
As long as you remember and uphold these virtues or ideals of a true education will live in you.







CLASS HISTORY

On September 8, 1942, 31 Freshies entered the doors of Avon High School. It was under the direction of Mr. Gould, that we really began our school career.

A couple of weeks later the Seniors of '46 entertained us with a party and initiation. Of course, no one got hurt and we were full pledged members of Avon High School.

Our class officers were the following: president, William Smedley; vice president, Francis Bommer; secretary-treasurer, Robert Buck.

On September 1, 1943, 28 Sophomores, a little more "Grown Up" began the year. As our class advisor we enjoyed Mr. Shellman, who left us this year. Don Hubbard was a fine president and Ken Fristch took his place as vice president. All minutes were taken and money was put into the hands of Frances Bungart.

On September 5, 1944, 24 pupils came back to Avon High School to form the Junior class under Mrs. Grube.

Very interesting projects came about in this year. We held the Junior-Senior Banquet and Prom, Saturday, May 12, in the high school auditorium, in which we carried the theme of a "Mexican Fiesta." We also sponsored a dance to raise our account in the Elyria Savings and Trust Company. Pie Plant Pete and Bashful Joe entertained the public Friday, April 27. November 14, the class presented their play, "Spooks and Spasms," under the direction of Mrs. Collins.

Our class officers were as follows: president, Donald Hubbard; vice president, Robert Buck; secretary, Virginia Bliss; and treasurer, Elfrieda Hein.

The members of the class chose Don Hubbard and Robert Buck as representatives in the Student Council.

On September 4, 1945, 21 young men and women entered their last year of school life at Avon High School. Mrs. Boyd was our class advisor until she resigned from the faculty. We are proud to have Mr. Blake as our present advisor.

Our class officers were: president, Pearl Homer; vice president, Frances Bungart; secretary-treasurer, Leona Leonard.

A hilarious three-act comedy, "Girl Shy" was presented Friday, February 8, under the direction of Mrs. Collins and the assistant director Geraldine Urig.

As our class motto we chose, "Life Is What You Make It." Our class colors are royal blue and white and the white carnation is our flower. Our commencement day was May 16, 1946.

Shirley Palmer, well-known lecturer, is touring the country giving talks on "Women's Rights — and Men's Wrongs."


Bill Mayton has given up undertaking and is now packing them in at the Palace. His crooning is reminiscent to Frank Sinatra.



The monitor system first started at Avon in September, 1944. Since that time it has developed and become a success. This worthy organization is under the leadership of Mr. Mass and Geraldine Urig. For every period in the day, there are 3 monitors—one for each hall. The duties of each are few and simple:

- (1) Keep the hall quiet
