

The Booster Staff presents the Avon Board of Education. All members, under the able leadership of Mr. Hassel, their president, are helping Avon toward greater achievement.





Senior Class History

September 1943







Varsity Basketball


Let's venture up to the gym floor. Oh! That's our varsity basketball team practicing up for that Eaton game.
