


You want us to do a what?!?



Marketing and Management students want to succeed in the business world. They prepare for this by working in various places while still in high school.










Life on the other side of the desk





The theme this year was "THAT'S WHAT FRIENDS ARE FOR." Ev-



Each year the senior class have a presentation of awards at their Senior Banquet. The winners of each of the categories are not known until the names are called.



One of the groups that Key Club helped was the basketball team. The banquet was help in April, and Windy Ross, Chris Elenin, and Dee Romes helped to serve.
















LADIES GRAB SECTIONAL WIN BUCKEYE TOURNEY








