Dear Lorain High Students and Parents:

The biggest challenge the district faced in 1987 and continues to face in 1988 is financial stability. Voters renewed one levy in 1987, but did not support a second issue that year. Declining property values will continue to plague the district and industry will continue to make cutbacks which hurt the schools. Our tax base is disappearing and, frankly, the schools cannot hope to make enough reductions to make up the difference.

On the positive side, I believe that as the cormunity comes to understand the financial problems the schools face, it will to understand the financial problems the schools face, it will support education. In 1988, I see the community springing back from difficult economic times. It is my greatest hope that schools will spring

our magnet programs are providing individualized training and experiences that will help all of our young people in the 21st Century - whether they choose to attend a university, a trade school or enter the workforce. Anyone who graduates from tora in City schools should be able to not only attain a position, but continue in that position and grow as a result of the educational skills and experiences acquired here.

In the future, I believe the district has a major responsibility to continue to provide the skills necessary so that individuals can function in an ever-changing society. In the future, few people will work in jobs that exist now.

The schools will continue to provide training in high technology - computers and other data information systems for students. But providing technology does not relieve the schools of the responsibility to make sure students acquire thinking skills that are so necessary in solving problems -- not just in class -but in their cormunity.

Despite the financial problems that have beset the district I think Lorain City Schools has been meeting the challenges of serving the needs of students. In the future, that will remain our number one goal.

Mike Renner, Editor-in-Chief of the Scimitar, interviewed our principal Mr. Thomas Ballish upon his impending retirement. What follows are the thoughts of our retiring gentleman.
Q. How many years have you been in the Lorain city school system?
A. I've been principal at Lorain High for 10 years, principal at Southview for 9 years and I started out as a Guidance counselor at Admiral King where I also served as Assistant Princepal.
Q. What advice do your have for youk successor?
A. If it's any one thing, it is to be a caring principal, one who would do anything for the school. Also, to keep the students in mind in whatever you do because the student is the most important part of Lorain High. Without students there would be no reason for schools.
Q. When you leave, will you have a "homesick" feeling and what will you do to fill the void?
A. Yes, I will because it's been a part of me and I enjoy it very much. Out of all the schools I've been at, Lorain High is my favorite and I will cherish it. I plan to travel over a couple years because l've been in education since 1952 and I've never had a summer without school. So traveling will fill my time.
Q. When you first graduated from high school, did you ever think you would "graduate" again?
A. No, because I didn't set out to be in teaching. I started as a Chemistry major in college but my math was not strong so I get out of it my sophomore year of college. I played football so I decided I wanted to coach and it led to teaching. I graduated from High School in 1948 and it's 1988 and if there is one truism about school and education it is that each succeeding year goes faster.
Q. When things got tough as they do in any job, what helped you pull through?
A. First of all I believed in the Almighty and have faith in Him which has helped me. Also, I have had the support of my family and staff. I found out being principal of a large school is too large a job to handle alone so a reliable staff is needed. Everyone is important to make it work.
Q. How do you feel about the pay-to-play situation for Lorain sports?
A. The failure of the levy scares me because of co-curricular activities. Things like Academic Challenge, which won a ESC tournament, would be lost which would be too bad because its the extracurriculars that help make people leaders in the community. As for the pay-to-play proposals, I don't favor it because too many would not be able to participate. For football it would cost $\$ 250$ to play and most students couldn't afford it.

## Q. . What was your proudest moment at L.H.S.?

A. It had to have been when the superintendent appointed me principal of L.H.S. It's first graduating class was in 1879 and since then it has been the school. Other things that give one pride are outstanding student accomplishments and seeing your fruits of labor.

## "\#34 - Oliver!"

It's tough enough performing well on the football field when you're at your mental and physical peak, but when you're deaf, a serious problem exists. How do you hear audibles on offense? Can you make quick adjustments on defensive coverage? The isolation you experience from the crowd while playing is deep, but it's compounded when you're cut off from your teammates as well.

Arnett Oliver, a junior, lives through this experience each football season although he's had some help recently in the person of Mrs. Jean Dennis, a signing interpreter for the deaf at L.H.S. "Arnett is one of only two deaf football players in the state of Ohio

and this created some problems for the coaches and especially the referees. During some jay-vee games, I wasn't allowed on the field with the coaches when timeouts were called; Mr. Eredetario was a great help in convincing the refs that he and Arnett needed me to make sure the instructions were followed. At first, they were confused but a phone call to the OHSAA and an officials' meeting cleared things up. Now, I'm introduced to the officals before the game and they know my duties so we don't have any problems.'
"Mrs. Dennis flashes me signals from the sidelines when the game's on and I'm in there," Arnett said. "But before she came, I couldn't make people understand me and I couldn't understand them. It was tough; I'd study the plays, know them, but on the field things got crossed up. I'd try real hard but I'd get mad 'cause I didn't understand and the coaches got mad too. The worst time I had was in 7th/8th grade. Coach thought I was stupid and didn't spend time with me. If I mess up, fine; tell me; but I'm not stupid. ${ }^{\prime \prime}$
'People don't believe that the deaf have a different vocabulary than a hearing person," Mrs. Dennis explained. "I've got to be able to understand football terms so I can interpret them for Arnett. I had to get some help with football anyway, so Mr. Uszynski contacted the coach from Galludet College, a school for the deaf. From all this information, Arnett, Coach Uszynski, and I worked up a vocabulary for the games."
Arnett hopes to move up from the varsity kick-off next year. "I want to start at runnining back and our best one is graduating (Golden Helmet winner Dennis Washington); if things go right, I have a good chance." He watches as many t.v. games as he can and always roots for \#34, which is his jersey number incidentally. "I cheer when they do ok, but get mad when they mess up."

Considering the many problems he faces, Arnett shows a great determination to succeed. The frustration, built up over years of misunderstanding, is slowly being controlled with the help of Mrs. Dennis. It's still hard for Arnett to make himself understood, but through his interpreter and football, he's beginning to realize that self-discipline is necessary.

Not surprisingly, a certain poignancy filters through them allowing us to see their joys and frustrations after their many years as teachers. So many individuals are combined to produce a faculty that it's a wonder anything meshes, but the diversity of our retiring members doesn't hide their affection for teaching. They let us know the greatest and worst feelings they have had in their long tenure relating to their students; not because the student may have failed but that they as teachers failed to help the person involved. It's only hoped that whoever replaces these people can bring the dedication, love, compassion, and care to the school and its student body.


In life's journey, a lot can be said for not looking back. When a person is looking back his eyes aren't focused on where he's going. If, however, a person stops and turns completely around-he might be gratified at the distance he's traveled and what an enjoyable journey it has been to that point in time . . . I'm at that point in time where I probably have more years behind me than ahead of me. Half of those bygone years have been spent as a teacher in the classroom. I have loved every moment, for nothing remains the same in teaching. Each student is

I'm proud I've been a teacher and of what I've taught. I'm proud of my students and what they've accomplished with their lives. Before I was old enough to begin school, I wanted to be a teacher. I was not quite four when my mother convinced me that the policeman would put her in jail if I ran off to school with my older sister. There was never a question about my choice of a career. The disappointments and the satisfactions are many. At the the end of every school year, I must look at my failures-those students I could not stimulate to be curious about learning. The rewards are often delayed, and it's not til many years later that former students speak to me of their joys and successes, letting me know that I had a part in them.


It's been an honor to be associated with the staff at L.H.S. I found this career quite a challenge after being in industry for many years. I leave with the personal satisfaction of knowing the Vocational Auto Program has been instrumental in securing employment for students in the automotive field.


My biggest disappointments in teaching art have been that recent college credit requirements and vocational eduction 'block time' have 'shut-out' many students with art potential. My second disappointment is that I was unable to introduce the computer into the art program now that computer art is the fastest growing industry of our times. My greatest joy derived from teaching occurs when I meet former students who tell me how much their art experiences have influenced their lives. I get particular pleasure when I discover that a former student has assumed an art related career. I hope to continue using my skills in a productive way.


As I reflect on 30 years in the classroom, I feel some years were better than others just as some students were better than others. Some students I have taught have become teachers, doctors, etc., but one is doing life in prison too. Overall teaching has been good to me, but there were lean years and some frustrating years. I think I got into education at a good time; I'm looking forward to being with my hobbies to keep me busy and not working to the bell.

In his sophomore year, Dennis Washington was cast in the role of running back for the Steelmen football team. This was a job he took seriously. On March 4, 1988, some Lorain High seniors from Mr. Ash and Ms. Shull's gov ernment classes participated for the firsi time in the Mock Trial Competition sponsored by the Ohio Bar Association, the Attorney General's office and the Ohio American Civil Liberties Union. The LHS team had to play roles of prosecutions, defense attorneys, witnesses, and a bailiff. The team was selected after the college level clases conducted the mock trial in class. The trial concerned whether a search of a student's car on school property which contained alcohol would be legal under the U.S. Constitution's 4th amendment rights of protection against illegal searches and seizures.

The competition was held at the Cleveland Justice Center. The prosecution team was led by Chris Nagy and David Gassoway as prosecutors; Colleen McBennett and Jennifer Patte as witnesses; and Ken Bailey as bailiff. They lost a close match to Vermilion. The defense team was headed by Amy Labos and Ken Szarek as attorneys with Steve Barnes and Rick Carek as witnesses; they won their case against Berea Midpark. Amy Labos was named by the judges as the outstanding attorney. Tracey Stitak and Brian Maynard assisted the team as time/score keeper and video tape person.

Each participating team was required to have a legal advisor and Mr. Michael Loughman and Ms. Caryn Pass assisted the LHS squad. Matt Shullick and Dan Kapronica also worked with the team as back-up witnesses.

Of course, a love interest between Joe/Jonathan and Betty Logan develops but is resolved to the delight of the involved parties and the audience.
