An incumbent and a newcomer big vote getters in Primary Election

An incumbent and a newcomer topped the list of vote getters in the at-large council races in the May 8 Primary Election.

Republican Dave Gillock led not only the GOP hopefuls, but also the entire roster of at-large contenders with a tally of 977 votes. Bernadine Butkowski collected 937 votes, Dennis Johnson, 893 followed by Jeffrey Madisen with 746, Ronald Schwachenwald with 779 and Linda Dunham, 653. The Democratic candidate and novice, James J. Rothgery, garnered 901 at-large votes.

Gillock said that pulling in the greatest number of votes was a "little humbling," especially since he hadn't done a door-to-door campaign.

In the weeks before the election, the incumbent said he had assessed his competition and decided he should be able to finish in the top three slots, paving the way for a November runoff. In reviewing the other candidates, Gillock said, "Rothgery has a name...Jean (Brown) pulls a lot of votes...Bernie (Bernadine Butkowski) pulls a lot of votes...Dennis (Dennis Johnson) will do well..." But collecting the most votes, he said, meant that people were judging him on his performance on council, which made him happy. "I didn't grow up here," he said, but has lived in North Ridgeville 22 years.

Will Gillock's high marks in last week's election make him a shoo-in in November? He doesn't think so and has no intention of resting on his laurels. "Now I've gotta work," he said.

Being an at-large councilperson means representing the entire city, said Gillock, and when he begins campaigning for

November, he said he's not going to pick out Republicans to talk to. "When someone stops to talk, I don't ask their party," he said, adding that in his post he plays the role of "facilitator," helping residents locate the right person to help with their concerns.

First-time candidate James Rothgery said he was "tired," after the unofficial election ballots were posted, but was happy with his 901 votes. Jean Brown followed Rothgery with 801 votes, Patricia Dreger with 757, Terry Zirzow, 751 and Jean Schroeder, 708.

After learning he had gotten the most votes in the Democratic at-large race, he said, "I wasn't expecting to be the frontrunner."

Looking ahead to November, Rothgery

said, "I'm happy with the people I'll be running against."

The week before the election, Jean Schroeder became angry over a political advertisement that characterized her as a STAMP member and denied an affiliation with the group. Following her loss on May 8, however, the novice candidate said she did take the defeat personally, but not said she feels she let her backers down. "They were so sweet," she said.

Schroeder also acknowledged difficulty with the length of time between filing with the Board of Elections and the actual voting

VOTERS QUASH PROPOSED TAX HIKE

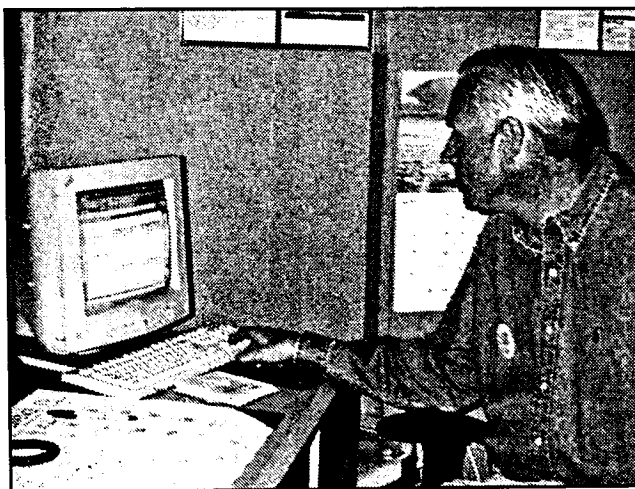
It's back to the drawing board for community center

North Ridgeville voters blasted a proposed 0.4 percent income increase earmarked for a Family/Senior Center in last week's Primary Election. The unofficial vote was 1,203 for the tax hike to 3,684 votes against.

Mayor Deanna Hill said she was disappointed with the election results and still feels a center would be good for the community. However, she acknowledged that there might have been something "in the way it (proposal) was presented and the way it was received." Hill also said she feels there may have been a misunderstanding about admission charges and that residents thought they would have to pay a yearly membership fee. "I don't think people knew they could come on a daily pass," she said.

Bad timing might have been another reason for voter rejection, said the Mayor. "Peo-

ple had just paid their income tax," she said, adding that she had received some e-mails complaining about a tax hike, particularly on the heels of the April 30 income tax deadline.

Hill said a center for North Ridgeville is not a dead issue and officials will go back to

the drawing board, however, she said, "It is very important to take into account the objections. You should listen to the message."

The Mayor hopes to see more residents become involved in the plans, though she stressed that not everyone's desires can be met.

When asked if the outcome would impact the new branch library to be constructed on the site adjacent to the proposed center, Hill said it would because the agreement between the city and the library was based on splitting the cost of maintenance, installation of utilities and other items. "We had a tentative agreement to go to council," she said, but it was decided to wait until after the election.

Ken Cromer, the director of the Lorain Public Library System, said Plans for the library will move forward. "From the get-go we said we'd go ahead regardless," he said. The library had two options concerning a lease, he said, one if voters passed the income tax increase and the other if they did not. Though it appears the library will incur

LaSalvia named CSU's outstanding graduate

Elizabeth LaSalvia is Cleveland State's Outstanding Graduate of Cleveland State University's Class of 2001. She was honored with the President's Award during the commencement ceremony, May 13, at the CSU Convocation Center.

LaSalvia, with a 3.96 cumulative grade point average, graduated summa cum laude with a bachelor's degree in psychology from the College of Arts and Sciences. She has been accepted by several medical schools and will probably attend the Medical College of Ohio in Toledo this fall.

She is the recipient of an Ohio Board of Regents Graduate/Professional Fellowship of \$7,000 (\$3,500 for each of two years). The competitive awards program encourages talented baccalaureate graduates of Ohio colleges to pursue professional or graduate study in the state.

At the university's annual Student Awards and Recognition Ceremony, LaSalvia also was named the Outstanding Psychology Major. LaSalvia began her studies at Cleveland State as a Presidential Scholarship recipient, which paid tuition and costs associated with getting a Cleveland State education.

For the past four years, she has counseled other students as an academic advisor in the College of Arts and Sciences. She also has worked with CSU psychology Professor Steven Slane on the development of a database of patients at the Cleveland Clinic's Chronic Pain Center. Slane and clinic researchers agree that her work, which included chronicling patient and family histories, physician intake and discharge reports, was so invaluable her name will appear on all publications and papers resulting from the database. Recently, the first

paper using the data was accepted for presentation at an upcoming meeting of the Midwestern Psychological Association with LaSalvia listed as first author.

While maintaining her excellent academic record, LaSalvia found time to pursue activities on and off campus. She served as vice president of the CSU chapter of Psi Chi, the national psychology honor society, and volunteered at the Cleveland Clinic psychiatric ward.

LaSalvia's parents, Robert and Margaret LaSalvia, attended the graduation, along with her brother Robert Jr., also a CSU student; sister Christine, a student at CSU's Cleveland-Marshall College of Law; and sister Mary, a student at Baldwin-Wallace College.

People answer the need and provide comfort and support

If you read letters to the editor, the tit-for-tat on Loraincounty.com, or even talk to your neighbors, you must be aware of the contention that continues over some of the results of last week's Primary Election.

The critics carp about the candidates who were voted the opportunity to move on to November's contest, and supporters of the Community/Senior Center are disappointed Issue 17 was defeated. Some even feel the loss signaled a selfishness on the part of residents who have access to amenities such as tennis courts and swimming pools and are unwilling to ante a few more income tax dollars to provide for those who don't. Some consider the loss a lack of community spirit, and with the climate that hangs over North Ridgeville, that is an easy assumption.

Going, going, gone

After purchasing a 48 ft. aluminum trailer at an auction at Musial's Greenhouse on Avon Belden Rd, April 12, a local businessman was told he had 30 days in which to remove the trailer, which, along with three others, was located on the south side of the greenhouse and overgrown with trees and brush.

The trees had to be cut down before the trailer could be hauled away and when the man went to pick up the trailer, he found it had already been removed. One other trailer was also gone and another cut in half.

When the complainant reported the theft to the police on May 2, he told them that the trailers were in no condition to be moved and would have had to be transported by flatbed. The trailers were not titled and had been used for storage.

When the complainant contacted the former owner, he said he was unaware that the trailers had been moved. The complainant said he believed that the subject, who had purchased the other trailers and had been bidding against him, took the trailer.

Police contacted the auctioneer, who provided the name and telephone number of the other bidder.

The situation continues to be under investigation.

Sidewinder

Responding to a call from a Bainbridge Road resident on May 3, a patrolman checked a report of criminal damage to a camper.

The victim said he parks his white camper on a gravel drive behind his home and while mowing his law he discovered that someone apparently had spray painted a continuous black line down the entire

length of the left side of the trailer. Since the paint was on the side away from the residence it could not be seen from the street, so the victim was unsure when it was done.

Because the camper had a heavy coat of wax, it seemed the paint could be rubbed off, however, the resident filed a police report on the advice of his insurance company.

Singing the 'blues'

While traveling west on Rt. 10, a North Ridgeville Patrolman clocked a vehicle going east at 83 mph in a 65 mph zone. He turned around and caught up with the driver, stopping him at the I-480 split.

He found two males in the car. The driver, 17, said he was returning from his job in Cleveland, however he was heading east.

After the driver exited the vehicle, the officer spoke to the defendant, who was still in the front passenger seat. When he appeared evasive about his activities, the policeman asked him to get out of his car and put his hands on the vehicle for a pat down. The defendant became upset and argued that the officer had no right to search him.

Finally the officer handcuffed him and the defendant subsequently became cooperative. Frisking him, the policemen found two round objects inside a right front pocket and he could hear what sounded like a plastic baggie crinkling. He removed the items and found a small plastic baggie containing vegetation, a blue colored glass-smoking pipe and an aqua colored plastic smoking pipe.

The defendant apologized and said he really didn't want to get caught.

He was taken to the police station where the material tested positive as marijuana.

YOUR DENTAL HEALTH

Digital x-rays: Good for the doctor and the patient!

It seems lately that everything is going digital and now you can add dentistry to the list. A newer technology in the form of digital x-rays has been introduced to the dental profession to help the patient and the doctor. Digital x-rays are in fact a relatively simple concept. The x-ray film has been replaced by a "film sensor" which looks like a small dental x-ray film with a cord attached to a computer. The chemical processing of the x-ray film has been replaced by the computer monitor screen. The film sensor is placed in the patient's mouth in a similar fashion to how the regular x-ray film is placed and the x-ray is taken. Instead of chemical processing of the film, the image appears on a computer screen in approximately two seconds.

The advantages of digital x-rays for the patient is we can now get a dental x-ray with 90 percent LESS radiation than before and the image appears in two seconds instead of five minutes. Patients seem to also enjoy the ability to see the x-ray on the computer screen which can be used to educate the patient about any issues regarding their dental health. The advantages of digital x-rays for the doctor is that the digital image can be altered to help diagnose certain conditions which may not have shown on conventional film.

Armbruster bill seeks to curb frivolous lawsuits

Columbus - State Senator Jeff Armbruster (R-N. Ridgeville) has introduced legislation that seeks to curb certain frivolous lawsuits that involve criminals injured in the course of their crimes.

"Believe it or not, criminals who have been injured while committing a crime have some legal recourse under current Ohio law," Armbruster said. "My bill seeks to close this loophole to better protect the true victims of crime."

Senate Bill 107 will ensure that individuals who have been convicted of or have pleaded guilty to a felony or to a misdemeanor that is an offense of violence, may not be awarded recovery on a tort claim when the injury or loss they suffer is a result of their criminal conduct.

Armbruster noted that a similar provision was originally a component of the

Tort Reform Bill, passed as House Bill 350 of the 121st General Assembly. In August of 1999, the Ohio Supreme Court ruled the Tort Reform Bill unconstitutional, effectively wiping out this provision, though it was neither one of the more controversial components of the bill nor one in which the Supreme Court was critical. (State ex rel. Ohio Academy of Trial Lawyers

v. Sheward.)

"The Supreme Court took a throw-the-baby-out-with-the-bath-water approach on the tort reform ruling and unfortunately this common sense reform was subsequently wiped out," Armbruster said. "By passing a specific, stand-alone bill I am confident that we will meet Supreme Court muster and effectively eliminate this gross abuse in our state's tort system."

More than 600 young authors, grades one to six celebrated their books at Wilcox Elementary School, May 11.

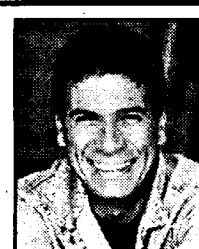

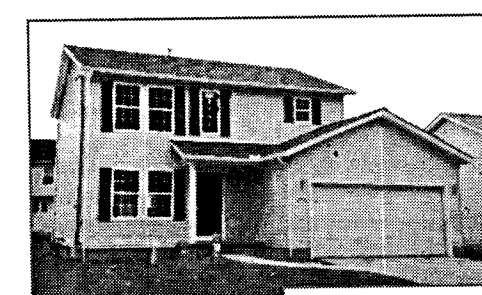

District Takes Steps to Preserve Facilities

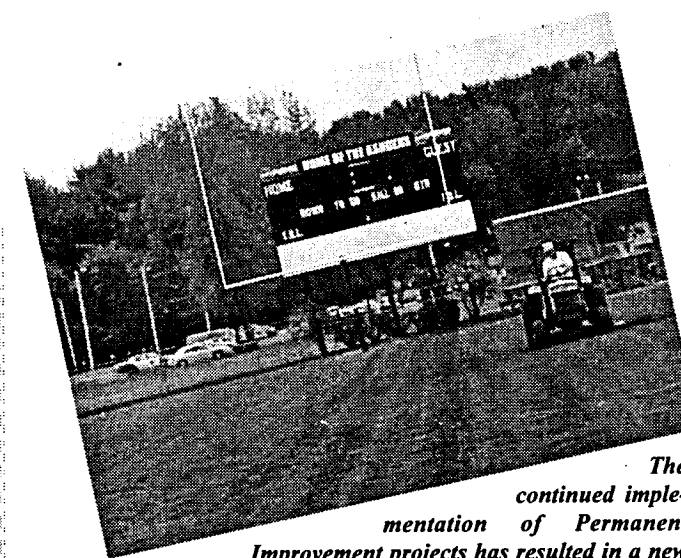

more expenses than if plans for a community center had gone through, Cromer said the library plans are moving along. "We're having it (site) surveyed now," he said.

Like Hill, Parks and Recreation Director Jim Spaulding was disappointed in the outcome of the election and said he had hoped the vote would be close. To revisit the issue and go back to the people will be "an uphill battle," he said, however if the city does begin again, Spaulding said it might be best to consider an aquatics center, and possibly a competitive pool, if affordable.

The day after the election Sally Balog, the director of the Office for Older Adults, said she wasn't really sure of her reaction to the defeat of the income tax issue.

Prior to the election, she was looking forward to having a bigger and better place for North Ridgeville's senior citizens to enjoy their activities, but she said she had spoken to some of the seniors who attend the present facility and learned, "they're happy with our Center."

Balog admitted she was "sad" that North Ridgeville doesn't have a swimming pool or a recreation facility, but she said the committee worked hard to get residents involved in the idea. "People said, 'No thanks,'" she said.

"People really did think it was too much money," she said. "I think council has to look at the issue of a (income tax) credit...it's a legitimate issue."

Balog is also concerned about people who live in developments where amenities such as swimming pools are provided, and who don't want to pay for a community center for everyone to enjoy.

"The community spirit just isn't there," she said, "and that's sad."

Click Davis, co-chair of the campaign committee for Issue 17, also was disappointed about the defeat, however, he said, "I think everybody did their best."

Davis speculated that perhaps the time wasn't right for a tax increase, considering the escalating prices of gasoline, energy and other items, but he credited Balog for doing a good job on the campaign and another co-chair, Bev Gillock for her work, especially her organization.

With the Family/Senior Center on hold, The Press & Light asked Davis what the next step is. "I don't know," he said, "the committee never discussed, what if..."

day. "I don't like applying for a job and waiting to find out if I'm going to get it," she said.

Republican Dennis Johnson came in third in the at-large contest, which means he'll be on the November ballot.

Johnson said he was happy with the outcome of the Primary Election and credits being in the top three with running an honest and open campaign. He expressed disappointment that Ward 4 Councilwoman Gail Minnick lost her bid to return to council. "I have a lot of respect for Gail," he said.

Discussing the defeat of the proposed income tax increase, which was to pay for a Community/Senior Center, Johnson acknowledged that North Ridgeville needs some type of recreation center, however "the financing was dead wrong," he said. Perhaps, he said, "We could have a much smaller facility that could be expanded, and with a regular sized pool."

With the Primary Election over, Johnson said he is ready to move on, but refused to use the word "battle" to describe his pre-November campaign. Instead he said he's

going to wage a "contest" to win an at-large spot on council.

Ward 1 Democrat contender and STAMP member Joseph Antush seemed to have no regrets about his loss to incumbent Larry Overby, who gathered 309 votes to Antush's 220.

"It came out pretty good," said Antush, "I was a reluctant candidate and I decided to run at the last minute...my wife is real happy."

Like Johnson, Antush expressed regrets that Gail Minnick lost the election. As far as Ward 1, Antush said he plans to back Republican Nancy Buescher in November, and he thinks his supporters in the Primary will also support Buescher.

Despite his loss at the polls, Antush said he would continue to be active in trying to get the issue of Planned Community Development on the ballot.

There was no Primary runoff in Ward 2. Democrat incumbent Allen Swindig will face his Republican opponent and STAMP Chairman John Prajzner in November.

Ward 3 Democrat incumbent Karen Borocz and challenger Richard Brent ran a tight race with just five votes separating the

two. Brent had 281 votes and Borocz, 276. According to news reports Borocz is requesting a recount. The winner of the Primary will face Republican Josanne Pagel in November.

One of the most hotly contested races was in Ward 4 where Republican Bob Olesen challenged Gail Minnick and unseated the incumbent by an overwhelming 411 votes to Minnick's 283.

Olesen said he's very grateful for all the help he received during the campaign. "It's hard for any candidate," he said, "to build up to a crescendo and then sit there and wait." And then, he said, "The final vote wasn't even close."

Throughout the ward, "People are so tired of the infighting," he said. The council candidate said his goal is to get through the November election and then try to get Democrats and Republicans to work together "for the best interest of the city."

Despite the big loss, it seemed Minnick couldn't be happier.

The day after her defeat, the councilwoman said, "I'm thrilled...I am glad. I was talked into running again against my better judgment and I'm ashamed to be associated with this council."

What will she do with her free time after her term ends in December?

"I'm going to clean closets," she said.

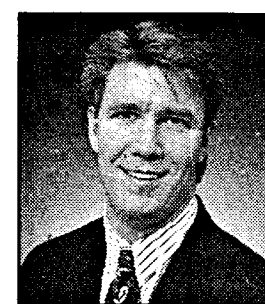

LASER TREATMENT FOR CAVITIES

Is there any alternative to drilling for treating cavities?

One alternative is laser treatment. A laser is a cutting tool that basically vaporizes the decayed area. Just like with a drill, water and air are used to cool the tooth and clean off the surface.

Laser treatment has some very positive aspects. For one thing, laser treatment is generally painless, so there's no need for anesthesia or a numbing anesthetic injection, like novocaine. Also, there's no vibrating like you experience with the traditional drill.

The laser has its drawbacks, too. Your dentist can't use it on a tooth that already has a filling. There's the risk that the existing filling would overheat and damage the tooth.

Laser equipment is relatively expensive as well. And many dentists are holding off on buying laser equipment until more studies are done and until the cost of the equipment comes down.
