Fire lieutenant to narrate TV show on car extrication

Winter Park fire lieutenant-paramedic William "Rusty" Scala, who has applied to become the city's fire chief, is venturing into television.

Scala will be the narrator-interviewer of Extrication '86, the third annual international automobile extrication competition and learning symposium held in Orlando in Winte March.

The event was filmed, Scala did interviews, and it has been compiled into a 30-minute program to be broadcast on Cablevision of Central Florida's community access Channel 17, or Channel E, at 7:30 p.m. June 30.

Scala said 26 teams from fire departments throughout the United States and Canada competed during the three-day event at Sheraton-Twin Towers in Orlando. The only Central Florida representative was a team from Seminole County.

"It was a great learning experience and, in the future, I would like to see more teams from the area get involved," said Scala.

■ The 1986 Charlie Clark, Walter Fly, Tim Veltman Memorial Scholarship, established last year by the Winter Park High School class of 1964, has been awarded to Charles Clark III, the son of one of the men in whose honor the scholarship was established.

Clark's father was killed in action in the Vietnam War. Clark had a grade point average of 3.5 and his SAT scores totaled 1220. He also was chosen for Who's Who Among American High School Students and was an officer in the school's Interact Club.

He was active in football, basketball, baseball and soccer and was captain of the wrestling team, for which he placed fourth in the state championship.

He also received a Marine Corps ROTC Scholarship and an early appointment to Virginia Military Institute.

This year's award was a check for more than \$1,000, the 1985 calendar year's interest from the foundation.
