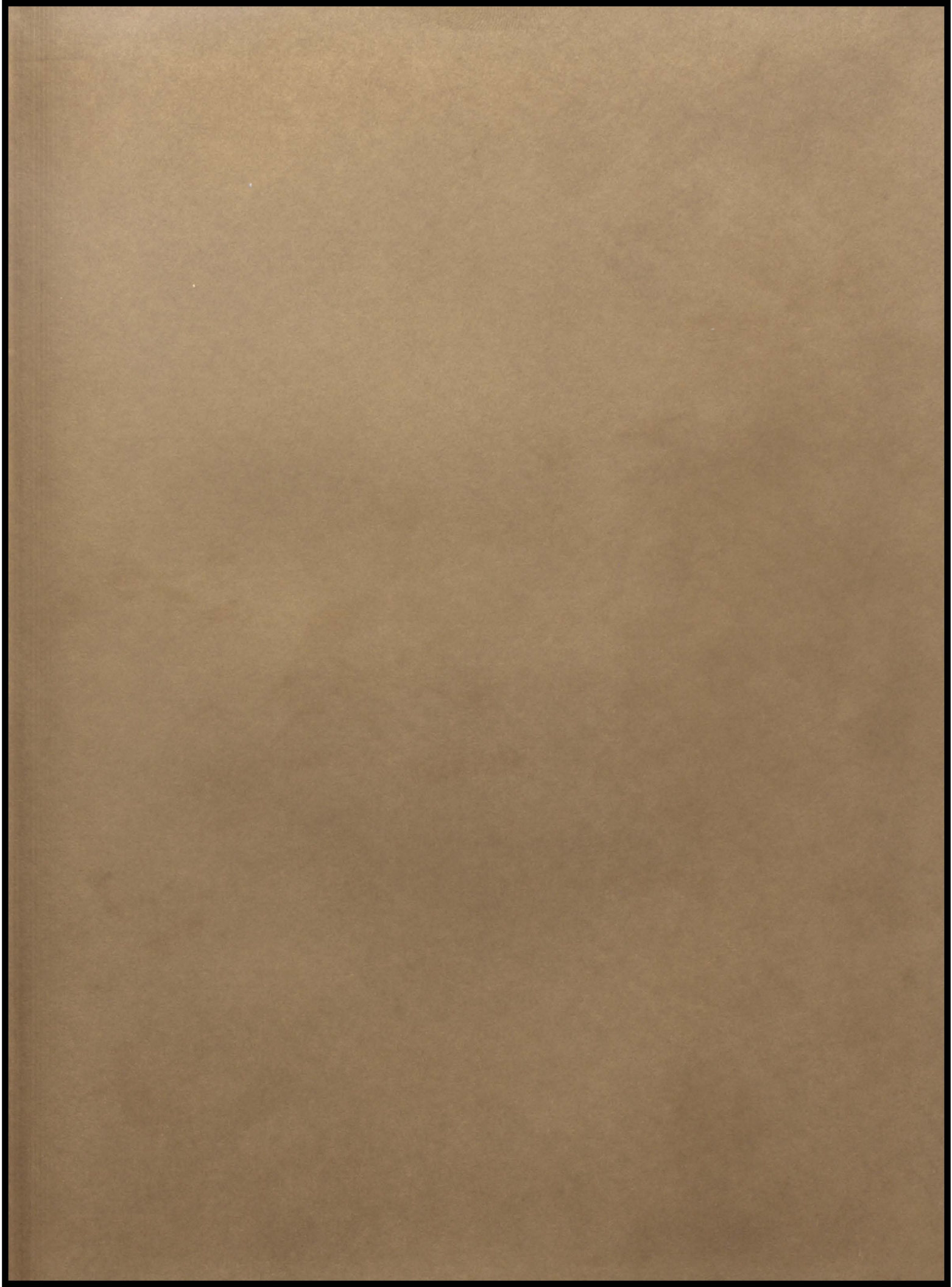

MAKING The BEST of IT

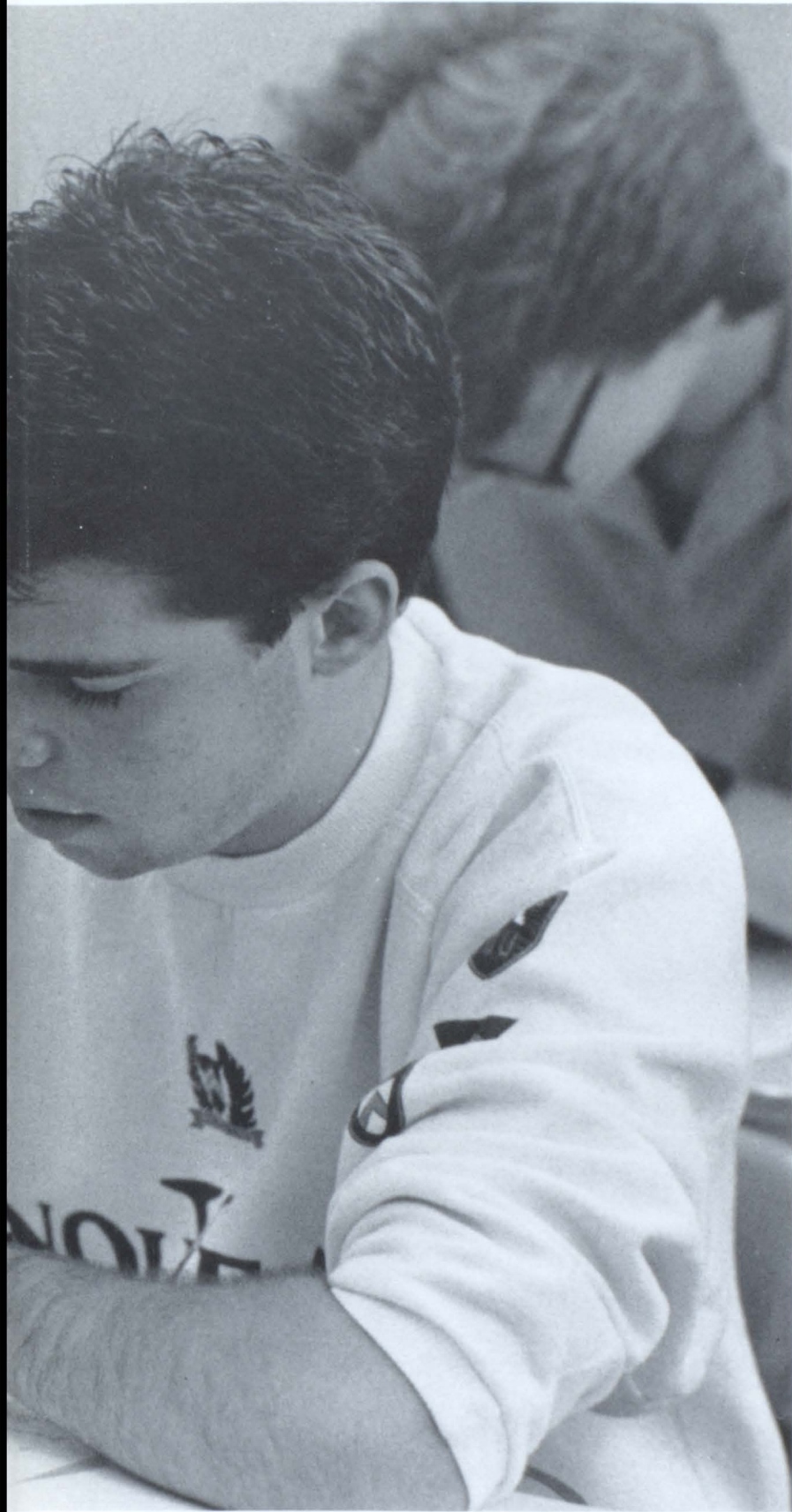
Making the best of it can involve a lot of things.

The first thing to decide is *what* it is that one is making the best of. The most obvious answer is that which we all have - life. But what about it?

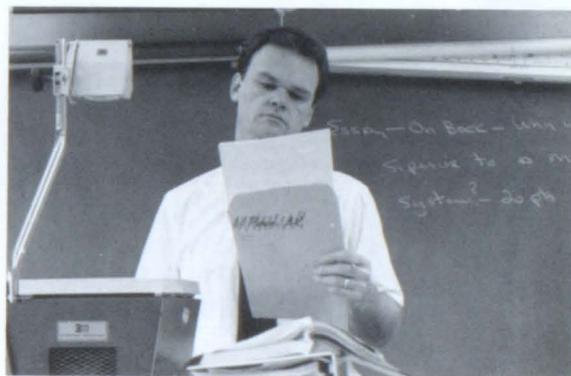
First, there is making the best of what we do. Almost everyone has a special skill or talent that they can use to improve themselves or others.

Looking one's best can be time-consuming. Below, Beth Hicks checks herself out in her locker mirror between classes.



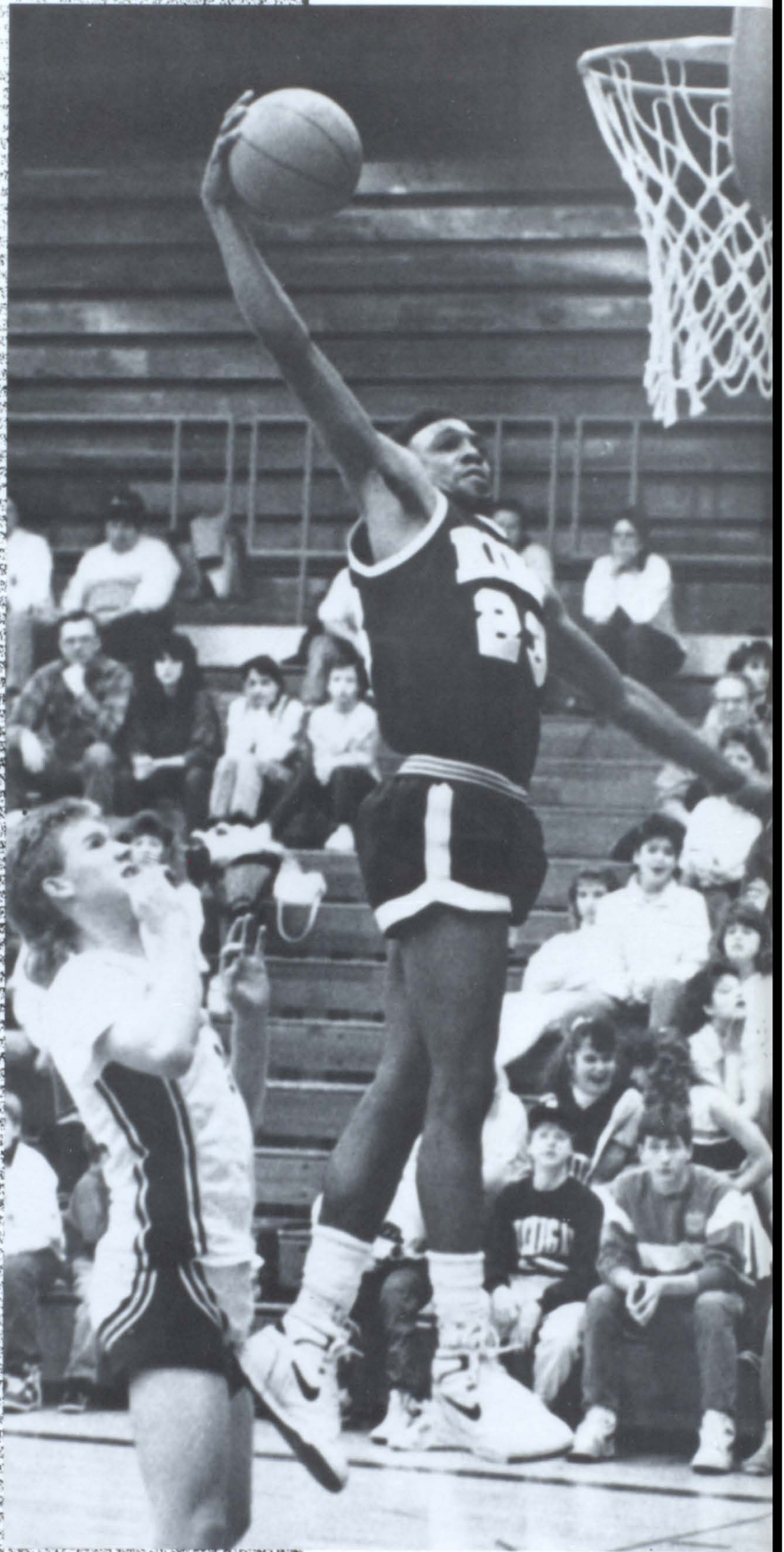

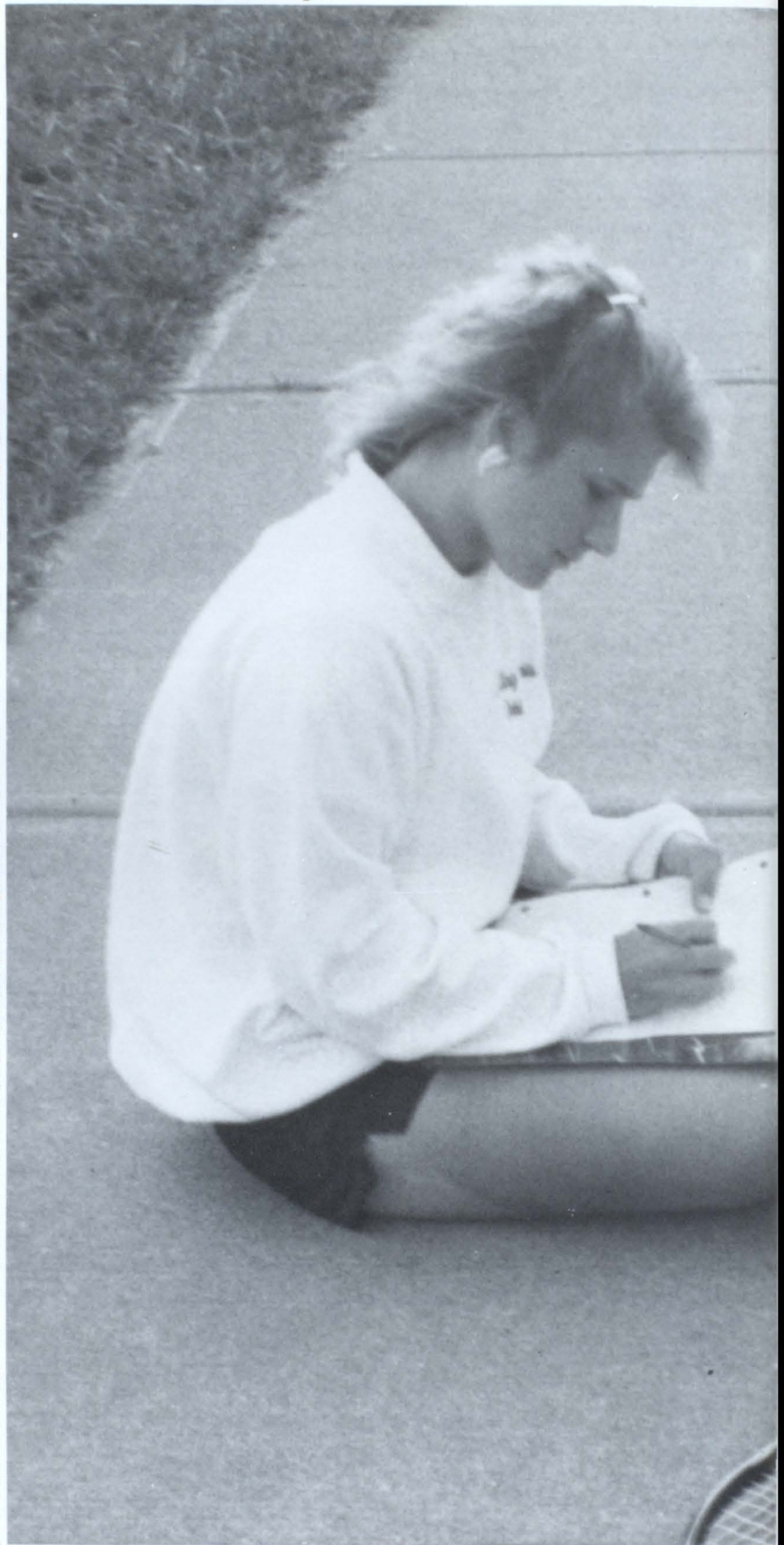

Each of us has our own distinct personality. It is the differences that make us unique and keep making us the best we can be.

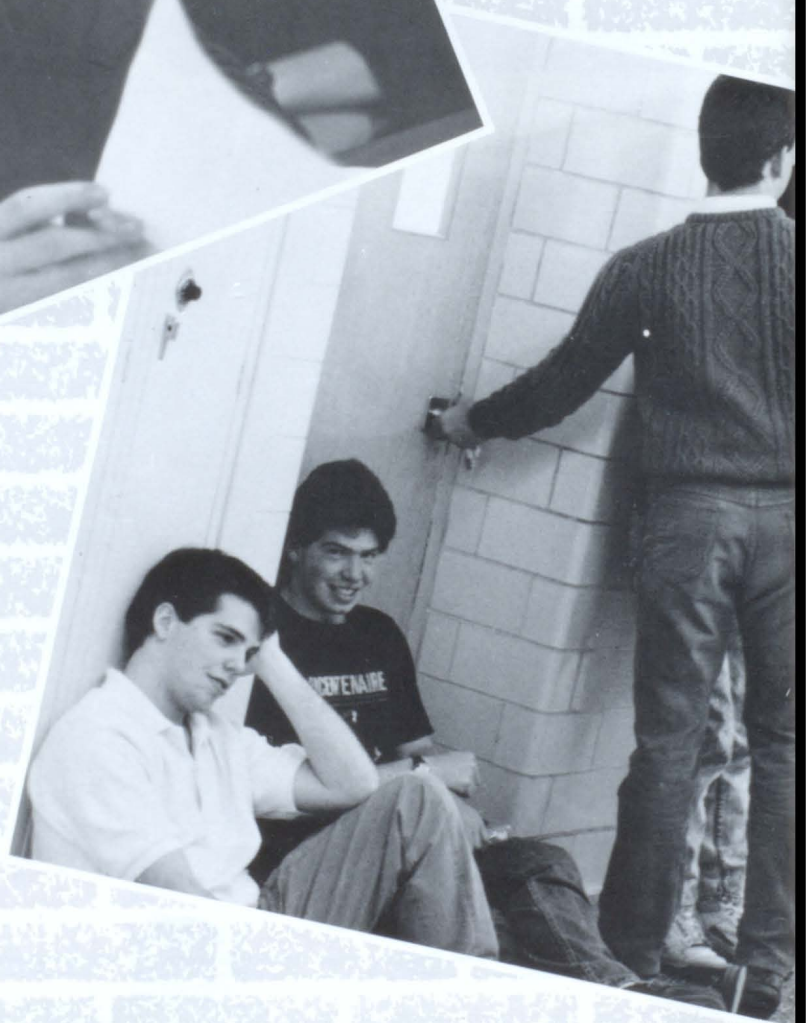

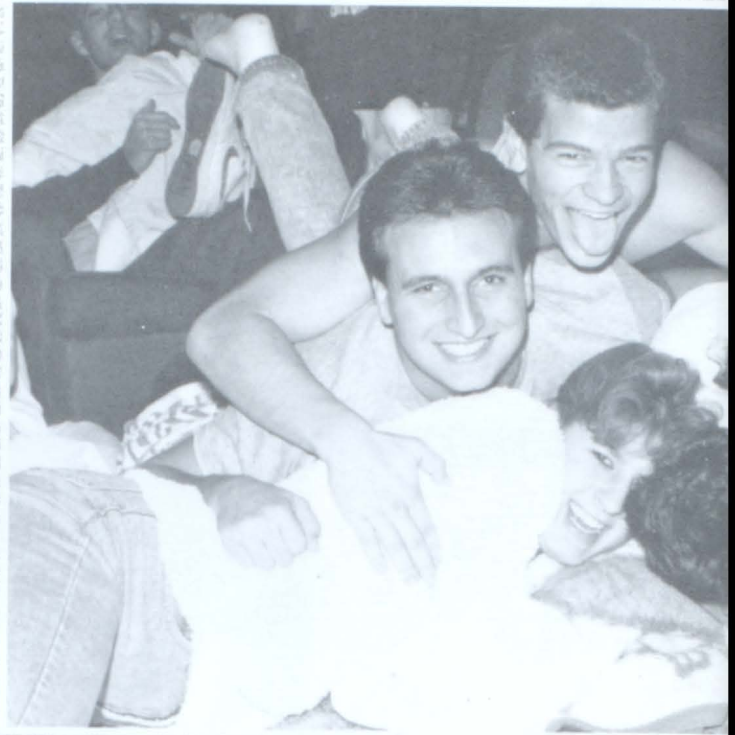
Rock around the clock

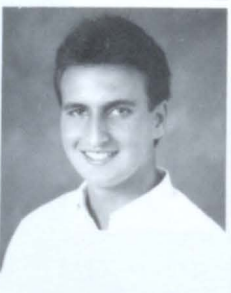
The night of fun and togetherness raised about \$2,000 to help defray the cost of the prom.

Seniors face real life

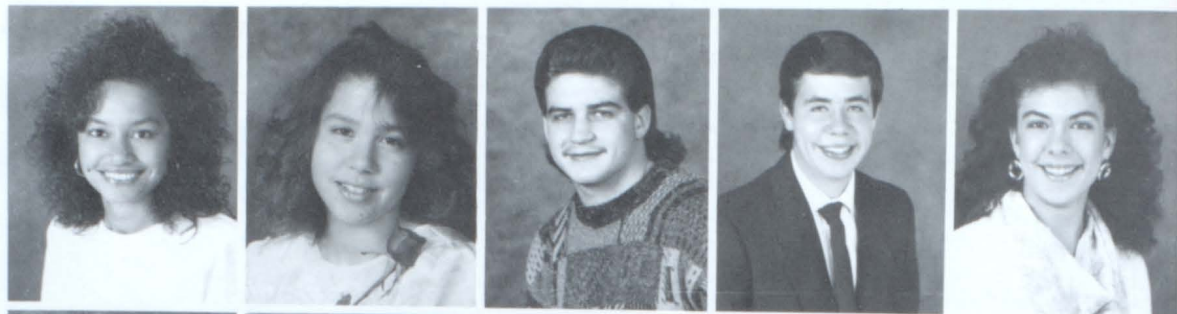
It's one of the most exciting times of a young person's life. It's a time when decisions must be made. It's the reason given when asking for special privileges in school.

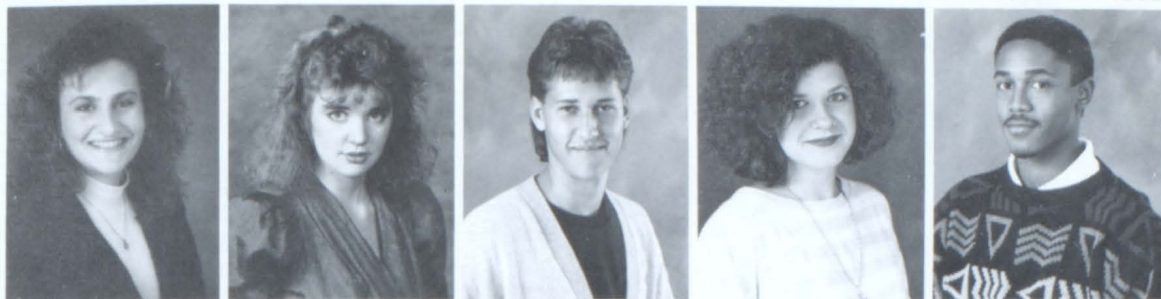
Senior Committee

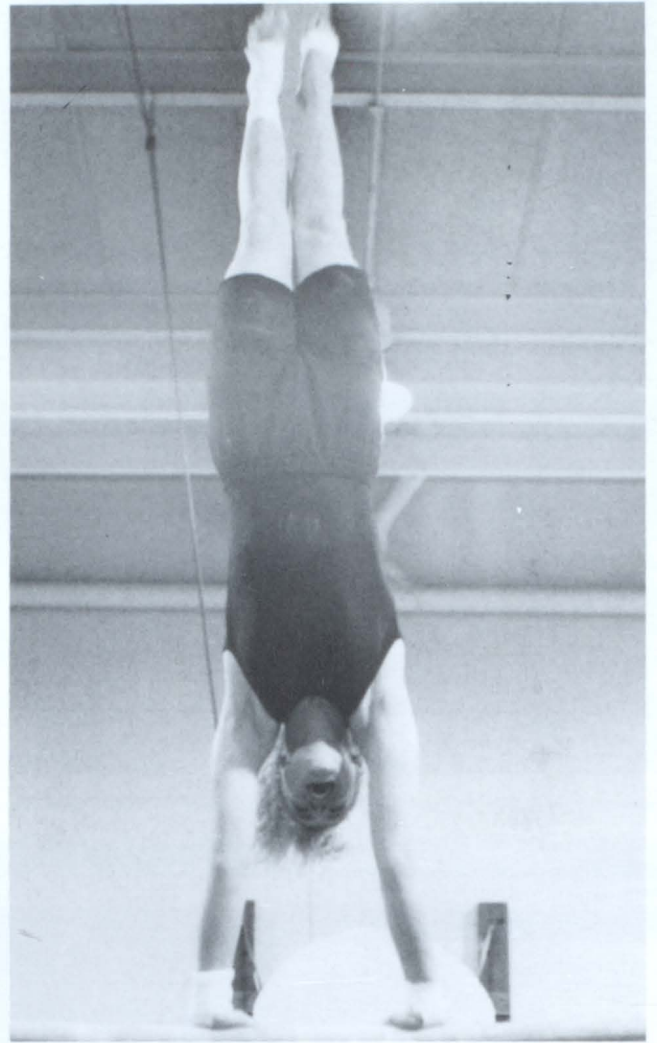

The prom-to-dawn, sponsored by the parents of the seniors, was held on May 27th at the Aquamarine Lodge in Avon Lake.

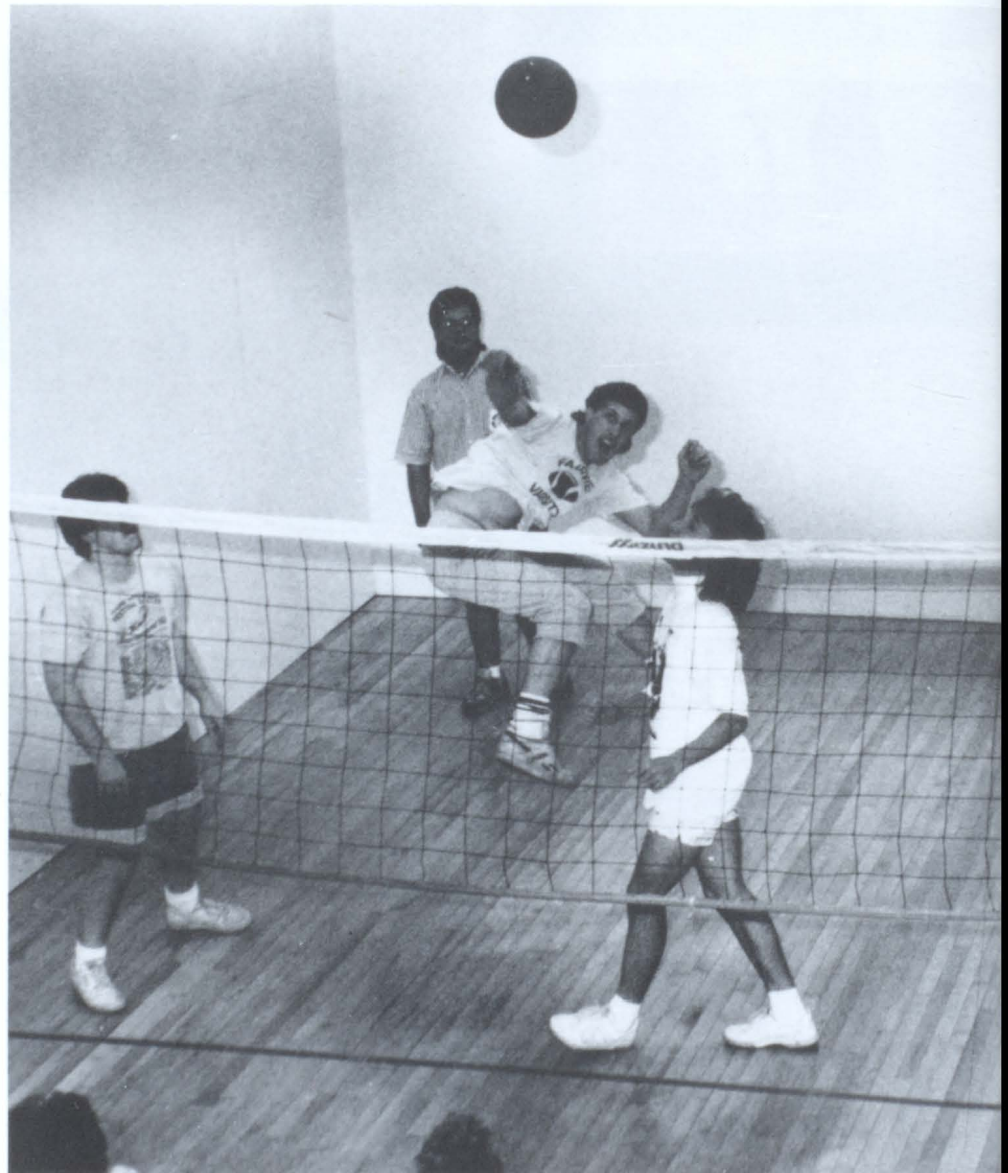

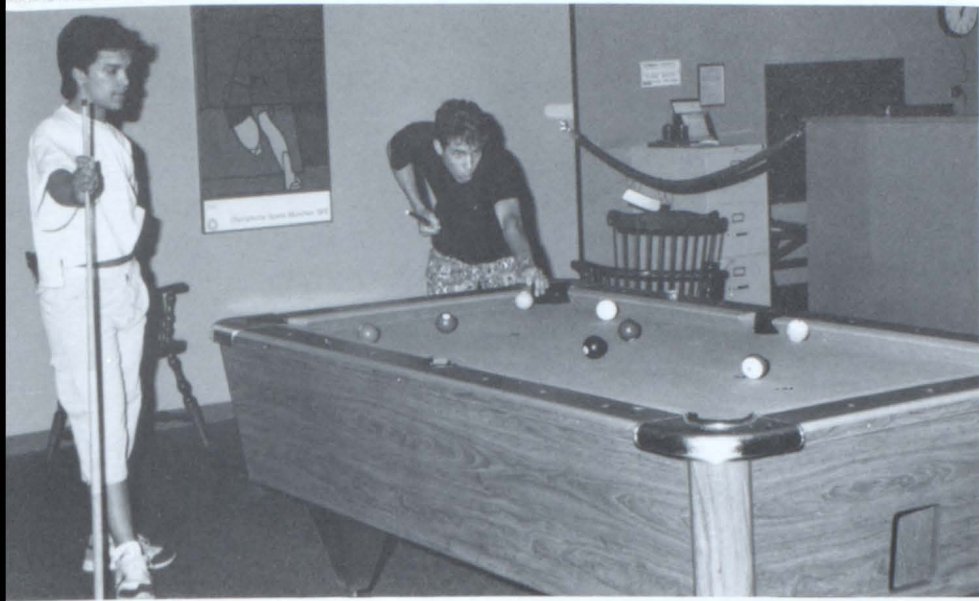

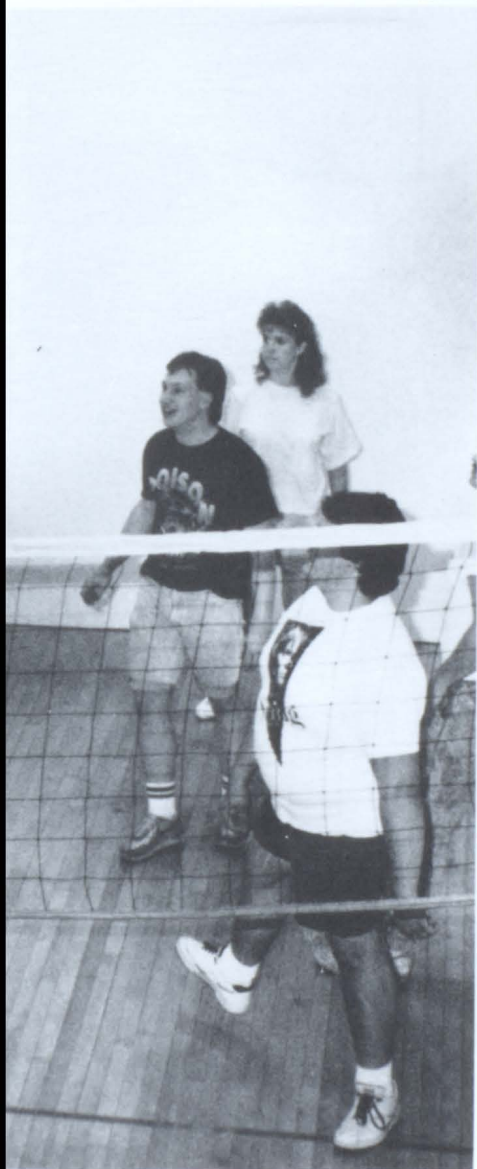

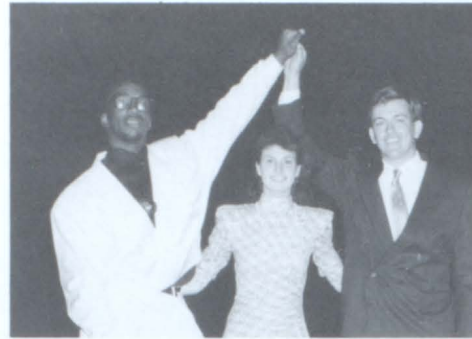

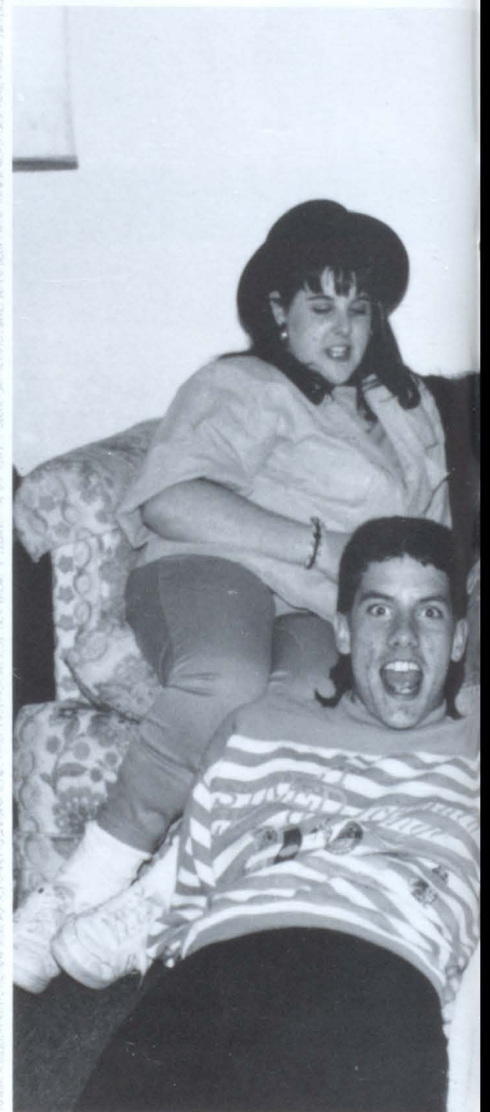

Three ladies and three gentlemen, they represented five different counties. Two, Guilherme Golden-

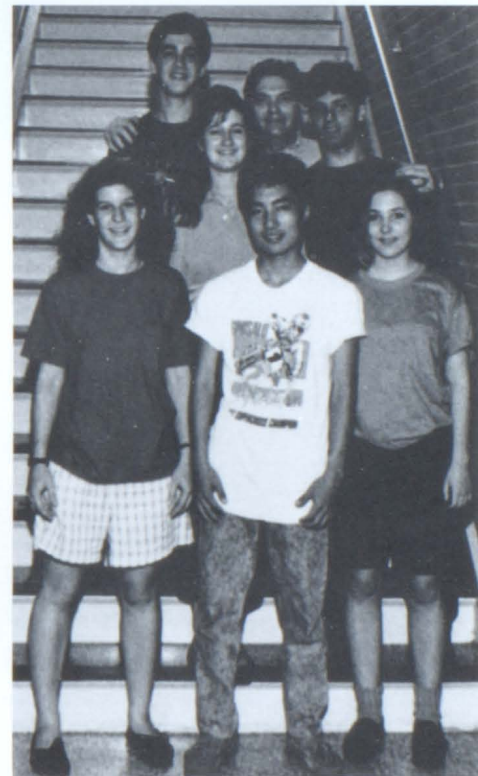

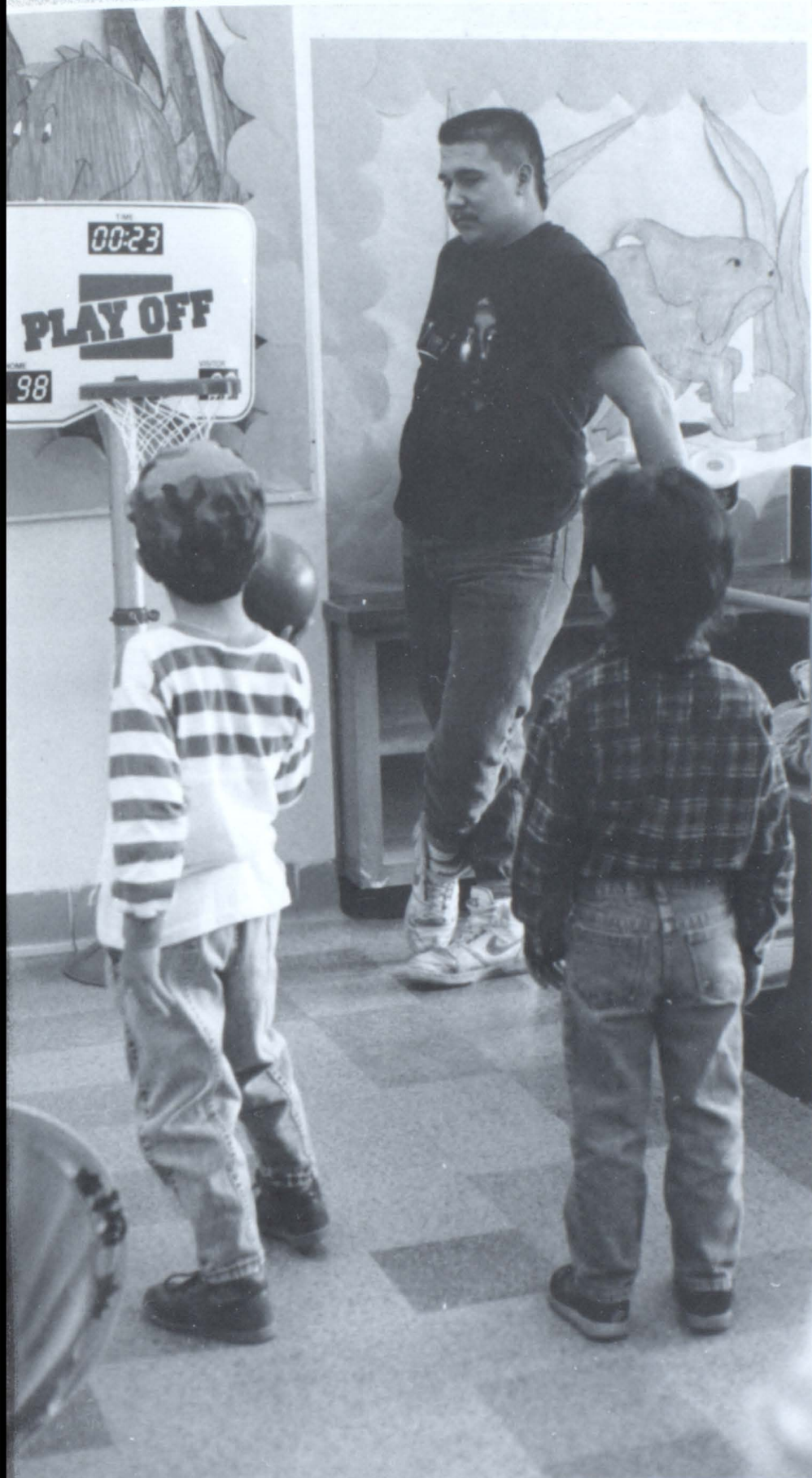


The end of the basketball season again brought the usual rash of tournament fever. Even though the team did not advance to the regionals, the fans, above, still came out to encourage the team.



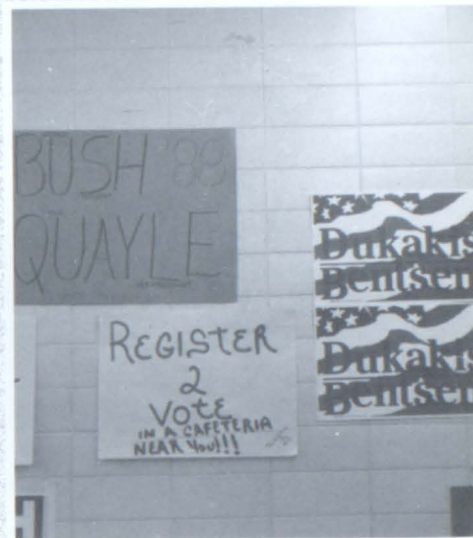

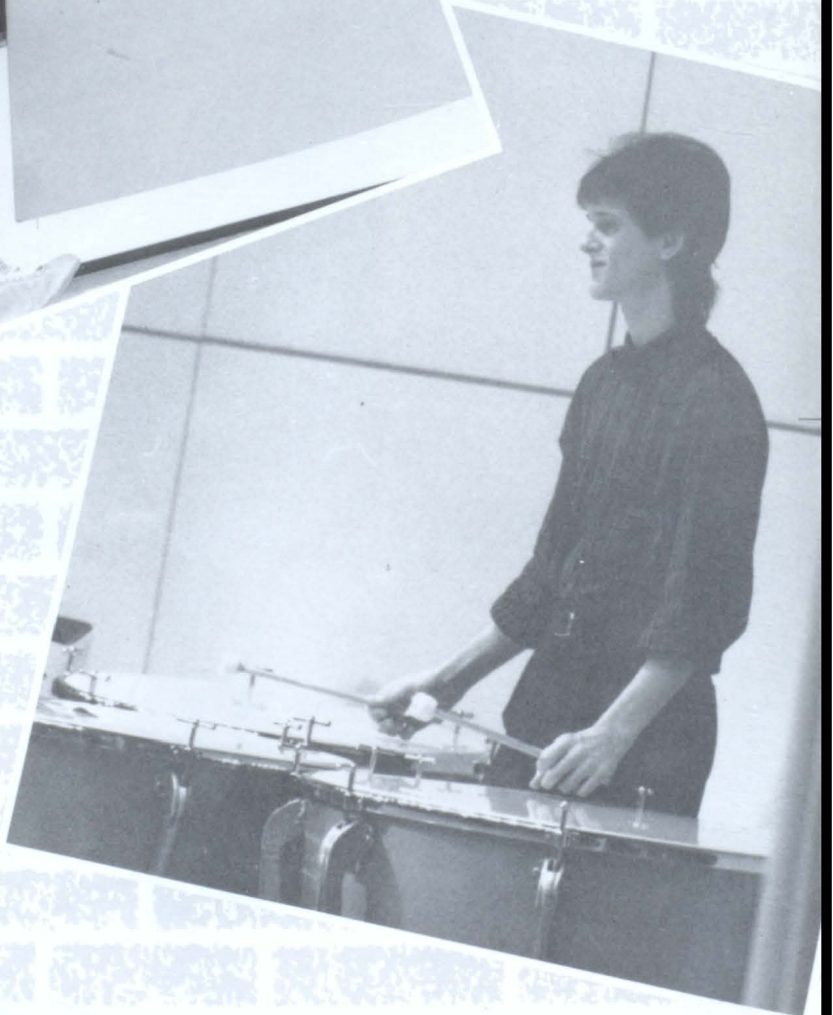

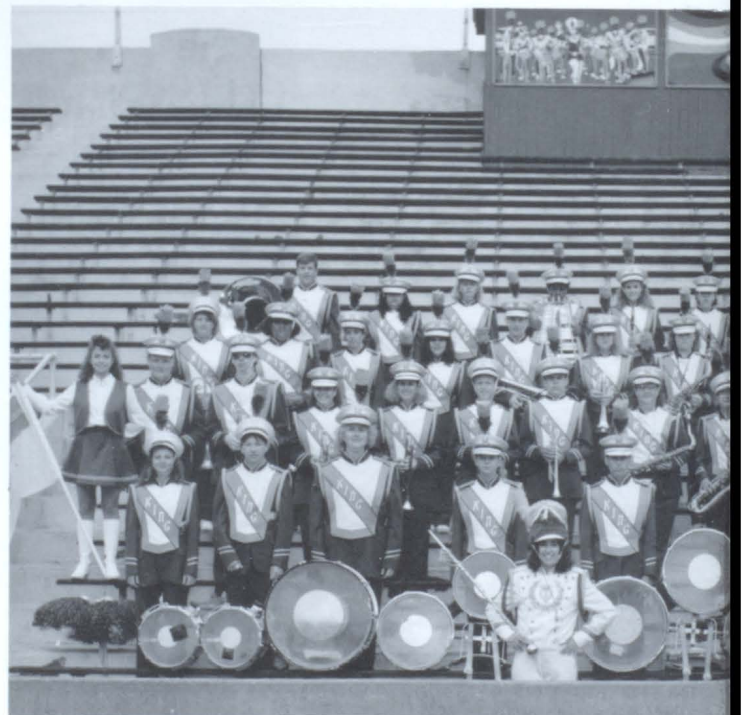

tour. Many people around the city also enjoyed the delicious pancake breakfast they served.

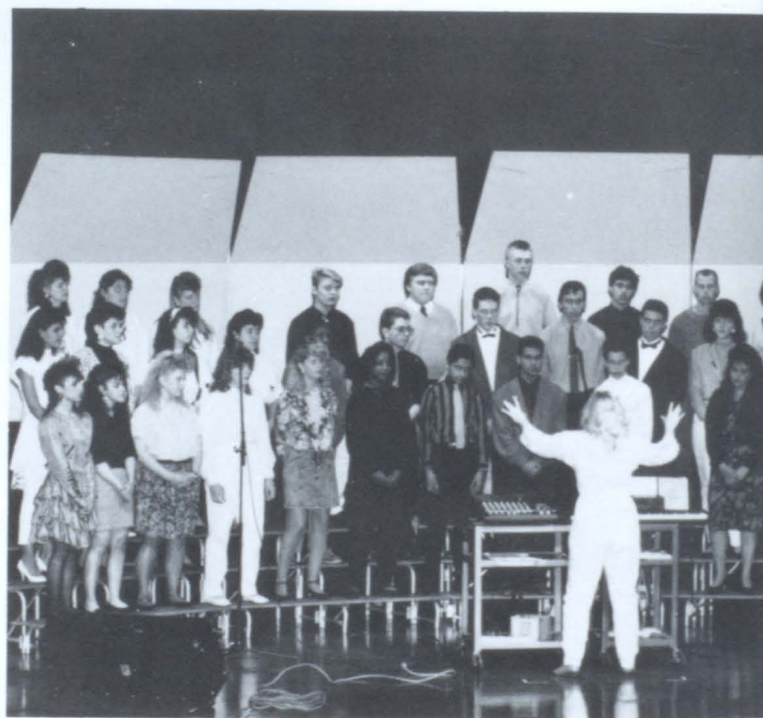

The Academic Team, led by Miss Rock, had another successful year. The team will be even more talented in the years to come, as their young talent matures and their knowledge increases.

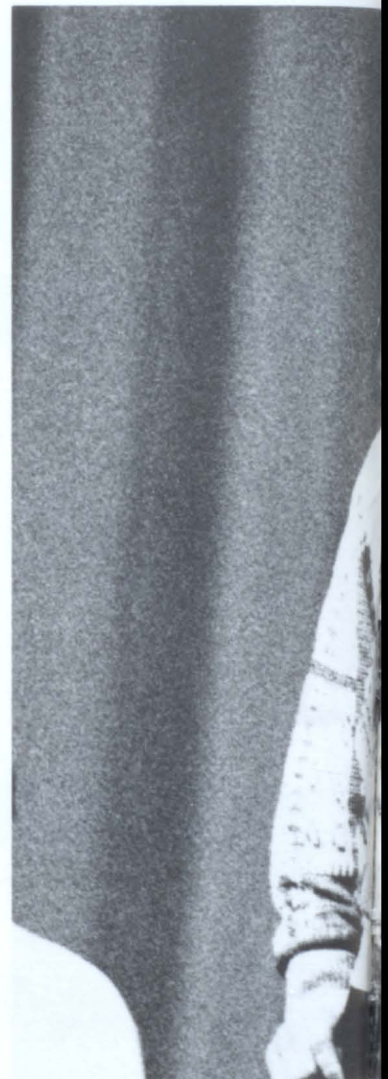
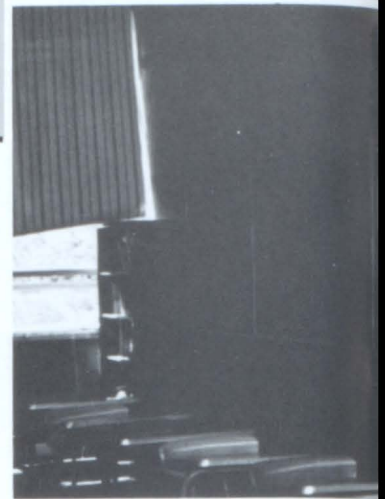
The Computer Team competed in two contests, one at LCCC,

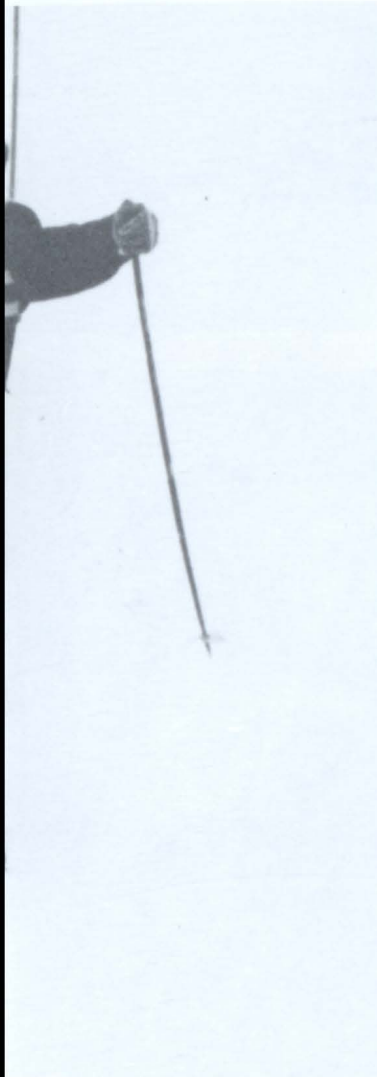
There are few clubs which require spending extra time after school and possibly away from the school.

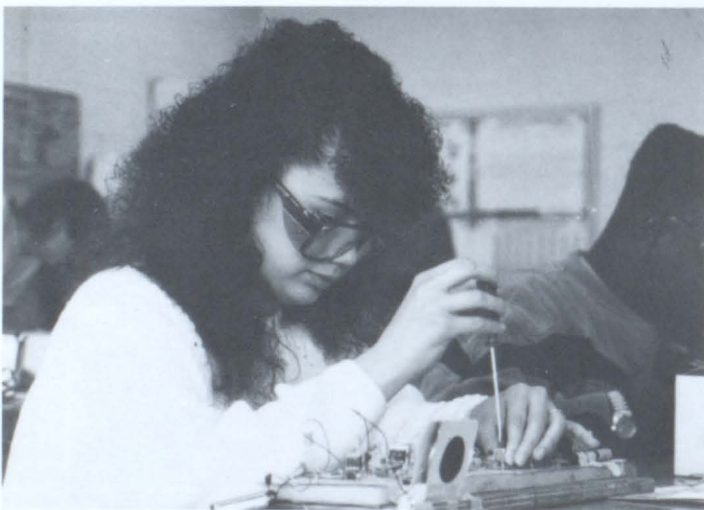
VICA, which stands for Vocational Industrial Clubs of America, consists of students from vocational electronics, small engine repair and auto mechanics classes.

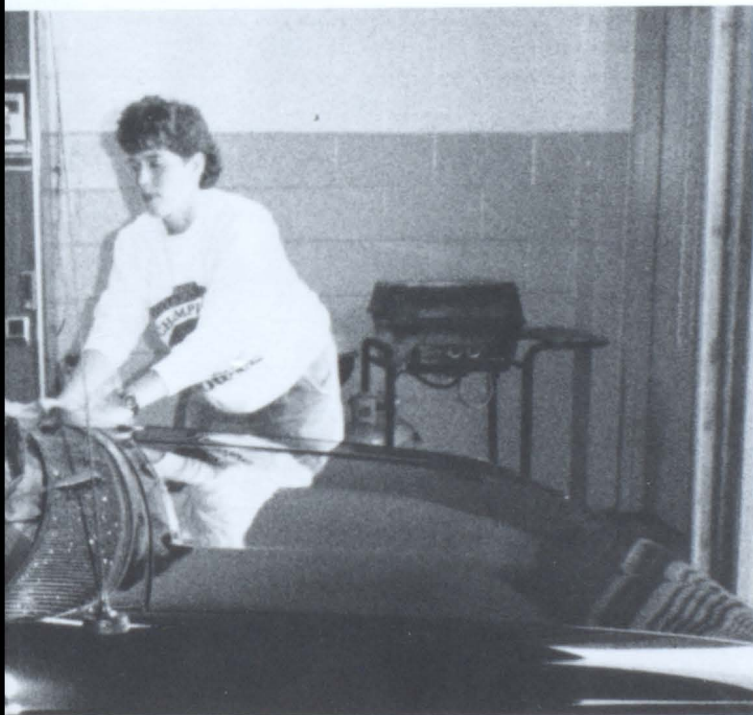
Throughout the school there are many aspects of service. Key Club, Student Council, and the Trident Staff are three examples of service organizations.

Student Council's biggest project during

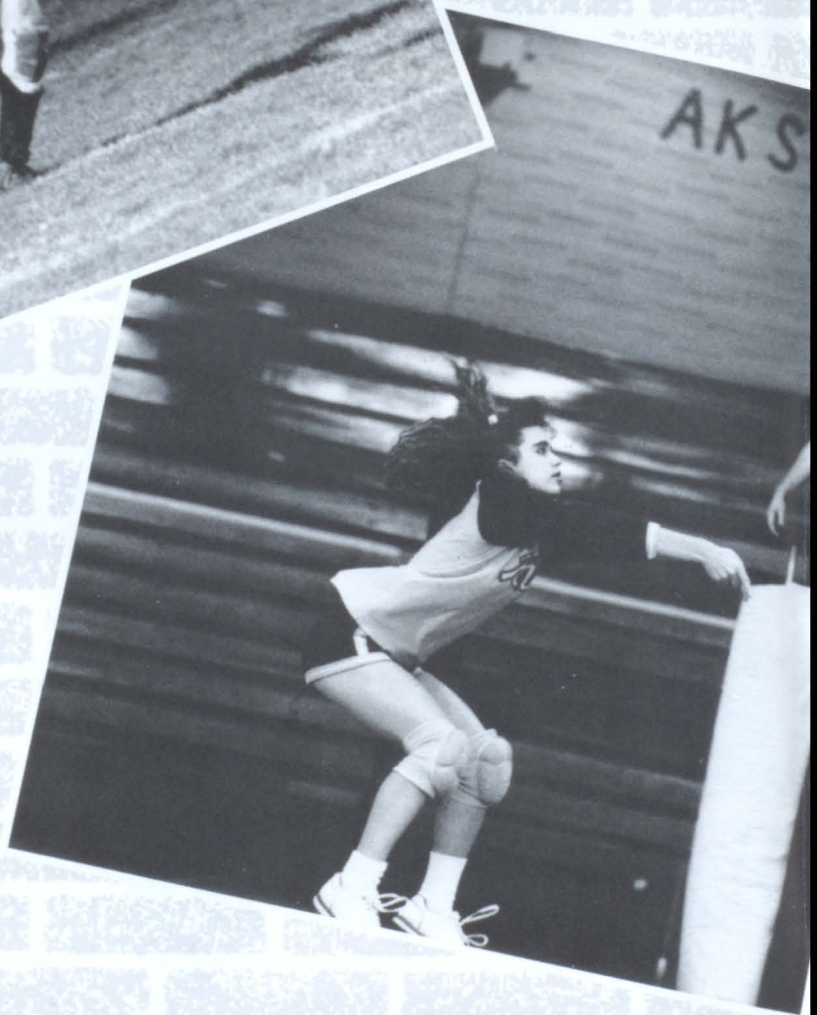

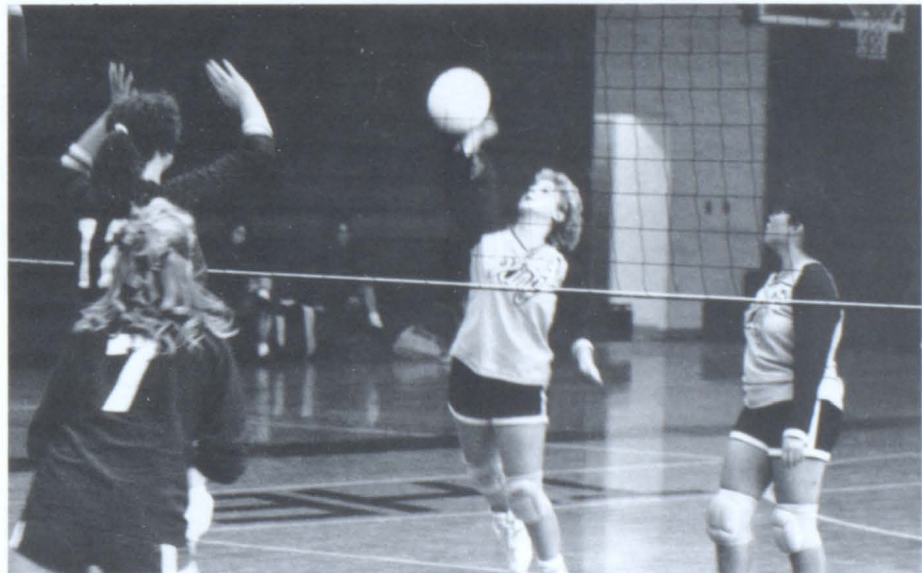

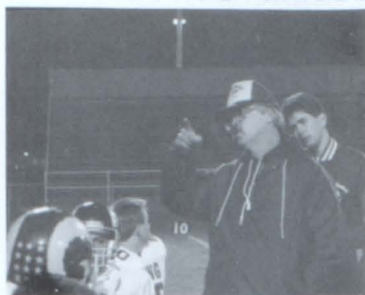

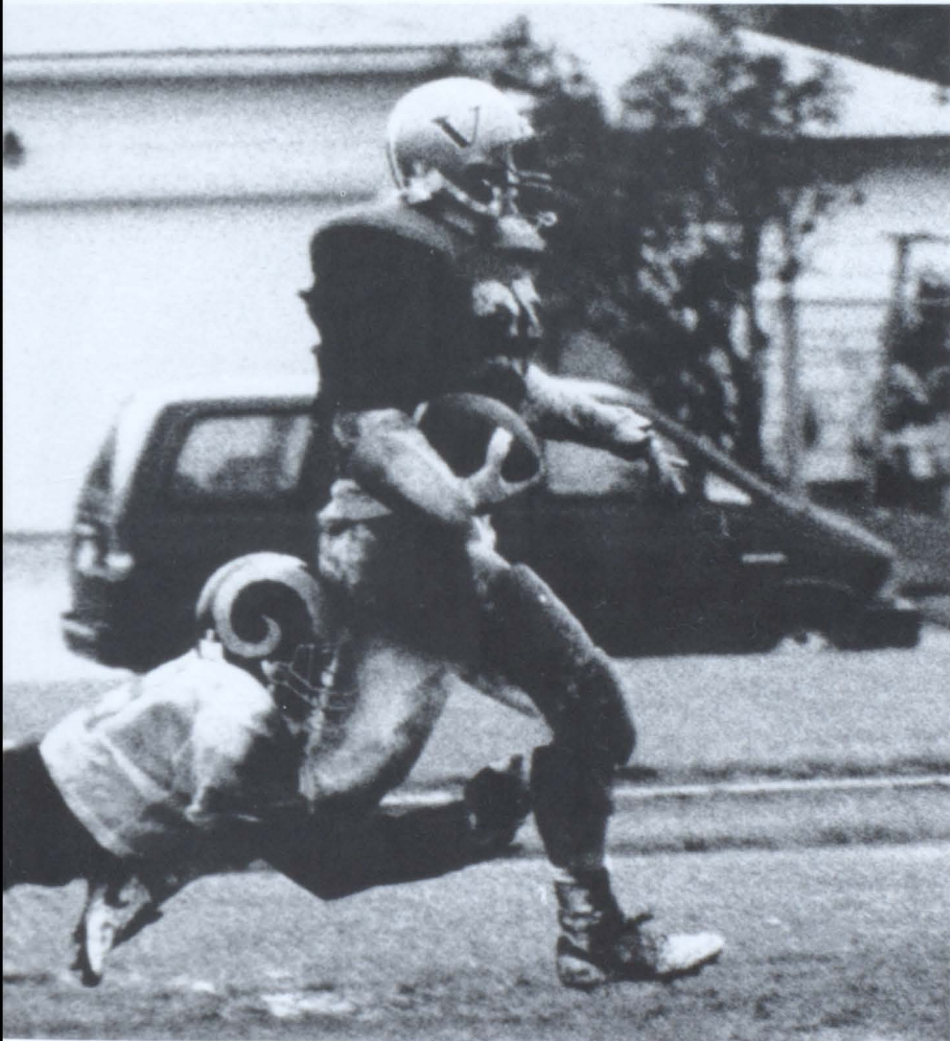

has a record of 188 saves and was All-Conference first team goalie.

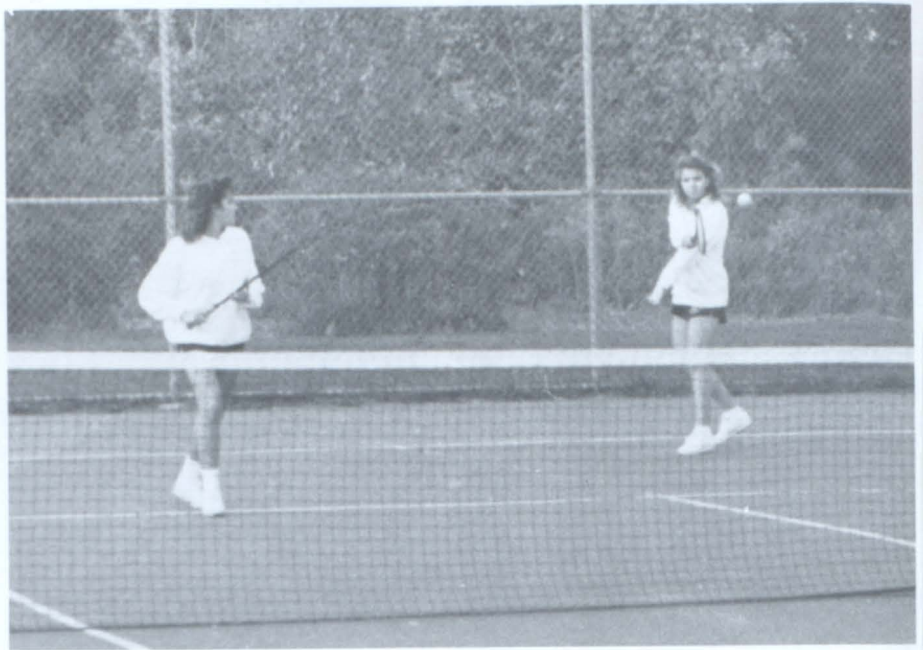

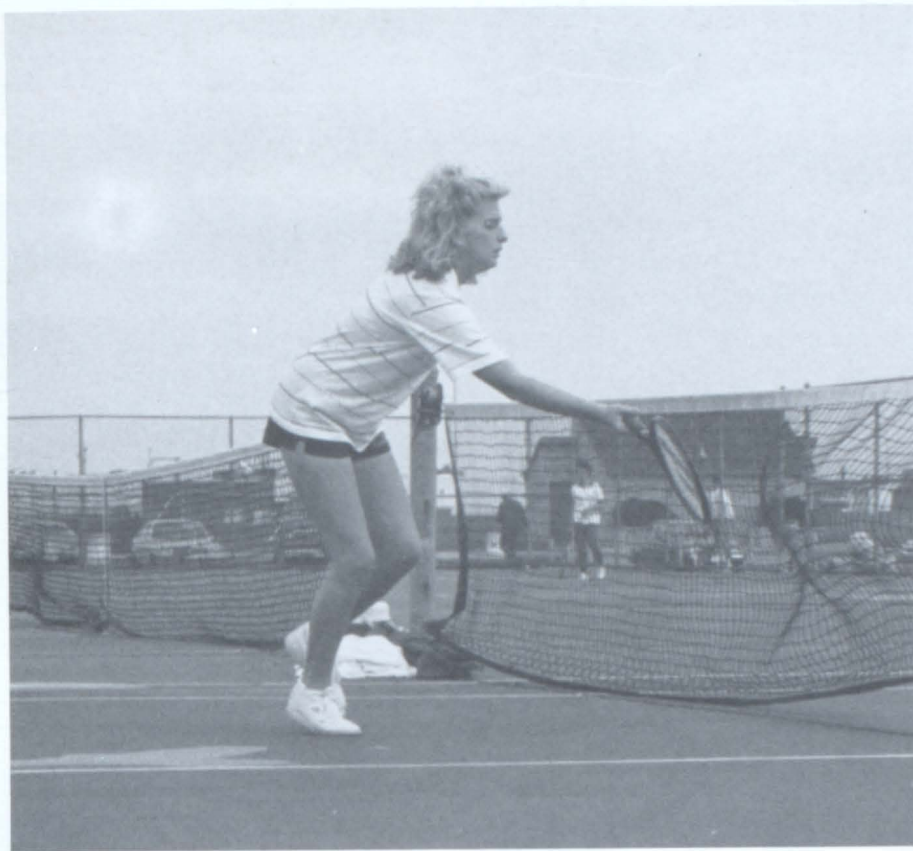
The team produced many stars.

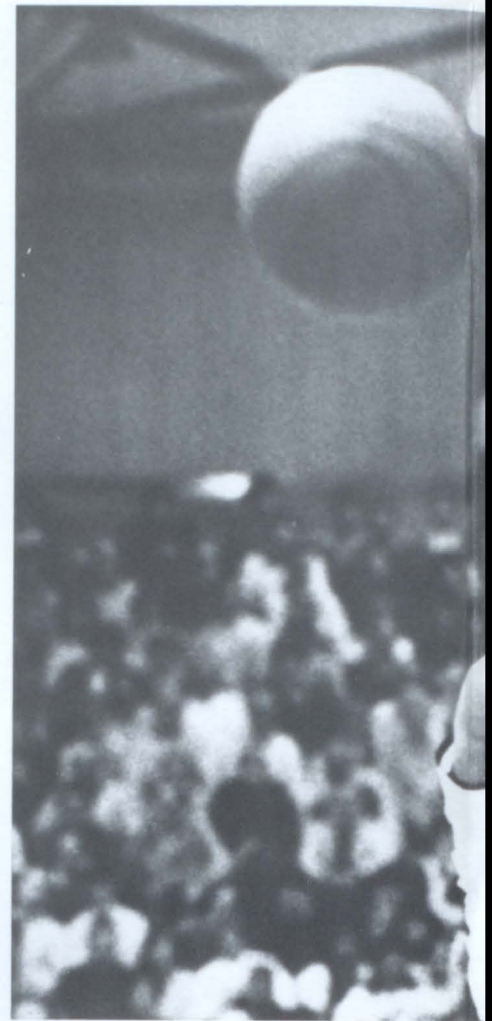

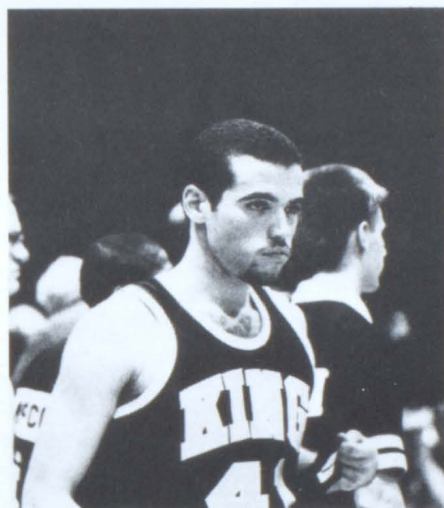
Last year's basketball team had a remarkable season. Though this year's team was unable to achieve the same things as last year's, they put up a good fight.

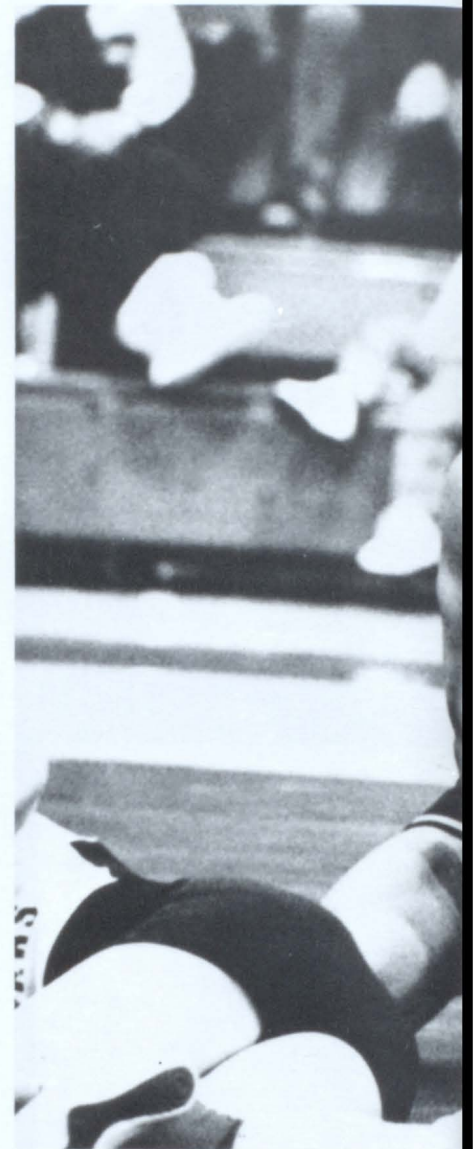

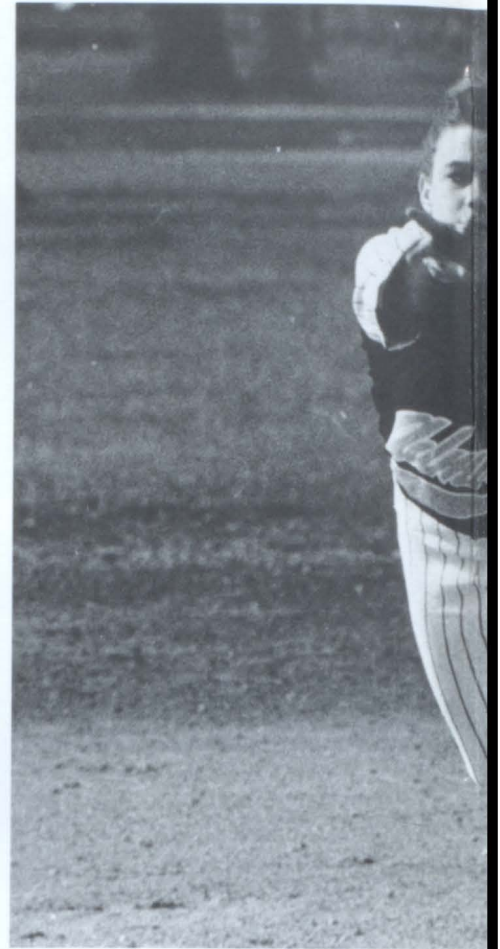

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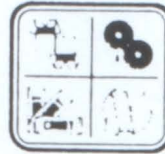
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COLOPHON

Reinker Studio was chosen by the seniors for their portraits and Lifetouch National School Studios took the underclass pictures.

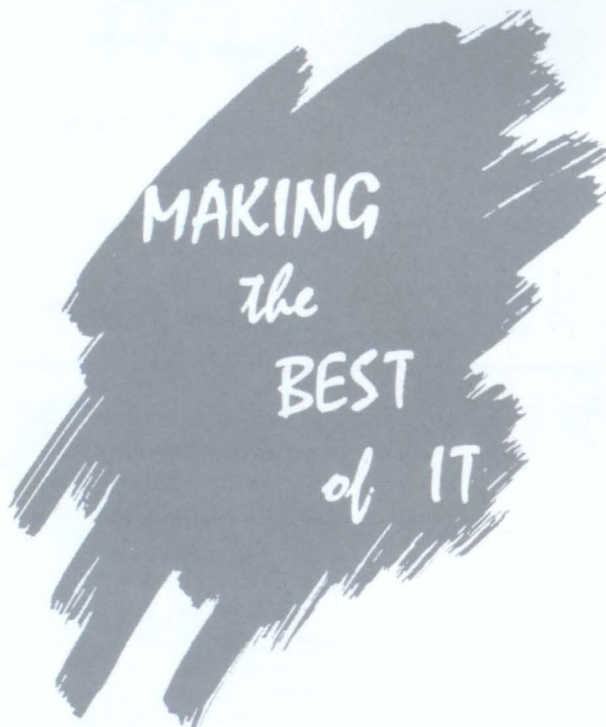
