



OUR SCHOOL






Last and Only Will of the Class of '30



As the "Booster" goes to press, boys and girls alike are preparing to do their part for the school in the track meet at Oberlin.




THIRD AND FOURTH GRADES




Our Clubs


Glee Club

On March 20th, the Dramatic Club presented the play, "Salt Water Taffy," which was a howling success. The above picture depicts one of the scenes in the play.



Library privileges are taken away from any one who does not try to honor these rules. Each individual librarian has her daily task to perform to keep the library in good condition.








Junior Physical Education Class

Boys' Track Team

The boys' track team of 1930, under the leadership of Coach E. A. Scamman and Captain Mike Walko is one of the best in Avon track history. The well balanced squad started training in early April. The boys were inexperienced with only two letter men, Walko and Schwinn back.

The team entered the C.A.C. Meet in Cleveland, April 22, to gain some experience and track knowledge from Simpson, Walsh and other well known world record holders. The team scored four points to beat several schools much larger than Avon, when Row Schwinn won second place in the half mile run.

The first meet with Brownhelm and Brookside proved that Avon had a real track team. Then followed various meets with Eaton, last year's champions, Avon Lake, St. Mary of Lorain, and Ridgeville, in which new records were chalked up to the credit of Walko, Schwinn, Smith, Detzel, Barr and Nagel.

At the annual county track and field meet, which was held at the Oberlin College athletic field May 10th, our boys and girls covered themselves with glory by breaking six records and running up the greatest score ever known in a Lorain county meet. New records were made by Captain Mike Walko in the 100 and 220 yard dashes, by Robert Peak in the mile run, and by Hazel Klingshirn in the 50 and 75 yard dashes and in the broad jump. The boys were victorious over all the other schools, scoring 36 points, as were the girls with 21 points. The combined boys' and girls' scores totaled 57 points. Thus ended a remarkable track season for Avon.





5 Accept decisions of officials without question.


6 Express disapproval of rough play or poor sportsmanship on the part of players representing the school.
