Chief Ron Bauer to retire, says

He's not your stereotypical cop.

He's not rough.
He's not tough.

In fact he's so relaxed and laid-back, it's hard to believe he's been with the North Ridgeville Police Department for 33 years - 12 of them as police chief.

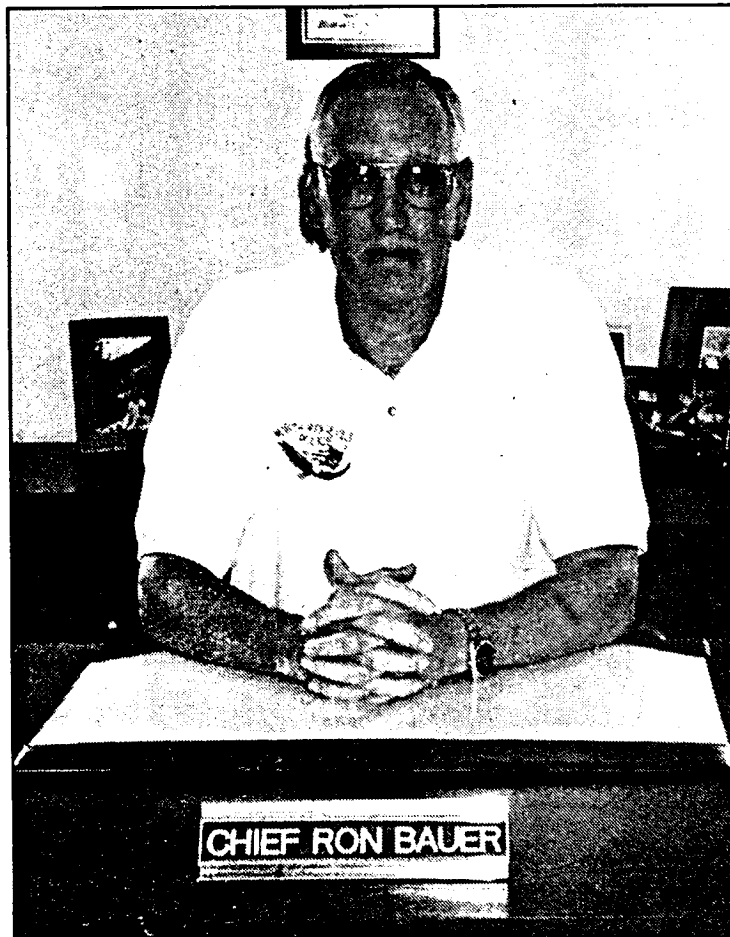
Even harder to believe is that at the end of this month, Chief Ron Bauer, 55, is going to retire.

Clad in pants and police polo, rather than blue and brass, Bauer talked about the years he's spent in police work. "It sounds corny," he said, "but I always wanted to be a policeman." However, he laughed, "It's been duly documented that I had three or four speeding tickets for drag racing." And if that's hard to imagine, just ask former Chief Tom Sigsworth, who calls Bauer, a good policeman and a good chief, but backs up his claim to juvenile transgressions. "He had a heavy foot on his Mustang," said Sigsworth, with a chuckle.

Bauer explained that he asked Sigsworth to pin the chief's badge on him when he was sworn in Aug. 2, 1989, as a sort of backhanded tribute to Sigsworth's "not being able to catch me."

Before joining the police force, Bauer served two years in the Army - 18 months of it in Germany. In 1968 he began his law enforcement career as a patrolman, moved up to sergeant in 1972, lieutenant in 1980, captain in 1987 and took over as acting chief in April 1989.

When he first started there were just eight

patrolmen, compared to the 37 today. "I was the first full-time officer hired on," he said. There was no dispatcher and the calls came through the sheriff's department, he said. And the phones came equipped with a "party line."

As today, the Police Department divided the city into zones, however there were just two persons to a shift, and the chief was on duty, said Bauer. "When I started Mills

starting and Wil-Lou Road was just developed." Motioning outside, the chief said that Bainbridge Road hadn't been extended either. "It was all woods."

The biggest problems police had in those early days were "the bar fights," and when police broke up the brawls, they had to haul the combatants off to the county jail, said Bauer. It was years before North Ridgeville got its own jail, in fact the police operated out of an old house near the Old Town Hall.

To direct someone to the station, Bauer said laughing, "We said, 'just look for the house with the pop machine on the front porch.'"

Another big thing, said the chief, were the druggies. There were two communes - one in a house on Center Ridge Road and another on Chestnut Ridge. "Yeah," said Bauer, smiling at the memory, "we went there a few times." There was a lot of drug experimentation in the '60s, he said, and Ridgeville was on the direct route between Cleveland and Chicago and Detroit.

Ron Bauer was born and raised in Ridgeville. He went to high school at the middle school and played baseball where Ranger Stadium is. "I grew up here and I knew everyone," he said, creating one of the hardest parts of his jobs - arresting people he knew.

Two Ridgeville moms get busted...for selling ice cream

They bought a big white truck, painted brightly colored balloons on the side, filled it with ice cream and with fun music blaring, Lia Muir and Michelle Kroboth drove up

and down the street selling "Two Mom's Ice Cream" to the delight of neighborhood kids.

"We had it out two days and we got busted," moaned Kroboth.

Muir said it was about 7 in the evening, and kids were lined up to buy ice cream

when the patrolman drove up. He admitted he hated to do it, she said, but based on a 1969 ordinance prohibiting vending from vehicles, the officer had to shut down the ice cream business.

"Someone complained," she said.

"He was real nice and let us finish the people," said Muir, but she asked, "You don't want to be the guy to shut down the ice cream ladies, do you? We just wanted to be the North Ridgeville community ice cream truck."

"I think more parents were excited about it than the kids," she said.

"They kept asking, 'will you come through on a regular basis,'" said Kroboth.

Muir said that when they went to police station to pick up a copy of the ordinance, "the dispatcher asked what we had and then bought some ice cream. I pushed it through the little drawer."

The women's venture began a couple of weeks ago when Muir spotted the truck on Case Road. "I told my husband, 'I'm going to buy an ice cream truck.'" And he was all for it.

Kroboth's spouse was just as gung-ho.

And the business - short-lived as it was - was born.

But the young mothers refuse to give up

GBS is leading cause of infections, death in newborns

When Bobbi and Jeff Woytach married their dream was no different than that of other couples — to have children. But for some time that dream seemed unreachable. "We battled infertility," said Bobbi Woytach. But at last two would become three, Bobbi was pregnant.

Her obstetrician, Dr. Kamrul Hasan of Westlake, was "very pro-active," she said, and tested the young mother-to-be for everything, including Group B streptococcus (GBS), the most common cause of life-threatening infections in newborns.

Bobbi was fine. Her doctor told her not to worry. Jeff and Bobbi began preparing a room for the baby, excited about the new little one that soon would join their family.

But suddenly it seemed an infection had settled in Bobbi's body and Hasan put her on antibiotics for a week. But things became more serious when her bag of waters began protruding at just 24 weeks.

"I was in labor," she said. At Fairview General Hospital she was hooked up to a fetal monitor allowing the medical staff to maintain a close watch on both mother and infant. After 24 hours Bobbi and Jeff's unborn baby went into fetal distress, and the choice was clear. Though full gestation was several weeks away, Carissa Woytach was delivered, weighing just 1 pound, 12 ounces and measuring 13 1/2 inches long.

She was so tiny, said Bobbi, that she was able to slip her wedding band over Carissa's tiny arm, nearly to her elbow.

But Carissa's size was only part of the doctor's concern, Jeff and Bobbi's baby daughter tested positive for GBS.

Babies must be tested for GBS right away, said Bobbi, because the disease can occur in newborns in the first seven to 10 days after birth. Though it doesn't always affect the baby, premature babies are far more susceptible to GBS, with sepsis (blood infection), pneumonia and meningitis (infection of the fluid and lining surrounding the brain) the most common problems associated with it.

In pregnant women, GBS can cause bladder and womb infections and stillbirth, and among those not pregnant, the most common diseases caused by Group B Strep are blood, skin or soft tissue infections and pneumonia.

Bobbi Woytach returned home just five days after giving birth, but for the first 75 days of her life, Fairview Hospital was home to Carissa. The

day she left she weighed 3 pounds, 12 ounces, said Bobbi. Infants who are discovered with GBS sometimes do not survive, said Bobbi, or may sustain lifelong problems, however today, nearly seven, Carissa seems only to have a propensity for upper respiratory infections, said her mother.

While in the hospital, Bobbi and Jeff did much of Carissa's care giving, however Bobbi said the medical part of the baby's needs was handled by a "wonderful nurse, Debbie Kruse" in Fairview's Neonatal Intensive Care Unit. The Woytachs became so attached to the NICU nurse that since Carissa's birth, "she has become part of our family," said Bobbi.

GBS is not widely explained to expectant mothers, said Bobbi, and since Carissa was born, she has joined an Internet support group, which includes nearly 100 active couples from all over the world, including Canada, the Netherlands and Germany.

Bobbi cannot emphasize strongly enough to pregnant women the necessity to be tested for GBS. "If the test is positive," she said, continue being tested. According to information gath-

ered from an Internet web site, a positive culture result means that the mother is a carrier, but does not mean that either she or the baby will become ill. However, when GBS is identified in the urine during pregnancy, it should be treated with antibiotics immediately.

According to a leaflet on GBS put out by The Jesse Cause, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention state that testing can prevent up to 86 percent of early-onset GBS newborn cases.

If not treated early on, babies can sustain lifelong disabilities from GBS, such as mental retardation, blindness, deafness and cerebral palsy. An early onset can also cause miscarriage or premature labor.

Women who are at greatest risk for GBS are those who have a positive culture reading during the later part of a pregnancy, have had GBS with previous pregnancies, have GBS in their urine, whose water breaks more than 18 hours before birth, have premature labor, who develop a high fever in labor, are African American and who are less than 20 years old.

"Our family is fortunate," said Bobbi, "mothers should take antibiotics right away. Had I not been tested at 24 weeks..." she said, her voice trailing off, as though refusing to even consider the consequences.

July is Group B Strep Awareness Month and is sponsored by the Jesse Cause, a non-profit parent organization and endorsed by the Center for Disease Control and Prevention.

The key to prevention is awareness and Bobbie Woytach has small leaflets that explain GBS. 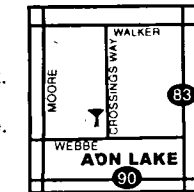

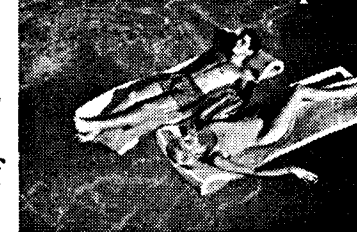

NRHS grad hired as recreation supervisor

The search for a new recreation program supervisor is over. Parks Director Jim Spaulding told the Parks and Recreation Commission Wednesday, that North Ridgeville High School graduate, Christa Centanni, was hired June 20. Centanni fills the vacancy left when Sonja Walden, the former supervisor, took a position in the clerk of courts office.

The Shady Drive Complex will get some new equipment thanks to a recycling grant, said Spaulding. The department's share of the grant is \$15,000 and so far 54 new parking stops have been purchased and installed at a cost of \$1,509.30, and still to come are speed bumps and a bike rack. South Central Park also will share in the grant money with a new sign at the Rt. 83 entrance.

Following Spaulding's recommendation, the commission approved using money from the Parks and Recreation Improvement Fund for security lighting at both Shady Drive and the Soccer Complex. Spaulding said the lights are needed to "deter vandalism."

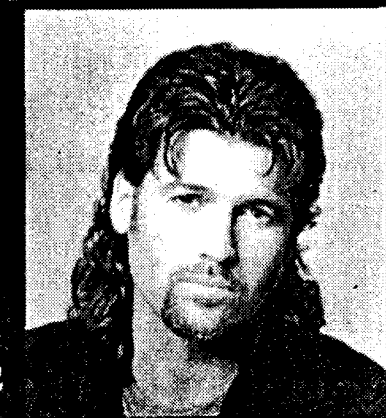

Fire Department discusses new imaging camera uses

To the Editor:

In the June 27th edition of the Press & Light, concerned resident, Chris Crobaugh, expressed his views and opinions on the purchase of a thermal imaging camera.

Although my conversation with Mrs. Klear identified one example of the use of the camera such as, an individual lost in woods, this was not to be construed as a device that would be used by other City Departments other than the Fire Department. It is a common practice in North Ridgeville, as in other cities, when an emergency arise both Fire and Police Departments work together for the health, safety, and welfare of our residents. This equipment requires special training and could be an aide to the Police Department in an emergency situation, such as a case of a missing or lost person, if warranted. I have complete trust in our Police Department's integrity and expertise, however, this equipment, due to the extensive training, could not be used on a pick up and go emergency other than by properly trained Fire personnel.

The primary use for this equipment by Fire Department personnel, as explained to Mrs. Klear, will be for locating people in

"burning" buildings, finding "hot spots" after a fire is extinguished, which could result in saving a life or lives and reducing property damage. The North Ridgeville Fire Department is one of the last departments in Lorain County to obtain such a life saving device.

I have had numerous conversations with council members in regards to the use of this purchase and never mislead a member to obtain a "yes" vote. Members who contacted me with their concerns and the concerns of their constituents were assured that this equipment would be strictly used for emergency operations and were informed of my open door policy should residents have unanswered concerns, such as Mr. Crobaugh's. The residents of North Ridgeville have always been our biggest support, having complete confidence and trust in our Fire Department. I, as Fire Chief of the city, want to continue this relationship with our residents. If you have any questions or concerns, I invite you to contact me at 353-0803. This invitation is also extended to Mr. Crobaugh. Thank You.

Homeowners object to houses planned for Ridgeview Blvd.

All Purpose Construction met resistance from homeowners when the company requested variances from the Board of Zoning Appeals to build eight houses on Ridgeview Boulevard north of Drake. In May the firm failed to get support from the panel for the project and last Thursday, the board voted 4-0 to postpone a decision until the July 26 meeting.

The property is on the west side of Ridgeview, opposite a development of upscale homes on large lots, and adjacent homeowners fear the smaller lots will detract from their property.

Roger Murphy told board members that

the compact row of houses would "ruin the aesthetics of the neighborhood."

Ken Cutler argued that smaller lots would mean the houses would be almost against the road.

Another homeowner questioned the construction company's plans if the variances are not granted and asked, "Will you put up manufactured homes?" Monica Dettore of All Purpose Construction told residents, "I have no answer."

Another asked if they would be "single-wide trailers."

"They'll be set on foundations," said Dettore.

Kelly Feierabend said she and her husband chose that area rather than the

Presidential Estates because of the size of the lots. "Now when we turn off Drake we'll see these small little homes. It's very disappointing," Feierabend said the new structures, also will devalue the other properties.

Jennifer Jones suggested leaving the land vacant. "Leave it for the community," she said, and James Jones asked if Dettore could stake out the house site, so residents could get a better idea of the sizes of the proposed houses.

Approved by 3-0-1a request for the temporary installation of two 4-by-4 signs advertising residential land available; one facing Lorain Rd. and one facing Bagley.

Approved a request by Denison Homes, Inc. for variances for a parcel on Xavier Ct.

Postponed until July 26 a request for a home occupation permit and a request for variances for property at the corner of May and Main because both applicants were absent.

Postponed for 60 days, as requested by Tri-County Cars, Inc., an application to use American and brand name flags in the front of the premises.

flood plan mappings on ditches in the County. FEMA encourages strong partnerships for the purposes of reducing flood losses and encourages cooperation in flood hazard identification and mapping processes. Because Lorain County is deemed to be in good standing by FEMA, which administers the National Flood Insurance Program, this agreement to share information and update flood maps has been entered into.

Part of FEMA's recognition is based on the previous partnership formed by the board of Commissioners, the Lorain County Engineer, United States Geological Study (USGS) and the Lorain County Soil and Water Conservation District. The Commissioners allocated \$675,000 to prepare a Master Drainage Plan and to implement ditch cleaning based on a previously prioritized list. Work continues on watershed planning, cleaning of the Black River under auspices of the Black River Remedial Action Plan (RAP) and Urban Sediment/Erosion Control.

As the 32nd anniversary of the July 4, 1969 flood approaches, it is important that we continue to work on a Stormwater Management Plan for Lorain County.

and they're mulling another idea. If they can't sell Two Mom's Ice Cream on the street, could they pull their truck into drive-ways with homeowners' permission, and hawk the icy treats from there.

Since she lives in Mills Creek, Kroboth plans to ask the Homeowners Association if she can park the truck near the swimming pool "There's no concession stand there," she said.

Muir said she and her partner have gone by the book in trying to get the business going. "We've called the state and got our permit, and the Health Department inspected," she said.

"We're totally legal," said Kroboth.

And the permits weren't cheap. Muir said the fee for the Health Department was more than \$100, the temporary business permit was \$50, and the partners had to get commercial liability insurance.

Even the kinky-tink music wafting from the ice cream truck cost a hefty \$200. "I had

to research the music," said Muir, "It's kind of like a player piano."

The two women speculate that the reason for the 1969 ordinance is that when ice cream trucks cruised the neighborhoods, a little girl was hit by a car and killed, as she ran to buy ice cream. "But that was years ago," said Muir, and there are other cities that don't ban the vehicles, including Avon, Elyria and North Olmsted.

Muir said that if there is a safety concern about the ice cream truck, she wants people to know she's the mother of four young children, all under seven and Kroboth has a lit-

tle one and is expecting another.

Listing her credentials, Muir said, "I deliver meals on wheels, I'm president of St. Julie's Golf League and I'm a Girl Scout leader."

Disappointed, but undaunted, Muir and Kroboth plan to approach council with the problem and hope that very soon Two Mom's Ice Cream will be rolling again.

Mayor Deanna Hill recalled, however, that approximately four years ago, then-Councilwoman Linda Mancuso initiated the idea of an ice cream truck and Council turned her down.

Question:

What's the difference between heat cramps, heat exhaustion, and heat stroke?

Answer:

Understanding the difference and taking proactive steps can often prevent these complications.

Heat cramps, also known as "miner's" cramps and "stoker's" cramps are associated with painful muscle spasms and usually occur in the extremities after strenuous activity. It is not necessary to be exercising in direct sun, and usually affects individuals in good condition. The cause is thought to be loss of sodium and water. Relief comes quickly with replacement of sodium chloride (salt) and water.

Heat exhaustion or collapse is the most frequently seen heat-induced disease. Symptoms associated with heat exhaustion are weakness, headache, nausea, and fainting. The skin feels cold and clammy. Blood pressure is often low, and body temp is either normal or below normal. The duration of heat exposure and the amount of sweat loss determine the severity of the heat collapse. It is important to remove the person from the hot environment and to replace their fluid loss.

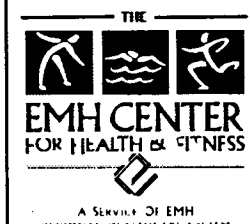
Heat stroke is often called sunstroke. It is the most serious of the three and prompt attention can make the difference between life and death. Direct sun exposure is not necessary, but high humidity levels are usually present for this to occur. The disease is caused by a breakdown of the heat regulating mechanism in the body. In other words the body is no longer able to regulate its temperature by sweating. It is associated with a decrease or a cessation of sweating; thus the skin is very dry, yet body temperature is very high. Body temperatures up to 110 degrees have been known to occur. This can cause permanent brain damage and death. Quickly get the individual cooled down; the most common treatment is an ice water bath.

It is important when exercising in humid, hot weather to keep salt and water replacement at hand. If you know you are going to be exposed to direct sun, or high humidity levels, plan ahead and drink water before, during and after activity.

Consult your physician before beginning an exercise program if you have never exercised, if it has been a long time since you last exercised, or if you have chronic or acute health conditions.

Police Chief from pg. 1

As he advanced in his career as a North Ridgeville policeman, Bauer worked under six administrations - Dick Noll, Chuck Stuart, Dick Carje, Floyd Peaco, Jeff Armbruster and Deanna Hill. "And I never had a problem as chief," he said.

Police equipment has evolved into some very sophisticated gear over the past three decades. "In the early days we used Rent-a-Cars that had no radio," said Bauer. Today every car has a radio equipped with the frequency to monitor North Ridgeville and for surrounding communities, in the event mutual aid is needed.

Each car has two lasers, one for speed and one for measurement, he said. "Thirteen cars are equipped with computers," which means the officers can do on the spot LEADS checks, and as an example, locate a stolen car quickly. "It saves a lot of radio traffic," said Bauer, "and cuts down on dispatch."

Can the police chief finger a favorite part of police work that he'll miss after 33 years on the force?

"The hands-on. I'll probably miss investigations," he said. "I was a detective and a juvenile officer for 10 years. I like putting the pieces together," he said.

As he talked, Bauer agreed that though equipment has changed over the years, people are basically the same and through their thought processes make the same mistakes. "I like the challenge at every crime scene," though he's not a crime scene technician, but rather prefers following the crime from beginning to end.

The Sherry Ulmer case is one that was never solved and has frustrated him for a very long time. It was 6 a.m. Christmas morning in the 70s as Ulmer and her boyfriend were speeding along the Ohio Turnpike, he said.

Bauer said Ulmer had her head on the boyfriend's shoulder, when suddenly someone standing on the overpass on state Rt. 83 high above the highway dropped a chunk of asphalt onto the car. It hit Ulmer and killed her, but the assailant was never found.

"Our department worked on that for over a

year," he said, "it was very frustrating."

Being a police chief mandates being the disciplinarian at times, but with his easy-going nature and casual style, it's hard to envision Bauer as authoritarian, but it goes with the job.

"When I discipline, I try to be firm and fair," he said, "but when it's done, it's done."

The key to being successful in his job, said Bauer, is not to view it "as us against them."

And in talking to some Ridgeville mayors, it's obvious Ron Bauer has been very successful.

Mayor Deanna Hill has known Bauer and his wife, Janet, for years, having grown up in North Ridgeville, and calls the chief, "a sense of history - of the town itself, the land and the families. "It's been wonderful working with him," she said, "it's a family feeling."

Hill credits Bauer with impacting city employees. "He's been a big influence with his cool demeanor," she said, adding, "He is very principled."

The mayor said that the men and women who work under Bauer admire him and have only good to say about him. "He's very fair, but laid-back," she said. "Every time he comes over (to her office), he salutes and when he leaves, he says 'protect and serve.'"

Dick Noll said that he recalls Bauer as always working well in the capacity in which he was placed.

Floyd Peaco said, "I am very proud Ronnie Bauer wound up becoming chief while I was mayor." Peaco said, "He's a hometown guy," but he also recalled hearing the police chief was "kind of a Peck's bad boy" in his younger days.

"I think the world and all of Ron, he's a great guy to work with. I always felt comfortable when I dealt with Ron," he said.

The former mayor said that Bauer could have retired with a disability after being hurt while in a "wrestling match" with a suspect while on duty. "I cannot say enough about him."

Despite Tom Sigsworth crack about Bauer's "heavy foot," the former police chief said, "He was a good policeman, a good chief."

He recalled one time in 1978 Bauer stopped

at McDonald's to buy an Egg McMuffin before heading to work traffic on Rt. 83. "There was about 8 feet of snow," said Sigsworth, "and he got hit by a car. I told him only the Egg McMuffin saved him."

Sigsworth also remembered the "wrestling match," which injured Bauer's back. "There was a drug addict on Lorain Road and Ron went into arrest him. The guy got unruly..."

"It's hard to find anything bad to say about Ron," he said.

When a man - a young man - has the respect of everyone he works with, as well as former co-workers, why does he want to retire?

"It's time," said Bauer, "it's time for younger guys."

And as others heap laurels on Ron Bauer, he hands out some compliments of his own. "This is really a great bunch of guys, well-picked and well-trained. I take great pride in this department, it's a great...a super job."

His last day on the job will be July 27, and then what?

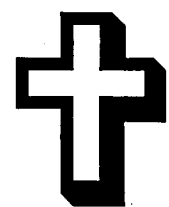
"I've had some offers," he said, "in law enforcement." But he's not interested.

"I've got four antique cars that need attention, and a motor home to take us places," he said, with one of the special places, Denver, where the Bauers' daughter lives. "We love it there," he said.

Bauer's wife will retire from the school district in January, and after the cars are repaired and the traveling is finished, at least for a while, the chief said he might consider another job, "if the right opportunity comes along."

And though he no longer lives in North Ridgeville, his mother does, as do most of his friends and relatives and his wife's relatives. While he may not be taking the stairs or the elevator to his office on the second floor of the North Ridgeville police station, he'll be around and around and around.

As Ron Bauer said, "This is home."

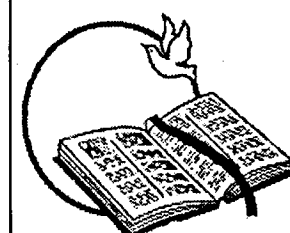

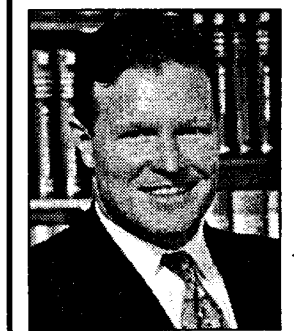

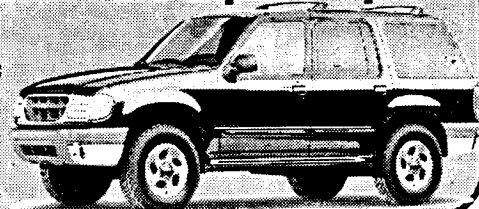
