and other national and regional organizations feature resources from which the ODAC has and will continue to benefit.

The 2025-26 season marks the 50th operating year for the Old Dominion Athletic Conference. The main event for the year-long celebration features the first class of the ODAC Hall of Fame. Fifty of the conference's finest student-athletes, coaches, and administrators comprise the inaugural class, all selected by ODAC charter and full-time members save for three entries from the ODAC Board of Directors. A similar format will be used to determine the second class in 2026-27, while a nominating and voting process will begin with the third class in 2027-28.

Thirteen schools joined the ODAC's three honorees in the first class. Shenandoah University will be included in the second edition in 2026-27. Averett University will be eligible once the Cougars have competed in the ODAC for a few more seasons.

The ODAC Partners with FloCollege

FloSports and the Old Dominion Athletic Conference (ODAC) entered into an exclusive five-year media rights agreement that will begin in the fall of 2025, bringing the conference's 14 member institutions to the FloCollege platform. Through the agreement, FloSports will provide a global platform to live stream over 1,500 regular-season and postseason events annually. 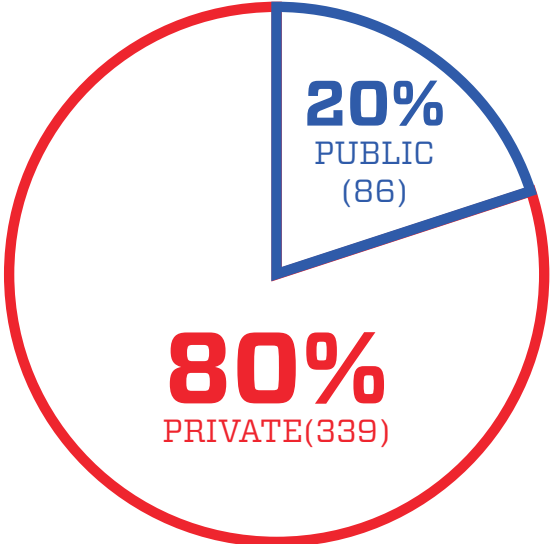
