Caring for the Flag

- The **flag** should never touch anything beneath it, such as the ground, the floor, water, or merchandise.
- The **flag** should never be carried flat or horizontally, but always aloft and free.
- The **flag** should never be fastened, displayed, used, or stored so that it might be easily torn, soiled, or damaged in any way
- The flag should never be used as covering for a ceiling.
- The **flag** should never have anything placed on it.

Flying the Flag

- The flag should never be displayed with the union (stars) down, unless as a signal of dire distress.
- It is the universal custom to display the flag only from sunrise to sunset on buildings and on stationary flagstaffs in the open. However, when a patriotic effect is desired, the flag may be displayed twenty-four hours a day if properly illuminated during the hours of darkness.
- The flag should not be displayed on days when the weather is inclement, except when an all-weather flag is displayed.
- The flag should never be used as covering for a ceiling.
- The flag should never have anything placed on it.
- The flag should never be used for any advertising purpose, nor embroidered on cushions or handkerchiefs, printed on paper napkins or boxes, nor used as any portion of a costume.
