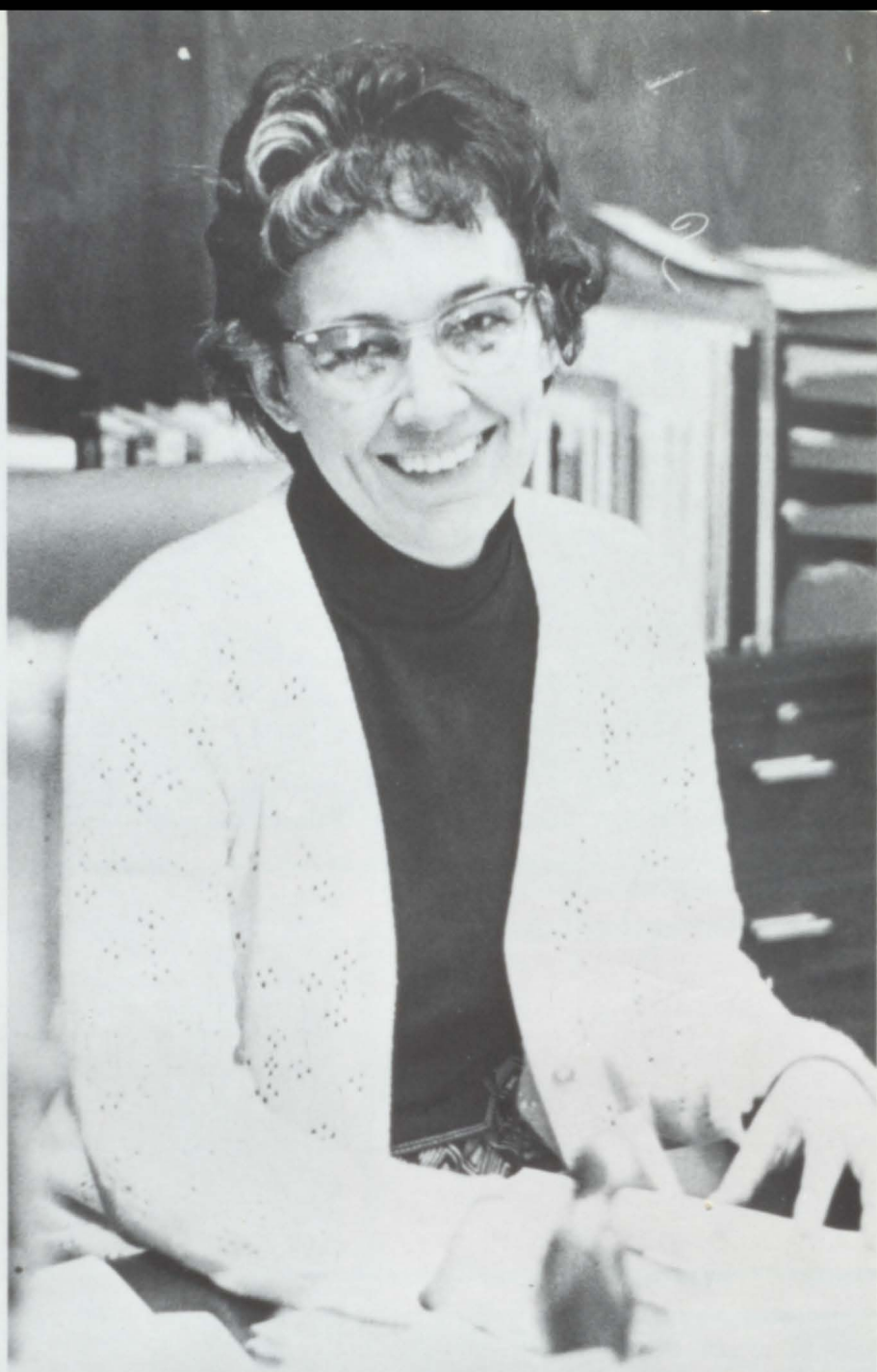


# ACADEMICS

# ADMINISTRATION

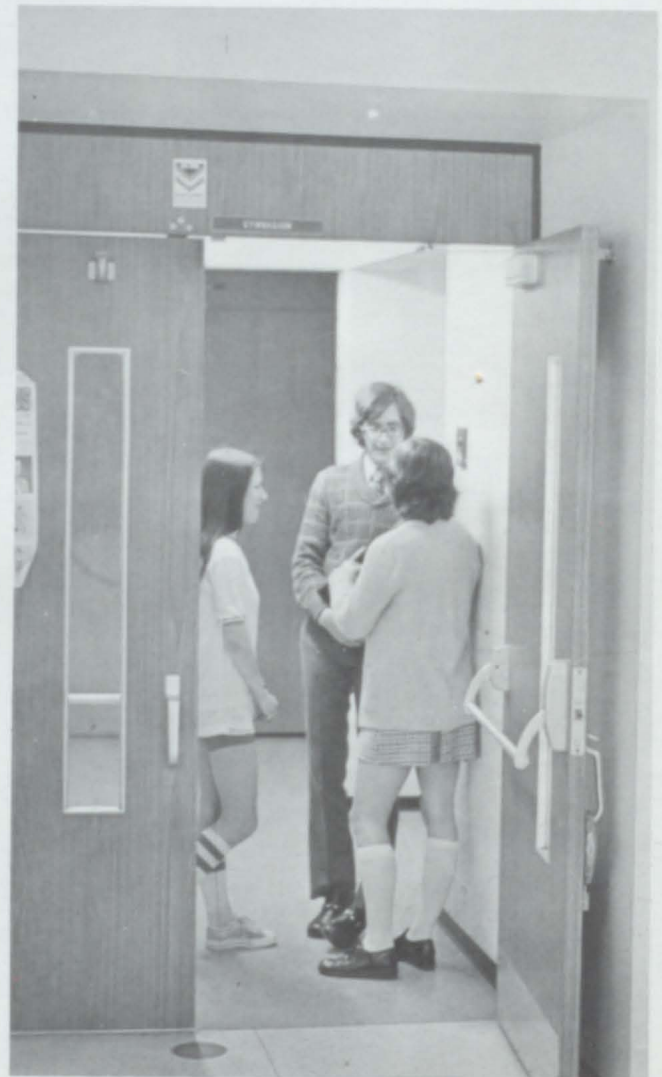

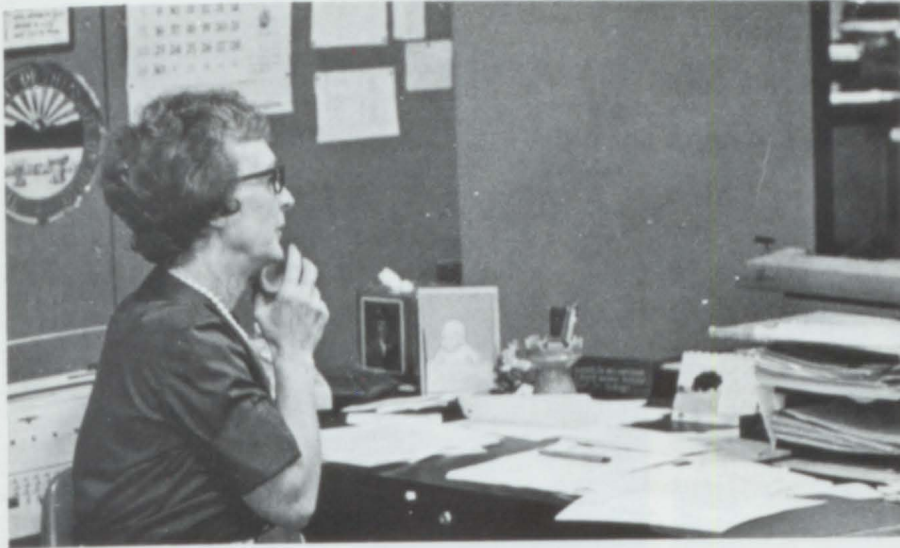
## COUNSELORS

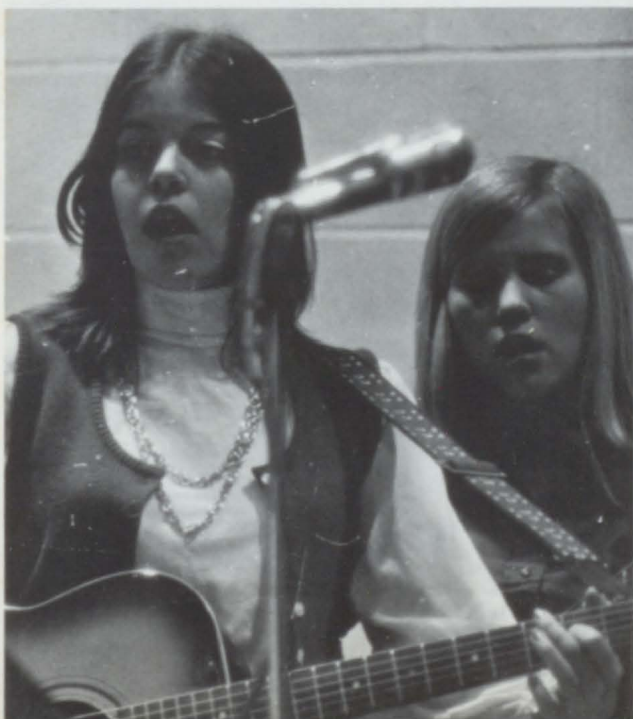
# THEOLOGY

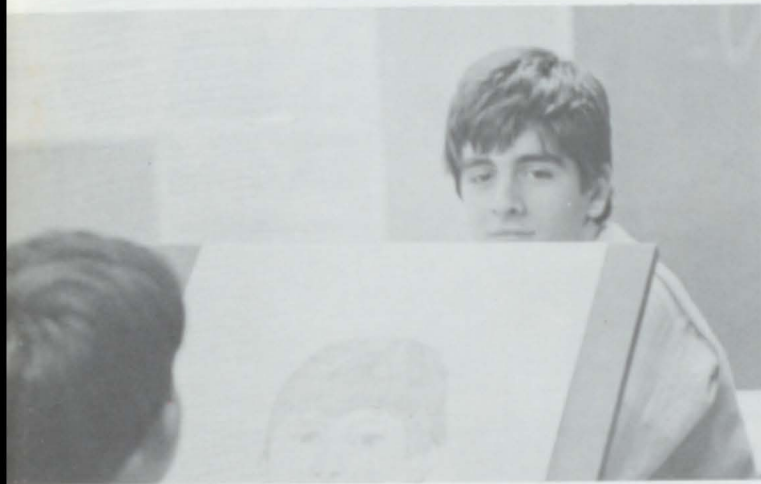
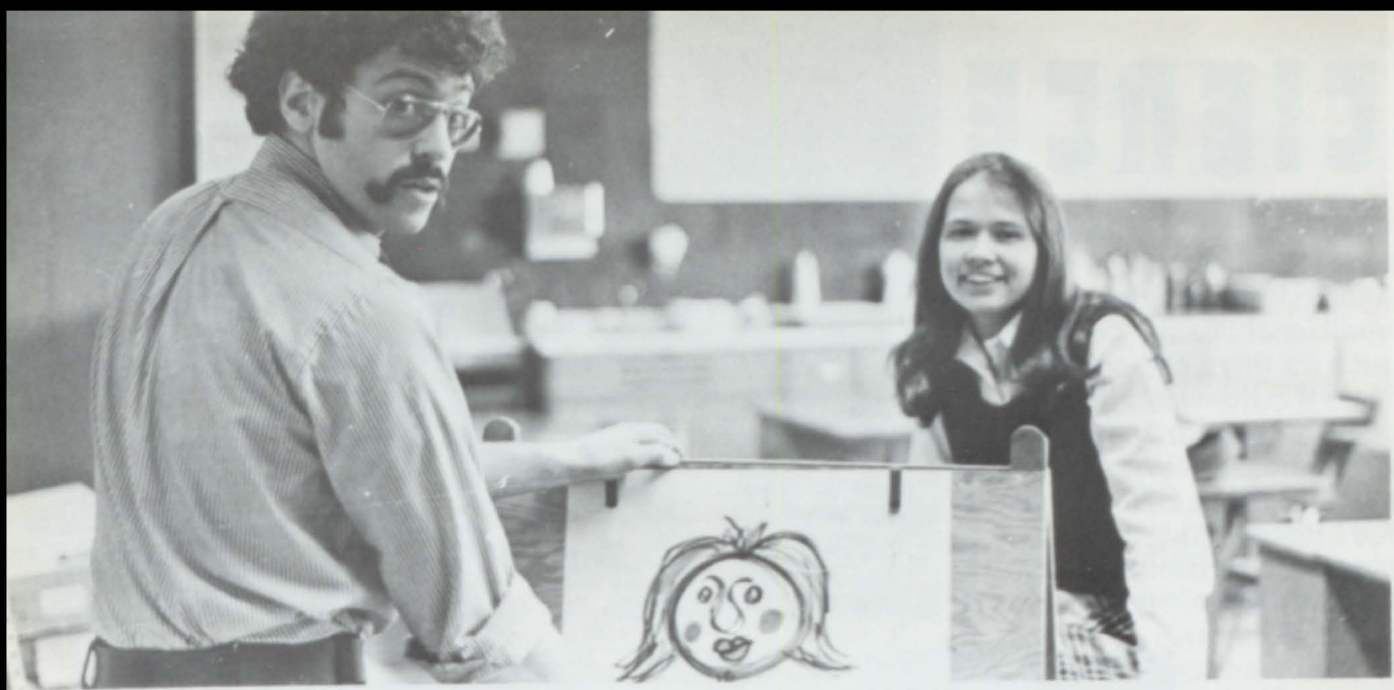


The Psychology Department explored the inner beings of its students as it explored human relationships and animal behavior, among other things. Highlighting the year was a seminar at OSU for several psychology students.

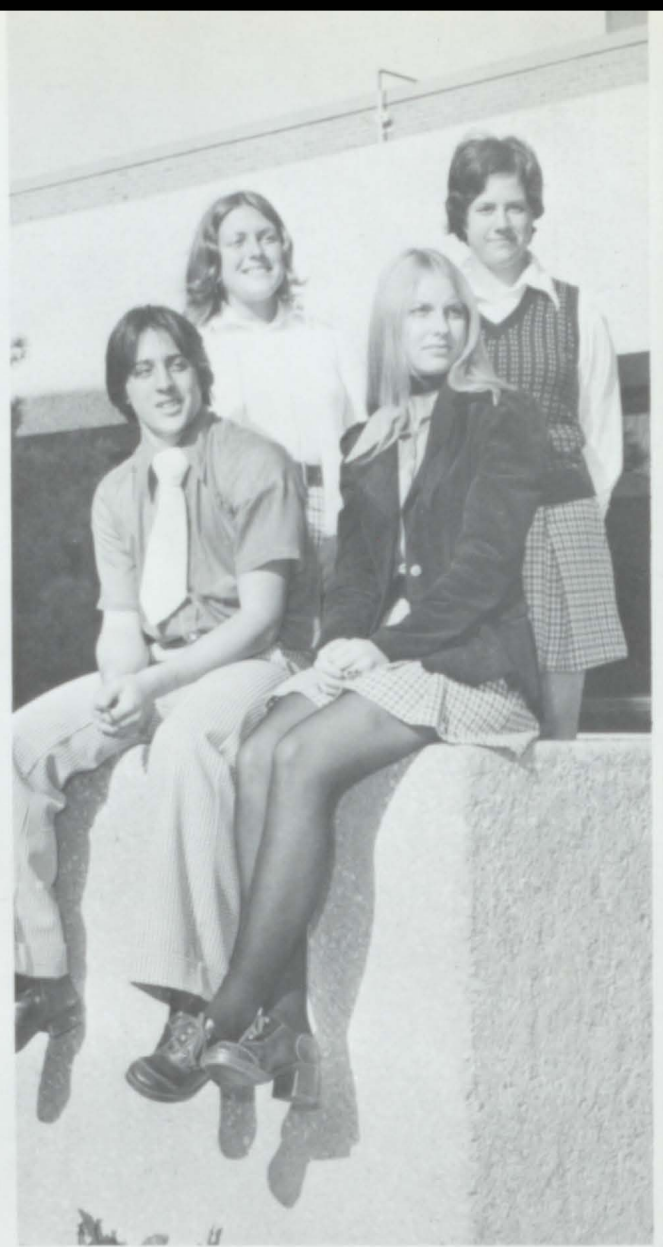


# ACTIVITIES

# ISLE OF PARADISE

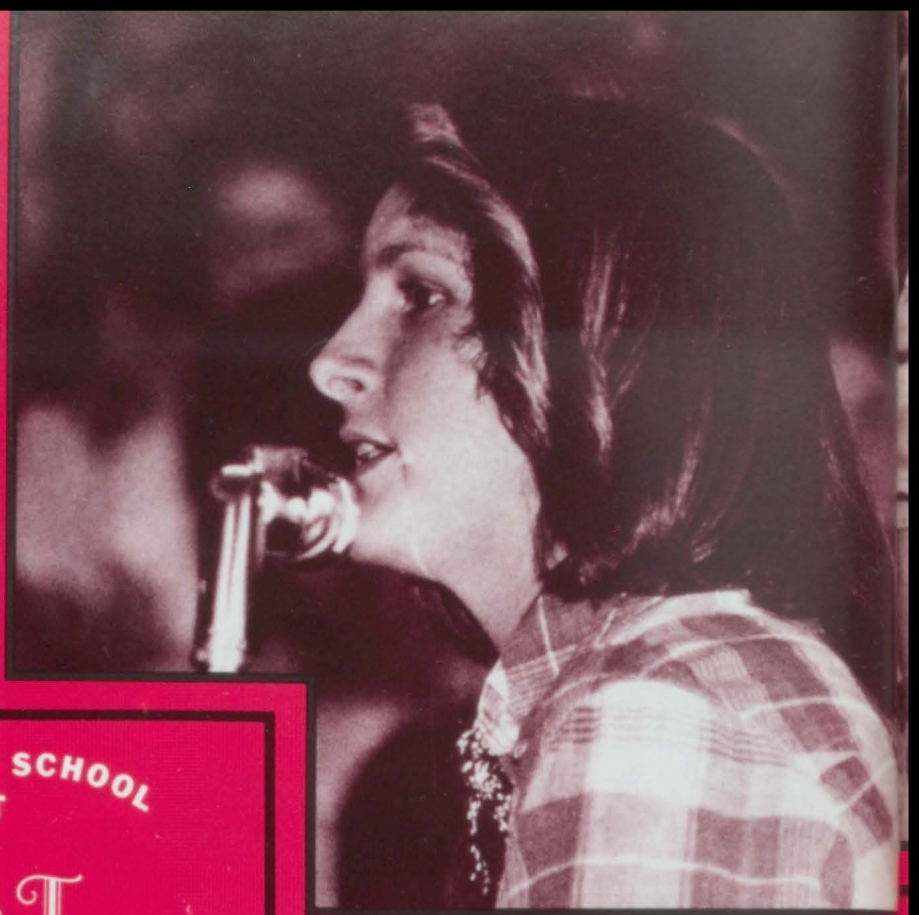

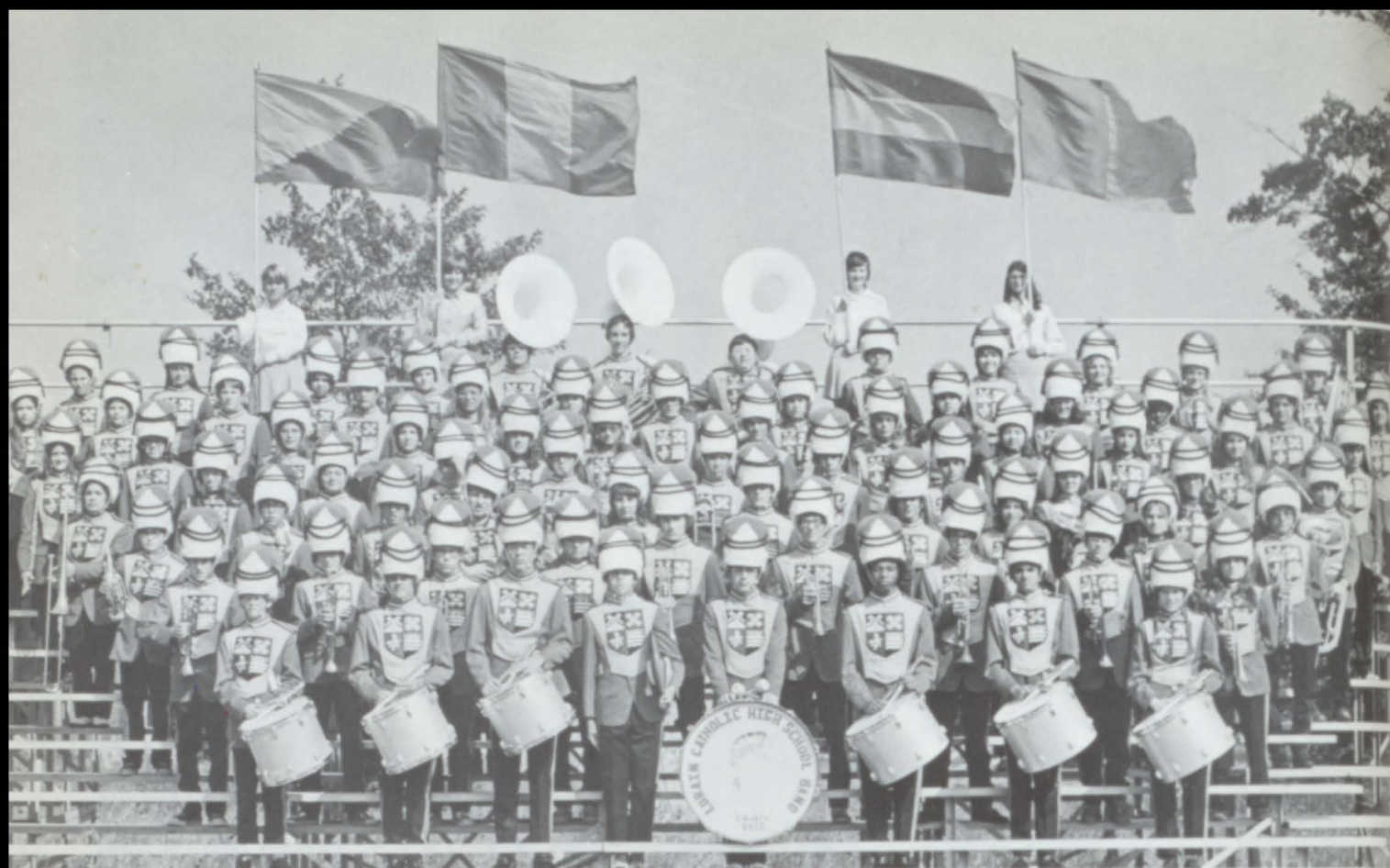
## *girls' choir makes music*

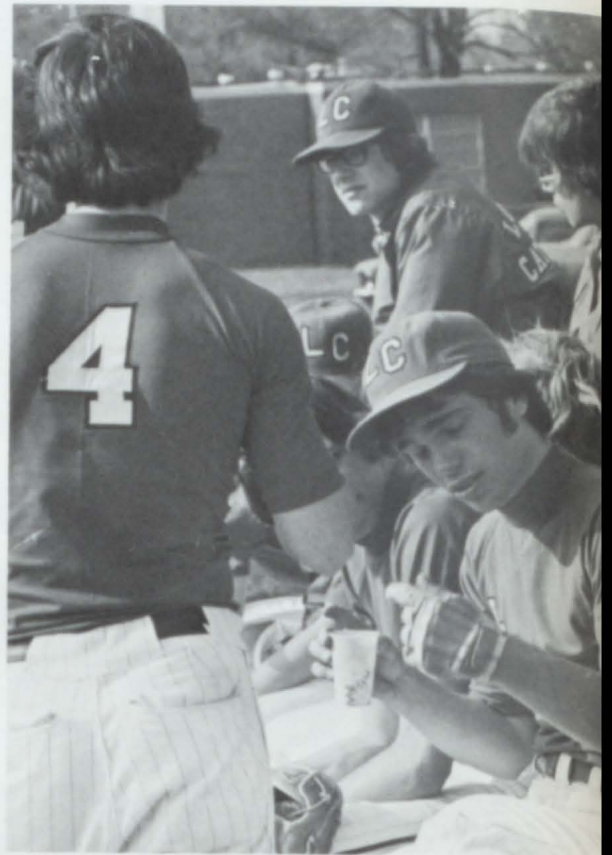

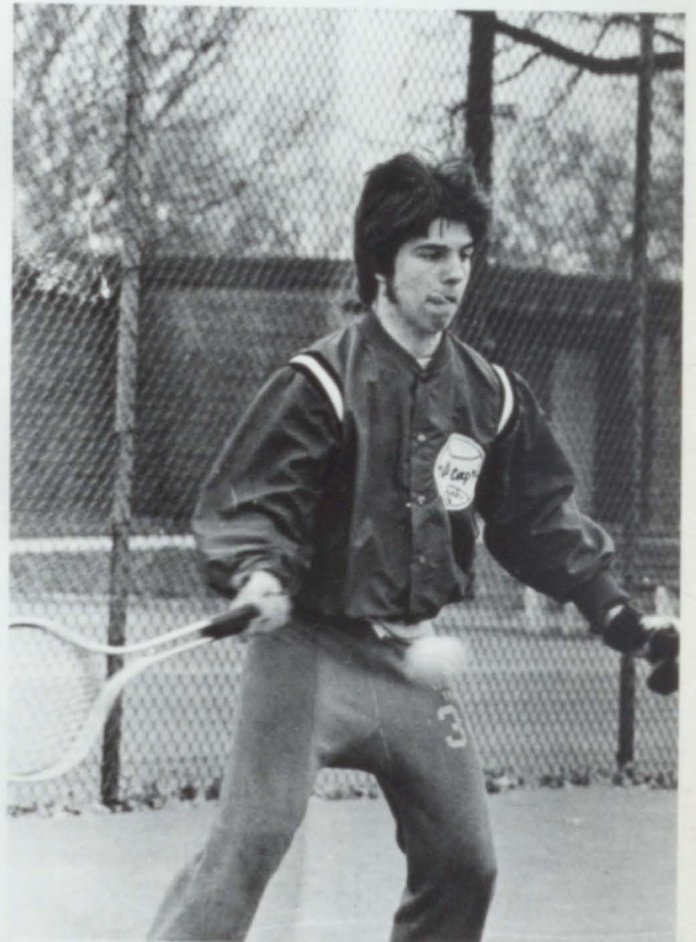
