

WE WON, September 26th ... football with South Amherst,--away. A game to match the 12th! We were cookin' that

Rumor has it they received quite a few compliments from the other band directors also. October 3rd...football again...Avon Lake this time. It was an away game that was a bit disappointing for Brookside fans...Oh well, you can't win 'em all. Ah! Finally! October 10th...The end of the first six weeks. It certainly took its time getting here but is a welcome sight anyway...That night we played Buckeye, at home ...looks like our winning streak is on again! The 15th of October-report cards--no comment. October 16th...Football with LaGrange at home ...Chalk up another win. We got all "spruced up" for school pictures on October 23rd. Everybody enjoyed the day (classes really got fouled up1)

October 24th . . . home football game with Firelands. Guess who won? We did (natch.) October 31st and the big game: The Inland Conference Championship at stake. We played Avon, --away. Band and team received a regular police escort all the way to Avon High--and we won! The boys really tied up this football season in a nice package . . . "There's nothing like a football hero . . . " November 6th, and Pianist William Haacker so gently and cleverly inoculated us with some of that there long-hair stuff, brilliantly coated with some of our usual diet, that it was not only painless but actually pleasant . . .

"We Shook the Family Tree" was the name of the Senior Class Play presented on November 14th. Those seniors are real comedians!

Roger: another six weeks bit the dust on November 26th. Start of the basketball season, too. Brookside-Avon Lake at home, and what a game: The joint was packed, the uproar was tremendous, and we won by one great big point, --a basket just as the buzzer sounded . . . Jack, you doll! . . . After that, we NEEDED the 27th and 28th off, which we got for reasons of drumsticks.

December 3rd, Report cards, December 5th: more bad news: the Belles of St. Mary's out-chimed Brookside's basketeers, 59-48.

December 12th . . . We beat Columbia in a home game, 73-38. (Were you there, St. Mary's?) . . . Frosh sockhop afterward.

In the second home game in a row, we romped over Avon, 64-45, on December 16th. On December 17th, the Hi-Y entertained the school with their annual Minstrel Show. Mighty nice job, too. Those guys really got out of school that day! December 22-January 4th: Holiday vacation!

January 9th. . . basketball, away, with Avon Lake. We lost, 52-41. So you CAN'T win them ALL! The Y-Teens held their annual Turn-About Dance January 10th. "The Boys" really liked this one. January 13th, and we lost our first home game, --South Amherst: 40-35... Ditto at Avon on the 16th, 45-37. SO WE'VE BEEN STUDYING!

(Shudder!) I'll need all your support, dear Diary, when I think of that woesome day, January 22nd. EXAMS! January 23rd... EXAMS! Two days running and almost too much for my constitution. Also that same day we had a home game with Firelands. Lost. 46-42. Those tests really shook the team! January 28th... report cards...oh, well... January 30th... Home basketball. Ridgeville stomped on us, 60-46. BUT WE CAME BACK! St. Mary's vs. Brookside on the 31st and how sweet is revenge: 53-51. (Close, but that only counts in horseshoes.) February 2nd... we went down 73-45 to Clearview at a home game. Charles King, vocalist, entertained Brookside on February 4th in a real cool "audience participation" gimmick. The whole gang sang "Happy Birthday" to Mrs. Garber and Mrs. Knorek, who blushed sufficiently for the occasion! Well, here I am caught up with past events and looking toward the future. What next? Off hand, my crystal ball says: ball says:

February 6th, last home basketball game for the season, --B.H.S. vs. LaGrange. We'll win, of course. The same day will be National Honor Society Induction for "them as has it."

February 7th: last basketball game of the year with South Amherst, away. Another win it'll be, natch. Two dances in February: the 10th Grade Dance on the 14th and the P.T.A. dance on the 18th. The Ides of March bring the end of the fourth six weeks and report cards . . . Ye Good Olde Vocal Concert comes

our way March 13th, and the Junior Play on the 20th. Time off for good behavior March 27th to April 5th, and then April brings two more dances: the Band Boosters Dance on the 4th and the Hi-Y Dance on the 11th.

Come April 17th, the Band Concert will spell-bind us, and on April 24th, there's the Roman Banquet: magnificent affair that's a privilege to attend! April 24th will mark its third annual appearance. This date also marks the end of the 5th six weeks!

April 25th . . . the Alumni Banquet. We undergraduates can't attend but there will come a time . . The student body will be able to attend a science assembly by Luther Gable, Ph.D., on the 28th . . . ought to be pretty interesting.

April 29th--report cards . . . you just can't get away from 'em! The highlight of the year, the Junior-Senior Prom, can be expected on the 9th of May. The Juniors have a banquet before the dance starts; I can hardly wait! It's too bad you're a stay at home friend, dear Diary. Our beloved Seniors behold baccalaureate on May 31.



FACULTY ENGLISH

English was emphasized at Brookside this year. Mrs. Norma Garber, in addition to her junior and senior English and composition classes, managed to be librarian, direct two plays, and advise Y-Teens, publications, and the junior class. Miss Ruth Sauer, sophomore class and Speech Club advisor, taught girls' phys. ed., speech, and freshman English. SCIENCE – MATHEMATICS

Algebra, geometry, and general math were instructed by Miss Jeanette Shuman, freshman homeroom teacher.

Mr. John Verbanek, sophomore and Student Council advisor, imparted knowledge to the students in government, sociology, and Spanish. The seniors and Jr. Hi-Y accrued benefits from the counsel of Mr. Willard Smith, teacher of world history, American history, and world geography.

VOCATIONAL

Aiding the students in the general and commercial curricula was the aim of the vocational department. Mr. Dick Sevits, basketball and baseball coach, taught shop and driver's training. The commercial courses were under the direction of Mrs. Lena Gratchen, advisor of the Leader and Cardinal Courier. Home economics and Latin students were informed by Mrs. Alice J. Knorek, advisor of the freshman class and National Honor Society. Mr. Robert Telatnik was the instructor of mechanical drawing and shop and was assistant football and basketball coach.





BROOKSIDE THEN ...

The citizens of the Sheffield Lake School District were jubilant in 1924 when their first big accomplishment became known: Brookside School was opened. It housed all of the grades, and the people were joyous with the new, modern building. It boasted a large gymnasium and all the comforts that the students could have wished. But the famous tornado of 1924 damaged part of the building, and it had to be rebuilt.

It was not until five years later that Brookside received a high school charter and presented the first graduating class. The first principal was Mr. White who remained for a short time. Mr. James A. Mc-Conihe took his place and remained until 1941.

In 1939 an addition to the building was constructed and formed the northeastern part of the building. This meant more classrooms and an industrial arts room. Mr. William W. Barr took over the duties of principal in 1942 and later became superintendent.

The Sheffield Lake School District grew in the meantime. Brookside became crowded; and in 1950, Tennyson Elementary School was opened and alleviated the conditions at Brookside. Knollwood Elementary further relieved conditions in 1957.

The above picture, taken in 1942, shows a charming and silent Brookside with the still-remembered hedges that spelled "BHS."

BROOKSIDE NOW . . .

Today, Brookside High School, an eighteen classroom building, looms her lofty heights to the sky. The eighth through the twelfth grades attend classes here and the atmosphere is one of preparation for life.

As a result of housing developments in the school district, many new students have entered in the past few years. The curriculum offered has been extended, more teachers have been hired, and the departments have been improved. An extensive remodeling program is under way at Brookside.

But the growing pains still ache. A new elementary school will be built this fall on Forest Lawn Avenue in Sheffield Lake. An addition to Knollwood was just completed, and the seventh grade moved there from Brookside. In the future, Tennyson will become a junior high school. All of these accomplish-ments will alleviate the growing pains --but what can be done when more developments are constructed? --this is the ache.

Brookside High School stands in this, her thirty-fifth year, with a bit of the old, a bit of the new--a school of which her students can be proud.






