To the Board of Directors of the Lawrence Free Public Library:

It is my pleasure to submit to you the thirty-ninth annual report for the year ending Dec. 31,1943.

Our library has been open for reading and the circulation of books 306 days closing the usual holidays.

Circulation

Books have circulated 87,202 times, a drop of 6,984 books over 1942. This drop came in the adult fiction, interest in non-fiction has been maintained.
