Tax Abatement Review Board approves Summit Tool request

North Ridgeville's Tax Abatement Review Board recently approved a request by the Summit Tool Company for a 10-year abatement on personal property. The proposal was expected to be on the agenda for the Jan. 6 council meeting, however there was no prior public notice concerning the abatement board meeting and the board's recording secretary, Paula Cope, said she had not been notified of the session. The abatement request requires council approval, before going before the Lorain County Commissioners.

When questioned about the legality of the Tax Abatement Review Board's meeting without public notification, Assistant Law-Director Toni Morgan said

she was unaware of the situation, but would check into it. By Press & Light deadline, Morgan had not returned the call. Mayor Deanna Hill was unavailable for comment. Safety Service Director Jim Johnson said he was unaware of the abatement request.

The company, now known as Summit Tool Company, has been in business since 1932 when the Pendleton family, under the name Warren Tool Corporation, founded it. Company officials are considering relocating its Michigan operation to the former AAR building on Mills Road in North Ridgeville. AAR moved to Pennsylvania in 2001.

Since Summit Tool would be housed in an existing building, the tax abatement request is on personal property only. According to the application, the Akron-based company is expected to add 40 new jobs at the North Ridgeville site over the next two years, with a projected payroll of \$700,000 annually. The

total cost of the project is \$4.2 million.

The proposed personal property tax abatement would be 100 percent the first year, with a \$10,000 contribution to the North Ridgeville City Schools; a 95 percent abatement the second year with a \$9,500 contribution to the school district; a 90 percent abatement the third year and \$9,000 going to the schools and an 80 percent abatement for years four through 10, with an \$8,000 contribution to the schools.

School board discusses changes in course selection book


North Ridgeville High School (NRHS) Principal Patricia Bahr recommended changes for the 2003-2004 course selection handbook during the Dec. 9 school board meeting. She noted students in the 2007 graduating class will be required to have 23 credits to graduate, including one credit of a technology elective and offered several courses including video production, computer classes, word processing and yearbook.

Tom Dake asked about the impact on North Ridgeville residents at the Lorain County Joint Vocational School (JVS), but Bahr said those students presently take technology courses.

Ten percent of the 1.5 million children annually examined by the Prevent Blindness America organization have abnormalities such as "amblyopia" or stradismus." Most of these individuals can be cured because their condition has been caught at an early age. Amblyopia, or "lazy eye," occurs whenever the eyes send images of unequal quality to the brain, such as when one eye focuses better than the other. Recent studies indicate that eye drops may be just as effective in treating amblyopia as patching, which has long been the primary remedy.

The sooner an eye-care specialist diagnoses amblyopia or strabismus, the greater the chance for a positive outcome. Regular examinations are especially important in detecting amblyopia, since the condition may only be detectable with professional testing equipment.

Noll also remembers when she was 8 years old, she asked Santa for a brile doll and found one Christmas morning underneath the tree. However, the brile doll's dress was very pretty and so deicate that she could not play with her.

"She just sat in the corner as a decration," Noll said.





Ridgeville and then back to JVS," Dake said.

Bahr assured him that would not be necessary. Board member Ross Mitchell questioned whether or not students could receive credit for the class by taking a test, rather than taking a course on a subject they know, such as introduction to computers.

"We're adding additional credits (to graduate) and requiring more than are required by the state." he said. "Can we allow them to test out?"

He said it seemed students have to pass an exam to determine if they have prerequisite knowledge to take a particular class, so they should be allowed to "test out" of a class and still receive credit for it.


Assistant Superintendent Larry Bowersox explained that students are required to be tested to get into class to determine the skill level and where to place the student.

'The state requires 21 credits," Mitchell said. "If kid can pass a course, he should get the credit." "To get the credit the student must spend time in the classroom," Bowersox said.

"You can't test out of a class like in college," Board President Rev. Mike Gibson said.

Dake said he presented the idea to the NRHS and Middle School PTAs and heard "no opposition." "They just realized we're going to challenge the kids," he said.

Bahr said the Class of 2007 would be required to have four social studies credits. Freshmen would take world history, sophomores, American history, juniors would take government and economics and seniors could earn one credit by taking an elective.

Rabung having fun again as he breaks Ridgeville wrestling record

At the beginning of the season, North Ridgeville senior wrestler Matt Rabung was just 10 wins shy of the school's career record. After flying out of the gates with a 9-0 start, Rabung was ready to make the mark at Strongsville last week, and nothing would stand in his way.

It just took 48 seconds against Sam Camardo in the 119-pound weight class for Rabung to break Matt Shultz's two-year old record of 104 wins. Seven of Rabung's 10 wins have come from pins.

"It felt good," Rabung said about breaking the record. "It's something I've been looking forward to and finally did it so I'm happy about it."

"It takes a four-year starter to do it," North Ridgeville coach Ed Haller said about the record. "Matt got over 20 wins his freshman year. Lightweights can do that."

In his freshman year Rabung recorded 27 wins and compiled a 35-8 record his sophomore year. Last year he went 33-7, starting the season


With the record out of the way in the first three weeks of the season, Rabung can now concentrate on his main goal for this year: Placing in states.

Rabung's most recent accomplishment is something special in his family. His father, Mike, set a school record for career wins at Springfield Shawnee.




