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## Winter Park Prominently Featured in Southern Lady Magazine

The article also focuses on Park Promenade Jewelers, Peterbrooke Chocolatier, Palmano's Expresso Bar and several other stores and restau-

"I had always wanted visitors to know that we have more than the theme parks to see when visiting Central Florida," said Posey. She said the magazine had not featured many article on Florida as they preferred stories about the "Old South." When she heard that, Posey said she smiled and told them, "You

have to visit Winter Park!." They agreed and a four-day visit was scheduled.

Posev arranged for the editor and photographer to stay at the Park Plaza Hotel. When they arrived, she took them on the Scenic Boat Tour. "It is a wonderful way to give our guests an overview of the beauty and personality of our beautiful town," said Posey. She also arranged for visits to the Charles Hosmer Morse Museum, the Annie Russell Theatre, the Albin Polasek Museum, the Cornell Fine Arts Museum and Rollins College. She took them to dinner at Park Plaza Gardens, the Briar Patch and O'Boys Barbecue. They visited BeBe's, Promenade, Chintz Company, the Doggie Door, Cida's and Timothy's Gallery to arrange photo shoots. She also arranged for them to take photographs of Kraft Azalea Gardens, the Park Avenue fountains in Central Park, and the beautiful signs around town. She said they were really impressed with Winter Park's unique peacock signs.

She called Winter Park City Hall and spoke with the public relations director, Scott Grail, Vice Mayor Barbara DeVane, and Gordon Blitch, assistant director of cultural development, inviting them to meet with her Southern Lady friends to share additional information.

"As expected, editor Ann Dorer and creative director Mac Jamieson loved our beautiful town," said Posey. "They worked from 8 a.m. until 10 p.m. each day. The result is a gorgeous pictorial and gracious verbal tribute that went to the stands nationwide on July 1."

Posey, a former Miss Georgia, also wrote an article on the history of the Miss America Pageant which was featured in Southern Lady's winter issue.
