New Firemen To Join Department

Winter Park officials next month will swear in nine new firemen to assist in manning a new fire department substation presently under construction on Lakemont Avenue.

The new men will report for duty about March 5 and will begin a period of training before the city moves part of its operations to the new facility which is expected to be complet-

ed by late March or early April.

THE NINE new firemen were picked from a field of about 30 applicants for the \$6,900-a-year jobs.

City officials, in preparing their annual budget last November, planned for an expenditure of approximately \$45,-000 to put the new men on the job for the next eight months of the current fiscal year.

In addition, the new fire station is expected to cost the city slightly more than \$62,000.

EMPLOYMENT OF the three Negro firemen on the staff represents the first successful attempt to integrate the fire department. City officials during the past several years have carried on a recruiting campaign to find qualified Negroe to fill jobs in the department

Previously, a number of Ne gro applicants were dis qualified due to poor applican exam scores and other factors

However, a recent advertising campaign sponsored by the city to interest qualified Negroe produced a number of applicants including the three new men.
