Report of the Librarian

To THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE
LAWRENCE FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY.

Herewith is respectfully submitted my report of the work of the Lawrence Free Public Library during its sixth fiscal year, ending December 31st, 1911.

The year of 1911 has been the most active of any in the history of the library, in the demands of the public for reference material. The High School and other students as well as members of the various clubs of the city make constant use of the library, but the material falls far short of their requirements.

The total accessions for the year were 867. The number lost, worn out and withdrawn from circulation was 243, a net gain of 624, making the number of books on hand December 31st, 1911, 10986, which are classified as follows:

Of the 867 volumes added, 767 were by purchase, 42 of which were from the Perkins Memorial Fund, and 100 by gift. Divided into classes 460 were non-fiction and 407 fiction.

The bi-ennial registration went into effect August 1st. The old registration closed with 3802, and 2410 borrower's cards were issued between August 1st and January 1st, 233 more than during the corresponding time two years ago.

The circulation statistics are as follows:

The circulation has decreased 1629. This is entirely in the fiction departments. There has been a gain of 887 in the non-fiction circulation, also a gain of 2890 in the use of non-fiction for reference in the reading rooms. The records show 8673 of such books used in 1911, against 5783 used in 1910. These gains prove the rapid growth of the library as a benefit to the public. The largest monthly circulation was 4423, in March, an average of 170 a day; the smallest was 3131 in Sep-

tember, an average of 120 a day. The largest reference month was 1237 in November, the smallest 71 in August.

There have been 576 volumes rebound and 74 volumes of current periodicals bound, which is 219 volumes more than last year.

The list of donors of books is as follows: Mr. M. G. Manley, Dr. E. Bumgardner, Mrs. Preusner, Mrs. Dora R. Bryant, Ventura Club, Betty Washington Chapter, D. A. R., Mr. Allan Wilber, Mr. Frank Brooks, Teutonia Club, Mr. Leonard Brown, Mrs. F. A. Wilber, Mr. Hugh Means, Miss Kate Stephens, of New York City, the publishers and authors of various works, and Mr. Gurdon Grovenor, whose Christmas gifts for 1911 were 12 volumes of miscellaneous works. Mr. Harry Dick and Mr. George Innes have furnished supplies.

A large portrait of Lincoln was presented by the Ladies of the G. A. R., Department of Kansas, when in session here with the G. A. R., during the month of May.

The work of the high school classes was resumed in November, after a two years' intermission. Both students and librarians missed the results from this work, but hereafter it will be an annual event. Three full mornings were devoted to talks on the use of the library. Miss Poff, Miss Mattoon and Miss Jackson brought their freshman and sophomore classes in sections of from 20 to 25, to the library building. These students were told as simply as possible the rules and regulations of the library and the reasons therefor. The borrowing and registering systems, the general arrangement of the books, and the uses of the reference room, indexes, and card catalogs were explained. The young people showed an unusual interest in their efforts to demonstrate the new knowledge acquired. Better deportment and a more intelligent use of the library on the part of the students always follow this work.

The Story Hour was continued throughout the winter and spring, and was made more than ordinarily attractive. Stories were told by Miss Edwards of the library, Mr. Horace Steele of the Manual Training School, Miss Evelyn Stanton, formerly teacher in the Sumner County High School, and by teachers in the grades. The afternoon of Indian legends by Miss Stanton, and that of Miss Ruth Scott, who told the story of the Aurora, deserve special mention. For the latter story hour, Mrs. A. D. Weaver lent her large copy of Guido Reni's famous painting, "The Aurora". One afternoon was given as a model story hour for Dr. Day, of K. U., and one of her classes in Home Economics. At the close of the story hour, a short talk was given to the class by Miss Edwards, on "Story telling in library and home—its purpose and results." On May 6th, the story telling season was closed by an informal party in the directors' room, when the librarian and first assistant entertained the story tellers of the year. A short program relative to story hour work was given and light refreshments were served. Our carefully selected story hour literature has been a decided help to the teachers in their choice of recreative reading in the schools, as well as to others interested in story telling.

As a whole the year has been one of decided progress along educational lines.

The library staff wishes to express its appreciation of the loyal support of the members of the Library Board.
