## Critical Studies In Santa Barbara



In August, the summer of 1988, our English Dept. Head Mr. Lew DelGross, went back to school, this time as a student. He applied for a seminar held in Santa Barbara. The seminar was geared as a critical study of Herman Melville's Moby Dick and the application was an essay on why he wanted to be chosen as well as background information and references. Mr. DelGross was one of fifteen in such diverse fields such as Social Science, Biology, Psychology, and Elementary Education attending the six week seminar. It was his first time applying and attending such a seminar and he said, "It was fascinating".
He attended group sessions 3-4 days out of the week where guest lecturer Dr. Giles Gunn, an authority on American Literature and critical studies, would lead discussions on various aspects of Moby Dick. Everyone conversed as equals on the political, psychological, and literary implications of Melville. They also studied the influences on Melville, such as his family, his consciousness of America, William Shakespeare, and the bible.
But it wasn't all work. Mr. DelGross was able to bring his family with him and had access to everything on campus a professor would. One of the best images he took from the trip was the times the seminar group spent picnicing, barbecuing and touring. On the tours they visited the Channel Islands wildlife reserve to view how things were in Melville's time.
Mr. DelGross said, "that all the diverse backgrounds represented by the group, along with their discussions and touring, enable him to see the Novel in its complexity. "It made me a more aware person... (frankly), I studied the novel mainly for my own benefit, rather than just for using it in the classroom. I wanted to absorb the author, the intent and the work to improve me, the person, not just the teacher." Nevertheless, the study excited him to want to teach Moby Dick in the classroom. So back to school Mr. DelGross goes to teach others to appreciate the genius of Herman Melville and the important of the Humanities in our everyday lives.

Lorain native Terry Anderson was born on October 24, 1941 in Lorain, Ohio. He was raised in Batavia, New York. He was a graduate of Iowa University in 1974 with a major in Political Science and Journalism. At the time of his capture, March 16, 1985, he was the Chief Middle East Correspondent for the Associated Press in Beirut Lebanon.

A Vietnam War Veteran serving with the United States Marine Corps, Terry is married and has a 3 year old daughter he has never seen before. Terry is currently the longest held hostage in Lebanon.

On November 26, 1988 at 11:00 a.m. the Lorain High Key Club, comprised of 36 members, dedicated a 9 foot blue spruce Christmas tree in honor of Terry Anderson. They made 1,381 yellow and black ribbons each representing one day of his being a captive.

The day began with a greeting from Key Club President Wendy Yepko, A flag raising ceremony, the Pledge of Allegiance and the singing of AMERICA, THE BEAUTIFUL, an Invocation by Tina DiLuciano, and the History of Terry read by Miss Yepko. Mr. Jack LaVriha Chairperson for the Free Terry Anderson Committee was the Guest speaker. To close the ceremony, Mrs. Deborah Gresh (Terry Anderson Tree Committee Chairperson) gave the Benediction.

On November 15, 1988, the deaf class at Lorain High School went to LCCC for a very Special Arts Festival. Special Education Regional Resource Center put on the show for all handicap students to enrich their cultural awareness. We watched The Fairmont Theater of the Deaf for 45 minutes, they did hands-on Art Experience and Dancing Experience. The Murry Ridge Students choir signed a song next.

I did a performance using sign language for the song, "When You Put Your Heart in It", by Kenny Rogers. I was very happy that I did the show. I wasn't nervous at all. The reason I signed that song was so the deaf could "hear" the lyrics and know what the song was about. The song really changed my life around. Since I was a little girl, I've wanted to be an actress. I always used to say to myself, "I can't do anything because I have a hearing problem," but when I heard that song, it hit me. The song gave me a second chance to think about what I really want to do. Now, all I say to myself is, "I can do anything, if I put my heart in."

While at the college I met two very interesting people. They're both deaf and go to Sandusky High School. The first student was Laura Frank, a senior who was born in South Korea. Laura

was adopted by an American family after her mother died; she was 12 years old when she came to America. Laura was very sad at first and had a hard time making friends because she didn't know any English or American sign language. She had a hard time passing her driver's education class, since laws here are very different from the laws in South Korea. In Korea, the deaf are not allowed to drive.


Later, Linda picked up sign language very quickly. She studied everyday for three hours. Food for Laura was very different. In Korea she at very spicy meals and many vegetables with rice. At first, Laura didn't like any type of meat, but after a while she got used to eating American food. Her favorite foods are pizza and spaghetti.

Laura is a much happier person now; she loves America. Last year, Laura was on the track team and in a drama club. Education to Laura is very important. She wants to go to college when she graduates from high school. Laura's favorite hobby is studying. In Korea, there are no schools for the deaf. She came to America to get a better education and a chance to go to college.

Until then, Laura has a job working at McDonald's. She works in the mornings fixing biscuits and salads before she goes to school.

Laura has a younger brother, Vilas. Before coming to America, Vilas lived in Mother Theresa's orphanage. He is now in the process of being adopted.

He also had a hard time making
friends, because he didn't know any English or sign language. He picked up American sign language quickly.
Food for Vilas was very different just as it was for Laura. He was used to eating very hot spicy foods. At first, he didn't like American food. He likes it very well now. He eats almost anything. In India, nobody ever helped a person with a handicap. That's one reason Vilas decided to come to America - to get a good job and a better education. Vilas loves it here in America. He says it is very different from India. He say he would like to go to India and visit his friends again. Vilas enjoys playing soccer. He can play well because he used to play in India.
Laura and Vilas Frank are very special people. It's nice to talk to people who are from different countries; they both are very good at what they do. One thing they don't let get in their way is their handicap.

## Inroads To Opportunity



INROADS is a non-profit organization which operates in severa major cities throughout the nation. It is designed for outstanding minority students - Blacks, Hispanics and Nativ Americans - for whom INROADS sets rigorous performance standards. Opportunities exist at both high school and college levels and are designed specifically for students with an interest in careers in business and technolog! INROADS operates with two purposes in mind. First, it seeks to develop skilled, experienced, qualifiec minority professionals. Second, it believes that these professionals in turn will use their skills to benefit their local communities and the community at large.


The Guidance Dept. invited the INROADS program to L.H.S. in order to assist talented minority students in choosing a career. A tour of Lorain Products was arranged for Jan. 20, 1989 so that pupils could receive first hank knowledge of the training needed for tomorrow's jobs.

THE PRE-COLLEGE COMPONENT
The INROADS high-school component is designed to identify and prepare bright, motivated minority students for success in college and eventual careers in business or technology. Students may join INROADS at the beginning of the eleventh or twelfth grade.

Students chosen for INROADS

- Possess above-average skills in Math. Science and English
- Have shown an ability to cope in competitive situations
- Are strongly achievement-oriented
- Want to obtain a four-year college education with a degree in business or technology.

Participants are enrolled in their high school's college preparatory curriculum.

INROADS supplements this course of study in several ways. including:

- Classes on such topics as Computers. Career/Exploration. Sciences. Communication and SAT/ACT Test Preparation.
- Tutoring
- Career counseling
- Personal and career-development seminars
- Tours of business facilities and universities
- Direct exposure to adults, successful in business and technology, who can serve as role models and advisors.


INROADS has found that these experiences provide minority students with skills, knowledge, attitudes and insights necessary for success in a competitive college environment.

Parents play an important role in the Pre-College Component. INROADS recognizes the importance of strong parental support to students who have set high goals for themselves. Our support vehicle is the INROADS Parent Association, to which all parents of participants belong. The association meets monthly.

INROADS offers its pre-college activities in conjunction with Northeast Ohio school systems and universities such as Cleveland State and John Carroll.


COLLEGE COMPONENT
INROADS offers college participants a four-year combination of counseling, training and development activities, tutorial services and summer internships with sponsor corporations.

The program is designed to equir students with the skills, experiences and insights they will need for success in business or technological careers - not only to qualify for entry-level positions but also to rise into middle or uppermanagement ranks.

Competition for an INROADS internship is keen. The screening process involves initial interviews with

INROADS representatives. Successful candidates then are interviewed by sponsor companies, who themselves select the intern whom they will sponsor. Since the internship is an essential feature of the college program, only students who have been accepted by companies as interns take part in other program activities.

Once students are accepted as INROADS interns, expectations are high. Students must remain in good academic standing, participate as expected in INROADS training and counseling sessions, and perform each summer's internship to the satisfaction of their sponsors. Unsatisfactory performance in any area may lead to dismissal.

Sponsor corporations agree to consider their interns for permanent employment upon graduation. The long-term goal, for INROADS and sponsoring corporations alike, is to develop skilled, experienced minority employees.

## Much Ado About Nothing



NATIONAL PLAYERS

After 39 consecutive seasons of touring, National Players has earned a unique name and place in American Theatre. The name has become synonymous with quality productions of the world's great plays done by professional players against handsome sets with beautiful costumes and freshly conceived staging.

The great road tradition has experienced a healthy revival in recent years, thanks largely to National Players, the first group of its kind in a field which is now thriving. It was in 1949 that Rev. Gilvert V. Hartke, O.P., assembled a group of the most talented graduates of the Drama Department at Catholic University in washington, D.C. and with a great deal of optimism and work, 'Players' managed to get out via the turnpikes and byroads to far corners of the country in what might have seemed a hopeless pioneering task. The rewarding response is now a matter of record.

In 39 seasons, this remarkable acting company has given approximately 5,000 performances of the plays of Shakespeare, Moliere, Shaw, Brandon Thomas, Kafka, Sophocles, Aeschylus Aristophanes, Eugene o'Neill, Tom Stoppard, and Peter Shaffer.

The company is made up each year of 14 members, each of whom is responsible for several jobs. They arrive a few hours before their scheduled performance to prepare the stage: raise the set, adjust and focus the lights, check sound equipment, arrange dressing rooms, and perhaps run a brush-up rehearsal before donning costumes and makeup. When the final curtain falls, they do everything in reverse. Like the Abbey Theatre in Dublin and the Old Vic in London, National Players companies function smoothly as a team.

Among the Players' alumni prominent on Broadway, television, and films can be numbered such names as John Heard, Lawrence Luckinbill, Gino Conforti, Ken Kimmins, Ray DeMatteis, Jack Knight, Ben Slack, David Little, and Daniel Hugh-Kelly. Former directors have included Walter Kerr ( now the New York Times drama critic), Alan Schneider (Broadway director of Samuel Beckett and Edward Albee), and Robert Moore (director of Broadway's Promises, Promises, Deathtrap, and Woman of the Year.
