Whenever possible, press credentials will be mailed. Should the request not be made in time, credentials may be picked up at the Will-Call window in the front of Goodman Stadium.

Parking Passes: Parking passes will accompany your press credentials. Press parking is available in the grass lots behind the Stadium House at Goodman Stadium.

Phone Lines: Phone line requests at Goodman Stadium (\$100.00 radio fee for non-league opponents) should be made to Mike Stagnitta, no later than one week prior to the game.

Post-game Interviews: Post-game interviews for both teams are held at the end of every contest in the Stadium House, located beneath the scoreboard. Please direct all Lehigh procedural questions to Mike Stagnitta. Visiting team interview requests should be made through the visiting team's sports information contact.

Media Services: Lehigh maintains a full-service working press venue at all home football contests. Working media will receive complete statistics, programs and media guides, phone and facsimile privileges, and food and beverage.

Lehigh Football on Television: Distinctive and the model for which all other Division I-AA television packages strive for, Lehigh Athletics is in its second decade of local, regional and national coverage on commercial television. Nationally Lehigh football can be seen on Fox College Sports and on DirecTV channel 628. HEAD COACH

Andy Coen

A fiery and passionate leader with a unique ability to motivate and inspire today's student-athletes, Andy Coen is in his fourth year as Lehigh's head football coach. During his time as the Mountain Hawks leader, Coen has produced 33 All-Patriot League honorees, ten All-America selections and 43 Patriot League Academic Honor Roll choices.

During the 2008 season, Coen led Lehigh to a 4-2 Patriot League mark, which included a 31-15 victory over archrival Lafayette. That victory was the 625th in the history of the Lehigh program. Coen also led the Brown and White to a 19-0 opening day victory over Drake, marking the first time since the 1998 and 1999 seasons Lehigh has registered a shutout victory in back-to-back years.

The Mountain Hawks led the Patriot League and ranked 26th nationally in sacks in 2008, and also paced the league in net punting (third nationally) and kickoff return average (13th in America). Lehigh also ranked second in scoring defense and rush defense among Patriot League institutions. Nine players earned spots on the All-Patriot League teams, including seven First-Teamers, while four student-athletes garnered All-America accolades. Off the field, 12 Mountain Hawks were named to the Patriot League Academic Honor Roll, led by Brendan Van Ackeren '09 who also earned a spot on the *ESPN the Magazine* Academic All-District Team, and the FCS Athletics Directors Academic All-Star Team.

"Coach Coen teaches the game with a great attitude and style," All-American Tim Diamond '08 said. "His passion for the game influences players to reach their full potential. I enjoyed playing for Coach Coen because he has great enthusiasm for the game, relates well to his players, and loves Lehigh University and its football tradition." He added, "Coach Coen's desire to compete at a high level is undeniable. He strives to get the best out of his players and coaches."



In 2007, Lehigh ranked second in the Patriot League in scoring defense (21.1 ppg) and scored 30 or more points on four occasions, including a 45-0 shutout win over Georgetown - the program's first shutout victory since 2002. The Mountain Hawks also defeated eventual Ivy League Champion Harvard in a game in which they did not score an offensive touchdown, marking the first time that has happened since the inception of Patriot League play (formerly the Colonial League) in 1986. Coen coached 10 All-Patriot League selections and six All-Americans; marking the first time since 2004 Lehigh produced an All-American.

Also that season, 19 Lehigh student-athletes were named to the Patriot League academic honor roll, the program's most ever. Pete Donchez '08 was one of just two Patriot League football student-athletes to earn a perfect 4.0 grade point average in the 2007 fall semester.

Coen led the Mountain Hawks to a share of their eighth Patriot League Championship in his first-ever season as a head coach in 2006. By capturing

that title in 2006, Coen has been a part of six league championship teams in his past eleven seasons as a coach, including three at Lehigh ('98, '99, '06) and three at the University of Pennsylvania ('00, '02 '03). The 2006 Mountain Hawks boasted a balanced attack on both sides of the ball, topping the Patriot League in scoring offense (27.2 ppg) and defense (20.2 ppg). The New Jersey native mentored 14 All-Patriot League selections, which included a league-best ten players named to the First-Team.

"Coach Coen is very passionate about football and has the highest expectations for his players and his team," explains former All-American center John Reese '07. "He sets high standards and objectives with the expectations that the team will achieve those goals and win championships. It was a pleasure to play for Coach Coen and I believe he surrounds himself with the right people. He understands what it takes to develop the talent he recruits into tremendous athletes and students."

Coen became the 28th head football coach in Lehigh history on January 3, 2006. That announcement marked his return to Lehigh, where he spent six seasons as an offensive line coach - including four as the team's offensive coordinator.

Coen returned to Lehigh from the University of Pennsylvania, where he spent six years as the offensive coordinator with the Quakers. In his six seasons in Philadelphia, the Quakers captured three Ivy League titles, including a top ten national finish in 2003. At Penn, Coen's offense annually ranked at or near the top of the Ivy League statistical charts, and the Quakers ranked in the top ten in America in scoring three times. In 2000, the Quakers set a school and Ivy League record for points in a season, eclipsing that mark in 2002.

On an individual level, the Penn offense produced the school's all-time leading rusher (Kris Ryan, 3,181 career yards), passer (Gavin Hoffman, 7,542 career yards), and receiver (Rob Milanese, 3,405 career yards) under Coen's tutelage. Coen coached two First-Team All-Americans while at Penn and several Quaker offensive linemen went onto sign with NFL teams. After the Quakers posted an undefeated 2003 campaign, all five starting offensive linemen garnered All-Ivy League recognition.

At Penn, Coen was responsible for recruiting several key areas in the east, including student-athletes from New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Florida, and Georgia.

"Andy is a terrific football coach and a terrific human being," said Penn head coach Al Bagnoli. "He is passionate, bright, and innovative, and is a hard worker and excellent recruiter."

In his first stop at Lehigh (1994-99), Coen was a part of three Patriot League championship teams, including the 12-1 1998 squad. That team set a school mark for the most wins in a season, while reaching the NCAA Division I-AA quarterfinals.

"Since I first set foot on campus in 1999, our football team has had nothing but first-class treatment at Lehigh University. Their facilities are top notch." commented Andy Reid, head coach of the Philadelphia Eagles. "Coach Coen, his football operations staff, and the entire Lehigh community has set a high standard for their student-athletes both on and off of the football field. We are proud to be affiliated with Lehigh University as the summer home of the Philadelphia Eagles."

Coen produced ten All-Patriot League offensive linemen at Lehigh, while his teams twice finished in the national top ten in passing offense (1996, 1998). In fact, the 1998 team ranked seventh nationally in total offense, averaging 447 yards per game. During Coen's tenure as coordinator, Lehigh produced four consecutive 1,000-yard rushers, including Rabih Abdullah '97, who remains Lehigh's all-time leader in rushing yards (3,696). Abdullah later went on to become the first Lehigh player to win a Super Bowl as a member of the 2004 New England Patriots.

"Coach Coen was part of taking the program from mediocre to one of the top teams in the nation," said defensive end Nick Martucci '99, a team captain. "His track record shows that he can be successful at programs where academics are as rigorous and important as football."

"Coach Coen is a great fit at Lehigh," said former quarterback Phil Stambaugh '00, Lehigh's all-time leading passer with 9,669 yards. "He was very instrumental in my personal success as well as our team's success during my time in the Brown and White."

"Coach Coen was the heart and soul of the coaching staff when I played here," said offensive lineman and team captain Brian McDonald '01. "He is by far the best coach I have ever played for."

Before his original stint at Lehigh, Coen was the offensive coordinator and head baseball coach at the United States Merchant Marine Academy in Kings Point, N.Y., where he spent four seasons. In 1992, the team was nationally ranked at the Division III level. Coen has also worked as a grad assistant coach at Minnesota, and a graduate assistant at James Madison.

A native of Cherry Hill, N.J., Coen earned his bachelors in history from Gettysburg College in 1986.

Coen and his wife Laura, have three children: a daughter, Molly (6), and two sons, Nolan (4) and Finn, born in June.

Q & A

Questions and answers with Andy Coen

Describe what it felt like to defeat Lafayette for the first time as a head coach last season.

It was a great feeling. I was obviously very excited personally, but also for our seniors. I did not want those guys to graduate without beating Lafayette. No matter what side of this rivalry you are on you will unquestionably be asked how you did in THE GAME. For our seniors that win is a memory they will always cherish. To get my first win as a head coach, after five wins versus Lafayette and some great memories as an assistant, it was very gratifying and will be something I will remember always. I will also remember the excitement our student body showed after the win. That was awesome!

How much are you and the team looking forward to playing seven of your games at Goodman Stadium this season?

We are very excited to be home seven times this fall. I have stated many times that Goodman Stadium is one of the marquee venues in all of FCS football so to be home seven times will be great. It will give our student body seven opportunities to come out and cheer on the Mountain Hawks. I am sure the community and alumni support, which is the most passionate and loyal fan base in the Patriot League, will also enjoy the added opportunity to watch our team. I am sure our team will be excited to defend its "home turf" this fall especially with the 145th renewal of the Lehigh - Lafayette game being at home.

What excites you most as you prepare for the 2009 season?

I am excited to see the 2009 football team pick up where the 2008 team left off. We ended last fall on such a high note and followed that up with a great winter and spring. Our team knows they have something to prove after the last two years so I am just excited to see our team compete every week. I know we will do that for 11 Saturdays this fall.

What are some of the biggest challenges this team will face in the upcoming season?

To me the game of football is all about meeting the different challenges you face. I think the biggest challenge is that the season is a long grind and the really good football teams find a way to manage that challenge. From August to November there are many things that can distract teams and cause them to lose their focus. We must stay focused and stay together as a team. We must also be tougher than we have been and really believe in ourselves as a team. We have grown by leaps and bounds as a program in these areas and this year we need to meet that challenge every day we practice or play.



Talk about the group of seniors and what they collectively bring to the program.

This senior class will always be a group that I will have strong feelings about, they are the first group that we were able to recruit, as a staff, when I was hired. The young men who have remained in the program have grown so much as players, and as people. This group brings a real love for the game of football to our program. This group has guys that are All-American type of players, and it has guys who are fighting for playing time as seniors, but they all love to play football. The makeup of these kids is what you are looking for as a coach. They have learned what it means to be on a team, to be dedicated, to make sacrifices. I know they are all very excited to lead the 2009 Mountain Hawks this year and I also know they will do a great job.

How would you describe your coaching style?

My coaching style is very aggressive. I will be open and honest with every player. I will let them know when they are doing something wrong, but I'll be right there to tell them they did a great job. Our players will definitely know I'm on the practice field every day.

What are you looking for in a Lehigh football recruit?

Our program wants to recruit student-athletes who are committed to being the best they can be. Aside from the obvious physical talents, we want to recruit student-athletes who are leaders and competitors. We want the guys who are the first ones to the locker rooms and the last ones to leave.

What would you like the student-athlete to take away from the Lehigh football experience?

I want every student athlete in our program to walk away with a degree from Lehigh, but I also want them to look back on their playing experience as the greatest time of their lives.

Talk about the University's commitment to excellence in both academics and athletics.

Lehigh shows its commitment to excellence by the people at the university. I have not come in touch with one member of the campus community who does not love and believe in Lehigh. To me, this speaks volumes for the commitment of the university to its students. I truly believe that Lehigh is an institution that believes that academic excellence and athletic achievement can go hand in hand. Our athletic facilities are top notch, and our academic resources are on par with larger state funded major research universities. The collegiate experience at Lehigh is outstanding.

LEHIGH FOOTBALL PARTNERSHIP

In April of 2009, Lehigh Athletics announced the launching of the Lehigh Football Partnership, an extension of the Lehigh Athletics Partnership. This new organization will connect, engage and involve former football student-athletes in a sport-specific community that is aimed at supporting the current student-athletes at Lehigh, while also connecting former teammates with one another.

Pete DeLuca '79, a member of Lehigh's 1977 National Championship Team, will serve as the Alumni Ambassador for the Football Partnership. "The Lehigh Football program is important to me, so if we can steadily build a strong Football Partnership, the football program will only benefit from the ongoing engagement and support of our football alums."

DeLuca will work closely with Lehigh Head Football Coach Andy Coen as well as Bill Griffin from the Lehigh Athletics Partnership staff, in the planning, organization, and execution of the Football Partnership's mission. Also involved in the organization's infrastructure will be a Communications Chairman, an Events Chairman, a Career Networking Chairman and a Chairman of Program Support. Lance Haynes '93 and Jon Stiegler '98 have committed to co-chair the Communications role, John Shigo '83 has signed on as the Events Chairman, Bill Trotter '66 will serve as the Career Networking Chair and Joe Uliana '86 is the Chairman of Program Support.

"It's exciting to get this organization off of the ground," explained Coen. "We now have a very well thought-out organization to keep our alumni engaged with Lehigh Football. As a program, we want our former players to feel truly connected with Lehigh Football. This organization will allow them to stay connected with one another and really stay plugged into what's happening with Lehigh Football."

RUST FAMILY FOOTBALL PAVILION

On September 6, 2008, the Lehigh Athletics Department dedicated a brand new facility, The Rust Family Football Pavilion, named in honor of former Lehigh football player C. Keith Rust '57 and his sons, Chip '82 and Craig '88, and his daughter-in-law Shannon '90. It was the vision of Keith Rust that Lehigh have a place for football alumni to gather before and after home football games to celebrate the great tradition of Lehigh Football.

"Lehigh Football and the atmosphere that the tailgating experience brings each fall has been a big part of our family for a long time and the pavilion seemed like a perfect way to share that with fellow alumni when they return to Lehigh for home games," Rust stated. "To be a small part of that tradition as it moves forward is pretty special to all of us."

"Keith Rust has been one of our most consistent and most sincere athletics loyalists," explained Lehigh Dean of Athletics Joe Sterrett. "His commitment to help us realize the vision for a place that our football alumni can gather every fall is quite fitting. The participation of his family members makes this an even more special project as clearly it is also grounded in our value of family."

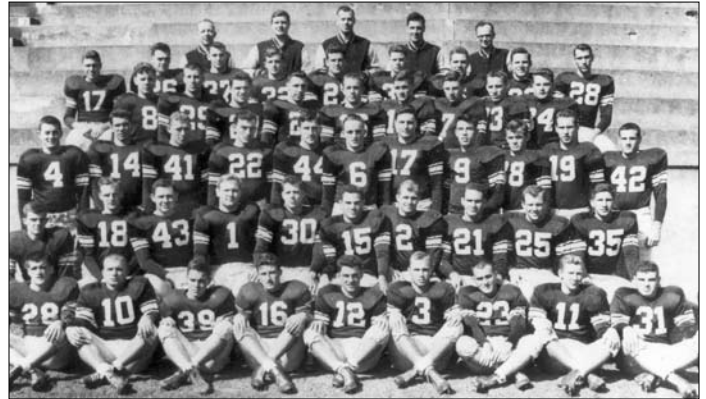
JIM GUM FOUNDATION

James S. Gum was a 1980 graduate of Pen Argyl Area High School where he was a standout player in baseball and football. Jim continued his education and football career at Lehigh University where he played defensive back under the tutelage of Head Coach John Whitehead. A three-year starter, Jim graduated from Lehigh in 1984 with a degree in economics.

In 2000, Jim was diagnosed with A.L.S. (Lou Gehrig's disease) and lost his six-year battle with the illness in May of 2006. It was one of Jim's wishes to give back to Lehigh Football and its student-athletes. The Jim Gum Foundation was established in August 2006 by family, friends, and teammates and annually awards a scholarship prize to a worthy Lehigh football player.

Trey Brown is in his fourth season as Lehigh's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. Brown joined the Lehigh staff after spending five seasons as an offensive assistant under Andy Coen at Penn.

During the 2008 season, Brown mentored J.B. Clark, who became the first Lehigh sophomore quarterback to be named MVP of the Lehigh - Lafayette game since 1983. Clark finished the season with 2,350 yards passing and 26 total touchdowns, including 23 through the air. He threw for at least 200 yards in six games, and his passer rating of 132.9 ranked third in the Patriot League. Under Brown's tutelage, Lehigh's offense scored 30 or more points on five occasions, and led the Patriot League in red-zone efficiency (87.9-percent).

Lehigh's 2007 offense scored 30 or more points on four occasions, and averaged over 200 passing yards per game, eclipsing 300 yards through the air in two games. Brown worked with a group of quarterbacks that struggled with injuries and consistency all season long, but still managed to throw for the program's most yards since 2005 with 2,212.

In 2006 Brown helped direct the Lehigh offense to a Patriot League best 27.2 points per game average, which included four games of 30-plus points. In addition, the Mountain Hawk offense averaged nearly 190 yards through the air and over 150 yards on the ground. Quarterback Sedale Threatt was named a First-Team All-Patriot League selection, after averaging 211 yards of total offense per game and leading the Patriot League in pass efficiency (144.7).



After spending a year coaching the tight ends at Penn, Brown spent the next four years working with the Quakers' wide receivers. During his stint in Philadelphia, Penn posted a 40-9 record, winning a pair of Ivy League championships.

At Penn, Brown directly worked with Rob Milanese and two-time all-Ivy League selection Danny Castles. Milanese, a four-time All-Ivy League selection, remains Penn's all-time leader in receiving yards (3,409). Castles left Penn as the Quakers' all-time leader in touchdown receptions (27), while finishing second all-time at Penn in receiving yards (2,444) and third in receptions (167).

Prior to his arrival at Penn, Brown spent three seasons as an assistant coach at Stanford. Brown was part of the 1999 staff named the coaching staff of the year by the Pacific-10 conference after that squad captured a Pac-10 title. The Cardinal boasted an offense that was recognized in the top ten nationally, and the team appeared in the Rose Bowl Game in 2000.

A native of Longmont, Colorado, Brown earned his bachelors in marketing at the University of Colorado in 1993. He added a masters in sports administration from Saint Mary's College (Calif.) in 2003.

Brown and his wife, Lea, reside in the Lehigh Valley, with their daughter Keelen, and son Mason.



DAVID KOTULSKI

Dave Kotulski is in his fourth season as the Mountain Hawks defensive coordinator and linebackers coach. Kotulski came to Lehigh after serving as the defensive coordinator at Patriot League rival Holy Cross during the 2005 season.

In 2008, the Mountain Hawks defense led the Patriot League and ranked 26th nationally in sacks with 26, which included a season best eight in Lehigh's victory over archrival Lafayette, and they paced the league with 18 interceptions. Lehigh also ranked second in the league in scoring defense and rushing defense, and pitched a 19-0 shutout versus Drake in the season opener - marking the first time in nearly a decade Lehigh has posted shut out wins in back-to-back seasons. Six members of Kotulski's defense were honored with All-Patriot League accolades, including linebacker Matt Cohen who led the league in both sacks and tackles-for-loss, while Tim Diamond '09 and Brian Jackson '09 earned All-America honors for the second consecutive season and Quadir Carter '09 also garnered All-America status.

Kotulski's 2007 defensive unit ranked second in the Patriot League and 23rd in America in scoring defense (21.1 ppg) and third in total defense and rushing defense. Kotulski mentored six All-Patriot League selections, including a pair of linebackers, and three All-Americans. One of those All-America selections was linebacker Tim Diamond, who became the first Mountain Hawk since 2004 to register 100+ tackles, and solidified his spot amongst the nation's best with a 22-tackle performance in Lehigh's win over eventual Ivy League Champion Harvard in late September.

In 2006, Kotulski coached a Lehigh defense that led the Patriot League in scoring defense (20.2 ppg) and turnover margin (+6), and ranked second in total defense, pass efficiency defense and red-zone defense. That season, the Mountain Hawks placed seven student-athletes on the All-Patriot League teams.

While at Holy Cross, Kotulski's defensive unit ranked second in the Patriot League in red zone defense, and linebacker Dan Adams ranked third in the league by registering 10.5 tackles per game. As a team, the Crusaders ranked seventh nationally in turnover margin at +1.0 per contest. Kotulski also headed the Holy Cross punt return unit, and the Crusaders led the league and ranked sixth nationally, posting an average of over 16 yards per punt return.



Prior to his arrival at Holy Cross, Kotulski spent two seasons as the defensive coordinator at Utah State University in the Western Athletic Conference. In 2003, Kotulski was a nominee for the Division I-A national assistant coach of the year award. That year, the Aggies' total defense improved 64 places in the national rankings, and 63 spots in the passing defense annals.

Kotulski has also made coaching stops at Bucknell University, where he was the interim head coach in 2002, Saint Mary's College (Calif.), and the University of Utah, where he spent 12 years. In all, Kotulski spent eight years at Bucknell as the defensive coordinator. While at Bucknell, the Bison won the Patriot League title in 1996 and Kotulski coached five first team All-Americans. Before coaching at Bucknell, Kotulski was the defensive coordinator at Saint Mary's, and he worked with the linebackers and defensive line during his time at Utah under then-head coach Jim Fassel.

A native of Illinois, Kotulski earned his bachelor's in physical education at New Mexico State University in 1974, where he played as both a linebacker and a center. He has begun work on his master's from Cal Poly in Pomona, Calif.

Kotulski and his wife, Cissy live in the Lehigh Valley with their two children: David, 22, and Carey, 21.

DONNIE ROBERTS KUTZTOWN '86

Donnie Roberts is in his fourth season as the Mountain Hawks defensive line coach. Roberts, who returned to Lehigh in 2006 for his second stint, previously served on the Lehigh staff from 1994-1999, with then-assistant coach Andy Coen. During his time at Lehigh, Roberts has coached seven members of the All-Patriot League teams, and three All-America selections.

Two members of Roberts' 2008 "D" line earned All-Patriot League honors, including Brian Jackson '09 and B.J. Benning, who combined to help the Mountain Hawks lead the Patriot League in sacks and rank second in scoring defense and rush defense. Benning totaled 6.0 sacks during the season, which was second best in the entire league, while Jackson, who was named an All-American for the second straight season, closed his career out in style, registering a career-best 3.5 sacks in Lehigh's victory over archrival Lafayette. Paul Bode '09, Jon Warren '09 and Keith Johnson '09 also enjoyed solid final seasons in the Brown and White along the defensive line under Roberts' tutelage.



In 2007, Roberts mentored a Lehigh defensive line that combined for nearly 200 total tackles, including 19.5 for loss, and 6.5 sacks. A pair of those linemen, Brian Jackson and Kyle Adams, earned spots on the All-Patriot League squad, and later went onto earn All-America distinction, with Jackson being named a Second-Team pick. Roberts also oversaw the maturation of returning lettermen Paul Bode, BJ Benning and Phil Winnett.

During the 2006 season, Roberts mentored First-Team All-Patriot League selections Paul Fabre, Eric Rakus and Royce

Morgan. That trio accounted for 121 total tackles, including 20 for loss, and 6.5 sacks. The Mountain Hawks defensive line helped contribute to a defense that led the Patriot League in fewest points allowed (20.2 ppg), and ranked second in total defense.

Prior to his return to Lehigh, Roberts taught Social Studies and served as head football coach and assistant athletics director at Allentown Central Catholic. At ACCHS, Roberts' 2003 squad was named District XI 3A champions, while his 2005 team finished with a 9-3 record and won the Eastern Conference 3A championship.

Roberts began his coaching career as a graduate assistant coach at the University of Pittsburgh. He also coached at Lock Haven University before joining the Lehigh staff in 1994. During his first stint at Lehigh, Roberts was a part of two Patriot League championship teams, including 1995 and 1998. In addition, he coached First Team All-American, Nick Martucci '99, during the 1998 season. Roberts then moved on to the University of Connecticut as an assistant before returning to the Lehigh Valley in 2001.

A three year letter winner and two year starter on the offensive line, Roberts earned his bachelors degree in secondary education from Kutztown in 1986.

Roberts and his wife Jane reside in Whitehall with their children Nathan Patrick (16) and Dana Noelle (10).



BRETT SAWYER MUHLENBERG '98

Now in his fourth season, Brett Sawyer is the Lehigh football program's offensive line coach as well as the recruiting coordinator. In 2008, Sawyer mentored a pair of All-Patriot League offensive linemen, including First-Team selection Will Rackley as well as Kevin Bayani '09. Rackley's selection to the All-League teams gave Sawyer a First-Team honoree in each of his three seasons on the Lehigh sideline. With that pair leading the way, Lehigh's offense averaged over 25 points and 215 passing yards per game in 2008, and also led the Patriot League in red-zone offense.

Sawyer's 2007 group of offensive linemen, which featured a pair of freshmen seeing significant playing time, ranked first in the Patriot League and 23rd in the nation in fewest sacks allowed (14), blocking for an offense that yielded over 200 passing yards per game. In addition, Sawyer mentored All-Patriot League selections John Reese and Jimmy Kehs, who both went onto earn All-America distinction.

In 2006, Sawyer oversaw an offensive line that paved the way for the Patriot League's leading scoring offense, at 27.2 points per game. The 2006 Lehigh offensive line produced three All-Patriot League selections in First-Teamers John Reese and Jim Petrucelli and Second-Team selection Jimmy Kehs.

Sawyer joined the Lehigh staff in January 2006 after having spent the 2004 and 2005 seasons working alongside Lehigh head coach Andy Coen at the University of Pennsylvania. "Brett possesses a great knowledge of the game, and knows how to recruit the type of student athlete needed to be successful," Coen said.

Serving as the tight end coach at Penn for two seasons, Sawyer coached Chris Mizell to All-Ivy League mention in 2005. Sawyer also has prior experience at Princeton (1999, 2002, 2003) where he helped to develop future Pittsburgh Steelers tight end Jon Decker.

During the 2000 and 2001 seasons, Sawyer was a graduate assistant at the University of Virginia, assisting with the offensive line. In 2000, the Cavaliers competed against Georgia in the Oahu Bowl. Sawyer has also served as a linebackers coach at his alma mater, Muhlenberg College, in 1998.

A 1998 graduate of Muhlenberg College with a degree in history, Sawyer earned three varsity letters and started at center, guard, and tackle on the offensive line, earning First-Team All-Conference accolades at center as a senior. In 2003, he added a master's degree in education from the University of Virginia.

Sawyer and his wife, Brook, reside in Center Valley with their son Cade (4), and daughter Haley, who was born in May of 2008.





GERARD WILCHER MOREHOUSE '92

Gerard Wilcher is now in his sixth season as the Mountain Hawks' defensive backs coach. Wilcher joined the staff at Lehigh after serving three years as the defensive secondary coach for Cornell.

In 2008, the Lehigh secondary had a breakout season, leading the Patriot League in interceptions with 18, which were the Mountain Hawks most since the 2004 season. Lehigh also ranked second in the league in pass efficiency defense and held three opponents below the 50-percent completion percentage mark. Two of Wilcher's starters, Quadir Carter '09 and Jarard Cribbs, earned All-Patriot League honors, with Carter named to the First-Team. Carter also went onto earn All-America distinction after posting double-digit tackles in four games and finishing second on the Mountain Hawks with 81 total stops. The success of Wilcher's secondary was not limited to on-field accomplishments, as Carter's running mate at safety, Brendan Van Ackeren '09, was named to the ESPN the Magazine Academic All-District Team and also earned a spot on the FCS Athletics Directors Academic All-Star Team.

During the 2006 and 2007 seasons, the Lehigh secondary picked off 17 passes and held eight opponents to less than 100 yards passing. During that time, Wilcher produced five All-Patriot League selections, including Brannan Thomas and Ernest Moore in 2007. As a unit, the 2007 Mountain Hawks secondary had six players who recorded at least 20 total tackles, including Moore who ranked third on the team with 60 stops, and Lehigh led the Patriot League in opponent's pass completion percentage.



In 2005, Wilcher served as the team's defensive coordinator, and the Mountain Hawks had one of the stingiest defenses in the Patriot League. Lehigh was tops in the league against the run, allowing only 104.4 yards per game on the ground. The Mountain Hawks also paced the league with 36 sacks, and 17 interceptions and Lehigh was the toughest defense in stopping fourth down conversion attempts.

In his first season in Bethlehem, the Lehigh secondary proved to be among the toughest in the league. The 2004 Mountain Hawks led the Patriot League with 20 interceptions, and Lehigh ranked sixth in Division I-AA by allowing only 16.1 points per game. All four of Wilcher's starters earned all-league honors.

In 2003 at Cornell, the Big Red led the Ivy League in passing efficiency defense. Prior to coaching at Cornell, Wilcher spent four seasons at UMass, where he helped lead the Minutemen to a 1998 national championship as well as another appearance in the national quarterfinals. While serving as the wide receivers coach at UMass, Wilcher's group set school records for catches and reception yards in a single season. Wilcher also spent a season coaching the outside linebackers.

In 2007, Wilcher was selected as one of just 26 coaches across the country to participate in the NCAA Expert Coaches Academy in Miami, Florida where he participated in numerous workshops that focused on a variety of topics including communication, academic success, and building a successful football program. During the summer of 2008 Wilcher interned with the Philadelphia Eagles where he worked with the defensive backs. He has also interned for the Chicago Bears and Arizona Cardinals.

A four-year member of the Morehouse football team, Wilcher earned his bachelor's in business administration from Morehouse in 1992.

Wilcher and his wife Ayanna live in Bethlehem with their three children: son Xavier (13), and daughters Jalen (11) and Jehlani (7).



R.J. RYAN LEHIGH '99

A familiar face returns to the Mountain Hawks coaching staff for the 2009 season as former Lehigh tight end and assistant coach R.J. Ryan re-joined the staff in March of 2009. Ryan returned to Lehigh following a stint as the Offensive Coordinator and Offensive Line and Tight Ends Coach at Franklin & Marshall College in Lancaster, Pennsylvania. He will oversee Lehigh's special teams and coach the running backs. "I'm extremely grateful to Coach Andy Coen for giving me the opportunity to coach at a school that is special to me," explained Ryan. "I'm also very excited for the challenge of helping to bring the Patriot League title back to South Mountain."

During his two-year stint at F&M, Ryan was responsible for all aspects of the offense, including game planning, scripting practice and play calling duties. He helped the Diplomats establish the school record for completions in a season during the 2007 campaign, while seven single-game records were either tied or broken by individual players during his time in Lancaster, including net rushing yards, rushing touchdowns, points scored, touchdowns scored, pass attempts, pass completions and touchdown receptions.

Prior to his time at Franklin & Marshall, Ryan enjoyed a three-year run as an assistant coach at Lehigh where he helped lead the Mountain Hawks to a share of two Patriot League Championships (2004, 2006) as well as an appearance in the 2004 NCAA I-AA Playoffs and a final national ranking of 15 following the 2004 season.

Ryan coached the tight ends and running backs while on South Mountain and had an assortment of other duties, including film breakdown, offensive scouting reports, defensive scout team, head coach of the Junior Varsity program, assistant offensive line coach and assistant recruiting coordinator.

After a three-year career in banking, Ryan began his coaching career at Worcester Polytechnic Institute in Massachusetts where he served as the running backs coach and video coordinator. While there his responsibilities included player evaluations and assisting the offensive coordinator with game planning.

Ryan has extensive recruiting experience as well having recruited the entire Northeast during his coaching career.

During his playing days in the Brown and White Ryan was a two-year starter at tight end. He was a member of the 1998 squad that won a school record 12 games and was ranked as high as seventh in the nation. Ryan was also the inaugural winner of the Barry Fetterman Award, for his dedication and determination to the program.

"I am very excited to have R.J. Ryan rejoin our staff," Coen said. "R.J. is very familiar with Lehigh and he certainly has a passion for Lehigh Football. He did a great job in his prior stint at Lehigh and I believe he has grown much as a coach in the two years he spent as the Offensive Coordinator at Franklin & Marshall."

Coen continued, "R.J. is a natural fit and he will be able to hit the ground running. He understands our system, he recruited well for us in the past, he knows many people throughout campus and so the learning curve is really non-existent."

In 2008, Amundson helped oversee a secondary unit that led the Patriot League in interceptions with 18 and placed two starters, Quadir Carter '09 and Jarard Cribbs on the All-League teams. Carter also went on to earn All-America distinction after finishing second on the Mountain Hawks with 81 total tackles.

Amundson came to Lehigh from Rowan University where he served as the assistant defensive line coach in addition to the junior varsity defensive coordinator and the program's video coordinator. During his time at Rowan, the Profs compiled a record of 30-8, including three appearances in the Division III National Playoffs, and won three New Jersey Athletic Conference (NJAC) Championships as well as two ECAC and Lambert Cup Championships. Amundson also served as an assistant coach with Rowan's baseball program and he was an adjunct professor of psychology at Cumberland County College.



Amundson graduated from St. Joseph's in 2001 with a bachelors degree in Psychology and he earned his masters in Sport Management from the United States Sports Academy, located in Daphne, Alabama in 2003. While at St. Joseph's, Amundson was a member of the ice hockey program, serving as captain during the 2001 season, and he helped lead the Hawks to the Delaware Valley Collegiate Hockey Conference (DVCHC) Championship on two occasions.

Lehigh's starting pair of outside 'backers (Cohen, Heath Brickner) combined for 104 total tackles, 19.5 tackles-for-loss and four interceptions.

Sanders came to Lehigh following a stint as a graduate assistant at his alma mater, the University of Louisville. During his time in that role Sanders was responsible for a number of duties including opponent game breakdown and scouting reports, film review with players, coaching the fullbacks on the kick-off return unit, running the scout special teams unit, and recruiting. Prior to that, Sanders was a student assistant coach with the Cardinals.

Sanders graduated from the University of Louisville in 2006 with a degree in accounting. He then went onto earn his MBA from Louisville in 2007 and is currently working on a second masters degree in Human Resource Education. While an undergrad, Sanders was a two year letterwinner on the Cardinals football team, playing at middle linebacker and on special teams. He was a member of the 2004 Conference USA and Liberty Bowl Championships. Sander's career was cut short due to injury however, and he then assumed the role of student assistant coach in 2007.

DeWalt was a two-time captain during his undergrad days at Moravian. He earned a pair of First-Team All-Conference accolades as an offensive lineman as well as two All-Region selections. DeWalt graduated from Moravian in 2006 with a degree in sociology.

Mike Morelli is in his fourth season as the kickers and punters coach for the Lehigh football program. In 2008, Morelli oversaw Lehigh's rise to the top of the Patriot League as the Mountain Hawks led the league and ranked third nationally in net punt average. In addition, Jason Leo '09 earned a spot on the All-Patriot League teams for the fourth consecutive season after ranking seventh in the nation in punt average, and he finished his career with 194 points, which ranks third in school annals among kickers. Leo also was named an All-American for the second consecutive year.

During the 2007 season, Morelli mentored Leo to an All-America and All-Patriot League campaign after he finished 14th in the country with a 42.1 per punt average. Leo also doubled as the Mountain Hawks place kicker and scored 61 points on 28 extra points and 11 field goals.

In 2006, Morelli also worked with Leo, who earned the 2006 Special Teams Player of the Year award, and led all kickers in the Patriot League in both points and made field goals. Morelli has worked with kickers of all ages on all skill levels and has coached several Division I prospects.

Prior to joining the Lehigh staff, Morelli spent a number of years working with kickers at a variety of different age and skill levels. Prior to arriving at Lehigh, Morelli spent six years as the owner and operator of Fourth Down Kicking Specialists in Montgomeryville, Pa. There, Morelli operated camps and punting clinics in three different states, while helping college kicking prospects hone their skills and select the right collegiate fit.

Morelli also spent two seasons as the kicking and punting consultant at the University of Connecticut, coinciding with the team's move to the Division I-A level.

Morelli was a four-year letter winner on the UConn football program, while earning Dean's List honors. An All-Atlantic 10 Conference selection as a punter in 1999, Morelli earned his bachelors in finance from Connecticut in 2000.

Morelli currently resides in King of Prussia, Pa., outside of Philadelphia.

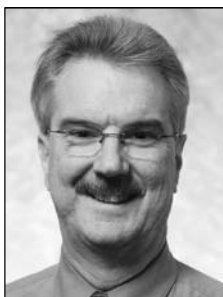

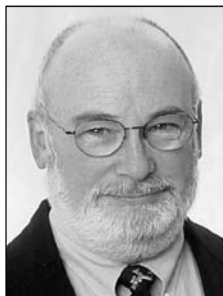

2009 SEASON OUTLOOK

Following an up-and-down start to the 2008 season, Lehigh rebounded to win three of its final four contests, including a 31-15 victory over archrival Lafayette in Easton. That win sent the Mountain Hawks into the offseason with plenty of momentum and optimism on what the future holds. Following a solid winter conditioning program and spring segment Lehigh enters the 2009 season with a good deal of experience and talent returning on both sides of the ball. Head coach Andy Coen, now entering his fourth season, expects plenty of competition throughout preseason camp, where the Mountain Hawks will look to fill several holes as well as develop depth in a number of areas.

"We entered the offseason on a high note and I think that really motivated our guys to work hard throughout the winter months and into spring ball," Coen said. "That said, there are plenty of areas we need to improve in and become more consistent with. We also have a few key spots on both sides of the ball where kids will be competing on a daily basis for playing time."

DEFENSE

The Lehigh defense was once again a formidable unit in 2008, ranking at or near the top of the Patriot League in several statistical categories, including sacks, scoring defense and rushing defense. Three All-Patriot League selections return for the Mountain Hawks on "D" and six starters overall will be back in '09. "I think our linebackers will be the strength of the team," Coen explained. "We have a lot of experience returning at that position as well as some very talented underclassmen that will get their shot to earn playing time." He continued, "Our defensive line has a few spots that need to be filled as does the secondary, but overall I am excited about the potential of our entire defense."

Defensive Line

Lehigh's defensive line grew stronger and stronger week-by-week in 2008, culminating with a dominating effort in the win over Lafayette. The Mountain Hawks defensive linemen registered six-and-a-half sacks alone versus the Leopards, displaying an outstanding combination of speed and power throughout the game. Lehigh lost four members of its D-line

to graduation, including two time All-American Brian Jackson, but despite those losses, a talented group of players returns.

First-Team All-Patriot League selection and team captain BJ Benning will anchor the defensive line. A native of Maryland, Benning registered six sacks a season ago including a career-best of three in Lehigh's win over Fordham. A physically imposing presence with good athleticism Benning once again figures to be one of the top D-linemen in the entire league.

Senior Steven Brown returns and will look to make a push for increased playing time. Junior David Brown is the largest defensive lineman on the roster, checking in at over 300 pounds. He got his first taste of action last season and did a nice job as Benning's backup, appearing in five games.

Junior Phil Winnett returns to the lineup after missing all of the 2008 campaign with an injury. Winnett had a great freshman season, appearing in all 11 games, and posting 12 tackles during that time. Fellow junior Billy Dokouslis made the switch from linebacker to defensive line during the offseason and Coen is excited about his future. "Billy is one of the stronger kids on the roster and he can run rather well, too. He has added some weight and we're looking forward to what he can do at his new position."

Other players at this position to keep an eye on are sophomores Andrew Knapp and Cody Connare, both of whom stand at least 6-2, and freshmen Tom Bianchi, Collin Bremer, Sajjad Chagani, and Anthony Verderame.

Linebackers

With three starters returning, including two time All-League honoree Matt Cohen, Lehigh's linebacking corps once again figures to be its strongest position group. Last season Cohen was a dominant force, leading the Patriot League in sacks and tackles-for-loss as he finished with 53 total tackles. The team captain was named the league's Defensive Player of the Week after registering five tackles and returning an interception for his first career touchdown in a win over Bucknell.

Fellow seniors Heath Brickner and Al Pierce also return to the starting lineup after both had impressive junior seasons. Brickner is a two year starter and totaled 51 tackles, one interception and a blocked kick last season. He registered a career-high ten tackles at Holy Cross and used his 6-4 frame to block the second kick of his career at Princeton. Pierce came into his own last season, displaying tremendous speed and athleticism en route to 50 tackles, including six-for-loss and a pair of sacks. The New Jersey native totaled a season-best nine tackles, including two crucial tackles-for-loss in the win over Lafayette.

Other returning linebackers are seniors Troy Taylor and Tobi Showunmi. Taylor was a special teams demon a season ago, totaling more than half of his 39 tackles on special teams coverage. He suffered an injury in the Lafayette game however, but Coen expects he will be back at full strength for the 2009 season. Showunmi was coming off of an injury in 2008 and grew stronger and stronger with each passing week. He appeared in seven games and made ten stops during that time, including a career-high seven versus league foe Colgate. He also registered his first career sack at Georgetown.

Rounding out the crop of outside linebackers are junior Ben Flizack, who has impressed the coaching staff with the strides he has made in the weight room, and sophomores Fred Mihal and Mike Groome. Coen is very high on this pair of physically imposing 'backers.

At inside linebacker, one junior and three rising sophomores will compete for playing time, including Robert Tulcin, Tanner Rivas, Alex Petroff, and Devin Greene. Greene earned the defensive scout team's MVP award last season and Coen expects each of these youngsters to make a serious push for playing time.

Secondary

Lehigh entered the 2008 season with a good deal of uncertainty throughout its secondary, but the Mountain Hawks wound up leading the Patriot League in interceptions and placed two players on the All-League teams. With one of those All-League selections and a host of other players that saw significant time returning, Lehigh's secondary figures to be in solid shape.

Leading the charge are juniors Jarard Cribbs and John Kennedy at cornerback. Cribbs earned Second-Team All-Patriot League honors after leading the league in interceptions and pass break ups and posting 38 total tackles. The Maryland native had three games of five or more tackles, and also doubled as the Mountain Hawks punt returner, returning a kick 82 yards for a touchdown versus Cornell. On the other side of the field Kennedy settled in nicely as the starting cornerback. An All-League selection as a kick returner following his freshman season, Kennedy used his top-notch speed to finish among the team leaders in tackles with 65, which included a career-best 11 at Princeton. He also picked off a pair of passes, none more memorable than the one he intercepted at Lafayette, which he returned 94 yards to pay dirt to seal the Mountain Hawks win.

Junior Casey Eldemire appeared in ten games as a sophomore, posting his best game at Harvard where he made eight stops and picked off his first career pass. Sophomore Colin Newton made an impact on special teams last season and will compete for increased time at cornerback. Eldemire and Newton are two of the taller players in the secondary.

At the safety spot, senior Jesse Sanchez returns with the most experience, having appeared in over 20 games during the last two seasons. As a junior he totaled 13 tackles, including four apiece versus Cornell and Fordham. Sanchez is one of the more athletic players on the Lehigh roster. Junior John Veniero stands over six-foot and weighs over 200 pounds, giving Lehigh a physical presence at the other safety spot. He totaled six tackles a season ago, playing mainly on special teams.

Other candidates at the safety spot include senior Femi Ajewole, junior Shane Ryan, and sophomores Isadore Carrie and Jonathan Littlejohn. Ajewole and Littlejohn are converted defensive backs, while Ryan is a former walk-on that has worked hard to put himself in position to earn playing time.

The newest Mountain Hawks in the secondary include Mike Hanhauser, Gabe Johnson, Bari-Boloka Nenbee, Billy O'Brien, and Bryan Andrews.

OFFENSE

From the time Andy Coen took the head coaching job in 2006, he has continually preached the importance of having a balanced offense. Last season the Mountain Hawks averaged 215 yards passing and nearly 100 yards rushing per game, but Coen would like to see Lehigh continue to improve on offense, particularly on the ground. "We want to build on the success that

we had passing this past season, but we need to do a better job of running the ball, so that will be a point of concentration for us." Last offseason much of the attention was focused on who would be the Mountain Hawks starting quarterback, but now the focus has shifted to the running back and wide receiver positions, where Lehigh graduated a large number of its top players from a season ago.

Offensive Line

This should be the largest offensive line Lehigh has had since Coen became the head coach. That said, there are a few holes to plug, including replacing All-League selection Kevin Bayani and the ever-steady Chris Tiefertal. "The door is open to everyone for competition throughout camp and into the season," Coen explained. "We've been able to add solid depth along the line the past few seasons and are now in a position where we can have great competition at each position." Junior Will Rackley is the top returner after earning a spot on the All-Patriot League First-Team last season. A Georgia native, Rackley has started nearly every game during his first two seasons on South Mountain. Classmate Keith Schauder started all 11 games last year at center and returns a year older and more experienced. Other Mountain Hawks that saw significant time along the line last season are senior Frank Giacalone and junior Ricky Clerge.

The rest of the Lehigh line is comprised of junior R.J. McNamara and sophomore Troy McKenna at tackle, sophomores Jim Liebler and Will Reich who can play either center or guard, juniors Ben Harden and Alex Rowe at guard, sophomore Vinny Pellegrini at guard and sophomore Stephen Ganoe who can play both guard and tackle.

Coen and his staff once again added a group of big, physical newcomers to the current crop of linemen. The newest additions include Thomas Ruley, Lex Utt, Mike Vuono and Ryan Weitz.

Tight Ends

Lehigh loses just one tight end off the roster in Troy Healion who was a partial starter each of the last two seasons. Junior Alex Wojdowski is more than ready to assume the full-time role of starter however. "Alex clearly established himself as the starter," Coen said. "He's a two year letterwinner who is a good blocker and a solid pass receiver." Wojdowski caught five passes a season ago, including a touchdown at Holy Cross.

Other Mountain Hawks in the mix at tight end are junior Brandon Radke, sophomores Mark Wickware and Kyle Holmes and freshman Jamel Haggins. Radke has been slowed by injuries each of his first two seasons but stands 6-4 and has plenty of talent, while Wickware appeared in nearly every game as a freshman making his mark on special teams. Coen describes Holmes as a "physical specimen" and he impressed the coaching staff with his improvement throughout 2008 and into the off season training regimen. Haggins is a physically imposing presence, standing 6-3 and weighing 225 pounds.

Receivers

Lehigh's receivers played with much more consistency and stayed healthy for the majority of the 2008 season. The result was nearly

2,000 receiving yards by the Mountain Hawks wideouts. With the top three lost to graduation Lehigh will now look to its younger crop of receivers to make plays on a consistent basis. Seniors Brien Ruyak and Jimmy Potocnie are the veterans of the group. Ruyak caught eight passes a season ago, including the first touchdown of his career, while Potocnie played a great deal on special teams and will look to take the next step in 2009. "These two have progressively gotten better and better each year they've been in the program," Coen says. "Now they need to become more polished and continue to develop."

Other upperclassmen returning include junior Craig Zurn and sophomore Travis Artim. Zurn had a breakout season as a sophomore, totaling 415 yards of all-purpose offense, which included 118 receiving yards. Zurn has good speed and shifty moves out on the field, which aid him when returning kicks. Artim took a leave of absence during the 2008 fall semester but has since returned to campus and is practicing with the team. As a freshman in 2007 Artim appeared in nine games and hauled in nine passes for 124 yards.

De'Vaughn Gordon headlines a large and talented sophomore class that also includes Jake Drwal, Jimmy Jefferson and Preston Soeprasetyo. Gordon's speed and elusiveness helped him make an immediate impact a season ago, as he did a little of everything, including pass receiving, rushing the ball and on kick returns. Drwal saw time on special teams toward the end of last season, but is a talented receiver that will be given his shot to earn time. Jefferson missed his entire freshman year after suffering an injury in preseason camp, while Soeprasetyo did not see any varsity action. Coen likes this pair of receivers for their size and good hands. Newcomer Luke Rudowsky

will also compete for time at the wide receiver spot.

The freshmen group of pass catchers includes Dan Cintron, James Flynn, Brendan Kelly, Marvin Pierre, Ryan Spadola, and Will Velekei.

Running Backs/Fullbacks

Lehigh loses the heart and soul of its offense in Matt McGowan who had a strong senior season capped off by a gutsy performance in the win over Lafayette. Fellow graduate Adam Watson was a two year starter at fullback, so the Mountain Hawks backfield will have a new look to it in '09, but that new look has experience to it. Junior Jaren Walker is completely healed from the injury that kept him out of nearly all of the 2008 campaign and is ready to go to work. Fellow junior Jay Campbell got his first taste of Lehigh Football a season ago as he carried the ball 20 times and scored his first collegiate touchdown. Sophomore Matt Fitz showed promise in his first season at Lehigh and is a talented athlete with good size and speed. Lehigh also added two talented running backs during the recruiting process, including local standout Zach Barket and Tony Kablan from Minnesota.

At the fullback spot senior Anthony Fossati takes over the starting role after serving as Watson's backup each of the last two seasons. One of the strongest and more physical players on the roster Fossati has appeared in nearly every game the last two seasons, playing on both special teams and at fullback. Sophomore Bryce Arruda made the switch to offense during the offseason and will serve as Fossati's backup.

Quarterbacks

Junior J.B. Clark earned the starting nod during last year's preseason camp and never gave the spot up. The Florida native threw for over 2,300 yards and 23 touchdowns and earned MVP honors of the Lehigh - Lafayette game in

2008. His challenge now is to continue to progress and improve on a daily basis as junior Trace Cisneros and sophomore Chris Lum are eager to earn playing time of their own. "J.B. was made better through competition in the fall and that will continue to push him in the summer and into camp," explains Coen. "He earned the opportunity to be the starter and he knows that he must work very hard to continue to be the starting quarterback of this football team."

Cisneros continues to develop both his skills and his knowledge of the Lehigh system. The 6-4 lefty has a nice throwing touch and has impressed the coaching staff with his development. Lum earned praise from the coaches and his teammates after receiving MVP honors of the offensive scout team. A Michigan native, Lum has a strong arm and knack for fitting balls into any space he's given.

Michael Colvin is the lone freshman quarterback for Lehigh.

SPECIAL TEAMS

One of the bigger areas of concern for Coen heading into the spring was improving the consistency of Lehigh's kicking game. The Mountain Hawks missed far too many extra points and field goals a season ago, and so that will be a major point of emphasis throughout preseason camp. Junior Tom Randazza was four-of-five on extra points last season and will begin camp as the top place kicker for the Brown and White. Sophomore Alex Smith has a strong leg and will look to step in for two time All-American Jason Leo who ranked seventh nationally in 2008 in punt average. These two will also battle for kick-off duties, along with freshman Jacob Peery.

DEFENSE

In the return game Lehigh should be in good shape with juniors John Kennedy and Craig Zurn returning to return kick-offs. Kennedy is a speedster who returned 30 kicks for over 650 yards a season ago, including a season long of 43 versus Fordham, while Zurn is shifty and brought back nine kicks for over 250 yards.

Junior Jarard Cribbs is the top punt returner after totaling 196 yards on 24 returns a season ago. Cribbs electrified the Mountain Hawks' fans with a dizzying return of 84 yards for a touchdown versus Cornell and returned four punts for at least 25 yards throughout the course of the season. Other candidates in the return game are sophomores Travis Artim and De'Vaughn Gordon.

Junior John Veniero did a nice job with long snapping a season ago, while junior J.B. Clark and sophomore Chris Lum will begin the season as Lehigh's holders. Coen will, as always, have open competition for all of these spots throughout preseason camp.

UNIVERSITY LEADERSHIP



DR. ALICE P. GAST PRESIDENT

Alice P. Gast, a world renowned scholar, researcher, and academic leader, became the 13th president of Lehigh University on August 1, 2006.

Since taking office, President Gast has focused on positioning Lehigh as a premier residential research university of international distinction, capitalizing on the University's strengths as a research

university and a residential college and its core values of integrity and honesty, equitable community, academic freedom, intellectual curiosity, collaboration, commitment to excellence, and leadership. She is actively engaged in transforming the intellectual footprint of the university, applying the best thinking of the Lehigh community to determine how the University will contribute to the next generation of problem solvers and the creation of new ideas to address the world's most serious challenges. Fundamental to this transformation is an emphasis on continuing to hire and retain the highest quality faculty and staff.

Before coming to Lehigh, Dr. Gast served as the vice president for research and associate provost at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, where she was also the Robert T. Haslam chair in chemical engineering. Prior to joining MIT in 2001, she spent 16 years as a professor of chemical engineering at Stanford University and at the Stanford Synchrotron Radiation Laboratory.

The focus of Dr. Gast's distinguished research career was the study of surface and interfacial phenomena, in particular the behavior of complex fluids. Her areas of research include colloidal aggregation and ordering, protein lipid interactions, and enzyme reactions at surfaces. She is the co-author of *Physical Chemistry of Surfaces*, a classic textbook on colloid and surface phenomena, and has presented named lectures at several of the nation's leading research institutions.

Dr. Gast serves on a number of national advisory committees and boards, including the Board of the American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS), is a member of the Academic Research Council for the Singapore Ministry of Education and the National Research Council Committee for Science, Technology, and the Law. She is a member of the AAAS, the American Chemical Society, the American Institute of Chemical Engineers and the American Physical Society.

In recognition of her achievements, Gast has received numerous awards and honors including the National Academy of Sciences Award for Initiative in Research, the Colburn Award of the American Institute of Chemical Engineers, the Camille and Henry Dreyfus Teacher Scholar Award and a Guggenheim Fellowship. She was elected to the National Academy of Engineering in 2001 and the American Academy of Arts and Sciences in 2002. She was named an AAAS Fellow in early 2007.

After earning a bachelor's degree in chemical engineering from the University of Southern California, Gast was a Hertz Fellow while earning her doctorate in chemical engineering from Princeton University. She spent a postdoctoral year completing a NATO fellowship at the École Supérieure de Physique et de Chimie Industrielles in Paris.

Gast resides on campus with her husband, Bradley J. Askins, and their two children, Rebecca and David.



JOE STERRETT '76 GOODMAN DEAN OF ATHLETICS

Joe Sterrett is in his 21st year as Director of Athletics at Lehigh, and his fifth year as the Murray H. Goodman Dean of Athletics. Sterrett brings a wealth of experience to his current position as he begins his 34th year of service at the university. He is just the seventh athletics director in school history. Sterrett has held several positions on South Mountain including assistant football coach, director of student recruitment, and assistant

vice president for enrollment management.

Through his experiences at Lehigh as an undergraduate student-athlete, coach, university administrator and director of athletics, Sterrett has helped to develop the Lehigh athletics department into a group of highly skilled and caring professionals whose common vision and exemplary work ethic aspires to make every student-athlete's experience a positive one. Focused improvements in number of areas have contributed to the progress made in achieving Lehigh's Athletics goals.

In an effort to affirm the importance of understanding the concerns and challenges of the Lehigh student-athlete, Sterrett established the Lehigh Student-Athlete Council and the Faculty Athletics Council. Each group meets regularly throughout the year. Sterrett, who also teaches classes at Lehigh during the academic year, takes an active role in each council. To promote the value of service to others, the award-winning community outreach program "C.O.A.C.H.," was founded. To honor the storied history of Lehigh Athletics the Roger S. Penske/Lehigh Athletics Hall of Fame was established. Lehigh student-athletes regularly rank nationally among the top division one institutions in graduation success rates and NCAA academic progress and success rates. Additionally, Lehigh is among the nation's leaders in measures of equity commitment across all sports and for all student-athletes. More recently, Lehigh's athletics program has expanded a long time commitment to leadership development to include a structured leadership program for student-athletes. In addition, Lehigh's scholar-athletes train and compete in outstanding facilities, the majority of which have been built or renovated during Sterrett's tenure. Lehigh teams and individuals regularly earn national distinction in top 25 polls and as All-Americans, Academic All-Americans, and national champions. The talented coaching and administrative staff has been recognized with numerous "Coach of the Year" and "Distinguished Service" awards, and eight athletics department coaches or staff members hold endowed chairs.

Sterrett received his bachelor's degree from Lehigh in 1976, majoring in finance and social psychology. As an undergraduate he earned All-America status as a senior quarterback and played on two Lambert Cup Championship teams. He was the recipient of the prestigious Undergraduate Merit Award in 1976, the Alfred P. Robinson Award in 1986, the University Award for Distinguished Service in 1998, the Paul J. Franz Award in 1999, and the Hillman Staff Award in 2004.

Sterrett earned his masters degree in educational administration from Lehigh while serving as a graduate assistant football coach. Throughout his tenure as a full-time assistant football coach, Sterrett pursued the doctor of education degree concentrating in sports administration at Temple University, and received the degree in January of 1984. During the period of his seven year coaching career as part of John Whitehead's staff, Lehigh's football program won 57 games, made three NCAA playoff appearances, finished as the national runner-up once, and won the National Championship in 1977.

Sterrett has been one of the University's key representatives in the Patriot League, where he served as chairman of the policy committee, chairman of the committee on athletics administration, a member of the league's committee for expansion, and as a member of the search committee for the league's executive director. On a broader level, he served as chair the NCAA Division I-AA Football Committee, and as a member of the NCAA Football Issues Committee, the NCAA Football Academic Working Group, and the NCAA Division I Management Council.

Sterrett and his wife Cindy, Lehigh '76, reside in Coopersburg, Pennsylvania, and have four children: Stephanie, Lehigh '03, Scott, Lehigh '05, Julie, Lehigh '07, and Christie, Lehigh '09.

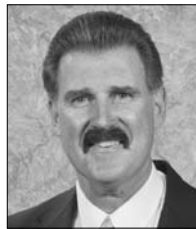

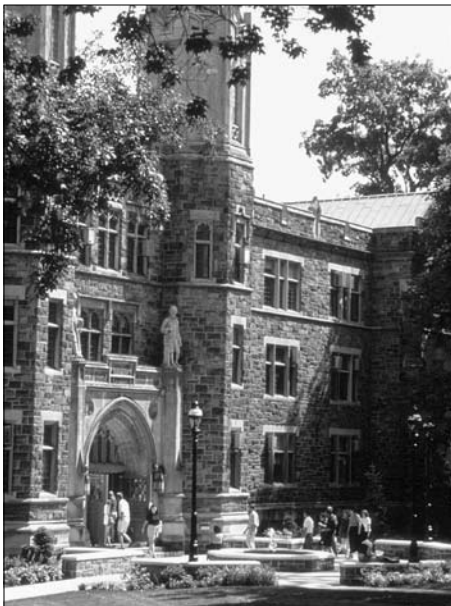

FINANCIAL AID: TYPES AND SOURCES OF AID

The basic types of financial aid are grants and scholarships (not subject to repayment); loans (that must be repaid); and campus employment. The sources are many: Lehigh University (which

provides 74 percent of all the grant aid received by students); federal and state governments; ROTC scholarships; and a variety of private sources.

More than 50 percent of undergraduates receive university-funded aid, and a total of 69 percent of students receive aid from some source.

The average need-based financial aid package for first-year students in 2004-2005 was

approximately \$20,156 (awards based on financial need range from \$500 to \$33,900).

Need-Based Aid from Lehigh

University-awarded financial aid comes in some combination of grant, loan and/or job.

Grants and Scholarships are "gift aid" awarded to students who either demonstrate financial need as determined by the university's financial aid staff, or are awarded solely on a "merit" basis. The majority of funds are awarded based on a student's calculated need. A few merit awards – Asa Packer Scholars, Dean's Scholars, and Baker Gifted Arts Scholars – are awarded through the Office of Admissions.

Loans available to Lehigh students include Federal Stafford (both subsidized and unsubsidized), Federal Perkins, and loans from various University-endowed funds. With the exception of an unsubsidized Stafford loan, no interest accrues while the borrower is enrolled on at least a half-time basis.

There are various educational loan opportunities for parents/guardians including the Federal PLUS program, and such private sources as Sallie Mae's Signature Education Loan, Citibank's CitiAssist Loan, Key Alternative Loan, and many others.

Jobs are available through the Federal Work-Study and the Work Opportunity Award programs. By working 8 to 10 hours per week, a student can earn up to \$1,700 per year. Employment opportunities span most departments, many with flexible hours. Pay rates reflect degree of experience or special talents. The Office of Financial Aid provides complete listings both in written form and on the university's computer network.

For students not eligible for federal work-study jobs, the university provides job opportunities through the Job Locator and Development (JLD) program administered by the Office of Career Services located in the Rauch Business Center.

Academic Merit Awards

Asa Packer Scholarship: \$15,000 renewable scholarship award for superior academic and leadership achievement. The scholarship is given to top 5 percent of the applicant pool. Not based on financial need.

Dean's Scholarships: About 10 percent of first-year students receive renewable \$10,000 awards for outstanding academic and leadership achievement. Not based on financial need.

Dexter and Dorothy Baker Gifted Arts Scholarships: These renewable scholarships provide annual awards of \$3,000 to students who demonstrate an outstanding talent in instrumental music or theatre. Not based on financial need.

President's Scholarships: 12-month tuition scholarships awarded to graduating Lehigh seniors who complete an undergraduate degree and meet GPA requirements. This scholarship can be used for second bachelor's degree or toward a master's degree.

Rodale Scholarship in Journalism: Qualified students will receive a \$2,500 scholarship (which may be renewed for three additional years); opportunities to intern at Rodale Inc. or other prominent media institutions; and one-on-one instruction with Lehigh faculty.

Lehigh-Pool Scholars Premedical Education Program: This highly competitive program, open to a limited number of outstanding, strongly motivated students, includes guaranteed, paid summer research opportunities (\$3,000 per summer) between the sophomore-junior and junior-senior years in biomedical settings.

Air Products Scholars Program: First-year students of color in chemical, mechanical and materials science engineering are eligible for this program, which offers \$10,000 scholarships and mentoring by Air Products and Chemicals employees.

GOODMAN STADIUM

Goodman Stadium

In the shadows of beautiful South Mountain one would be hard pressed to find a prettier autumnal setting and more impressive 16,000 seat facility than Goodman Stadium. Fans coming to a Lehigh football Saturday will find convenient parking around the stadium and exciting entertainment in and around the stadium prior to kickoff. Once inside the stadium with South Mountain foliage in the background fans find comfortable seating including nearly 2,000 chairback seats, bench seating with excellent sightlines and the very popular grass bank seating in the south endzone.

Goodman Stadium opened on October 1, 1988 with a 27-14 Lehigh win over Cornell. Then Lehigh President Peter Likins and Murray H. Goodman '48 dedicated it one week later.

Goodman Stadium has been home to over 10,000 fans on game day nine of the past ten seasons and has hosted sellout crowds in six of the past eight seasons. Lehigh has led the Patriot League in attendance for 17 of the last 18 years and been among the top FCS (Football Championship Subdivision) attendance leaders for several years.

In addition to hosting Lehigh football, Goodman Stadium has also served as the site for National Football League scrimmages involving the Philadelphia Eagles, Washington Redskins, New York Jets, New York Giants and Buffalo Bills.

The stadium also hosted its first NCAA Playoff game on December 1, 2001 as Lehigh defeated Hofstra 27-24 in overtime.

Home Field Advantage

There are very few home field advantages bigger than the one Lehigh enjoys at Goodman Stadium. Since its inception in 1988, Lehigh has won nearly 70% of its games at home, sporting a 78-35-1 record during those 21 years. The Mountain Hawks have gone undefeated at Goodman Stadium four times since the year 1988, and they accumulated the nation's longest home winning streak during that time span at 28 games.

DIRECTIONS TO GOODMAN STADIUM

FROM ROUTE 22

From Route 22, take the Route 378 exit in Bethlehem. Route 378 heads south only. Follow Route 378 south for 3.6 miles, over South Mountain. Halfway down the hill, turn left at the traffic light onto Seidersville Road (becomes Hickory Hill Rd.) Follow to traffic light, then turn left into Goodman Campus and follow signs for stadium/arena.

FROM INTERSTATE 78

From I-78, take exit 67, Hellertown/Bethlehem. At stoplight, go straight across Route 412, through short tunnel and toward "Y" in the road. (From west, make a right onto 412, then a left at the light) Bear left at the "Y," following signs to Lehigh University and Goodman Campus. Proceed to stop sign. Continue straight, passing Goodman Stadium on your left. At end, make a left onto South Mountain Drive, then a left into Goodman Campus.

FROM PHILADELPHIA AND SOUTH

Take the Northeast Extension of the Pennsylvania Turnpike (Route 476) to Exit 32 Quakertown. Turn left onto Route 663 to Quakertown. Follow for 3.5 miles. Turn left onto Route 309 north. Follow 309 to Route 378. Turn right and travel approximately two miles to Saucon Valley Road. Turn right onto Saucon Valley Road and follow to end. Turn left onto Bingen Road and travel approximately one mile to traffic light. Continue straight into Goodman campus and follow signs for stadium/arena.

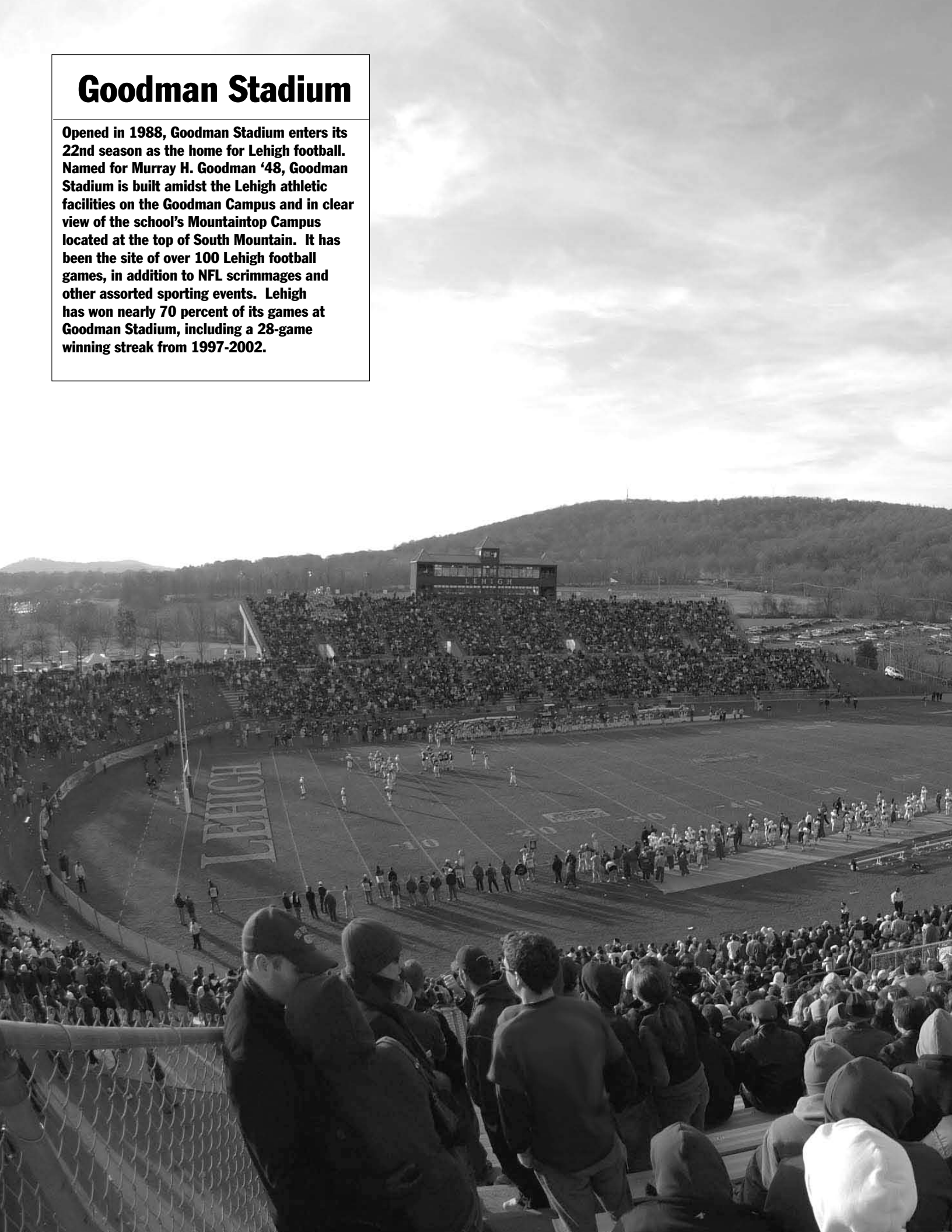

Goodman Stadium

Opened in 1988, Goodman Stadium enters its 22nd season as the home for Lehigh football. Named for Murray H. Goodman '48, Goodman Stadium is built amidst the Lehigh athletic facilities on the Goodman Campus and in clear view of the school's Mountaintop Campus located at the top of South Mountain. It has been the site of over 100 Lehigh football games, in addition to NFL scrimmages and other assorted sporting events. Lehigh has won nearly 70 percent of its games at Goodman Stadium, including a 28-game winning streak from 1997-2002.

LEHIGH ATHLETICS FACILITIES



Welch Fitness Center

STABLER ARENA

Originally built in 1979 Stabler Arena has undergone many improvements in order to better facilitate the Lehigh basketball and wrestling programs. In 1998-99 a new basketball floor was installed along with two new scoreboards. New Lehigh locker rooms and a team room were added in 2004. Arguably one of the top facilities of its size on the east coast, Stabler boasts a "big-time" basketball and wrestling atmosphere.

GRACE HALL

Grace Hall is home to Lehigh's nationally ranked wrestling and women's volleyball programs. The legendary facility, fondly known as "The Snake Pit," underwent a substantial renovation and reopened in November of 2003. The building's lower level, renamed Leeman-Turner Arena at Grace Hall, seats 2,200 and is also used for intramural and club sports, concerts and lectures. The upper level houses the Ulrich Student Center, including a movie theater, game room and mailboxes.

LEWIS TENNIS CENTER

This 30,000-square foot building houses four tennis courts, two locker rooms, two offices and training and storage areas. It

complements the existing 15 outdoor courts, and open space in Rauch Field House for intramural and recreational sports. It is part of Lehigh's long range plan for improving intercollegiate athletic, intramural, and recreational sports facilities.

WELCH FITNESS CENTER

The Welch Fitness Center offers students, faculty and staff the opportunity to work out in a spacious area with modern equipment in an enjoyable atmosphere. Free weights, body master machines, treadmills, stationary bicycles, Hammer machines, ellipticals, and stair climbers are among the equipment that is available for use by the Lehigh community. During the winter of 2008, the Welch Fitness Center added new equipment from Star Trac Fitness Company, including cardiovascular and strength equipment. Aerobic and anaerobic training programs that take into account nutrition, strength, flexibility, and cardiovascular elements are designed for any individual seeking guidance. In addition, supervised workouts, machine orientation, and the teaching of proper techniques are included in this all-encompassing fitness program.

TAYLOR GYM

In addition to Welch Fitness Center, Taylor Gym also houses the Roger S. Penske Lehigh Athletics Hall of Fame, two pools, squash, racquetball, basketball and volleyball courts and the Lane Climbing Wall. The overall renovation project of Taylor Gym included the Meerwarth Lobby and the Spiegel Fitness Center Mezzanine. Taylor houses offices for the athletics department staff, including the sports medicine area.

A. HAIGH CUNDEY VARSITY HOUSE

Cuneday Varsity House is located next to the football practice fields, it houses the team's primary locker room, as well as team meeting

ULRICH SPORTS COMPLEX

The Ulrich Sports Complex is a lighted, dual-field complex that possesses both natural grass and artificial turf fields. The lighted facility is home to the soccer and lacrosse programs and has seating for 1,200 fans. Named after Lehigh trustee Ron Ulrich, the complex opened in the fall of 2001. A team of students from various majors at Lehigh conceptually designed the complex. The students were participants in Lehigh's distinctive ILE (Integrated Learning Experience) program and received credits and a grade for their performance in the academic course. In the fall of 2008, the facility underwent a face lift with the installation of a brand-new, state-of-the-art synthetic sport field called TigerTurf. This field is known as Frank A. Banko '41 Field.

GOODMAN CROSS COUNTRY/TRACK

Circling the Goodman Campus is one of the nation's finest cross country courses. The grass trails wind through the campus' various athletic fields with South Mountain providing a picturesque background. The course hosted the NCAA Cross Country Championships in 1979, 1983 and 1993. Construction of an outdoor track was completed in 1995 and completes running facilities that

rooms and a state-of-the-art weight room. Renovations to the Varsity House were completed in the summer of 2002, including the addition of a 5,000-square foot weight room, new sports medicine area, locker rooms and meeting areas. The Cundey Varsity House is also the primary workout facility of the Philadelphia Eagles during their annual summer training camp held at Lehigh.

WHITEHEAD FOOTBALL PRACTICE FIELDS

The Whitehead Football Practice Complex is named in honor of legendary Lehigh football coach John C. Whitehead. The spacious practice fields are located behind the Cundey Varsity House and adjacent to the outdoor track and tennis courts. The complex allows Lehigh to keep the Goodman Stadium playing surface in excellent condition during the season. The complex is used extensively by the Philadelphia Eagles during their summer training camp held at Lehigh.

MULVIHILL GOLF LEARNING CENTER

The Mulvihill Golf Learning Center is located on the north side of the Goodman Campus. Ed Ruiz, the Founder and President of Ed Ruiz's Speed Advantage Training Inc., has a long and varied background in the field of strength, speed, agility and conditioning. Ed was a Pennsylvania state competitor as a high school athlete in the 400 meter dash, and later went onto compete as a collegiate sprinter. Ruiz finished his competitive running career by winning both the 100 meter dash and 400 meter dash championships in the Pennsylvania State Keystone Games.

As a track and field coach, Ruiz was 134-0 leading the Girls Track and Field program at Palisades High School. Ruiz's girls' teams won 15 consecutive league championships, a state championship, and set a United States record for consecutive victories. His Boys Track and Field teams were 118-15-1 during his fifteen years as a head high school track and field coach. In total, his athletes earned over fifty medals in the sprinting and jumping events in state competition. Those great performances led to Ruiz being named the Pennsylvania State Track and Field Coach of the Year in 1989 and 1997.

In addition, Ruiz was a head high school football coach for seven years. In his third season at the helm he saw his Palisades High School football team attain its first winning season after seventeen consecutive losing years.

Ed Ruiz's background in the field of speed and strength development was greatly enhanced by his graduate studies in the former Soviet Union at the Soviet Sport Institute during the 1980's. He brought a number of Eastern bloc training secrets back to the Lehigh Valley following that trip, and has used his vast knowledge in the field to help numerous athletes achieve goals that were unimaginable.

Ruiz is currently the Lehigh University Strength, Speed and Conditioning Coach. He and Eric Markovcy handle the year round training for 14 varsity program and travel to every game with the Lehigh Football program.

Eric Markovcy graduated Suma Cum Laude from East Stroudsburg University with undergraduate and graduate degrees in Exercise Physiology. He now aspires to pursue his Doctorate. THE LEHIGH-LAFAYETTE RIVALRY

In the history of Lehigh-Lafayette, eight football classes at Lehigh have not lost or been tied against Lafayette during their four years. In addition, three classes have been unbeaten against Lafayette with three wins and one tie (1965, 1964, and 1891).

Lehigh earned an emotionally charged 31-15 victory over its archrivals in Easton in 2008, as the Mountain Hawks rallied around a spirited crowd to defeat the Leopards. Sophomore defensive back John Kennedy made the play of the day, picking off a pass and sprinting 94-yards to pay dirt with just 4:27 remaining to clinch Lehigh's first road win versus Lafayette since 2000. Fellow sophomore J.B. Clark earned the game's MVP award after the quarterback completed 12-of-22 passes for 201 yards and a pair of touchdowns, while senior captain Tim Diamond led a ferocious defensive effort with 11 tackles. The Mountain Hawks "D" sacked the Leopard quarterbacks eight times, including a career-best three-and-a-half from All-American Brian Jackson '09.

In the clash at Goodman Stadium in 2003, senior running back Jermaine Pugh gained 265 total yards and sprinted 79 yards on a screen pass for a touchdown as the Mountain Hawks earned a 30-10 victory at Goodman Stadium. The win marked Lehigh's seventh consecutive win over its rival at Goodman.

In 2000, Matt Salvaterra became only the third defensive player to earn Lehigh-Lafayette MVP honors since the award was initiated in 1960. Lehigh linebacker Art Renfro won the award in 1967 and Lehigh defensive end Mike Crowe won the award in 1980.

The 133rd and 132nd games mirrored each other in that Lehigh overcame double-digit deficits to pull out wins. 1997 marked the third straight comeback as Lehigh trailed 21-0 at one stage before rallying for a 43-31 win. In 1996 Quarterback Phil Stambaugh became the only Lehigh freshman to win the rivalry's MVP award.

The 131st clash may go down as the most exciting and dramatic of all thanks in part to the fact that it was the first one to go to overtime. The extra sessions were made possible thanks to a Patriot League rule created in the summer of 1995. Following a scoreless first possession of overtime, Lehigh broke the tie when Brian Klingerman caught Bob Aylsworth's pass with one hand in the back of the end zone as darkness fell on Goodman Stadium. The miraculous catch all but clinched a 37-30 win and the league title for Lehigh, which trailed 30-14 midway through the fourth quarter.

Only once in the 141-game history of college football's most-played rivalry have Lehigh and Lafayette not met in Easton or Bethlehem. In 1891 the teams played in Wilkes-Barre, Pa., before 3,000 spectators. A newspaper report stated: "... by far the largest crowd that ever witnessed a football game in Wilkes-Barre, and the cheering of the students seemed to startle the natives." That was one of three Lehigh-Lafayette games that year — Lehigh won them all.

Aaron Crane of Lafayette threw the first scoring pass in this series in 1909. The Leopards, who used it only once all season, called the play a "circus double" forward pass. Oddly enough, Crane was a tackle. His throw helped Lafayette win, 21-0. Lehigh's first scoring pass was fired by V.J. (Pat) Pazzetti Jr., in 1912. Pazzetti was an All-American quarterback and is a member of college football's Hall of Fame. Lehigh won that contest 10-0.

In 1918, as recorded by various observers, Lehigh halfback Raymond B. "Snooks" Dowd completed a 115-yard touchdown run. According to the story, Dowd ran the wrong way, circled his own goalposts, and went the right way 100 yards to score.

The longest official play in the rivalry occurred in 1898 when J.C. Ross of Lehigh returned a punt 100 yards for a touchdown. Playing fields were 110 yards long at that time.

Lehigh-Lafayette football games have been postponed only twice. The first postponement occurred in 1904 because of the death of Dr. Henry S. Drown, president of Lehigh. The only other postponement was in 1963 when the game was moved from November 23 to November 30 following the assassination of President John F. Kennedy.

Lehigh ran up the largest point-production in the Lehigh-Lafayette football series in 1917 when the Engineers won, 78-0. The largest Lafayette margin came in 1944 with a 64-0 win. The most points ever scored by both teams combined occurred in 1988 when a total of 97 points were rung up in Lafayette's 52-45 victory.

The only break in the series occurred in 1896. Two games were scheduled, but a dispute arose over the eligibility of Lafayette halfback George Barclay and Lehigh declined to play. Casper Whitney, a leading football authority of the day, upheld Lehigh's decision. Barclay invented the first football helmet for an earlier game with Penn that year.

Lehigh and Lafayette have never played to a scoreless tie. The lowest score in the long series came in 1922 when Lafayette avoided a 0-0 deadlock when "Botts" Brunner kicked a field goal with 45 seconds remaining. Brunner is the only man to star for both Lehigh and Lafayette. In 1916 he had a field goal in the 50th game of the series, in Easton, helping Lehigh to a 16-0 triumph. In 1921, after stints at Yale and Pennsylvania in the years when true free-agency was the rule, he came back in a Lafayette uniform to help win the annual contest, 28-6 for the Leopards.

Lehigh unveiled its "fumblerooski" play in the 1989 game at Goodman Stadium with right guard Brian Hensel running 10 yards for a touchdown just before intermission. It was a designed play with center Jarrod Johnson laying the ball on the ground behind him as everyone took off on what appeared to be a right end sweep. Hensel scooped it

up, ambled through a gigantic hole off left guard and moved untouched across the goal line. This didn't save Lehigh from a 36-21 defeat, but it warmed the hearts of anonymous offensive linemen everywhere.

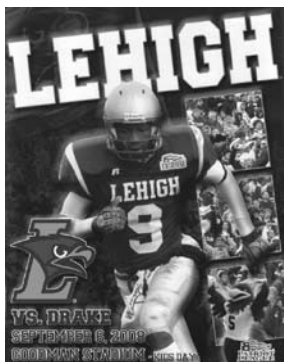

BETHLEHEM, Pa. – The Mountain Hawks got off to a fast start at Goodman Stadium, and it paid off as the rain from former Tropical Storm Hanna forced both teams into a defensive battle. Lehigh jumped out to a 13-0 lead in the first quarter and never looked back in a 19-0 win against the Drake Bulldogs in front of 4,706 fans on opening day in Bethlehem. Sophomore quarterback J.B. Clark threw two touchdowns on 9-of-12 passing for 146 yards. Senior running back Matt McGowan controlled the ball for Lehigh once it had the lead and kept the clock rolling with 173 yards on 39 carries to put the game away.

Trying to get Clark going early, the Mountain Hawks called for a quick screen to Mike Fitzgerald on the left sideline. Fitzgerald made the rest happen with his feet, breaking tackles and hurdling defenders before cutting back all the way to the right side and taking the ball to the Drake 13-yard line. Five plays later, Clark threw his first touchdown pass of the season, a two-yard strike to Troy Healion in the back right corner of the end zone. Clark proved on the next drive that he could do more than just throw the ball short. Starting on Lehigh's 15-yard line, Clark dropped back and found a wide-open Sekou Yansane streaking down the right sideline for an 85-yard touchdown. The score was the sixth longest touchdown pass in school history, and the second longest all-time at Goodman Stadium. Lehigh padded its lead with a Jason Leo field goal with 6:54 remaining in the third quarter. Leo would add a 24-yard field goal in the fourth quarter to give Lehigh a 19-0 lead and put the game away for good.

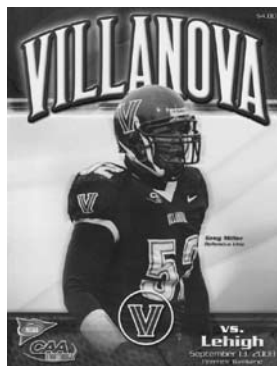

VILLANOVA, Pa. – Lehigh's defense hung tough with No. 21 Villanova, but the full-scholarship Wildcats wore the Mountain Hawks down and pulled away for a 33-14 win at Villanova Stadium on a hot, humid afternoon. Villanova ran 82 plays on the day – 16 more than Lehigh, and scored 20 points in the second quarter, which proved to be too much to overcome for the Mountain Hawks.

Both teams showed the strength of their defense in the opening quarter as neither offense could muster any points in the first 15 minutes. Villanova began the second quarter with good field position, but again the Mountain Hawks stiffened and forced the Wildcats into a fourth-down scenario. A 44-yard field goal by Joe Marcoux with 14:12 remaining in the opening half gave Nova a 3-0 lead. Lehigh appeared to have taken the lead on a long pass from J.B. Clark to senior Mike Fitzgerald, but a holding penalty negated the touchdown. On the very next play Osayi Osunde showed great hands, picking off a short, quick pass from Clark and sprinted to pay dirt, putting the home team in front 10-0 at the 11:38 mark of the quarter.

A second field goal from Marcoux with 6:07 left in the half put Lehigh in a 13-0 hole, but on the Wildcats next possession, Tim Diamond forced a fumble, scooped the ball and ran 32 yards to set the Mountain Hawks up with a first-and-goal at the three-yard line. Matt McGowan then scored his first touchdown of the season on the very next play and Lehigh was within six with 4:24 on the clock. Villanova responded with a touchdown however, as Aaron Ball scored from a yard out to put the home team up by a score of 20-7 which is how the score remained as the teams retired for halftime. After ten third quarter points put Villanova ahead 30-7, Lehigh was able to cut into its deficit as Clark found senior Sekou Yansane from six yards out for a Mountain Hawks touchdown that made it a 16-point game with 12:28 left in the contest. Villanova answered once again however as Marcoux knocked through his career-high fourth field goal of the afternoon to give the Wildcats a 33-14 lead with 5:38 left on the clock.

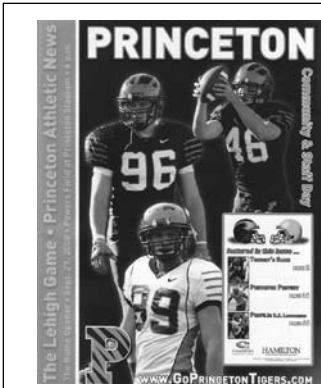

PRINCETON, N.J. – Lehigh's defense did all it could to give the Mountain Hawks a chance to win, but a 32-yard field goal by Connor Loudon as time expired lifted Princeton to a 10-7 win at Princeton Stadium in front of 8,836 in attendance. Lehigh was stopped short on a fourth-and-one play with 55 seconds remaining, giving the ball to the Tigers on their own 33. Princeton then completed a 46-yard pass up the right side, which led to the eventual game-winning kick.

Following a 46-yard run by Jordan Culbreath, Princeton found itself inside the Lehigh five-yard line, but the Mountain Hawks defense held strong once and forced the Tigers into a field goal attempt. Junior Heath Brickner broke through the line however, blocked the attempt and classmate Al Pierce picked the ball up and rumbled down to the Princeton seven-yard line. Two plays later sophomore J.B. Clark found senior Mike Fitzgerald in the back of the end zone for a touchdown and the Mountain Hawks went up 7-0 with 7:18 remaining in the opening half.

The Tigers tied the game at seven on a one-yard run by Culbreath with 4:57 to go in the half, which capped a five-play, 68-yard drive. Both teams had one final possession but neither could muster any points and so they retired for halftime knotted at seven.

Neither team scored in the third quarter as both defenses were on display. Lehigh was able to push the ball into Tiger territory on several occasions in the second half, but could not muster any points.

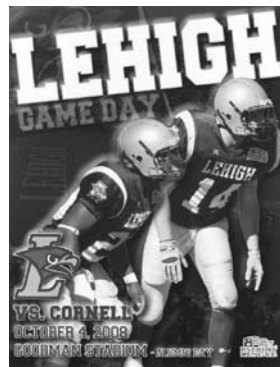

BETHLEHEM, Pa. – With Lehigh and Cornell swapping the lead back and forth throughout the final quarter at Goodman Stadium, it was all about who had the ball last. Cornell quarterback Nathan Ford was the last player to take a snap from the Lehigh 20 yard line, and he made it count by throwing a touchdown pass to Jesse Baker for the 25-24 victory in front of 10,460 fans. The Big Red had to earn the final touchdown with a 17-play, 78-yard drive for the game-winning score. Cornell had to convert on three fourth-down situations in its final possession, including the final play, which came on fourth and six.

In a game dominated by defense and special teams for three quarters, both offenses exploded in the final quarter, scoring two touchdowns each on the final four drives. Lehigh scored first in the fourth quarter on a 50-yard touchdown pass from J.B. Clark to Mike Fitzgerald, which gave the Mountain Hawks an 18-13 lead after the failed two-point conversion attempt. Cornell dropped two safeties into coverage deep, but Fitzgerald found the crease between them and caught the wide open pass for the big play.

Cornell answered less than two minutes later with a five-play, 64-yard touchdown drive. Ford did his own job of splitting the defense with a pass over the middle to Baker for the 15-yard touchdown. Another failed two-point attempt left the score at 19-18 in favor of the Big Red. Clark led the Mountain Hawks immediately down the field for a 10-play drive that spanned 73 yards in 4:17. Clark finished the drive himself with a 10-yard designed quarterback sweep. He appeared to be stopped behind the line of scrimmage before breaking free down the right sideline for the touchdown to give Lehigh a 24-19 lead, setting the stage for the dramatic finish.

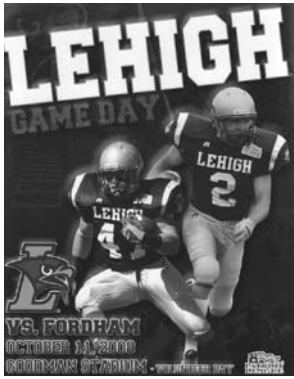

BETHLEHEM, Pa. – Sophomore quarterback J.B. Clark led the Mountain Hawks to a 45-24 victory against defending Patriot League champion Fordham in what was by far the best statistical game of his career at Lehigh. Clark threw for 296 yards on 18-of-27 passing in the win. The sophomore connected for four touchdowns through the air and added another on the ground while not throwing an interception for the second-consecutive week. Lehigh jumped out to an early 9-0 lead in the first quarter, which gave the Mountain Hawks fans hope after consecutive last-second losses to Princeton and Cornell. After a 38-yard field goal from Jason Leo put Lehigh on the board, an 18-yard punt by Cameron Dean gave the Mountain Hawks tremendous field position on the 26-yard line. Clark took advantage of the opportunity three plays later, when he hit Mike Fitzgerald in stride for a 24-yard touchdown pass over the middle to give the Brown and White a 9-0 lead to end the first quarter.

The Mountain Hawks opened up the playbook in the second quarter against the Rams, throwing the ball 18 times for 203 yards in the half. The highlight play of the half came on fourth and one from the Fordham 42-yard line. Matt McGowan took the handoff on what was shaping out to be a short loss, but he stopped a yard from the line and fired a pass to tight end Troy Healion for a 34-yard gain. The Mountain Hawks seized the momentum and scored on an eight-yard pass from Clark to Nick Johnson to take a 16-7 lead with 7:47 remaining in the second quarter. After four-consecutive touchdown drives by the two teams combined, Lehigh finally forced a stop in its own end at the end of the second period. Adam Danko's 35-yard field goal at the end of the half pulled the rams to within 23-17 heading into the locker room.

The Rams took their first lead of the game in the third quarter when John Skelton found Asa Lucas in the back left corner of the end zone for the seven-yard score. However the lead was short lived, as the Mountain Hawks drove right back down the field, led by a 50 yard pass from Clark to Sekou Yansane to the Fordham seven. Clark ran up the middle on the next play on a designed quarterback draw for the touchdown, and Lehigh never looked back from there.

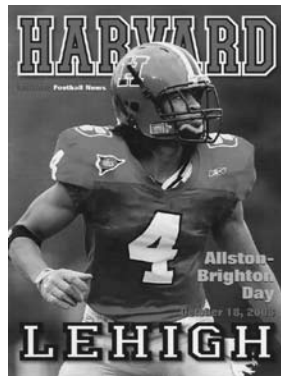

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. – Harvard linebacker Glenn Dorris recovered a Lehigh fumble on the Crimson's 19 yard line with just 1:07 to play, and Harvard was able to run out the clock to hang on for a 27-24 victory over the visiting Mountain Hawks at Harvard Stadium. Lehigh scored 17 second-half points and looked poised to go in for the winning score, but the untimely turnover prevented that from happening.

Lehigh got on the board for the first time when senior Jason Leo booted a 30-yard field goal with 14 seconds left in the first making the score 7-3 in favor of Harvard. The Mountain Hawks score was aided by a beautifully called fake punt in which junior Matt Cohen took the snap and made his way up the left side line for 25 yards, setting the Brown and White up at the Crimson 17-yard line. Harvard tacked on three more points on a 32-yard field goal by Patrick Long, making the score 10-3 with 8:18 remaining in the half, and on Lehigh's next possession, a 21-yard interception return by Glenn Dorris put the Mountain Hawks in a 14-point hole at the 7:18 mark.

J.B. Clark hooked up with Mike Fitzgerald for a 21-yard touchdown pass with 3:47 on the clock, but Harvard responded with a 28-yard strike from Pizzotti to Matt Luft making the score 24-10 in favor of the home team, which is how the score remained until halftime.

The Mountain Hawks received the ball first in the second half and strung together a strong 14-play, 75-yard drive that ended with a seven-yard touchdown pass from Clark to Sekou Yansane making the score 24-17 in favor of Harvard with 8:51 remaining in the third.

Another field goal by Long, this one from 23-yards out pushed Harvard's lead back to ten, 27-17 with just over one minute left in the third. The ball changed hands several times over the course of the next few minutes, but following the first career interception by sophomore defensive back Casey Eldemire and a nice return, Lehigh marched 50-yards down the field and pulled within three points on a nine-yard touchdown pass from Clark to Fitzgerald at the 6:27 mark of the fourth quarter.

From there, Lehigh's defense held strong – thanks in part to two key sacks from Cohen and Diamond – forcing Harvard to punt the ball back to the Mountain Hawks. Lehigh methodically moved the ball nearly 45-yards into field goal range, before Harvard's Matt Curtis knocked the ball free from Clark with just 67 seconds to play.

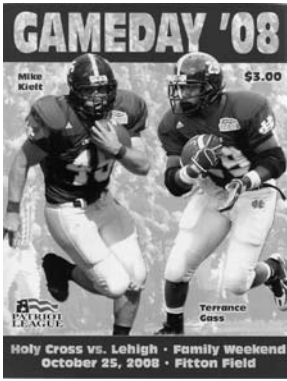

Trailing 21-nothing, Lehigh battled back to tie the score in the third quarter, before the Crusaders put together the game's final two scores. Junior Brien Ruyak pulled down a career-high six receptions for 86 yards and one touchdown, while classmate Al Pierce returned an interception 37 yards for a score as Lehigh won its eighth straight game over the Hoyas. Georgetown did not score after the first quarter.

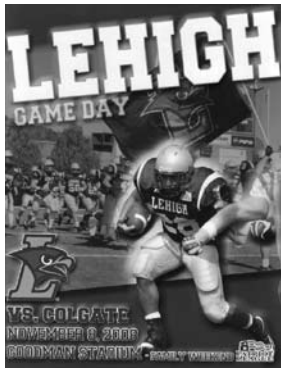

BETHLEHEM, Pa. - Colgate quarterback Greg Sullivan hit Pat Simonds on a seven yard touchdown pass with 2:28 to play to lift the 24th-ranked Raiders to a come-from-behind 34-33 win over Lehigh in front of 10,841 on Family Weekend at Goodman Stadium. The game winning score capped a 10-minute, 47-yard drive for the Colgate offense. Sophomore J.B. Clark threw for a career-high 338 yards and four touchdowns, to lead the Mountain Hawks, who trailed 21-6 midway through the second quarter, but rallied to take a 12 point lead halfway through the third quarter.

Lehigh received the opening kickoff, but a fumble on the Mountain Hawks third play from scrimmage set Colgate up at the Lehigh 19 yard line. Four plays later, Sullivan scored on a two yard run to put the visitors up 7-0. It took just under three minutes for the Mountain Hawks to answer however, as Lehigh drove 67 yards in eight plays, as Clark found senior tight end Troy Healion in the back of the end zone for a four yard touchdown, Healion's second of the season. A missed extra point left the score at 7-6 Colgate halfway through the period.

The Raiders extended their lead late in the opening quarter when Sullivan connected with Simonds on a 79-yard scoring strike, putting Colgate up 14-6 at the end of one quarter.

In the second quarter the teams exchanged turnovers early and Colgate extended its lead on a five yard touchdown run by Nate Eachus, which capped a six play, 65-yard drive. The Mountain Hawks cut their deficit back to eight with just over six and a half minutes to play in the half. Clark tossed his second touchdown of the day, this one to Sekou Yansane on a post route, which made the score 21-13 Raiders. After the Lehigh defense forced a three-and-out, the Mountain Hawks put together a six play drive and pulled within one at halftime as senior Adam Watson powered into the end zone from six yards out.

Colgate went three-and-out on its first possession of the second half, and Lehigh responded with a six play, 53-yard drive as the Mountain Hawks took their first lead on Clark's third touchdown of the day, a 23 yard pass to Mike Fitzgerald. An interception from sophomore John Kennedy gave the Mountain Hawks the ball back and five plays later Clark and Fitzgerald hooked up again on a 39-yard strike to extend the Lehigh lead to 33-21. Simonds caught his second touchdown pass from Sullivan to bring the Raiders within five after three quarters.

Following the go-ahead score by Colgate, Lehigh had one final drive to try and win the game, but Yansane was ruled out of bounds on a fourth down catch along the far sideline.

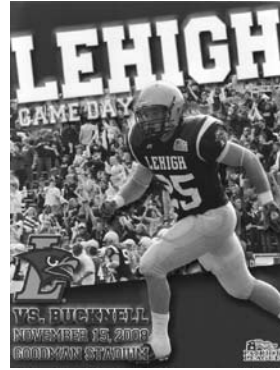

BETHLEHEM, Pa. - The Mountain Hawks have had their fair share of narrow losses in 2008, losing four games by three points or less this season. So the Brown and White decided not to leave its game against Bucknell to chance, jumping out to an early lead and pulling away for a 31-15 victory in the home finale at Goodman Stadium.

Just before the start of the game, the rain lingering over the Lehigh Valley cleared up and the Mountain Hawks took advantage of the suddenly-pleasant weather with a quick and efficient scoring drive. Craig Zurn put Lehigh in great field position with a 60-yard kickoff return that gave the Mountain Hawks the ball on the Bucknell 40-yard line. Six plays later, after one fourth down conversion, the Mountain Hawks hit pay dirt on a 16-yard run by Jay Campbell to take the early lead with 11:38 remaining in the first quarter.

The Bison helped Lehigh's cause with a key turnover on the very next possession. Trying to execute a wide receiver sweep to Marlon Woods, the Bison botched the exchange and the ball fell to the Goodman Stadium grass. Matt Cohen scooped up the fumble and returned it 38 yards for the score, and Lehigh had seized a 14-0 lead just more than six minutes into the game.

The Mountain Hawks would return the favor to the Bison later in the quarter. With Lehigh facing fourth down from its own 20, Jason Leo's punt was blocked by Woods and skidded back into the Brown and White end zone. Leo had no choice but to kick the ball out of bounds for the safety, making the score 14-2.

Both offenses stalled for the rest of the first half, as the score remained the same until the Lehigh defense set up the offense with another scoring opportunity in the third quarter. Back at his own 26-yard line, C.J. Hopson looked for a receiver down field, but the Bison quarterback found Cohen instead, who returned the interception 20 yards to the Bucknell 11-yard line.

Three plays later, Lehigh earned a comfortable 19-point lead on a seven-yard pass from J.B. Clark to Mike Fitzgerald. Clark dropped back and held in the pocket as it started to collapse as he looked for an open receiver. The sophomore signal caller started to run down field looking for a lane before he looked up and found Fitzgerald in the end zone. The Bison made one last effort to keep the score close in the third quarter when they executed an 11-play scoring drive that went for 72 yards. Hopson found Shaun Pasternak in the end zone for the seven-yard score. But the Mountain Hawks answered quickly to take back the momentum and end all hopes of a Bucknell comeback. John Kennedy set Lehigh up again with a 35-yard kick return that got the drive started on the Bucknell 49. On the next play from scrimmage Clark found Sekou Yansane streaking up the seam for a 37-yard gain. Three plays later, Clark bulled his way across the goal line on a quarterback sneak from one yard out to give the Mountain Hawks the 28-9 advantage.

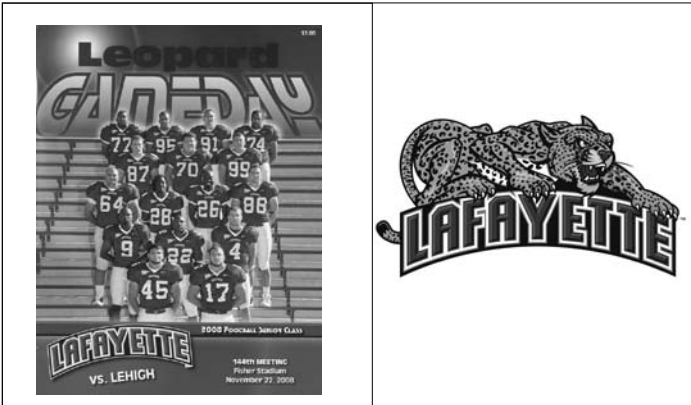

Easton, Pa. - Sophomore John Kennedy picked off a Rob Curley pass and sprinted 94-yards for a touchdown with 4:27 remaining that sealed a 31-15 victory for Lehigh over archrival Lafayette in front of 15,908 in attendance at Fisher Stadium. Sophomore quarterback J.B. Clark finished the day 12-of-22 through the air for 201 yards and two touchdowns and was named the game's MVP, becoming the first Lehigh sophomore QB since Hall of Famer Marty Horn '86 in 1983 to garner Most Valuable Player honors. The Lehigh defense registered a season-best eight sacks, led by All-American Brian Jackson who sacked the Leopard quarterbacks three-and-a-half times.

A Heath Brickner interception on Lafayette's first possession set Lehigh up with good field position and the Mountain Hawks capitalized with a 40-yard field goal by Jason Leo to take a 3-0 lead with 10:58 to go in the first. The Lehigh defense forced a punt which was knocked down due to the wind, setting Lehigh up at the Leopard 40-yard line. Following a key third down conversion in which Matt McGowan gained two yards for the first down, Clark dropped back in the pocket and found a wide open Mike Fitzgerald who made a nice move to avoid a Lafayette defender and scored his 11th touchdown of the season, putting the Brown and White in front 10-0 at the 7:43 mark.

Lafayette got on the board for the first time on a 62-yard rush by Shaun Adair on a reverse play in which the senior made a great juke to the inside and then hurdled a second defender on his way to pay dirt. That score made it a 10-7 game with 5:34 to go in the first half.

Early in the second quarter an errant Lehigh snap gave Lafayette two more points by way of a safety, which made the score 10-9. The Leopards then took their first lead of the afternoon on a 34-yard field goal by Davis Rodriguez with 9:50 remaining in the first half. The Lehigh defense began to make life tough for the Lafayette offense and got the ball back for its "O" towards the end of the half. The Mountain Hawks then put together a crisp, six play, 85-yard drive that ended with a 14-yard Clark to Nick Johnson touchdown pass that put the Brown and White in front 17-12 with 3:45 remaining in the half.

Lehigh received the ball first in the second half, but was unable to do much with it, and so Lafayette took over with junior quarterback Rob Curley now under center. The Leopards responded with a long 15-play drive that covered 71 yards and chewed up 9:05 on the clock. The drive resulted in only three points however, as Rodriguez booted a 22-yard field goal bringing the home team to within two points with 3:13 left on the third quarter clock.

The fourth quarter started slow, but Lehigh seized momentum on a beautiful 36-yard pass from Clark to Sekou Yansane on third-and-seven that set the Mountain Hawks up with a first-and-goal at the one-yard line. Senior Adam Watson plowed his way into the end zone two plays later, putting Lehigh in front by nine, 24-15 with 7:11 remaining on the clock. Lafayette was driving down the field and seemed poised for a score of its own that would have made the final minutes interesting, but Kennedy stepped in front of a Leopard receiver, picked off the pass and sprinted to pay dirt, sending all the Lehigh faithful at Fisher Stadium into a frenzy.

The Mountain Hawks have finished ranked in the top twenty-five six out of the last 11 years, and topped out with a final ranking of number 5 in 2001 after advancing to the second round of the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs.



The 2009 NCAA Championship Sub-division playoffs will get under way on November 28th at the home sites of the higher seeds. The quarterfinals and semifinals will be played at campus sites on December 5th and 12th respectively, while the Championship game will be held on December 18th in Chattanooga, Tennessee. Portions of the quarterfinals along with the semifinals and national championship will be televised live on the ESPN family of networks. The host city will be announced at a later date.

The NCAA FCS Playoffs consist of a 16-team, single elimination tournament. The field of 16 is made up of eight conference champions and eight at-large bids. The eight conferences with automatic bids are

the Atlantic 10, Big Sky, Gateway Collegiate Athletic, Mid-Eastern Athletic, Mid-Eastern Athletic, Ohio Valley, Patriot, Southern, and Southland.

In its second decade of combining academic and athletic excellence, the Patriot League sponsors championships in 23 men and women's sports. Initially started as an NCAA Division I-AA football conference in 1986, the Patriot League became an all-sport conference in 1990 and includes American, Army, Bucknell, Colgate, Holy Cross, Lafayette, Lehigh and Navy as full members, and Fordham and Georgetown as associate members. These institutions are among the oldest and most prestigious in the nation and their alumni have, and continue to play leadership roles in shaping our country.

Since 1998, the Patriot League has ranked first each year among all Division I conferences awarding athletic aid in the NCAA Graduation Rate Report. The League finished at the top spot with 96 percent of its teams reporting a graduation rate of 85 percent or higher in the most recent data. In addition, 76 Patriot League teams earned NCAA Academic Performance Program Public Recognition Awards after posting academic progress rate scores in the top 10 percent of all squads in their respective sports.

The Patriot League's mission is simple, to provide successful competitive athletic experiences while maintaining high academic standards, and to prepare its student-athletes to be leaders in society.

During the 2008-09 academic year, Patriot League student-athletes and teams have accomplished the following:

*14 student-athletes earned ESPN The Magazine/CoSIDA Academic All-America honors, including First-Team selections for: Army's Elizabeth Betterbed, Sarah Goss, Briana Stremick Scott Rosenshein and Kevin Kumlien; Navy's Lizzie Barnes and Kelly Zahalka; and Colgate's Daniel Kerley.

*61 student-athletes were recognized as ESPN The Magazine/CoSIDA Academic All-District recipients, with 45 on the First Team.

*Bucknell won its 15th overall and women's Patriot League Presidents' Cup trophy, while Army won the men's trophy for the first time since 2005.

*Holy Cross men's soccer senior Jerry Dickinson was awarded a Fulbright Grant to work and study in South Africa.

*Navy's Kelly Zahalka earned her third Academic All-America selection from CoSIDA, and was also named to the USA Today First-Team All-Academic squad. She also earned both a Truman and Marshall Scholarship.

*Navy's Lizzie Barnes was one of 58 student-athletes nationally to receive an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship and was also a First-Team All-Senior All-America selection.

*Army became the first Patriot League team to advance to the finals of the NCAA Baseball Regional, and also the first to win two regional games by beating Texas State and Boston College.

*Lehigh advanced to the finals of the NCAA Softball Regional, knocking off Florida A & M and Texas A & M in elimination games before falling to top-seed Florida.

*Army's Ben Koenigsfeld became the first baseball student-athlete to earn a pair of First-Team All-League honors in the same season, and also the first to win both the Pitcher of the Year and Tournament Most Valuable Player award in the same year.

*Colgate's Nick Hennessey and Steve Jonas and Holy Cross' Brett McDermott all signed NFL free agent contracts.

*Hennessey became the first Patriot Leaguer since 2004 to earn consensus FCS All-America honors with his selection by each of the four major organizations.

*The Lehigh women's basketball team was one of 14 NCAA Tournament participants to record a perfect graduation rate.

*Colgate's Jordan Scott finished his career as the all-time Division I leader in carries (1,240), and fifth in FCS history while breaking the Patriot League record in rushing yardage (5,621).

*Scott became the eighth player in FCS history and first Patriot League with four 1,000-yard rushing seasons in his career.

*Holy Cross quarterback Dominic Randolph led the FCS in passing yards, total offense and completions per game in 2008, while also finishing as a finalist for the Walter Payton Award.

*Army men's soccer goalkeeper A.J. Glubzinski was a First-Team All-Senior All-America selection and Lowe's Senior CLASS award finalist.

*Navy's Amy Watson competed in the NCAA Cross Country Championship.

*American's Irene Schickhardt and Christine Fingerhuth were both named Longstreth/NFHCA Division I Field Hockey All-Americans.

*American hosted the first and second rounds of the NCAA Division I Volleyball Championship.

*Navy's Erica Ziel became the fourth female student-athlete to earn the Patriot League Scholar-Athlete award in Cross Country, Indoor and Outdoor Track and Field in the same academic year.

*Twelve Patriot League student-athletes, including seven from Lehigh, received Arthur Ashe Jr. Sports Scholars awards.

*Bucknell rowing senior Page Kannor, Army baseball sophomore Kevin McKague and Lehigh softball senior Lisa Sweeney each appeared in Sports Illustrated's "Faces in the Crowd".

*Navy junior Adam Meyer received an All-America honor by finishing in fifth place in the consolation final at the 2009 NCAA Men's Swimming and Diving Championship. Erik Hunter and Jonathan Galinski also represented Navy at the event.

*Colgate senior Emily Murphy and Navy juniors Thuy-Mi Dinh and Tara Chapmon all competed at the NCAA Women's Swimming and Diving Championship.

*Bucknell's Andrew Cohen set a record with a score of 208 at the Patriot League Golf Championship, and was named Golf World's College Player of the Week for his effort.

*American men's basketball senior Garrison Carr became the second player to win back-to-back Tournament Most Valuable Player honors, and set a League record with 302 career three-pointers.

*American men's basketball senior Derrick Mercer became the first player in League history to finish his career with at least 1,200 points and 500 assists, and was named an Honorable Mention AP All-America.

*Holy Cross men's basketball freshman R.J. Evans was named a Mid-Major Freshman All-American.

*Three Patriot League men's basketball players were named NABC All-District selections, the most for the League since 1995.

*The Patriot League finished 17th in the final women's basketball RPI rating, the highest mark in League annals. The eight teams also combined for the best non-League mark ever with a 61-59 record.

*Two Patriot League women's basketball teams made the postseason, with Lehigh in the NCAA Tournament and American in the WNIT.

*Four Patriot League men's lacrosse players were selected to the USILA All-America team, including Colgate's Brandon Corp on the First Team.

*Corp was also named MVP of the North-South All-Star game, was a finalist for the Tewaarton Trophy and became the highest-ever MLL Draft pick from a Patriot League school when he went fourth to the Boston Cannons.

*Corp and Navy's Andy Tormey were named to the All-Senior All-America team, with Tormey on the First Team.

*Army baseball freshman Zach Price and sophomores Joey Henshaw and Clint Moore each earned All-America recognition.

The storied tradition of Lehigh University football began in 1884. The program developed slowly for the Brown and White, as they were winless in their inaugural season, but the program went on to earn winning records in seven of the first ten years, and football games emerged as premier events at Lehigh. The Tom Keady coaching era (1912-1920) brought nine consecutive seasons of winning records as well as Lehigh's first All-American in quarterback Pat Pazzetti '13. In 1946, Lehigh's all-time winningest head coach, Bill Leckonby arrived on South Mountain and Lehigh Football again returned to national prominence. The 1950 squad finished the year unbeaten and untied led by the running back tandem of Dick Gabriel '51 and Dick Doyne '51. All-American quarterback Dan Nolan '58, who eventually went on to play in the National Football League, led the 1957 team to Lehigh's first Lambert Cup Championship, emblematic of the top Eastern team. Lehigh captured the Lambert Cup again in 1961 but the rest of the sixties were not as successful for the Engineers, though the team did beat Lafayette seven of ten years and tied the Leopards 6-6 in the 100th game of the most played series in 1964. Head Coach Fred Dunlap arrived in 1965 and began to turn the program back in a positive direction, accelerated by the recruitment of future NFL quarterback Kim McQuilken '74 in 1970. McQuilken's varsity career began in 1971 and along with future NFL center John Hill '72, and running back Jack Rizzo '72, Lehigh once again became an Eastern power. In the 1973 campaign the team won another Lambert Cup Championship and made Lehigh's first appearance in NCAA post-season play.

The 1970s ultimately proved to be a benchmark decade for Lehigh football. Lehigh won 76 games in the decade along with three Lambert Cups and a National Championship in 1977. Hall of Fame standouts including McQuilken '74, running back Rod Gardner '77, and in the late seventies, linebacker Jim McCormick '80 and the All-American quarterback and receiver tandem of Mike Rieker '78 and (future Cincinnati Bengal) Steve Kreider '79 led Lehigh on the field. John Whitehead followed Fred Dunlap as head coach and earned two

national coach of the year awards. In 1978, Lehigh joined the newly formed NCAA Division I-AA, and the following year played in the National Championship game, losing to Eastern Kentucky.

The 1980s brought continued program successes but also a decade of change. In 1986 Lehigh joined the Colonial League, which later became known as the Patriot League. The league was formed by institutions committed to playing high quality football without compromising high quality education. 1986 also brought the retirement of John Whitehead from coaching to accept a three year appointment as Athletics Director. Following the 1987 campaign, Taylor Stadium was vacated after 70 years to become the site for a new Business College building, and in 1988 Lehigh opened the doors to Goodman Stadium. The Lambert Cup returned to Lehigh in 1980 following an undefeated regular season. The stars of the 80s were All-American receivers Mark Yeager '81, Rennie Benn '86 (who led the nation in career catches, receiving yards, touchdown receptions, and points by a non-kicker), and Rob Varano '89, along with quarterbacks Larry Michalski '82, Marty Horn '86 and Mark McGowan '89, running back Erick Torain '91, and linebackers/linemen Bruce Rarig '81, John Shigo '84, Wes Walton '86, Dave Whitehead '86, Joe Uliana '87, and Mike Kosko '87.

Lehigh had long been recognized for offensive prowess but in the late 1980s and through the 1990s, that reputation became legend, first under head coach Hank Small and later under Kevin Higgins. Lehigh regularly led the league in offensive production and ranked among the nation's top offensive teams. Top receivers like Horace Hamm '92, Jason Cristino '93, Dave Cecchini '95, Brian Klingerman '96, and Deron Braswell '99 set multiple records on catches from quarterbacks like Todd Brunner '90, Glenn Kempa '92, Bob Aylsworth '96, and Phil Stambaugh '00. Lehigh won four Patriot League titles in the 90s. Much of Lehigh's success can be attributed to the balance provided by some talented running backs and an improved commitment to defense. Rabih Abdullah '97 broke the school record for career rushing yards with 3,696 yards and then Ronald Jean '00, standing at a mere 5'5", was named the 1999 Patriot League Player of the Year, and finished his career with 2,422 career yards on the ground. Ian Eason '00 and Nick Martucci '99 were among

the top defenders of the era. Lehigh finished the decade with 70 victories and the millennium with momentum, winning the last two Patriot League championships of the 90s.

With winning and success on the gridiron becoming the norm for the Mountain Hawks, Lehigh continued its drive and won the first two Patriot League championships of the new millennium, also winning first round playoff games in each of these two seasons. Lehigh was led by all-league performers, Brant Hall '02 and Josh Snyder '02. In 2000, the quarterback and receiver tandem led Lehigh to an undefeated regular season and in 2001, Snyder was named an All-American and the Patriot League Offensive Player of the Year following another unbeaten regular season. Hall was honored with First-Team Patriot League selections both years and set a career record for lowest interception rate. The 2001 squad, under head coach and national coach of the year Pete Lembo, also won Lehigh's seventh Lambert Cup, the second highest total of all Eastern football programs. Lehigh football success has continued well into the new decade, earning the 600th program win in 2004 and amassing a winning record in six seasons. The 2006 season brought continued promise under former assistant Andy Coen, named Lehigh's 28th head football coach in January 2006, who led Lehigh to a share of its eighth Patriot League crown in his first season.

LEHIGH IN THE NCAA PLAYOFFS

Lehigh made its playoff debut in 1973 with a 26-16 loss at Western Kentucky and dropped its second at Taylor Stadium in 1975, bowing to New Hampshire in the fourth quarter 35-21.

The 1977 squad broke through big time two years later, rolling over Massachusetts, Cal-Davis, and Jacksonville State in the Pioneer Bowl championship game (in Wichita Falls, Texas) by a 33-0 score. All three games were played on the road.

That national championship ended action against Division II competition. A new I-AA division made its debut the following year but Lehigh had to wait two years before being invited to rejoin the playoffs. Here's a look at how the postseason has gone at the I-AA level.

1979 – Following a bye, won at Murray State (Ky.), 28-9, before losing to Eastern Kentucky in the championship game in Orlando by a 30-7 score.

1980 – Lost to Eastern Kentucky again, this time in Taylor Stadium and in a much closer score, 23-20, in a first round game.

1998 – Lehigh pulled off an upset win at Richmond, 24-23, to advance to the second round at Massachusetts. The Minutemen avenged their 1977 upset at Lehigh's hands with a 27-21 win, halting Lehigh inside the ten yard line in the final minutes.

1999 – Lost at Hofstra 27-15 in the opening round.

2000 – Upset heavily favored Western Illinois on the road, 37-6, before falling at Delaware by a 47-22 score.

2001 – Avenged defeat in playoff opener at Hofstra two years earlier with an impressive victory in the first playoff attraction ever held in Goodman Stadium, 27-24 in an overtime thriller. The Mountain Hawks lost their next outing at eventual national runner-up Furman, 34-17.

2004 – Lehigh earned an at-large playoff berth, and the Mountain Hawks played host to James Madison at Goodman Stadium. Though Lehigh held the vaunted Dukes' offense in check for most of the afternoon, JMU squeaked out a 14-13 victory. The Dukes went on to capture the national title.



THE ECAC LAMBERT POLL

Lehigh perennially finds itself among the top I-AA teams in the east, as evidenced by its strong yearly finish in the ECAC Lambert Poll, originally known as the Lambert Cup.

The Lambert Cup was established in 1957 by brothers Victor and Henry Lambert, two New York jewelers and college football boosters, in memory of their father, August, to recognize supremacy in eastern college football.

In 1984 the Meadowlands Sports Complex was selected to sponsor the award. A dinner and awards ceremony is held every year at Giants Stadium to honor ECAC award winners.

The award, now known as the ECAC Lambert Poll, territory includes eastern teams from Maine to Virginia. A panel of seven regional media members does the weekly voting.

ECAC TEAM OF THE YEAR

Eight years ago Lehigh was named the ECAC Team of the Year for the fourth time in school history. It was the third time it received the award as a Division I-AA member institution.

The Eastern College Athletic Conference Team of the Year award was started in 1974 to honor the top four teams in eastern college football. The award honors a member of each division, Div. I-A, Div. I-AA, Div. II, and Div. III.

The award is selected by a panel of Athletic Administrators and is presented at the ECAC awards banquet held at Giants Stadium in East Rutherford, NJ.

In addition to the Team of the Year award, the ECAC also presents a Coach of the Year award for all four levels of eastern college football.

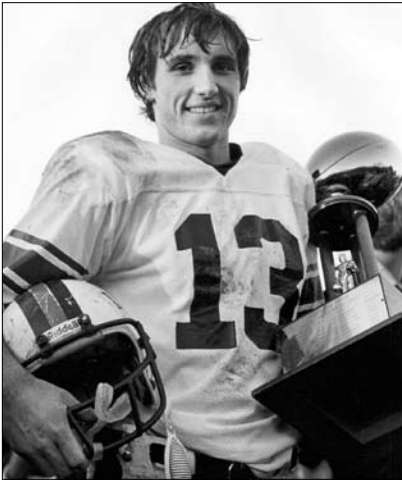

ACADEMIC PREPARATION

Lehigh University is a true university with four colleges: arts and sciences; education; business and economics; and the P.C. Rossin College of Engineering and Applied Sciences. Students are encouraged to take classes from all colleges and can easily transfer from one to another.

Experiential learning is a hallmark of the university. Students are encouraged to participate in interdisciplinary programs and special learning opportunities. As such, participation in athletics is central to the university's mission.

Lehigh athletes are true "student-athletes" who are academically representative of their class at the time of their admission and throughout their entire academic careers. Student-athletes choose colleges and majors in comparable distributions to the general student population. Individuals regularly earn Academic All-America laurels and Lehigh teams are annually cited for academic prowess.

The Lehigh student-athlete experience benefits from a support network including a full-time academic support professional, a faculty-athletics council, and the prioritized attention of our coaching staff.

LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT

Leadership development is an essential component of the Lehigh educational experience. Lehigh seeks and attracts student leaders who are encouraged to further develop their leadership skills by serving on the Student-Athlete Council, serving as team captains, or participating in student organizations.

Lehigh boasts the John A. Cable Leadership Development Fund, designed to enhance learning and leadership development for student-athletes through a combination of classroom, experiential learning, community service, and mentoring activities.

COMMUNITY SERVICE

Lehigh athletics believes in giving back to the community as a way of preparing student-athletes for a lifetime of making a difference for others. Among Lehigh's many community service programs are the C.O.A.C.H. (Community of Athletes who Care about Helping Others) program, Youth Activity Day, and tutoring and charity support activities.

NCAA GRADUATION RATES

Lehigh has ranked among the national leaders in NCAA graduation rates for a decade. In 2001, Lehigh won the inaugural USA Today/NCAA Foundation Academic Achievement Award for boasting the highest graduation rate among all Division I institutions, at 96% throughout the past decade. Lehigh has ranked in the top 20 in graduation rate success for more than a decade, or essentially since the NCAA has made these rates available, and in the top 10 for the past seven years. Lehigh's student-athletes also graduate at a rate higher than the overall institutional population.

THE LEHIGH LEGACY

Lehigh produces the type of bottom-line results so important to prospective students, with a great job placement rate (more than 90% employed, in graduate school, or in the military within six months of graduation) and starting salaries 10% greater than the national average.

Lehigh boasts a strong alumni body which continues to support the university after graduation, including an active Athletics Partnership group. Lehigh annually ranks as a Patriot League leader in attendance and sponsors alumni events and championship team reunions to foster relationships and encourage life-long involvement in Lehigh athletics.

LEHIGH UNIVERSITY CAREER SERVICES

Undergraduate students, graduate students and alumni are served by a comprehensive program including counseling, workshops and on-campus interviewing, enabling Lehigh students to realize a successful and fulfilling professional life.

Services Include:

- Individual career counseling
- Pre-professional advising for law and medical school
- Experiential education including externships, internships, and co-op
- Workshops and special programs to develop job searching skills and career knowledge
- On campus interviewing
- Web-based resources for career exploration and job searching

Career Exploration and Counseling

Meet one-on-one with a career counselor to discuss personal career plans. Counselors will help with questions related to selecting or changing a major; deciding on a career path; locating an internship; writing a resume; developing interview skills; defining job search strategies; researching companies or graduate schools; and evaluating job offers.

Career Assessment

Interest inventories and assessment tools can help select a major and generate options for a profession that will best meet interests, values and skills.

Research

The Career Library contains a wide collection of books and publications available on the subjects of career planning, career fields and employers, graduate and professional schools, job listings, and employer brochures.

Skills Development

Interactive and group-oriented workshops provide practical information on topics such as writing dynamic resumes, developing interviewing skills, conducting a fulfilling and productive job search, utilizing the internet in job searches, and networking.

Peer Educators

The Peer Educator Program is a special service to undergraduates, graduate students, and alumni who would otherwise wait for an appointment with a counselor. Peer Educators are volunteers who have been specially trained by the Career Services staff. They are available Monday through Friday, as well as some evening in the student athlete lounge.

LUCAN (Alumni Database)

The Lehigh University Center Advisory Network is a group of over 26,000 alumni volunteers. These individuals have agreed to act as advisors to current students, graduate students, and alumni seeking information about career paths and specific industries. The database is searchable by job titles, industries, and locations, and will yield a number of

individuals who share your career interests. A Career counselor can help you contact alumni appropriately via writing and phone calls for networking purposes.

Externships

Externships are designed to assist in gaining exposure to a specific career or career field. Ranging from 1-5 days, externships provide a wonderful opportunity to shadow a Lehigh Alumnus or mentor in the workplace.

Cooperative Education (Co-op)

Designed to provide eight months of paid, full-time work experience that bridges the gap between engineering theory and application, co-op allows one to graduate within a four year time frame. Co-op is a selective program available to engineering students. Because of the rigorous academic schedule, only the top third of a given class is invited to participate. Selection takes place in the spring of the sophomore year.

Internships

An internship is usually an experience where one earns college credit as one gains on-the-job experience. Performance is evaluated and a grade is received upon completion of the internship.

Job Searching

Lehigh University Career Information Exchange (LUCIE) is a web-based system that allows registered students and alumni to access on-line job information and place their resumes on line. You can access LUCIE by visiting www.lehigh.edu/careerservices

On-Campus Interviewing and Employer Presentations

Approximately 300-400 employers interview candidates for full-time, internship and co-op positions each year. Many employers offer special on-campus information sessions to help learn more about their organizations.

Career Fair

Each fall, career services participated in a number of career fairs. These fairs cover all industries and fields and occur throughout the year. Whether students seek full-time or internship positions, meeting employers early can provide a distinct advantage.

Graduate and Professional Schools

Not everyone decides to enter the work force upon graduation. Many students choose to further their education by continuing on to graduate school. Counselors can advise on searching for schools, programs, application and testing procedures and writing personal statements. Information booklets (including registration information) for the GRE, GMAT, LSAT, MCAT, DAT, and OAT are available in the career library.

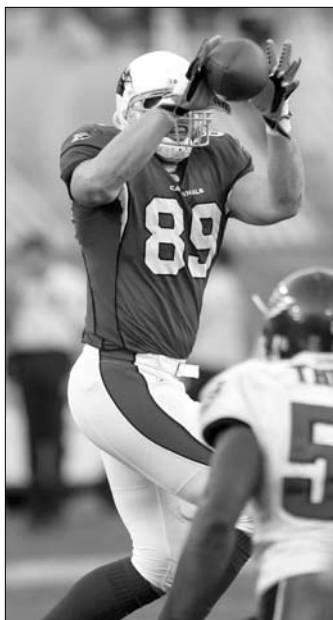

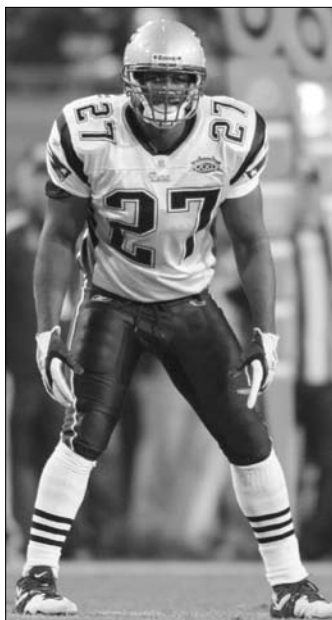

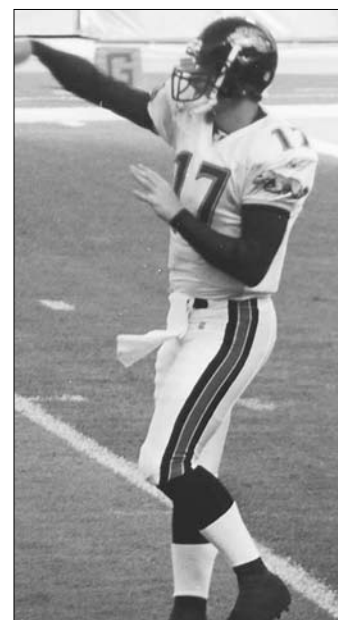

ON THE AIR: TELEVISION, RADIO, AND THE INTERNET

Lehigh football can be seen nationally on DIRECTV channel 628, regionally on FSN Pittsburgh, and locally in the Lehigh Valley and Philadelphia on WFMZ-TV and Service Electric cable. In addition to game coverage each week, the Lehigh Sports Magazine airs nationally each week on DIRECTV and FSN, as well as on the Lehigh web site.

Lehigh football can be heard exclusively on commercial radio on ESPN Radio 1230 and 1320-AM in the Lehigh Valley. Matt Kerr calls the play-by-play, with Hall of Fame quarterback Marty Horn '86 and former Lehigh wide receiver Kody Fedorcha '00 providing color commentary. Lehigh football is the highest rated sports program, as measured by Arbitron, in the Lehigh Valley, nearly doubling Penn State broadcasts. Lehigh also broadcasts the live audio of every game on the web at Lehighsports.com, with streaming provided by Yahoo! Sports. Once again in 2009, fans can watch most regular season games live on the Lehigh web site through the Yahoo! College Broadcast package.

GOODMAN STADIUM: HOME OF CHAMPIONS

Lehigh has led the Patriot League in attendance for 17 of the past 18 years and annually ranks among the national attendance leaders. Situated in a picturesque setting with the South Mountain foliage in the background, pre-game tailgating around the entire stadium, plus several pregame and kid-friendly activities, it's understandable why Lehigh has been so successful on its home turf.

NCAA PLAYOFFS

Lehigh has made five NCAA playoff appearances since 1998, and has advanced to the quarterfinal round on three occasions.
