## 'School days, school days, dear o rule days ...'

The restoration project's been in the works for more than a dozen years, but the weekend of July 7 and 8, the North Ridgeville Historical Society threw open the doors of the one-room schoolhouse on Jaycox Road and invited the public inside.

Today the white clapboard building sits on the west side of Jaycox, a short distance from Mills Road, but when it was first built, around 1859, District No. 9 schoolhouse was on the other side of what was then known as Snow Road.

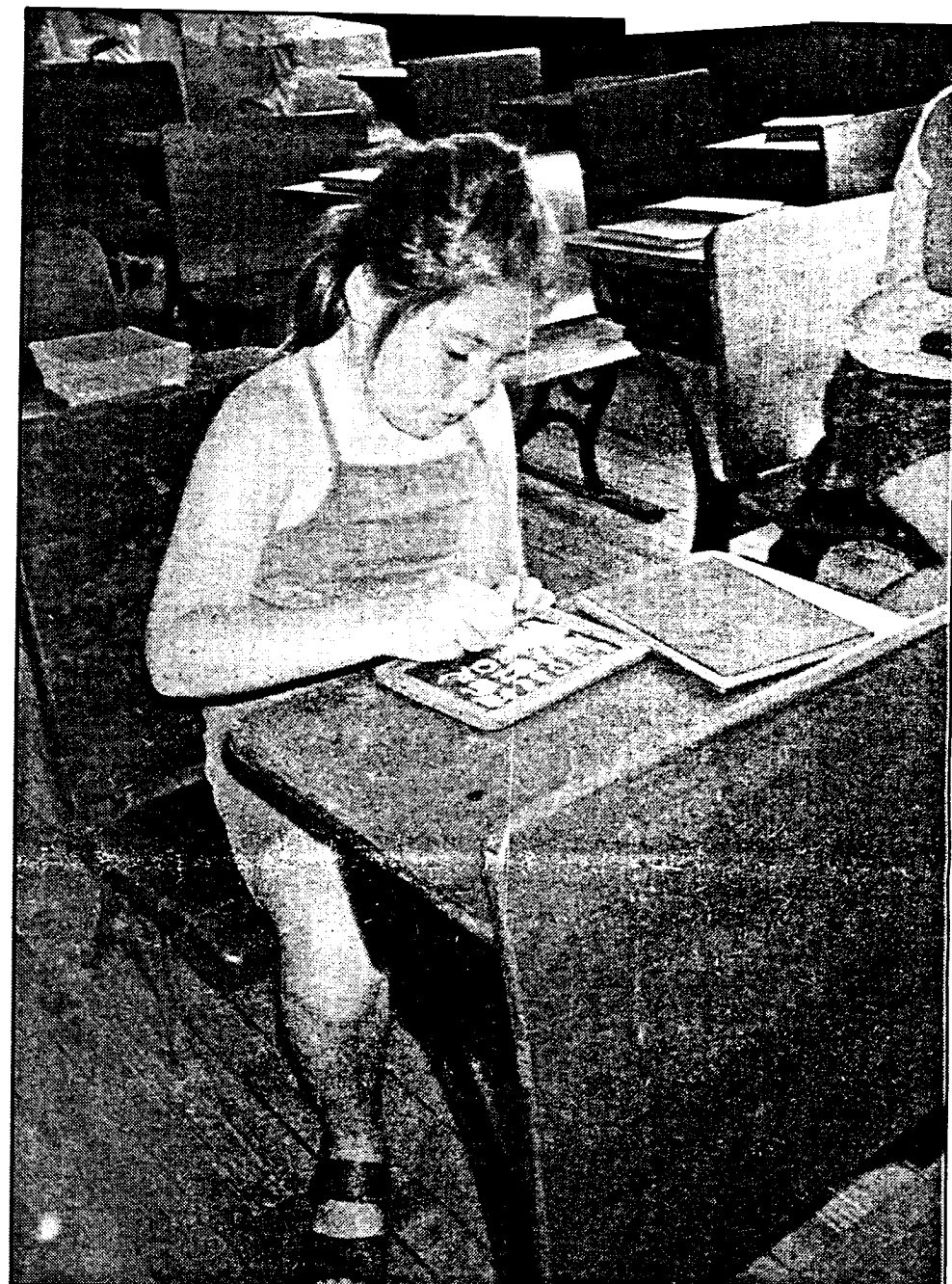
According to writings of the late North Ridgeville history buff, Frances Smith, the little schoolhouse was situated on John Muhlings's farm.

Smith wrote, "In 1865 Mr. Muhling sold his 46 acres to a Mr. Lehman for \$2000, i.e. \$43.50 an acre. The school continued to occupy its corner until 1880 or 1881. On November 19, 1880 the school board paid \$100 for the land on the west side of Jaycox Rd. and a short distance north of the original site. Subsequently the school was moved to this location and served until 1924 when the 'centralized school' was opened. Soon after that John and Grace Sullivan purchased it, and used it for storage."

While it was still used for schooling, "It was the teacher's responsibility to teach and to keep the building and premises clean, the stove going and a supply of drinking water on hand," Smith wrote, and she usually enlisted the help of the children to handle the chores.

Visitors to the recently reopened schoolhouse smiled appreciatively as they looked at the polished wood floors, the rows of small desks and the potbelly stove ready to be stoked for warmth. Schoolbooks were arranged on some of the desks, or on book shelves and a few of the familiar little slates used for practicing letters or sums were on display. The large painted blackboard stretches across the front of the room.

In the old days when children went to the schoolhouse, they entered through two doors - one for boys and the other for girls. After hanging their coats on hooks in the

coatroom, they took their seats, with younger children on one side and the older ones on the other. There was no inside plumbing so answering nature's call meant a trip to the outhouses - again, one for boys and one for girls.

Proficiency tests cause today's students many anxious moments, but eighth graders

facing a final exam in 1895 may have been just as nervous, as they waded through the five-part assessment which covered grammar, arithmetic, U.S. History, orthography and geography - and was expected to last

## Will the ice cream man...er...women cometh to North Ridgeville?

Remember the good old summertime when kids sat on the front steps clutching a few coins, waiting for the tinkling of bells that signaled the arrival of the ice cream man. When the wagon showed up in their neighborhood, boys and girls would crowd around the truck trying to be the first to get one of the frosty treats.

Lia Muir and Michelle Kroboth look back fondly on the ice cream that tasted oh-so-good during the dog days of summer, and they wanted today's kids to enjoy it as much as they did when they were young. So they launched "Two Mom's Ice Cream," selling the cool snacks to youngsters the way the ice cream man did for them. But before they got

very far, the long arm of the law halted the fun, citing an old city ordinance against that sort of thing.

Monday night the two moms, more than a dozen supporters, and cameramen from two Cleveland television stations, showed up at Council - the moms hoping to persuade the legislators to amend the statute, so they could again board their ice cream truck and move on.

Muir said she and Kroboth just wanted to do something nice for the children, and are very concerned about the safety issue. With two of them in the truck, she said, they'd have a "spotter and a driver," and they would only travel in residential areas where the posted speed limit is 25 mph.

"We don't want to draw children into a

dangerous situation," she said, adding, "I have children who sell candy door-to-door and have lemonade stands."

Kroboth agreed and went a step farther telling Council members, "Safety is an issue for everything, we feel we're doing everything we can." Two Mom's Ice Cream is a "positive addition to North Ridgeville."

Kroboth said the years have brought a lot of changes, and "We're willing to compromise."

The two women's arguments, along with comments from others brought sporadic outbursts of applause until Council President asked them to refrain from the handclapping.

# Gloria Avenue residents continue court fight

Ronald and Sara Siemientkowski have resumed their court battle over the alleged defects they say exist in their Gloria Avenue home — problems the couple insist were there before they purchased the property in 1999, and prevent them from selling and relocating.

In March the Siemientkowskis filed their case in U.S. District Court in Cleveland, naming a list of nearly two dozen defendants, who played any role in the construction of the house or approval of the permits, including Moreland Homes, Inc., city and county officials, the EPA, insurance companies and lending institutions.

Judge John M. Manos subsequently dismissed the suit May 14. At that time Ronald Siemientkowski told The Press & Light that if it took 20 years he and his wife would continue the court action to right the wrongs they feel have been done to them.

July 6 the Siemientkowskis filed another appeal, this time in the 6th U.S. District Court of Appeals.

The most recent filing again names the persons listed in the previous lawsuit and along with the introductory statement of facts, which cites contaminated effluent

waste, radon and cement dust among their complaints. Ronald and Sara Siemientkowski provide numerous exhibits in the brief they filed "Pro Se" on their own behalf.

The document references city ordinances, copies of permits pulled and inspections made. It also contains copies of related newspaper stories and Council minutes.

## Kiwanis Club organizing in City

## Fields Church sponsors Vacation Bible School



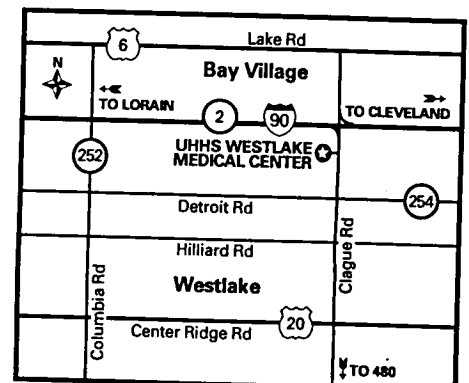

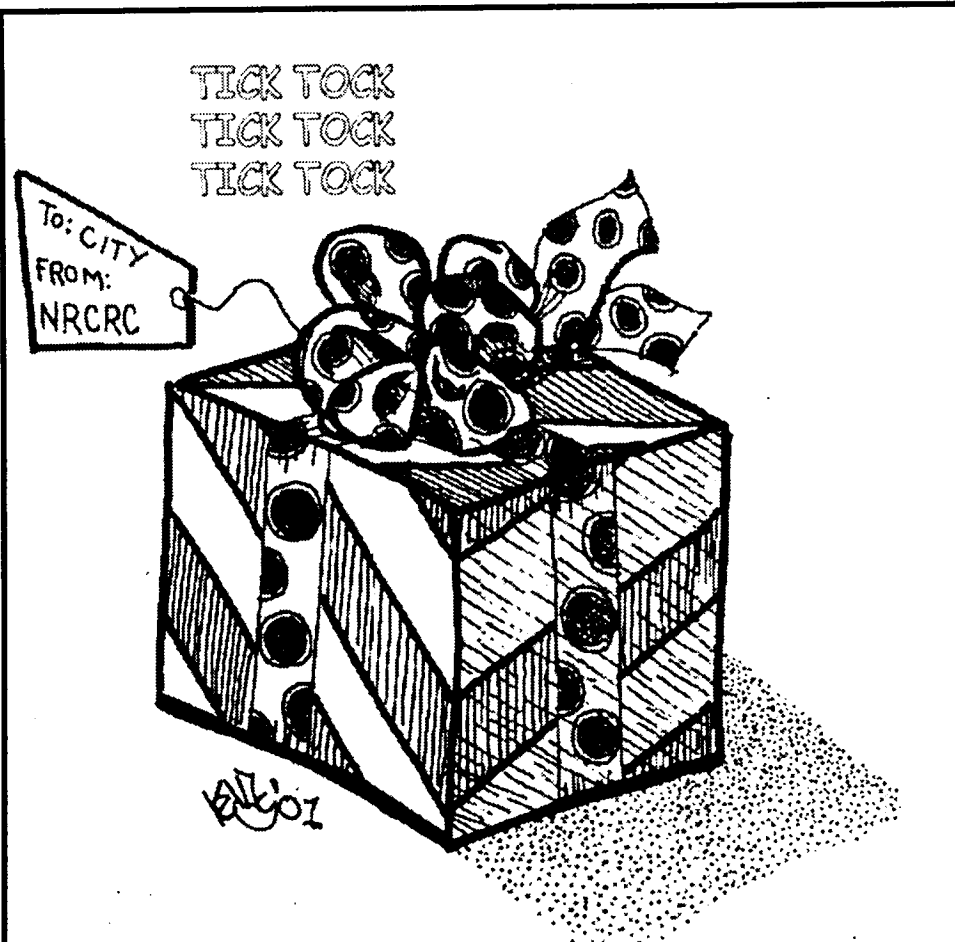

Addressing Muir's remarks about candy selling and lemonade stands, Law Director Eric Zagrans said that the law excludes minors under 18, adding, "Girl Scouts can go door to door." The theory behind the ordinance, he said is that an operation by someone beyond 18 can be considered an enterprise.

Bob Miles of Lorain Road put in his support for the ice cream business and told Council, "There's a guy selling steaks from his truck freezer," and noted that another hawk flowers at Lorain and Lear Nale.

"Let's not stop these young ladies," he said.

Mayor Deanna Hill disagreed with Miles' comments about the man selling meat, explaining that she has firsthand knowledge about the situation because someone came to her door selling meat and she called the police. She also said that some vendors operate on property with the owner's permission, and licenses are also required.

An Opal Drive resident insisted that today's pizza delivery cars "create a bigger risk" than the ice cream truck, while a Topaz homeowner said she felt the city ordinance was an over-reaction to a tragedy of years ago. Apparently the statute stems from a fatality involving an ice cream truck and a little girl. She stated, however, that even a ball going into a street could be dangerous.

Most Councilpersons steered clear of the controversy with the exception of Karen Borocz, D-3 who stressed, "a lot of parents work and children are not supervised." When they hear the music of the ice cream truck, she said, "they just run."

To cap the issue temporarily, Councilman Dave Gillock, R council at-large, recommended it be referred to the Safety Committee for further discussion, however Council's decision may not help the young women this year since the legislators recess for the month of August.

Though the resolution to pay the city's outside legal counsel, Squire, Sanders and Dempsey for work done in connection with the westerly sewer, was set for third reading and approval Monday night, Gillock halted the vote and asked that action be postponed.

During two previous meetings the Councilman asked the Law Director to provide documentation for the bill, however Zagrans had objected to providing detailed billing, insisting that it also included privileged attorney-client information.

Monday Gillock said that though, as a

Councilman, he felt he was the client, he was more interested in the rate charged for the number of hours the Cleveland firm worked.

"The Law Director indicated he would get back to me," said Gillock, however by Monday's meeting he had received "nothing to justify the resolution."

"Mr. Gillock is correct," Zagrans said, "it was oversight on my part, I dropped the ball. Sorry, Dave, it dropped off my radar screen."

Council voted 7-0 to postpone action.

The Mayor announced a new idea for the community, Monday night — a quarterly newsletter. Hill introduced the idea during appropriation meetings last spring and requested funds to put it together. The first edition of North Ridgeville Town Talk is expected to arrive in mailboxes this week.

The city has taken another forward step, said Hill by implementing automated utilities payments. Residents will still receive a utility bill, she said, but those who sign up for the automated service will have the payment deducted through their bank account. Sign-up is underway with the first "live file" to be produced in September.

For more information concerning the free service, call the Utilities Department at 353-0840, 353-0841, 353-0843 or 353-0855. The Mayor reported to Council that the Northeast Ohio Area-wide Coordinating Agency (NOACA) began studying on-lot and off-lot septic tanks in seven counties in 1998 to test those that have been installed since 1979.

The research revealed that approximately one-in-five septic systems have effluent that is surfacing and of the off-lot systems, up to one-half have mechanical problems. The NOACA study also showed that as many as one-in-three are discharging poor effluent.

Based on the NOACA information concerning septic systems installed since 1979, Hill said, "You can imagine what the results would be with systems prior to 1979."

She also said that the data was also the impetus for a resolution which was passed urging the Ohio General Assembly to strengthen legislation for evaluating septic systems, using the highest technology and limiting the level of discharge permitted by off-lot systems.

With Council's approval, the Mayor reappointed Click Davis to the city's Fair Housing Board, for a term to expire, June 30, 2004.

## Former North Electric Co. steel workers owed pension benefits

A search is under way for several hundred former employees, or their survivors, of North Electric Co. who may be owed pension benefits. Individuals who worked for North Electric Co. for more than five years, including 1976, and who participated in the company's pension plan, may be eligible to receive significant benefits as part of a settlement with the Pension Benefit Guaranty Corporation (PBGC).

At the time of the pension plan termination, North Electric Co. had offices or plants in the Akron, Cleveland, and Toledo, Ohio areas with its corporate headquarters at

10951 Lakeview Ave., Lenexa, Kansas.

To find out if benefits are waiting, these workers, or anyone who may know or be related to them, should call toll-free 1-800-316-8857 or 1-866-731-1510.

The benefits are payable under a 1996 settlement with the Pension Benefit Guaranty Corporation, involving some 12,000 pension plans nationwide that were terminated between 1976 and 1981. Workers in those plans who did not receive appropriate benefits are now entitled to them plus interest. Many thousands of missing workers identified thus far who worked for these

companies for 10 years or more have received payments averaging between \$10,000 and \$12,000. Individuals who worked for these companies for more than five but less than 10 years have received smaller benefits. The pension plan for North Electric Co. was terminated in 1979.

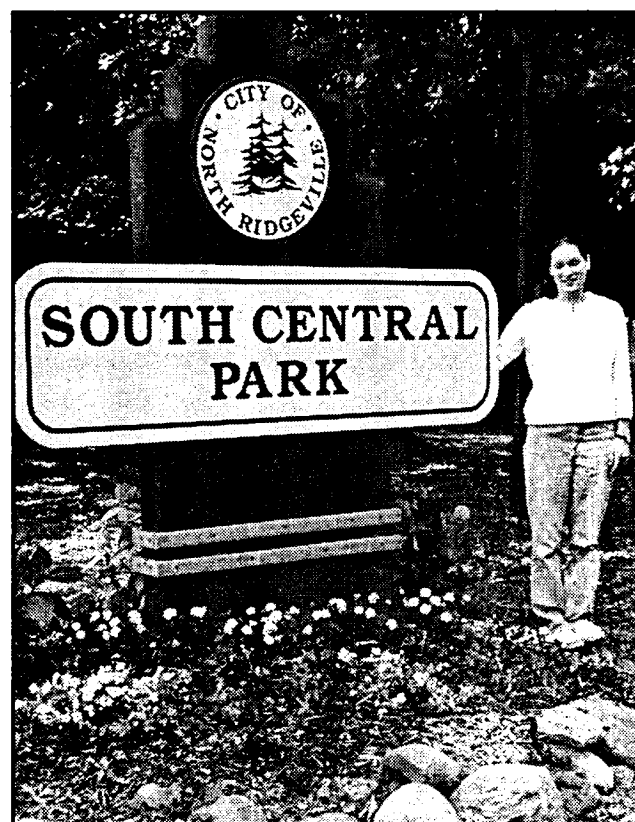

Parks and Recreation Director Jim Spaulding noted that the department's new program supervisor Christa Centanni is a North Ridgeville High School graduate. So, this is the first of what we hope will be many 'Where are they now?' stories.*

A bubbly new employee, Christa Centanni, has joined the Parks and Recreation Department and without hesitation she jumped right into her job as program supervisor to begin lining up fall and winter programs.

A 1995 graduate of North Ridgeville High School, Centanni earned her degree from Judson College in Elton, Ill. with a major in sports management and a minor in business. In addition, she was a student trainer for two years.

Centanni is not a girl who just talks-the-talk, she's an all-American type who's the perfect complement to Parks and Rec. At NRHS she ran track and field, played volleyball and was a cheerleader. "The bugs are the worst," she said, and a nuisance as she rolls along her route.

Getting the word out about the Parks and Rec programs is also high on the new supervisor's to-do list, and she plans to distribute flyers at schools, as well as post them on store bulletin boards...and use eye-catching color. "The brighter the color, the more people who are going to see them," she said.

She also wants to downsize the program booklet for ease in handling. Centanni also considers scheduling a key to successful programs. "The time of the day (for activities) is a big factor," she said, adding that she'll shy away from the 5 p.m. to 6 p.m. dinner time slot.

Centanni has no small task ahead of her, but she's up to the challenge, particularly when youngsters are concerned. "Kids are our future," she said, and she's determined to help make that future bright. She also wants to bring the community together through activities and programs. ## Suspicious fire at Ziegen's Landscaping

Firefighters were called to Ziegen's Landscaping, 6195 Stoney Ridge Rd. at 4:42 a.m. Sunday for what was described as a "suspicious" fire.

According to Fire Chief Rick Miller, someone apparently set a fuel tank on fire. Miller said the property is a storage facility for landscaping equipment, including other tanks, machinery and plastic pipe.

Miller said the acreage extends from Stoney Ridge to state Rt. 83, with the equipment setting well off the road.

Approximately five hours after the initial run, firefighters were called again. "When it was daylight, it was realized that a truck was missing, and police found it at Dettore's new development on Case Road," said Miller.

The truck apparently had been driven over the tops of fire hydrants, before coming to a stop, he said. When it was discovered, the truck cab had been set on fire, though it was out when firefighters arrived.

Property damage at Ziegen's was set at \$65,000 said the chief.

Bill Ziegen said that he had no idea who caused the damage. A neighbor who happened to spot the blaze called the Fire Department.

On Monday morning, Ziegen said he has no idea who would have started the fire, but credited both the police and fire departments with "doing a very good job."

Firefighters kept the fire under control and prevented it from spreading, he said, and the police located the truck one-half hour after Ziegen reported it missing.

"Business will go on as usual," he said, then joked, "We're having a fire clearance on nursery stock."

## High efficiency furnace filters help reduce air pollution

The use of high efficiency furnace filters-coupled with the continuous operation of a properly functioning heating and cooling system - may play a role in reducing levels of indoor air pollution, according to a report released recently by the American Lung Association Health House Project and 3M.

The report supports findings recently published in a leading consumer interest magazine, which concluded that electrostatically charged filters (also known as high efficiency filters) capture about 10 to 15 times more particles from the air than fiberglass filters. Yet a survey conducted by the American Lung Association in 1999 revealed that only one in eight American homeowners purchase a high efficiency filter for the furnace. And of the homes tested in the report, less than four percent of them with a forced air heating and cooling system run the furnace fan continuously.

Using a high efficiency filter while running the furnace fan continuously is a simple and easy way to improve air quality in the home. Although fiberglass filters do a decent job of protecting the furnace, they do not have a positive effect on air quality. In fact, the report indicates that fiberglass filters may actually contribute to indoor air pollution when the furnace fan is in use.

According to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, indoor air pollution is one of the top five urgent environmental risks to public health. To help minimize this risk, it's important to follow all of these tips, provided courtesy of the American Lung Association Health House Project:

- \* Use high efficiency furnace filters and replace them every two to three months.
- \* Run the furnace fan continuously, regardless of outdoor temperature. To do so, make sure the furnace thermostat is set to the 'on', rather than the 'auto' position.
- \* Make sure gas cooking appliances are vented to the outdoors and the kitchen fan is turned on when such appliances are in use. These measures will help prevent dangerously high levels of carbon monoxide from accumulating in the home.
- \* Install a carbon monoxide detector on every floor of the house. This will help determine unsafe levels of carbon monoxide, which could be caused by malfunctioning heating and cooling system.

## ODOT investigating alternatives for railroad grade separation

Although there has been little talk recently about a proposed overpass/underpass for state Rt. 83, the project is very much alive, just ask Debra Haynes, 8135 Avon Belden Rd. who received a letter from Mike Ciotola, PE, rail grade separation program manager for the Ohio Department of Transportation, May 18, stating that ODOT has retained Gannett Fleming Engineers and Architects to investigate the alternatives for Rt. 83.

Ciotola reiterated what Mayor Deanna Hill had insisted several months ago that a grade separation is needed due to increased train traffic and increased instances of blocked crossings since the acquisition by CSX and Norfolk Southern.

"The options under consideration," Ciotola stated, "include the construction of an overpass or an underpass at the existing crossing of SR 83 and the Norfolk Southern tracks or construction of an underpass for a relocation of SR 83 just west of the existing crossing."

The letter also explained that ODOT's project team would be studying the situation to determine the impact of the various possibilities to such issues as homes, businesses, farmland, woods and other environmental resources. Since the Haynes' property lies in the area being studied, they may see personnel on their property collecting data.

Though he had not been contacted by ODOT, City

Engineer Stewart Lovece concurred that "the project is still ongoing," and agreed that the state will study various aspects of the proposed grade separation before making a final decision on exactly how it will be constructed.

Lovece said, however, that there is "a polite disagreement" between the city and ODOT over financing the project. ODOT said that North Ridgeville is to pay 5 percent of the project, which is expected to cost more than \$5 million. However, said Lovece, "the Mayor has collected \$600,000 from the railroad and \$600,000 from the Federal government via (Congressman) Sherrod Brown," and the administration wants to use a portion of that funding for its 5 percent share. But ODOT objects. "We worked hard to get this funding," said the engineer and the city feels it should be credited toward the 5 percent.

Though Debra Haynes has heard nothing since the letter in May, she is very concerned about her house, which has been in her family for four generations. She and her husband have made some major renovations in the century-old home, but she said their work is on hold until she knows definitely what will happen to their property.

In his letter to the Haynes, Ciotola promised that when the initial information has been gathered, area residents "will be notified of a public meeting where the results will be presented and your input requested prior to the decision on which alternative to pursue."

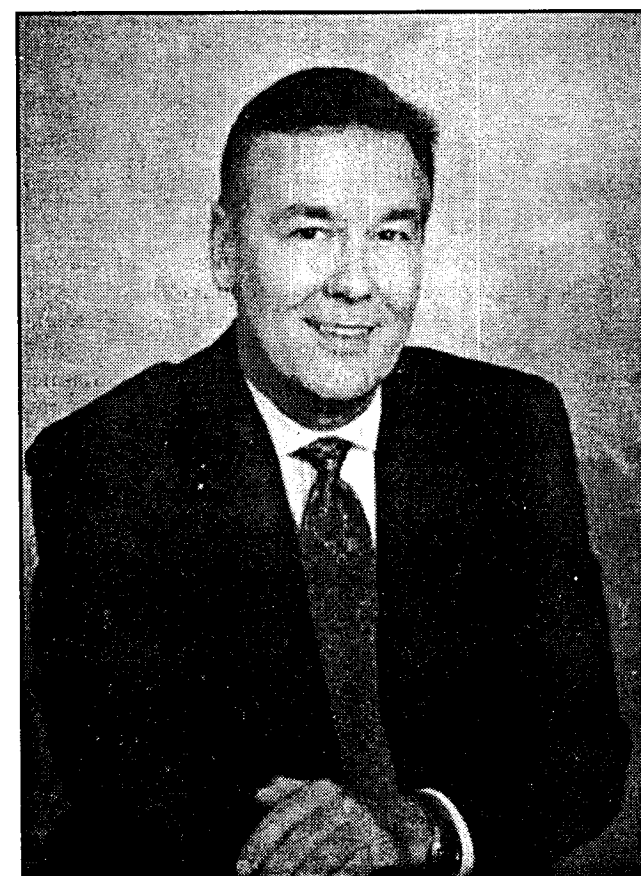

Today Schoolhouse 9 stands as yet another tribute to North Ridgeville's history, but before the renovation could begin, the scores of raccoons and skunks who called it "home" for years, had to vacate the premises and their entrances were sealed off to keep them out.

The outside required scraping and repairing before the pristine whiteness could be applied, and patches of poison ivy were cleared before volunteers could begin their work. Members of the Historical Society say "thank you" to the people who donated material and equipment to the project and who filled ditches, leveled earth and designed a circular drive at the schoolhouse, especially Gary Mould of Don Mould's Plantation, Gerald Hansen of Bulk-N-Bushel Landscaping, Richard Sullinger of Midview Excavating, Delbert Worcester of Worcester Sales and Gary Sweet of Sweets Farms.

Though most of the grunt work has been completed, the Historical Society welcomes any additional memorabilia to add to the items displayed inside.

## Warren and Pat Blakely = 'Service Above Self'... times two

Like most married couples Pat and Warren Blakely like to do things together, but when Warren joined North Ridgeville's Rotary Club 10 years ago, he went solo. Involved in so many activities of her own, Pat was glad her husband had decided to become a Rotarian, and she was equally happy to provide back up when he needed help with club projects.

Through the years Warren became so steeped in the organization and dedicated to carrying out its mission, "Service Above Self," club members honored him as a Paul Harris Fellow, named for Paul P. Harris, an attorney who began the Rotary Club in 1905.

Three years ago Warren began prodding Pat to also join Rotary, telling her, "You're doing more than half the members right now." But still Pat felt Rotary was Warren's venture, not hers. But finally at her husband's urging, along with the urging of another Rotarian she agreed and since then has co-chaired the annual Easter Egg Hunt and also served three years as a club director. And, during the June 29 anniversary dinner, Pat, like her husband, was named a Paul Harris Fellow - the first woman in the North Ridgeville Rotary Club to be so honored.

Talking to Pat and Warren about their very active lives, Warren recalled joining Rotary as "kind of an offshoot of having been safety service director." And Pat's involvement he said can be traced back to when she was an incorporating member of the city's Environmental and Recycling Committee, along with former Mayor Jeff Armbruster, Ann Bruwer and present Mayor Deanna Hill.

Rotary worked hard on the recycling project for nearly three years, said Warren, and when he left City Hall after his stint as second in command, Rotarian Chuck Sword "sucked me in."

Prior to joining Rotary, Pat had been president of the North Ridgeville Women's Club, the group that sponsored the commu-

nity Easter Egg Hunt. The activity was expanding almost beyond what the club could handle and Pat began talking to the Rotary Club about taking it over. Since joining Rotary she has co-chaired one of North Ridgeville's most popular children's events.

Before becoming a Rotarian Pat served as founder and chair of the club's pancake breakfast events, was editor of the Rotary handbook and directory for five years and the primary typist for most of the club's needs.

Though Pat has been nominated as Rotary Club president twice, said Warren, she has turned it down, although her husband served two terms. Just as Warren was about to relinquish the gavel following his first term, the vice-president, who was to move up to president, left the club. Prior to being sworn in as president, the person who

will hold the office must attend numerous meetings in preparation for the office, which meant there was no one to succeed Warren, when the next in line departed.

For years Warren also was in charge of the Exchange Student Program at the high school, which meant arranging for host families for foreign students, dealing with any problems that arose, as well as the parents of the exchange student.

"People don't know the time that goes into things," said Pat.

As Pat helped Warren with Rotary events long before she became a Rotarian, Warren worked on the Easter Egg Hunt with Pat and Kerry Mueller.

"And when Kerry hit his second year (as president), I offered to help," said Warren. At that time Kerry was swamped with business matters of his own and Warren told him

he'd cover meetings for him and report the outcome of the sessions.

While he was president, Warren said, he became reunited with a cousin in Jamaica, who was president of the Montego Bay Club, which led to the North Ridgeville Rotary's Dental Project.

"We got five dental chairs and assorted equipment," said Warren, which Rotary wanted to ship to the less fortunate, however, "We had more stuff than we could handle." And, despite that fact that the dental supplies were secondhand, customs officials wanted to impose a 100 percent duty "as if it was brand new," he said. "It took 41/2 years to convince them," he said. The project that began in 1995 was not concluded until 1999. After the equipment reached its destination, the Dental Program was dropped.

In addition to her involvement in Women's Club, Pat is a trustee of the St. Peter Credit Union, a trustee of the Mills Creek Homeowners Association and a member of the North Ridgeville Visitors Bureau.

Pat had organized the pancake breakfast for the Growing Arts Tour for several years. "We split the proceeds with the Senior Center," she said. "We purchased materials and made decorations," she said, "but it was not that well attended, and Sally (Sally Balog Director of the Senior Center) cancelled it."

Warren said that Pat's forte are things creative. "She does so many things so well and she hides her light under a bushel," he said.

Last week Pat shared an idea that the Rotarians are planning for the Christmas holidays - a Holiday Home Tour, Nov. 18 -, which she feels, will generate potential revenue.

There are 15 active members of the Rotary Club of North Ridgeville who have been honored Paul Harris Fellows, but Pat and Warren Blakely are the only husband-wife team to win.

"And we sure are a team," said Warren.

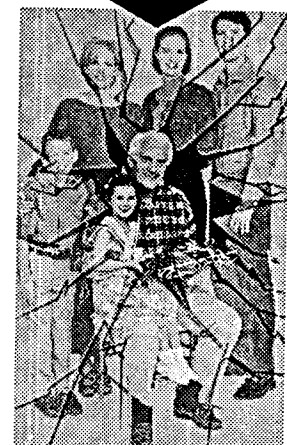

Plan ahead and know what you will do if you're attacked again. If you decide to leave, choose a place to go; set aside some money. Put important papers - marriage license, birth certificates, and checkbooks - in a place where you can get to them quickly. Learn to think independently. Try to plan for the future and set goals for yourself.

## If you are hurt, what can you do?

There are no easy answers, but there are things you can do to protect yourself. Call the police or sheriff. Assault, even by family members, is a crime. The police often have information about shelters and other agencies that can help victims of domestic violence. Leave, or have someone come and stay with you. Go to a shelter - call a crisis hotline in your community or a health center to locate a shelter. If you believe that you and your children are in danger - leave immediately. Get medical attention from your doctor or a hospital emergency room. Ask the staff to photograph your injuries and keep detailed records in case you decide to take legal action. Contact your family court for information about a civil protection order that does not involve criminal charges or penalties.

## HAVE YOU HURT SOMEONE IN YOUR FAMILY?

Accept the fact that your violent behavior will destroy your family. Be aware that you break the law when you physically hurt someone. Take responsibility for yourself and get help. When you feel tension building, get away. Work off the angry energy through a walk, a project, or a sport. Call a domestic violence hotline or health center and ask about counseling and support groups for people who batter.

## The High Costs of Domestic Violence

Men and women who follow their parents' example and use violence to solve conflicts are teaching the same destructive behavior to their children. Jobs can be lost or careers stalled because of injuries, arrests, or harassment. Violence may even result in death.

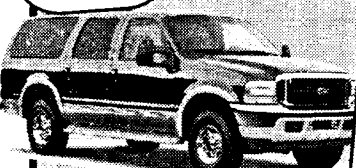

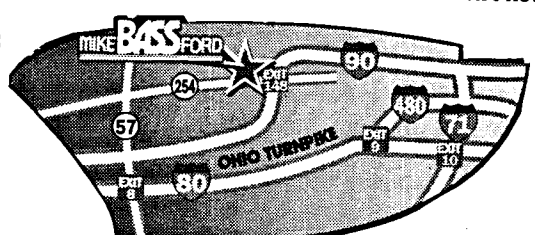
