The performances not only served as a "grandopening" event for the Palace, but also gave AK students something to be proud of.

The acting, singing, and dancing abilities of the students were stupendous as the curtain rose. Dan Barnicle and Melissa Driscol's previous theatrical experience, Mark Freeman's comedic timing, Melissa Lopez's energy and consistancy of her character, and Brian Love's dancing ability, all proved to be assets to the performances when the spotlight hit the stage. All of the main characters were type cast perfectly, especially that of Ali Hakim, played by Mark Freeman. It's hard to believe that he almost didn't audition for Oklahoma! According to Mark: "I didn't think I was good enough but in the middle of auditions I changed my mind and auditioned." 



War In The Persian Gulf

AK Supports The Soldiers Of Desert Storm

You've seen the TV broadcasts, you've read the newspaper . . . but do you really know the facts? Here they are in a nutshell:

Saddam Hussein, president of Iraq, was mad and jealous of the neighboring country of Kuwait for a numer of reasons.

After World War I, Britain split up the remains of the Ottoman Empire. When Iraq was given its borders, it was cut off from access to the Persian Gulf by a tiny country called Kuwait. Iraq then discovered that they had ore fields within their borders. Kuwait was getting some oil from a grant

field on the Kuwait-Iraq border. Kuwait was overproducing oil, bringing down prices that the Iraqis counted on to pay back war debts. Kuwait wanted Iraq to allow them to continue drilling. Instead, Iraq demanded the drilling stop; Kuwait was to give Iraq an oil rich strip of land and two small islands. In late July, Saddam moved troops toward the border to show he was serious. Iraq believed that the U.S. would not intervene and on August 2, 1990, he sent in troops proclaiming Kuwait a part of Iraq.

Other important dates: AU-GUST 6, 1990- President Bush commits U.S. forces to the Saudi Arabian desert. NO-VEMBER 29. 1990- U.N. Security Council gives Iraq until Jan. 15 to unconditionally withdraw from Kuwait. JAN-UARY 16, 1991- Liberation of Kuwait begins. Massive air attacks on Baghdad and occupied Kuwait. Desert Shield becomes Desert Storm.

FEBRUARY 23, 1991-Ground attack is launched. FEBRUARY 27, 1991- Presi-

FEBRUARY 27, 1991- President Bush orders a cease fire exactly 100 hours after the beginning of ground war. U.S. VICTORY!!

1.5 Percent Income Tax Levy Fails.

On February 5, 1991, the citizens of Lorain were forced to make a crucial decision about the city's future. The district asked voters to approve a 1.5 percent income tax. When the results from the polls came in, we learned that they defeated the income tax. March 15, 1991, the day all extracurricular activities were scheduled to stop functioning, lurked around the corner.





Since September of 1989, Jobs for Ohio Graduates (JOG) has been preparing students for the transition from school to work. JOG classes are held twice a week, with classes focusing on employability skills and career choices. The JOG program helps students prepare for the future as they make the transition from school to work.

According to JOG specialist Mr. Larry Lathwell, students benefit from the program because they are able to "... pursue career interests through various activities as members of the Ohio Career Association. They become fa-

miliar with job search skills and employability competencies through use of the JOG curriculum. The Job Specialist assists the students in their job search if they are working after graduation, and there is a 9 month follow-up period to continue assisting the graduates."

Speaking of the program, Mr. Lathwell says: "The Jobs for Ohio Graduates program is extremely valuable in today's world, where proper job search techniques and abilities play such a crucial role in gaining employment. Students build knowledge and self-confidence, and have numerous opportunities to explore various career options."






The awards were then presented by counselor Mr. Harvey Herrmann and English teacher Mrs. Jo Brown, both of which will be retiring this year. There were 106 award







Admirals," states the proud Coach McGill.
















Corey Noble, a junior, and



sor for nearly seven years, "Skiing is an enjoyable experience during the winter months that can be enjoyed by students of all levels of ability."









Public Relations Manual- the first one in the district's history- which will be distributed to all Ohio high schools without Key Clubs.



For his endless hours of service and dedication, Tom was honored with many accolades. At the 1991 District Convention, he was awarded the Ohio District Governor's Excellence



TIME TO SAY GOOD-BYE


"Less stress and more to explore," said Mr. Popiel when we asked him why he decided to retire.



The time and effort that went into the 30th edition of the 1991 Admiral King High School Trident was unbelievable. Time was a great sacrifice for many staff members, but actually grasping the book in your hands makes it all worth it.

The 250 copies of the 1991 Trident were printed by Jostens Printing and Publishing of State College, Pennsylvania. The 168 pages are bound in a custom-designed royal blue cover with a trim size of 7 3/4 x 10½ with yellow print. Vinyl covers and gold foil name stamping are optional features. Century Schoolbook Condensed is the dominant type style, with 8 pt. being used

for captions and 10 pt. for feature stories, although sizes and type styles vary throughout the book. Headlines are mainly set in 30 pt. with subheadlines set in 18 pt., but styles do vary from section to section.


Underclassmen and faculty pictures were taken by Lifetouch National School Studios. The senior photographer was Reinker Studio.
