yle Dillingham, who started playing the violin when he was 9, said he knew he wanted to pursue a career in music since he was in junior high school.

While still in high school, the Enid native was featured twice on the Grand Ole Opry. Despite attractive offers to stay in Nashville, Dillingham said he has always felt that he could better serve Oklahoma by investing his talents into the growing music and entertainment industry in his home state.

"My decision to pursue a career in the music industry followed my desire to share my music with others." Dillingham said. "Music naturally brings people together through a shared experience and can therefore be a powerful tool for building relationships. Consequently, this quality about music makes it an extremely powerful tool for growing business as well. It's quirky, but effective!"

Dillingham earned his bachelor's degree in instrumental music performance from Oklahoma City University, where he later served three years as ambassador. He received an Oklahoma Governor's Arts Award in 2009, and he is an Oklahoma creativity ambassador and the musical ambassador in residence at the University of Central Oklahoma.

Dillingham has performed in 35 countries, including for the king of Malaysia and the

princess of Thailand, A frequent visitor to Washington, D.C., he has performed for the Japanese, Thai and Saudi Arabian ambassadors, just to name a few. Last year, Dillingham's band, Horseshoe Road, was chosen by the U.S. State Department to tour as a part of its American Music Abroad program to Korea, Burma, Russia and Taiwan, where Dillingham was featured as soloist with the Taipei Symphony Orchestra. This year the U.S. Embassy in Liberia has requested Horseshoe Road to represent America through a performance for its Fourth of July celebration in Monrovia.

Collaborating with Edmond composer, Callen Clarke, Dillingham has premiered eight new works with symphony orchestras in the last six years. He also has been soloist with the Amici New York Orchestra, Oklahoma City Philharmonic, Enid Symphony Orchestra, OCU Orchestra, UCO Symphony Orchestra and Chamber Orchestra as well as the Oklahoma Community Orchestra.

Kyle Dillingham and Horseshoe Road perform every second Thursday of the month at the Paramount Theater in Oklahoma Citv's Historic Film Row. Dillingham and Horseshoe Road were named Slice magazine's 2014 Best Performing Artist and Best Local Band. respectively.

ixie Agostino may have grown up in Tulsa, but her personal mantra comes from a Spanish proverb: A life lived in fear is a life half-lived.

Her personal belief in that philosophy and a desire to embrace challenge at every level have spurred Agostino to success as owner and CEO of Switchgear Search & Recruiting. The Tulsa-based company specializes in placing employees skilled in engineering, accounting, finance and information technology. It boasts a growing list of high-profile clients, mostly in the energy industry.

"I consider us to be matchmakers in the corporate world," she said. "Switchgear technically is a product, but it also describes a mind-set and a change of focus."

Agostino has come a long way since 2010, when she started as a one-woman show in a 300-square-foot office. Today Switchgear is a thriving company with 10 employees, new headquarters and offices in Tulsa and Houston. Under her guidance, the business has doubled in size every year, and plans are in place to expand into Oklahoma City and Denver.

"So many times in our lives an idea will pop up, seemingly out of nowhere, that scares us," she said. "An idea to start our own business, go on

an adventure, do something different. I want to grab that idea, even if it is a little crazy, and run with it. The fact that there are people on my team who believe in me and my vision enough to do the same, to stake their professional and financial futures here, is the biggest compliment I could receive."

Switchgear got its unusual name one day while Agostino was driving on the highway with her husband, Anthony.

"We were in fourth gear," she said.
"My husband yelled 'Switch gears!,'
and I knew we had our name."

Another key focus is giving back to the community, through employee group projects and Agostino's individual work with entities such as the Tulsa Mayor's Commission for the Status of Women.

Above all, Agostino said she will never settle for the status quo.

"I never want to ignore that still, small voice that is my true self," she said. "Switchgear was created based on that voice and those ideas, and it has been one of the most amazing adventures of my life. By pushing our dreams farther than we think we can, and by going that extra mile even when we think we can't, I believe we discover strength we didn't know we had."

Luis Aguilera

Director of manufacturing GEFCO Inc.
Birth date: June 1980

f anyone serves as an example of the American dream come true, it's Luis Aguilera. He's come an incredibly long way from his early days when, as a 14-year-old in Aguascalientes, Mexico, his father's illness forced him to become the family breadwinner. In the 20 years since, Aguilera has achieved success in several diverse careers, ranging from high school math and physics teacher to university public relations director to his present position as director of manufacturing for Enid's GEFCO Inc.

The triple burden of school, family responsibilities and multiple jobs would have made a lesser person give up, especially a young boy. Instead it honed Aguilera's determination to succeed.

"I was tempted to quit several times, and I thought also that life was not fair," he said. "But with time and extraordinary friends and teachers, I learned that by accepting fully and totally my reality and God's will for me, I was going to be happy and successful. I discovered that it was not just about me, but my loved ones and the people around me."

Before his illness, Aguilera's father was a professional soccer player who made sure all his children learned the value of sports as a way to help keep the mind, body and spirit balanced and healthy. Aguilera inherited both of his parents' love of athletics and education in spades, which led him to a soccer championship, competing in Ironman Triathlons, and a black belt and gold medals in kung fu. He also excelled as a scholar; one of his top successes was winning MIT's physics and mathematics tournament in 1996. The accolades continued as he received a Dale Carnegie Institute highest achievement award in 2013.

Aguilera moved to the United States in 2011 to serve as general manager for Garfield Equipment, and he joined the GEFCO team in 2012. He's been instrumental in boosting the company's production flow by 207 percent, while at the same time reducing costs.

"I love making things efficient, managing resources wisely and producing continuous improvement," he said. "I agree with Albert Einstein, who once said 'There is a driving force more powerful than steam, electricity and atomic energy – the will.'

"My purpose in life is to serve, and I firmly believe that everything we do has a direction and intention coming from who we are," Aguilera said. "Unity of life, magnanimity and humility are our keystones for success."







Melissa Barnett

t's a long way from a degree in sign language to managing an elite realty and custom home company. Melissa Barnett, however, believes her unusual career path is one she was destined to travel, and her professional track record confirms that she made the right choice.

That path started at age 13, when Barnett began volunteering for the Muscular Dystrophy Association. She quickly became hooked on helping others and developed an interest in sign language after witnessing a deaf woman's efforts to communicate.

Yet it's as a Realtor that Barnett found her niche. During her first year as sales and operations manager for Oklahoma City's AllenStyle homes, she nearly tripled its sales.

In a field where closing the deal is often the only goal, Barnett takes a different approach.

"I'm successful in this position because I love people, and they can sense that I'm not trying to 'sell' them anything," she said. "I love to help by answering questions, learn about them as people and try to improve their lives in some way."

Barnett's determination and drive are highly visible. She was the first person in her family to attend college and earned her associate degree of science at Oklahoma State University-Oklahoma City and, later, a bachelor's degree in mass communications from Oklahoma City University.

After joining the Greater Oklahoma City Chamber, Barnett threw herself into selling chamber memberships, advertising and sponsorships. She raised nearly \$31,000, an amount unheard of for a new member. The end result was that the chamber created a Rookie of the Year award based on her achievements. That success led to her role as chairman of both the education and sponsorship campaign committees for the Central Oklahoma Home Builder's Association. She and her daughter, Kaitlyn, also foster dogs through the Central Oklahoma Humane Society.

"I thought that was something that would make a difference in our community," she said. "They definitely bring joy to us, and we are happy to be a part of passing that joy along to the new adoptive families."

Her biggest satisfaction, however, comes from helping other single mothers buy their own home.

"I use my knowledge to empower them to know they don't have to have a spouse to achieve the American dream," Barnett said. "I love helping these women change the course of their lives in this small way. Many times I believe in them more than they believe in themselves."

eterans returning from overseas all too often struggle with mental, emotional and physical issues that can make transitioning back into civilian life difficult. Finding support, even with all the awareness we have today, can be daunting.

As executive director of the State Association for Veteran Empowerment (SAVE), Carie Antosek Benton provides a clear vision for helping those who have served in the armed forces. Through education, finding local community resources, employment opportunities, or helping them cope with conditions like post-traumatic stress disorder, Benton works to improve the lives of families, friends, and neighbors who have sacrificed for the rest of us.

A helper by nature, Benton became interested in working with veterans while obtaining her master's degree at the University of Oklahoma. She sees her current job as a tangible way to provide meaningful assistance to combat veterans in need.

"I think of the ripple effect created by tossing a pebble into a pond; the ripple of helping one veteran extends outward, in turn helping the veteran's family, and all those around them. Imagine that impact," Benton said.

Working with veterans is a significant career shift for Benton, who initially was a pioneer in the real estate technological field. In 2000, she and a business partner co-founded

Vi360.com, which offered website technology to real estate agents, including the then state-of-the-art concept of virtual tours of houses for sale. Within three years the company had 47 distributorships along with its Realtor clients, which kept Benton busy trayeling across the country.

Living in 10 cities and six states made it difficult, but after 12 years she completed an undergraduate degree in marketing.

"I was determined to finish, no matter what. Through that experience, and from my failures and successes, I learned who I am and the ways I'm best equipped to contribute," she said.

Beyond work and school, one of Benton's particular causes is Great Circle, where she mentors teenage girls in foster and residential care. "We are highly selective in our recruitment of volunteers," said Great Circle Director Judy Hillyer. "Carie is part of a small group of women who really excel in this role."

Benton is now focused on two goals – expanding the SAVE program and adding to her academic credentials. She's applying to doctorate programs, and while she hasn't decided on a specific degree yet, she said it will probably be psychology.

"People, and what makes them tick, fascinate me." she said.



Michael Boecking

Vice president, credit risk manager Kirkpatrick Bank Birth date: November 1979

t's no secret that children in foster care or awaiting adoption have a tough time and often go without emotional support and needed items like shoes and clothing.

In recent years, these children have had their path smoothed a bit, thanks to the dedicated efforts of Michael Boecking. He and his wife, Cindy, are co-leaders of the Chosen OKC adoption and foster care ministry at Crossings Community Church.

"These are children who face significant adversity through no fault of their own," Boecking said. "Statistics will tell you that most are doomed to repeat the cycles of abuse and neglect. Our goal for Chosen is to raise awareness and recruit more loving foster/adoptive families to provide the stability that these children need."

His involvement became even more personal after adopting two sons.

"It was a great opportunity for us to be part of the solution, and we feel so blessed to be the parents of these two amazing little boys." he said.

Boecking's successful philanthropic efforts are equally matched by his professional abilities. He has played an integral role in developing Kirkpatrick Banks's new credit risk department, and he created a series of analytical tools that allows the bank to evaluate a company's financials on an individual level. He's also developed models that monitor the loan portfolio's risk on a macro level, incorporating such elements as risk rating monitoring, problem loan trends, concentration risk and portfolio stress testing.

Despite his young age, Boecking also is a leader in the community. He has served on the board for the national Risk Management Association's Oklahoma chapter and held a number of key positions with United Way and Freedom School OKC. He currently serves on the board of Citizens Caring for Children and Edmond Public Schools Foundation.

In his private life, Boecking also is literally on the go. For the past several years he has been participating in races and obstacle runs. This past year he added cycling to the mix and began running, cycling and competing in duathlons.

"My grandfather would always tell us, 'If you're gonna be a bear, be a grizzly,' which means anything worth doing is worth doing with all your heart," he said. "That's why I apply an attitude of hard work, commitment and dedication to everything – my education, family and career."

Relley Gompton

Co-founder, vice president, director of operations Project Hope Worldwide Birth date: September 1980

s a former Miss Oklahoma and top 10 Miss America finalist, Kelley Compton has had a unique opportunity to change lives for the better, and she is doing so not only across the state of Oklahoma, but around the world as well.

It started with presentations on behalf of the America Cares for Children initiative, where as a motivational speaker she gave presentations to more than 350 schools and 50,000 students. From there Compton, a former high school athlete, became instrumental in promoting healthy lifestyles for children across the state. She helped create and promote many state. school-based and private wellness programs. Among them are the Oklahoma State Health Department's Walk this Weigh campaign and partnerships between the department and companies like Wal-Mart.

Compton's influence further increased when she lobbied Oklahoma's congressional leaders on behalf of children's health and served as a member of the state's Task Force to Study Overweight Children.

Compton said she didn't find her life's mission, however, until 2008, when she traveled with a small group to Uganda.

"I was in a place that the United Nations had said at the time was the worst place for a child to live in the entire world," she said. "Because of the AIDS epidemic and the war that ransacked the nation, there are nearly 3 million orphans. As a woman born in the West and given every opportunity, I couldn't walk away."

Once back in the United States. Compton and two of her fellow travelers quickly founded Project Hope Worldwide. Its mission is to provide holistic care to the most vulnerable children, specifically orphans, providing them true opportunity for transformation, Compton's leadership has turned the nonprofit, now in its fifth year and headquartered in Owasso, into a huge success, with more than \$2 million in assets. locations in four countries and a longterm plan to establish programs on every continent. Her fundraising success is in no small part due to her skill with finances - she holds bachelor's and master's degrees in accounting from Oklahoma City University's Meinders School of Business.

"Some people think big, but big thinking doesn't get things done," said Ryan Underwood, CEO of Tri Leadership Resources. "Kelley Compton is that rare leader who can think and act big – and she inspires the rest of us to bring our skills and resources to join her."

dam Croom was exposed to cutting-edge technology at an early age, thanks to his grandfather, who was among the first generation to study computer programming, and his father, who also built computers. So it's no surprise that Croom became a tech wizard himself, culminating in his current position as director of digital courses for the University of Oklahoma.

"We were always the first family in the neighborhood to adopt new technology, whether that was Internet access or CD burners," he said. "Starting when I was 11, I would design websites for trivial interests I had. The Web became my creative outlet."

Croom turned that creative outlet into a highly successful career at OU, where he's also an adjunct journalism instructor. To date he's created two major programs that have put the university at the forefront of Internet technology, while at the same time showcasing Oklahoma's educators, entrepreneurs and other leaders.

His first brainchild is TEDxOU. TED (Technology/Entertainment/Design) is an annual conference with free, short videos that connect professionals in all disciplines. That was followed by the launch of Janux, an interactive platform offering approximately 20

open, and freely accessible, courses to anyone around the world. He's particularly proud of Freedom.ou.edu, an online civic education platform he created as a joint project between OU and the Institute for the American Constitutional Heritage.

A naturally curious person, Croom said pursuing a career in journalism was a natural fit, and one that gave him a chance to continue developing his technological skills.

"While it's a discipline in and of itself, journalism is somewhat interdisciplinary, since you are constantly put in a position to learn a subject that you're unfamiliar with and in turn translate it for the public," he said. "This allowed me to explore a broad range of subjects."

The fact that his efforts allow thousands of people around the world to connect and learn, and thus have an influence themselves, is a huge source of satisfaction for Croom. He especially enjoys seeing the development of his students and young professionals. That's because in his opinion, there is no such thing as a "next" generation.

"That implies that you are 'next' and aren't allowed to create an impact until it's your turn," he said. "In truth, we are all collectively 'the generation,' and we all have roles to play now."

s the captain of his college baseball team, Tim Doty learned early not to rest on his laurels, and that the next pitch, swing and game were always right around the corner.

"He has a keen legal mind that easily spots issues and has the business acumen to analyze and consider resolutions that further our business initiatives," Guzzy said. "He is incapable of doing anything halfway."

Outside the office Doty remains a leader, volunteering as co-vice chairman for the Oklahoma Bar Association's professionalism committee and serving as an executive committee member for the United Way Emerging Leaders. He's also an active member and leader with Memorial Road Church of Christ

As you would expect from a former Male Student Athlete of the Year award winner (at Kansas State University), Doty said he adheres to his father's philosophy of "Fight the good fight."

"Nothing is impossible," he said. "Because given genuine determination, resourcefulness and skill, we can conquer any challenge put in front of us."

any successful people have favorite quotes, but Stacy Eads' mantra comes from a fortune cookie. Its message is simple – "Let reality be reality."

It's an outlook that's particularly suited to Eads, who segued from a career in nonprofit public relations, manufacturing human resources and print journalism to her current position as CEO of Levant Technologies. The company designs websites and apps, and under Eads' leadership grew by a phenomenal 300 percent during her first year alone.

"When our team is building a new website or app for a local business, I can clearly see that business owner's goals, and the value of the project from their industry perspective."

Eads took the reins of Levant in 2011. She supervises day-to-day operations for 450-plus clients' Web and app accounts and oversees six full-time staff members and eight part-time contractors. She spearheaded the development of the company's School Connect app, which was named among The Journal Record's Innovator of the Year honorees in 2012. The app now serves 300-plus school districts nationwide and has more than a quarter-million downloads.

Eads also shares her expertise through involvement with civic and business groups around the metro area. Most recently she became involved with Girl Tech, which mentors high school girls interested in a career in technology.

When things get too hectic, Eads simply glances at the fortune cookie posted on her refrigerator.

"For a person with my intense drive, this simplistic statement can make the fast world stop spinning and your mind open from its fear of yesterday or what will be tomorrow," Eads said. 


Garman serves on the board of the Young Nonprofit Professional Network of Oklahoma City.



tate Rep. Randy Grau, R-Edmond, is known for going the extra mile for others. In fact, he has climbed one of the world's tallest mountains to do just that.

"In 2009, I traveled to Tanzania and climbed Mount Kilimanjaro in order to raise money for a Rwandan school," Grau said.

This is only one example of Grau's strong commitment to children. As a volunteer for Oklahoma Lawyers for Children, Grau represented two sisters in the termination of the parental rights of both their mother and father. He also served as guardian ad litem for one of the girls regarding an auto accident in which she had been involved.

"I continued to represent the girls for several years through the process of being adopted by their aunt and uncle," Grau said. "Both girls are thriving, and one is about to graduate from college."

Grau, who is serving his second term as a state representative, said his personal faith, commitment to family and drive to enhance his community was the catalyst to run for office.

"My family and faith always taught me that we are all blessed to be a blessing. In other words, we are to use any of the talents, skills or resources we have in order to help others," he said.

Grau said he uses this motivation

to help him bring more accountability to the government as the assistant majority floor leader and vice chairman of the Appropriations and Budget Subcommittee for Higher Education. The governor has signed more than 30 of his proposed bills into law, including the Oklahoma Regional Jail Act.

"His unopposed elections ... are a substantial indication of the esteem to which he is held in his home community," said Oklahoma County Commissioner Ray Vaughn. "While at a relatively young age, Randy has already garnered numerous awards and recognitions from not only his community but from the Oklahoma Bar Association as well as other organizations, both foreign and domestic."

As the first deputy county commissioner for District 3, Grau helped develop, negotiate and transition the former GM building to Tinker Air Force Base.

"Integrity and commitment are the two words that come to mind when I think of Grau," said John Morris Williams, executive director of the Oklahoma Bar Association. "As a lawyer, he is skilled and thoughtful. As a public servant, he is mindful of this charge and humble in meeting it."

After earning her bachelor's degree in social work from the University of Oklahoma, Mitchell began working for the YWCA of Oklahoma City as a social services specialist in 2002. Her abilities enabled Mitchell to climb her way up the corporate ladder, while also obtaining her master's degree, and she was promoted to her current position as chief programs officer in 2012.

"Kristie has not only affected thousands of lives through the direct services she has provided, but she has, in fact, impacted the field of domestic violence and sexual assault on a state level through her prolific work with law enforcement and the judiciary system," said Lesley Smith March, chief of the Oklahoma Attorney General Office's Victim Services Unit.

Since 2008, Mitchell has led the Oklahoma County Coordinated

Community Response Team, helping the multidisciplinary team identify systems issues that affect adult and child victims.

"Kristie is one of the most humble, sincere, intellectual, hardworking individuals I have ever known and manages to be a vibrant ray of hope in the midst of the most flooding ills facing humanity," said Jackie Miller, administrative law judge at the Oklahoma Corporation Commission and former board member of the YWCA. "Kristie exhibits an unprecedented commitment to adult and child victims of domestic violence and through personal work ethic and immeasurable individual efforts, helps to transform those victims into miraculous survivors of purpose and hope."

Mitchell said her greatest influence has been her mother, who had a heart for helping people anyway she could.

"And she was never afraid to speak up on behalf of others," Mitchell said. "I am simply a product of many caring and smart women who remind me to use my voice for others. I believe problems of today, like domestic violence, will only rise to the level our community is willing to accept."

It's that social conscience that she is committed to instill in her three daughters – Ariah, 8; and 4-year-old twins, Aiyana and Aliyah.

rom moving rubble to the curb and picking up belongings that were salvageable to providing tax advice to tornado victims, Todd Pefferman has been an ace in the hole.

When the Oklahoma Society of CPAs was looking for someone to help with presentations in February and March on the tax implications for natural disasters, Pefferman gladly stepped up to the plate.

Pefferman, the leader of BKD CPAs and Advisors' tax practice at its Oklahoma City office, has given presentations to more than 350 victims of the May 2013 tornadoes. The presentations helped provide information on what disaster relief was available per the tax code, how to treat insurance reimbursements, and what to do if they lost tax returns or documentation, among other tax preparation tips.

"He has fostered a close-knit, team-oriented and supportive culture within his practice and his team that permeates into the office as a whole."





hrough the legal arena, Emily K. Pomeroy has played a key role in the planning and preparation of such development projects as the 50-story Devon headquarters building, Core to Shore, the Midwest City Downtown Redevelopment Project and the renovation of the Shangri-La Hotel property on Grand Lake.

Pomeroy is a senior attorney for the Center for Economic Development Law, which is general counsel to the Oklahoma City Urban Renewal Authority. She and Dan Batchelor, chairman of the firm, assisted the authority and the city of Oklahoma City in the real estate transactions and financing authorizations associated with the Devon development, including the creation of Increment District No. 8, which helps fund the Project 180 improvements downtown.

"To watch the stacks of paper turn in to the world-class Devon headquarters and the surrounding improvements is a professional accomplishment I am not sure can be topped," Pomeroy said. In addition, Price finds time to volunteer as a big brother for Big Brothers Big Sisters of Oklahoma.

t 32, Katherine Richard is one of the youngest CEOs of oil and gas companies with more than \$500 million in assets.

Richard founded Oklahoma Citybased Warwick Energy Group in 2010.

"I describe Oklahoma City as the Silicon Valley of the oil and gas industry and that's exactly what it is," Richard said. "This city is a mecca of oil and gas ingenuity. It is exceedingly supportive of oil-field entrepreneurship and this makes sense culturally since the major companies that dominate this city commercially have all been built over the past three decades by entrepreneurs."

Investment funds managed by Warwick Energy own interests in 5,000 wells in 13 states.

Richard said she is inspired by the support and inspiration of her mentors and the capabilities of her team led by Shilpa Abbitt, Doug Bellis, Max Germin, Jessica Tompkins and Bob Wagner. Plus, she loves her job.

hen Marco Rodriguez came from Venezuela to Oklahoma to fulfill his higher education goals at the University of Central Oklahoma, he was a struggling international student without much financial aid.

Director of government relations Cherokee Nation, Cherokee Nation Businesses Birth date: March 1982

hen Courtney Ruark-Thompson's friend and mentor asked her to be a trainer for a Native American leadership program, she was hesitant at first. But after serious consideration, Ruark-Thompson decided it was time to jump out of her comfort zone.

Now, Ruark-Thompson shares her story as a survivor who suffers from periodic severe depression in hopes to erase the stigma associated with such diseases and bring about positive change.

"I married a recovering alcoholic and drug addict. We both knew we needed treatment, and were too afraid to talk about it or ask for help. For both of us, we almost waited too long. Thankfully, we both reached out for help and today, we are both healthy," Ruark-Thompson said. "Now, we're parents, and are fully aware that both depression and addiction can be hereditary, and concerned that our son might suffer from either or both. For him, and for everyone else in our community who fights these diseases. we need to share our stories so anyone can feel confident to openly seek treatment that saves lives - just as if they suffered from any other serious disease."

Ruark-Thompson, a Cherokee citizen who remains an adjunct trainer for the Wellstone Action Native American Leadership Program, served as the program's director for a year before assuming her current position as director of government relations for the Cherokee Nation and Cherokee Nation Businesses.

"She is a true leader in the Cherokee Nation and in Oklahoma," said Cherokee Nation Principal Chief Bill John Baker.

Ruark-Thompson earned her bachelor's degree in political science from the University of Oklahoma.

She began her career as campaign manager for Cindy Rosenthal's successful bid for Norman City Council. Ruark-Thompson later worked with the Democratic National Committee and the Indigenous Democratic Network's List before joining the staff of U.S. Rep. Betty McCollum, D-Minn. It was in this position that Ruark-Thompson said she achieved her most significant professional accomplishment. Her hard work helped bring more than \$50 million in emergency funding to the Bureau of Indian Education Schools.

"Her work helped us shine a light on the need for tribal nations to have more control over how federal education dollars are spent in the education of their youth," McCollum said.

Ruark-Thompson said her greatest influences include her husband, Grant; her parents, Kim Glazier and Kirk Ruark; mentor Peggy Flanagan; and former teacher Richard Lemon.

hether it's opening a restaurant, running a film festival or producing a movie, Melissa Scaramucci's creative spirit shines through.

As program director of deadCENTER, Scaramucci turned a near bankrupt film festival into a fiveday event bringing international attention to Oklahoma's film industry.

"The way it has continued to explode makes my heart truly sing," Scaramucci said. "DeadCENTER is important to OKC and that's a fact of which I'm very, very proud."

The restaurant, called Local, that she started with her sisters, Heather Steele and Abby Clark, is transforming the industry.

"Melissa was on the cutting edge in Oklahoma in making her restaurant a destination for customers who value locally sourced and sustainable dining," said Jim Hopper, president and CEO of the Oklahoma Restaurant Association.

Local works directly with Oklahoma farmers to source most of the food for the restaurant.

"We use everything, and we make everything, including all of our sauces, soups and stocks," Scaramucci said.

Even the art in the Norman restaurant comes from local sources. Local has an art gallery and shop that

sells locally made art and boutique items. Her love of the arts is further seen through her service on the executive board of the Norman Arts Council and the associate board of the Fred Jones Jr. Museum of Art.

"Melissa's contributions to the arts community in Oklahoma and her dedication to supporting locally crafted wares make her a true leader in the state and someone I am honored to work with on a day-to-day basis," said Erinn Gavaghan, executive director of the Norman Arts Council.

Entrepreneurship is nothing new for Scaramucci. From her father and in-laws to former employers, Scaramucci said entrepreneurs have been her mentors and provided inspiration since she began working.

"I had no illusions about how hard owning and operating my own business would be – it's been modeled for me my whole life," Scaramucci said. "But the joy of accomplishment is worth every hour, every setback, every dishwasher that no-shows a Sunday morning shift. I know, because I've been a witness to it, that owning your own business can be the path to the greatest force of good any one person can hope to achieve in a lifetime."

With the development and ultimate sale of a successful technology company, Whitaker and his co-founders finished their vision.

Whitaker and his partners, Justin Cowan and Gary Saunders, founded Element Fusion in 1999 in borrowed warehouse space and focused on building websites for companies. The Oklahoma City company moved to its current office space off of Hefner Parkway the following year. But Whitaker knew that continued growth would mean a shift in thinking. His thinking was to broaden the company's offerings to software.

"With software, an hour spent by our team would grow our bottom line exponentially rather than linearly, he said. "And, so it did."

For the next five years, Element Fusion was listed among the Greater Oklahoma City Chamber's Metro 50 list of fastest-growing companies in the area. The company also made

Inc. magazine's 5000 list of the nation's fastest-growing companies four consecutive years.

Element Fusion's continued success brought dozens of acquisition and partnership offers from companies across the world. However, Whitaker said an offer from California-based NetSuite Inc. stood out from the rest.

"It was a match made in heaven, as our values were in perfect alignment," he said.

NetSuite completed its acquisition of Element Fusion in 2013. Whitaker remains on board as director of software development.

Whitaker's vision as a dreamerfinisher does not just apply to his professional life. In 2012, he and a group of friends set out for a mission trip to Nicaragua. Helping to bring more than 100 people to know Christ and delivering needed medical help to more than 700 in the remote villages, Whitaker said, is one of his proudest personal accomplishments.

"Ryan's desire to be a positive influence not only to those in his workplace, but in his family, community and beyond has led him to continually evaluate his own actions as a leader and to strive for excellence in this area to the same extent he does for excellence in the operations of his business," said J. aige Williams said her personal philosophy can be quantified in one word – conviction.

"My convictions guide me to be my best daily, pushing my limits while holding high expectations of myself and my outcomes," Williams said. "My convictions are sometimes known, however, typically a feeling that pulls and pushes me towards goals and outcomes for unknown reasons."

This conviction has helped the native Oklahoman accomplish many goals, including seeking her graduate degree immediately after college, traveling the world on her own personally and professionally and, as director of tourism of the Chickasaw Nation, building a department from scratch into one with more than 30 employees.

"My most significant professional accomplishment has been the development, integration and success of Chickasaw Country, the tourism brand representing the 7,600-plus square miles of the Chickasaw Nation," Williams said.

Since the launch of the brand, website (www.chickasawcountry.com)

and integrated social media campaign, the project has won numerous national and international awards, including Best Website and Best Social Media Campaign in 2013 by the U.S. Travel Association.

"The professional success of Chickasaw Country has provided the Chickasaw Nation a comprehensive campaign reflecting the vast opportunities available within south-central Oklahoma. For a nation so committed to benefiting its citizens, I feel honored to be able to provide a piece of success in return," she said.

In addition to her work with the tribe, Williams is active with several state and national tourism associations.

Williams said her parents instilled independence in her while she was still a young girl.

"This independence has allowed me the opportunity to grow and fail," she said, "all the while learning how to pick myself up and carry on."
