The Econ contains most of the last natural wetland still largely unprotected in East Central Florida, and its basin runs through eastern Osceola, Orange and Seminole counties.

The Econ basin stores flood waters in its floodplain where the land is undeveloped, releasing them gradually to the St. Johns.

Until recently it has avoided development due to the swampy land and lack of utilities to serve communities and businesses, but now as urban areas have sprawled eastward there is growing pressure to extend roads and waterlines across the Econ to open up the land between it and the St. Johns River.

Bosserman will explain the complications of efforts by citizens, organizations and agencies to protect the Econ. These include water quality studies, basin studies of plants and wildlife, and proposals for

more public land acquisition.
