All 18 different ministries of NCBM/Baptists on Mission have important things to accomplish. There are hundreds of homes to rebuild after Hurricane Matthew; hundreds of people who need to receive treatments on the health screening bus and on the mobile dental units; thousands of students and adults to mobilize for state, national and international mission projects; and hundreds of tasks to accomplish to help churches involve their members in missions. All of those things are important, but they are not nearly as important as the people we become.

Scripture describes the people that we are to become in **Galatians 5:22-23**, "But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control; against such things there is no law." Whatever ministry or mission project in which you are involved, God cares more about the person you become than He does about what you accomplish.

I told someone recently that two years from now, when we are finished with rebuilding most Hurricane Matthew damaged homes, those we help will be impacted more by the people we are than by the homes we rebuild.

### "Go and Make Disciples"

In August 2010, Kathryn and I led our first international mission trip to Ukraine to work with the Roma People through NCBM/Baptists on Mission. I took along a book with me to use in devotions called *Go and Make Disciples!: An Introduction to Christian Missions* by Roger S. Greenway. It was a great source of encouragement to me as I read from it daily before our team began their day. One section of this book listed the right motives for people to go on mission and they are:

- 1. The desire that God be worshipped and His glory known among all the peoples of the earth.
- 2. The desire to obey God out of love and gratitude by carrying out Christ's commission to "go and make disciples of all nations."
- 3. A burning desire to use every legitimate means to save the lost and win unbelievers to faith in Christ.
- 4. Concern that churches grow and multiply, and that the kingdom of Christ be extended by words and deeds that proclaim the compassion and righteousness of Christ to a world of suffering and injustice.

Recently, Kathryn and I led a mission team to the Red Springs Mission Camp. (If you have not tried one of our two mission camps in Red Springs or Shelby, you are missing out. They are a great resource for NC Baptists.) Once again before going, I reminded myself why we go by reading the four points above. These four points are also nicely summarized in the vision statement of NCBM/Baptists on Mission: "Every Christian sharing God's love with hurting people through word and deed."

The NCBM/Baptists on Mission Statement of Our Beliefs is also a good reminder of the

right motives for going on mission. I would encourage you to go to the www.baptistsonmission.org website and read that mission statement. It is good to keep "the main thing" the main thing as we go about our busy preparations and work of every mission endeavor.

I love what Roger Greenway says about the Final Goal of Missions. He refers to John's vision in Revelations 5:9 where a great multitude would someday be gathered before the throne of Jesus Christ. The multitude is made up of people bought by the blood of Christ from "...every tribe and language and people and nation. They never cease worshipping and praising the Lord." "Why do missions? With such a vision before us, how can we not do missions?"

Tim and Vicki have been on multiple international mission trips, beginning in the 1990's, to many places including Tobago, Mozambique, Honduras, Guatemala and other places. They also have been involved in multiple national mission projects including Wyoming, Montana and Hawaii.

The Etheridge's are intensely involved in disaster relief responding to the Durham ice storm; Hurricane Katrina; Hurricane Isabel; Hurricane Irene; Hurricane Sandy long-term coordinators in New Jersey and led feeding team to Queens, New York; Hurricane Irene, South Carolina Floods, Hurricane Matthew and other disasters. Tim also served on the Region 2 Disaster Relief Feeding Advisory Team.

Tim has served as a regional Ag Missions coordinator and is currently serving as the state Ag Missions coordinator. Vicki serves on the Guatemala Advisory Team.

**Currently in Lumberton, NC** working on rebuilding Hurricane Matthew flooded homes in the Lumberton area for the next two years.





### AGRICULTURE MISSIONS



ou might wonder why agriculture would be a ministry of Baptists on Mission. Let's begin by looking to the Holy Bible. Agricultural references are found throughout the Bible. You will find references to plants and fruit trees as early as the third day of creation. In Genesis 3, you will also find where Adam was told there would be thorns and thistles and he must toil to produce his food. Jesus also used the parable of the sower to explain what can happen to new Christians. We, in Agricultural Missions, know that everyone has spiritual needs and physical needs. We want to share the love of Jesus by addressing poverty and hunger wherever it exists. A person's physical need of hunger must be met before their spiritual needs can be addressed.

We believe that gardening could be a ministry for youth groups, families, churches, and associations. Gardening does require suitable land, able bodies willing to work, and gardening resources! Assisting the needy with fresh vegetables can also provide the opportunity to deal with the individual's spiritual needs. We have provided "Hands On" Workshops to demonstrate making a raised bed, installing a drip irrigation system, straw-bale gardening, the basics of composting, and other methods of small scale gardening. We continue to explore sites where we can train others in this ministry.

The need for fresh food is a need in many international settings. We are blessed with stocked shelves in all of our grocery stores, but many in foreign countries are not so blessed. Even if food is plentiful, usually funds are not! You have probably heard that if you give a person vegetables, you feed them for a week. If you teach them how to garden, you feed them for a lifetime! We are open to assisting with agricultural opportunities wherever there is a need. We are currently working with projects in several foreign countries.

Acts 1:8 says, "But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all of Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." Agricultural Missions is looking for others who have interests in addressing hunger and poverty, wherever it exists, through agriculture. ntil a few years ago, I thought flying must be a gift from God. When people at church would hear of how my wife, Karen, and I used our airplane to fly those who needed medical treatment to different locations, they would say "What a great gift it is that you have been given." or "What a great ministry to be able to use your gift." So there you go. (Even the Apostle Paul said in Ephesians 4:8 "When he ascended up on high, he led captivity captive, and gave gifts to men.") All those folks cannot be wrong, can they? I guess Paul just did not have enough room in Ephesians Chapter 4 to include the gift of flight.

After over 80 successful flights filled with hugs, prayers, tears, laughter and decisions to follow Christ, we continue to use our gifts along with our skills to serve Him. All our Aviation Ministry members use their gifts to serve whether it is participating in a Youth Flying Event coordinated by Dale Fuller, working with Lin Whichard on the Ground Angels Team or other opportunities that presents themselves. We will continue to share the never changing message of Christ and His love for others because in the end, "Without the Message, it's just another good deed."

Fellowship of Baptist Educators (FBE) has been so excited about our shipment of books to the Seminary in Nagaland. We wanted to let you know a little about the area. Our Assistant State Director, Harriet Worsham, wrote this response to some recent questions:

It has been my pleasure to serve alongside Sandy Simpson as Assistant North Carolina Director of Baptist Educators for the past three years. During this time, I have had the privilege of teaching in a Hungarian public school and encouraging folks to donate books and materials from their libraries to FBE to for use in the mission field. Recently we shipped a container of 1,119 boxes of Bibles, study materials, concordances, dictionaries, and songbooks to Nagaland in northeastern India for use in a seminary.

As I gathered information about Nagaland, I found many interesting facts that makes supporting its people very important and timely.

- In 1967, the Nagaland Assembly proclaimed English as the official language of Nagaland and it is the medium for education in Nagaland.
   This fact makes our publications easily read and understood by the students in the seminary.
- The state's population is 1.9 million, out of which 88% are Christians and one of three Christian-majority states in India.
- The state has a very high-church attendance rate with huge churches present in the cities.
- Nagaland is known as "the only predominantly Baptist state in the world" and Baptists constitute more than 75% of the Christian population there. This is a larger percentage of Baptists than in the United States.

As I thought about this, I realized that our efforts to provide study materials to this Indian state was huge. What better way of spreading the gospel to India than by equipping the Indian preachers to reach their own fellow citizens and women by sending them our used books and materials.

God works in many different and unusual ways to perform His will. What a blessing it was to watch young and old men and women work very hard and tediously to pack the truck. What a blessing to realize that the driver of the truck was a believer. We do not know the rest of the story. We do not know who will read and study the books or who will come to a saving knowledge of Jesus Christ as a result, but we do know that God will use and bless our efforts.

To God Be the Glory!

We continue to collect books for another shipment but not yet sure of the location. ### Bpen Hearts and Bpen Minds



ave you ever noticed that when people come with open hearts and minds to hear what God wants them to do for Him, that churches and families come back together again? There are five weekends that make up the Church Renewal Journey (CRJ), and here is a description of what they mean to us.

Weekend One is the "Awakening" weekend. The church assesses where they are in their walk with the Lord—both as a body of believers, and individually. Friday evening begins with a fellowship meal including singing, praising, and hearing team member testimonies. Brief introductory small group sessions facilitated by CRJ team members encourage sharing and learning what God has planned for them over the Awakening weekend.

Saturday morning begins with coffee socials in church members' homes, where the CRJ team leaders stimulate church members to talk about how God is at work in their midst. The coffee groups meet back at the church for lunch and then breakout into a men's and women's fellowship hour, before dispersing. After an afternoon break, the team and church members gather again at the church for a fellowship supper followed by another time of worship, praise and sharing testimonies. The breakout sessions Saturday night challenge church members to share how they see God working in them personally, this weekend.

The "Spiritual Gifts" weekend consists of CRJ-led teaching sessions on the specific spiritual gifts God gives to each church member that empower them to do His work, in His way, for His purpose. It is exciting to see people acknowledging, perhaps for the first time, a spiritual gift they may not ever have realized they had before!

Next, comes the "Marketplace" weekend which helps each person to identify their own sphere of influence—their workplace, their community, their family—wherever their "marketplace" might be. We all learn how to identify practical ways we can share the love of Jesus with the people we come in contact every day.

During the "Phayer" teaching weekend, we study John 17: Jesus' Kingdom Prayer for His disciples—and for us. The focus of this weekend is on praying for the lost, as we become intentional about reaching out to a world in need of a personal relationship with Jesus. The small group meetings during the Prayer weekend are powerful practice for sharing the gospel.

The final weekend is the "acts 1:8" weekend where there is an emphasis on how to "go, and make disciples" as Jesus commanded His disciples. As we learn to share our love for the Lord with others because of His great love for us, we remain thankful that God has grown and blessed us over the years through this ministry opportunity.

### HEREI AM Send Me!

n this series of North Carolina Baptist Disaster Relief articles, we are covering the ministries in detail. Last time I said we would cover the ministries alphabetically. However, one of our Ministry Team Leaders is retiring so I wanted to publish his article about Drivers sooner rather than later.

After completing disaster relief training with North Carolina Baptist Disaster Relief in Elizabethtown, NC, Pat Flowers was asked to go on a mission trip to Sri Lanka. The 2004 Indian Ocean tsunami had devastated many areas in South Asia, and the NCBM were asked to help clean up, rebuild homes, and minister to the people of Sri Lanka. Pat had never traveled internationally and did not have the money needed for the trip. As he walked in his garden early one morning, Pat asked God to show Him how to decide. In less than two weeks, community friends had contributed enough money to pay Pat's travel expenses and Pat knew God had answered his request.

It was a life-changing trip for Pat as he worked alongside the people of Sri Lanka in 115-degree heat mixing cement, building homes, feeding those living in makeshift tents, hearing stories of unimaginable loss, and sharing God's love. The trip ignited a desire for Pat to live out the Great Commission. Pat had the opportunity to travel internationally again, when he accepted the call to Nairobi, Kenya to assist in building a dormitory for seminary students.

Pat Flowers went on to become our Driver Team Leader. His responsibilities include recruiting drivers, scheduling loads, and providing a safe environment. The team consists of retired professional drivers using their skills and training to drive cooking units, shower units, bunking units, a water tanker, and trailers for hauling and delivering supplies. Drivers are held to the same standards as those that work for companies or drive independently.

Drivers are usually one of the first to arrive and the last to leave a disaster. We have four Class 8 trucks that provide the backbone to our transportation plan. The trucks have caretakers for maintenance and general care of the unit. Volunteer drivers usually have to drive to the truck and then go pick up the load. It demands long hours at odd times of the day and week.

Pat and his team of drivers have served in Mississippi, Louisiana and Texas after Hurricane Katrina, and in North Carolina, New York, and New Jersey after Hurricane Sandy, not to mention the most recent events in NC – Hurricane Matthew and the Western NC fires.

When asked why he is willing to work so hard volunteering instead of just enjoying retirement, Pat Flowers replied, "People are suffering all around us. If you saw what I saw, you would want to help out, too."

Pat Flowers encourages others to volunteer their time and talents to missions and says that if one feels a hesitancy to serve after being asked, to remember Isaiah 6:8, "Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying,

'Whom shall I send? And who will go for us?' And I said, 'Here am I. Send me!''

### NCBM/Baptists on Mission Dedicate Lumberton Rebuild Center

orth Carolina Baptist Men/Baptists on Mission have dedicated a new base of operations for Hurricane Matthew disaster relief efforts in the Robeson County area. The Lumberton Rebuild Center will house and feed volunteers working in coming years to restore or rebuild storm-damaged homes. The 12,000-square-foot warehouse facility was purchased and renovated by NCBM/Baptists on Mission. Situated on a four-acre site, the Rebuild Center, at 141 Avent Rd, is near I-95, Exit 17. Previously, Hyde Park Baptist Church served as the area's response site.

The Lumberton Rebuild Center dedication was a ceremony of thanks and praise for the many ways God is allowing Baptists to respond in the hurricane's aftermath. Prayers were voiced for people affected by the hurricane, for volunteers who have and will respond, for the building facility and for the Lumberton/Robeson County area.

"Lumberton was really ground zero for Hurricane Matthew," said Richard Brunson, executive director of NCBM/Baptists on Mission. "The rebuilding stage is really what this building is about." Rebuild efforts also are being coordinated at four other Eastern North Carolina sites – Windsor, Goldsboro, Warsaw and Black River Pender County, added Brunson.

Site Coordinator Billy Layton said the facility can daily accommodate as many as 150 disaster relief volunteers. Multiple sleeping rooms, a kitchen, dining/fellowship area, tool and equipment room, restroom/showers, office and outdoor prayer garden are key features of the center.

"There are lots of people to thank for this building, and I especially want to thank Mayor (Bruce) Davis who connected us with Jim Driscoll," said Brunson. "I want to thank Jim Driscoll and his family for selling this building to us. And for the volunteers who did so much of the work on this building to renovate and set it up as a place to house, feed and coordinate the many rebuilding jobs that will be done through this place in the next few years. "Most importantly, we want to dedicate this building and these efforts to the Lord," concluded Brunson.

Lumberton's mayor remarked, "This is an awesome commitment that Baptist Men

have made. I cannot say how much I appreciate Baptist Men; without groups like them we could not achieve the goal of putting our community back together." The mayor introduced several guests instrumental in recovery and relief efforts following the October 8, 2016 hurricane. Mike Sprayberry, director, NC Emergency Management, told the gathering of Baptists and government officials, "Baptist Men and Women are the 'go-to' volunteer agency in NC. We are partners. We are blessed to have North Carolina Baptist Men and Women." He added, "I know that when Baptist men and women come into our EOC (Emergency Operations Center) we become a better EOC. We are so appreciative, humbled and inspired by what you do. It is such a great mission helping disaster survivors out there.

"Right now I can feel the Lord's presence in this room. We know that this mission is the Lord's mission. I just want to tell you how much you are appreciated and loved. God bless each and every one of you," said Sprayberry.

North Carolina Baptists offering dedicatory prayers and encouragement included: John Butler, executive leader, Business Services, Baptist State Convention of NC; Mike Cummings, director of missions, Burnt Swamp Baptist Association; Robert Simmons, NCBM/Baptists on Mission president; Alan Taylor, director of missions, Robeson Baptist Association; and Tammy Weeks, NCBM/Baptists on Mission prayer coordinator.

Mayor Davis read a proclamation of thanks declaring a North Carolina Baptist Men/Baptists on Mission Day just before the official ribbon cutting ceremony. Surrounded by program participants, Director Brunson wielded scissors cutting the ceremonial ribbon. Gaylon Moss, NCBM/Baptists on Mission disaster relief coordinator, offered the closing prayer of thanks and blessing. Tours of the Rebuild Center followed lunch that was prepared by disaster relief feeding volunteers.

## Marriage Menturing



arriage is tough," says Linda Marshall. "We live in a throw-away society that has brought that mentality into marriage. If it does not seem to be working, just throw it away. Marriage takes work, but it is well worth it." With culture and the media giving us such poor role models, the church needs to develop husbands and wives who will be willing to partner with newly married couples that can develop a positive approach to marriage.

We are all aware of the many statistics that are out there about the issues that threaten and tear apart a marriage. As a local church, many want to know what can be done to turn the tide in our communities and society. There is research to demonstrate that a good premarital program can help a couple get their marriage off to a better start. The research indicates that a mentoring program offered six

months or more prior to the wedding date, and then continuing for six to 12 months after a marriage, are the most effective. This is a great opportunity for a local church to make an impact on their local community.

Dr. Thomas and Linda Marshall have been married for 46 years and have raised three daughters



who are happily married. "As a part of Family Foundations, we can tell you that through the many on-going challenges over the years, we have had a determination to make our marriage work. Having a great role model in my (Tom's) parents, we were able to face and defeat the issues that would threaten to tear a marriage apart. I (Tom), an educator, minister, and writer have used what we have learned over the years to also advise and guide others."

Starting a Marriage Mentoring Ministry within your local church can be an exciting and powerful addition to the outreach of your church or community. This type of ministry often ensures that premarital couples get more preparation and get it earlier in their engagement, two of the factors that promote healthier relationships. Marriage Mentors can provide a helpful role during the premarital stage and first year of marriage. For the Marriage Mentors themselves there are great rewards; investing in other couples often is an enriching experience for their own marriages. For the Church, it expands the ministry possibilities, helps to reach young couples, and develops a more sharing and connected feeling among the members of the congregation.

"Just think," asks Tom, "if your church could salvage one marriage, could direct one young couple in the right direction, could change the culture in your community, wouldn't a ministry like this be worth the time and effort spent?" The church can make a difference, if we are willing to be what Jesus calls us to be.



### Making an Eternal Impact

ituated in a part of the world that has been hostile to Christianity for many generations, Armenia is a mission field ripe for harvest. Pastors from restricted access countries often come to Armenia for training and then apply what they have learned when they return to their own countries. Armenian Baptists have been experiencing a great movement of God over the past twenty years. As part of the former Soviet Union with many restrictions on religious freedom and an atheistic government, Armenia had just one Baptist church when the Soviet Union collapsed in 1989. When Baptists on Mission began our Partnership with Armenian Baptists in 2003 there were 80 congregations with 8 building, 2000 total members, and 25 pastors. Now there are over 150 congregations with 30 church buildings, 6000 members, and 110 pastors. God is allowing us to join Armenian Baptists in making an eternal impact!

There are some great things in the works in 2017. A team from the Little River Baptist Association will be completing their fifth church this summer. The Atlantic Baptist Association will be assisting a church planter in the Nagorno-Karabakh region. Campbell University School of Medicine is sending a team of faculty and students to hold medical clinics and to make plans for a greatly expanded ministry in the future. A team from WMU NC will be leading conferences for women from Armenia and some restricted access countries. Light is shining in the darkness!

This is a great time to start planning teams for 2018! There is a wide variety of projects available and we will match your team's assignment to its calling and abilities. There are opportunities to assist in building a new church building for one of the 19 church plants, hold medical clinics, distribute eyeglasses, lead VBS or other community ministries, or teach at the seminary in Yerevan.

first heard about an opportunity for a trip to Cuba when Pastor Brandon presented about the vision trip of which he was able to be a part last Fall. A construction trip promised to be a great deal of work but also an opportunity to be part of the beginning of an exciting new ministry in the Eastern Baptist Convention of Cuba. Though complications threatened to keep us from being part of the trip, on Saturday, April 1, 2017, my wife, Elka, and I joined seven others representing five different North Carolina churches in Santa Clara, Cuba.

Joined by Yadniel, our translator, we crowded into a tiny microbus to travel to Mi Campemento, a retreat center situated halfway between Placetas and Santa Clara. The Eastern Baptist Convention of Cuba now has a vision to convert the property to a seminary capable of serving 250 students to serve the growing Christian community in Cuba and reach the Western end of the island. We were warmly welcomed by Pastor Renee, who is the Convention representative; camp pastor, Gregorio, and his wife, Marlenis, who runs the camp; and the dedicated workers, Luis, Jose, and Bedia.

The team was able to be part of several worship services during the trip. On Sunday, Pastor Brandon preached at Fourth Baptist in Santa Clara, while Todd preached in Placetas. With the church packed with people of all ages filling plastic chairs in the aisle and even standing outside the windows, the atmosphere was exuberant as we joined in despite the language barrier. On Wednesday, one of the highlights of the week, we were able to join Jose at his house church near the camp for another packed, vibrant worship service.

As promised, the work was very difficult and further complicated by worn tools, sweltering humidity, and shortage of supplies. We had originally planned to lay block, but we ended up digging and pouring footers for the new dining hall building. After getting some new shovels, we were able to work more quickly and completed about half of the digging for the building. Unfortunately, we ran out of rocks for the concrete so had to leave some of the pouring for a later team but

were glad of what we were able to get done.

Though there is much more work to be done, the excitement of the people that we worked with was evident, and we look forward to seeing how God uses this camp to continue His work in the country of Cuba.

### Construction Teams Needed to Build

Children's Cottages in

inatemala

he ministry in Guatemala has been a blessing to many North Carolina Baptists since 2011. Hundreds of volunteers contributed to the construction of a beautiful ministry center in the mountains of Southwestern Guatemala. That facility now houses a community clinic and is the site for on-going leadership training among the Quiche people. Roger and Vicki Grossmann are the missionaries we work with in Guatemala. In 2014, the Grossmanns collaborated with the Baptist Children's Home of North Carolina to open a children's home in the same town as the ministry center. Now, those two ministries are coming together. Two cottages for older children are being built at the ministry center property. Construction teams are needed throughout the end of 2017 and all of 2018 to complete this task! Tim and Vicki Etheridge of Greenville, NC recently went with a team to get the building process started.

"In January, 2017, we were privileged to be part of a five-person adobe-making team in Quetzaltenango, Guatemala. Having been on larger adobe-making teams before, we were greatly concerned that our team was only five. Tim and I could not image how five people were going to accomplish much. Ultimately, we trusted that these were the people the Lord had put together, and that He had a plan. Upon arrival in Quetzaltenango, we learned that a team of six Guatemalans would be working alongside us. Gestures, smiles, and laughter transcended the language barrier. We were able to make over 500 blocks for the children's cottage. Indeed, the Lord provided!

After a long week of work, Sunday was our last full day in Quetzaltenango. We attended church with the children from the Children's Home. We then had lunch with them at Pizza Hut and frosties for dessert at Wendy's. Afterwards, we received a tour of the Children's Home. During all of these activities, it was obvious how well-cared-for the children are. They are extremely polite, and look after one another. It was also obvious how much they love Roger and Vicki - and how much Roger and Vicki love them. What a privilege to be part of a team to assist with the construction of cottages for these children!"

### **Construction of Two Children's Cottages**

Many teams are needed to work at the Good Shepherd Center in 2018. Teams will work on two cottages for older at-risk children. A variety of construction skills will be needed. Teams will have supervision and will work with Guatemalans on-site. Flexibility is a must, as it will be impossible to know exactly what task teams will be doing until a week or two before arrival. There is plenty of work for everyone to do

- men and women. If teams have

three construction-oriented people, who can then enlist 2-3 other team members - regardless of skill level - for particular jobs, much can be accomplished!

NOTE: Construction teams have the option of sending 2-3 team members to live and serve for 48 hour shifts at the Good Shepherd Children's Home in order to give our Guatemalan children's home workers some much-appreciated time off. Team leaders should discuss this with field personnel prior to team's service in order to best prepare for this.

### An Unforgettable Experience in

### Honduras

hen my Youth Pastor, Bryan Moore, approached me about joining the college team to go to Honduras this past summer, I immediately knew it was something I should do. I had never been on an international mission trip but have always been interested in doing things out of my comfort zone.

While in Honduras, our team was assigned to build a house for an elderly woman who lived with four or five other family members in a 20' x 16' one-room house. We quickly settled into our work. I had never felt heat like this before, but the hard physical labor encouraged me to pray for strength over every block I helped lay.

When not working on the house, we were playing with the local Honduran children. I have always loved playing with kids, but this was something special. I speak very little Spanish and they spoke absolutely no English. However, the language barrier did not stop us from connecting. The kids were the absolute sweetest! They loved playing with my hair, hugging me, laughing at me when I tried to speak Spanish. Best of all, they loved playing sports! We brought baseballs and soccer balls to play with them. This helped break the language barrier

One boy in particular made an impression on me. His name was Anthony and was only seven years old. Anthony had the prettiest brown eyes I have ever seen. He longed for our attention, and we gave it to him! His laugh, so contagious and adorable, was displayed any time we made a silly face at him. Anthony showed me the love of Jesus in ways that he will probably never know. Anthony loved the team and me unconditionally.

Like Anthony, a great number of Hondurans are in financial poverty, but a great number of Americans are impoverished when it comes to community. The Hondurans we met were so eager to spend quality time with us, as opposed to playing video games or watching Netflix like we Americans often do. This experience was one that I definitely will never forget and I cannot wait to go back soon!

NCBM/Baptists on Mission have sent teams to Honduras since 1998. As with Payton's team, most construct a house for a family in need. This construction effort is

combined with an afternoon VBS or other children's ministry. Other teams do evangelism, consisting of door to door witnessing in the

morning and VBS in the afternoon. A few teams a year conduct medical or dental clinics, each seeing hundreds of patients in a week's time.

Teams stay comfortably at NCBM's Ministry Center. Cost is \$1,200 per person, plus \$3,000 per team for construction materials (if building a house). We would love to have your church join us for a life-changing experience in Honduras in 2018!

### God at Work in the Faraway Land of ...

### Kenya

he melodic sound of children's voices filled the air as we looked out over a sea of beautiful smiling faces. Over six hundred primary school students, dressed in red, white, and green uniforms, were seated on the ground in front of Karanda School in Ahero. Their words, though heavily accented, were in English, so we knew they were singing about Jesus! Our seven-member team, along with the Kenyan pastors who interpreted for us, shared the love of Jesus through puppets, songs, and a simple Biblical message. When asked if anyone would like to have Jesus come into their heart, almost every hand was raised! While seeds had been planted previously, we were there to witness the harvest and to be reminded that accepting Christ with the simple faith of a child is all that is required to enter into Heaven.

That was just one part of our experience in Kenya as volunteers with the Houses of Hope Project. Working alongside local villagers and skilled laborers, we participated in the construction of four simple African village homes made of sticks, mud, and a corrugated metal roof. Whether it was digging a hole in the ground for poles, hammering sticks to the sides of the house, or simply carrying materials, there was something that each of us could do.

We were privileged to visit with the recipient of each new home. This included Dorothy, a young widow, and Eunice, another young widow with three children to support.

Jennifer, age 73, has only 2 of her 11 children still living and yet somehow manages to care for her young grandson. Finally, we met Anna, age 56, whose home was literally falling down around her. Experiencing their desperation, their poverty, and their humility made a lasting impression upon each of us.

Our team was given the opportunity to share the Gospel by going door-to-door throughout each village. While their homes are simple by American standards, with dirt floors, no running water and no electricity, the people welcomed us inside and listened attentively as we told them about Jesus' love and His gift of eternal life. Over and over, people prayed to receive Christ. We invited them to join us for the House Dedication Service at the end of the day. These services were filled with singing, clapping, a Bible presentation, a brief message and an invitation. Hearing so many of these precious people pray to receive Christ reassured us that God is at work in a mighty way in this faraway land of Kenya!"

#### The Birth of a Church

ince the Fall of 2014 I've lived in my current town, Nagyhalász. Together with my ministry partner, Tünde we moved here after a summer camp in the local school hosted by NC Baptists on Mission. At the closing program of the camp we saw God do an incredible work and we knew He was calling us here. The principal and his wife along with more than 200 others came forward at the invitation. This large movement of people showed us that God is drawing the people in this town and they are open to the gospel message. Since coming here, we have worked diligently to preach the gospel and live lives of faith before the interested crowds.

It's been almost three years since that first camp and two more camps have been held. The principal of the school, along with a few other followers have been baptized. Our dream day after day has been that we see a Baptist church planted in this community.

On Tuesday, April 4 that dream became reality in this small town in Hungary as by God's grace a new Baptist Church was founded! Later this year, the Baptist Union will vote to accept the church into the union at their annual convention. We established the church with 10 founding members who are baptized believers and one prospect member who hopes to be baptized within the year and join the church. The founding pastor, Jószef, an ordained minister serving as pastor of another Baptist church, will continue to visit the church once a month. Our local leader, Barnabas, is a soon to be ordained pastor who is also serving as the School Chaplain. The church meets every Sunday in someone's home and once a month in a larger service in the school. At the larger service, many non-believers from our community come to see what's happening.

During our founding service on Tuesday afternoon, we sang together, heard the word together, broke bread together, prayed together and shared together. The most touching moment was hearing the principal share testimony to what God has done in his life and reflecting on just how special the moment was to him.

# South Africa - Door of Hope Divine Intervention

Door of Hope

rapped in a plastic bag, discarded in garbage cans, thrown in dumpsters, left in public toilets, thrown in rivers, or left in hospitals and parks, many children in Johannesburg, South Africa face certain death each day without immediate intervention. Since its beginning in 1999, Door of Hope has rescued over 1,500 infants and has provided temporary Christian homes for abandoned, aborted, abused, and orphaned babies and children. The Door of Hope operates a number of baby homes, not institutions, where babies enjoy the loving care of Christian caregivers and volunteers until arrangements can be made for their adoption.

Participants in this partnership will have the opportunity to build small cottages that will house six children along with a host couple. Cottages will be built of a lightweight interlocking cement blocks on site, cure for about three weeks, be dipped in a mortar mix, and then stacked to build the cottages. The process is quite simple and does not require skilled labor. Trip dates will be available for almost any time in 2018.

Length of Trip - The basic trip will include an 8-day stay in South Africa: departure from NC on a Friday evening; worship and orientation on Sunday; work at the Village of Hope near Johannesburg on Monday through Friday; a choice of optional activities on Saturday; worship and departure on Sunday, and arrival in NC on Monday morning. Extensions are available if a church would like to assist a church planter in Central Drakensburg, and/or visit a game park. The length of your trip will determine trip cost (see below).

**Trip Cost -** Total cost will be dependent on: 1) number of members on the team, and 2) the current cost of airfare. Cost per person will be the cost of airfare + \$55 per person per day for field costs. Field costs include lodging, most meals, in-country transportation, orientation, and insurance. Some personal spending money will be needed for a few meals and souvenirs.

Material Costs - Each team must provide the cost of materials for construction projects. Unless otherwise stated, the cost for most construction projects will be a minimum of \$5,000 per team, with a goal of \$10,000. Cost of each cottage will be \$30,000 and three teams should be able to build a cottage. The goal is to have three teams cover the cost of a cottage. This amount must be received in our office 30 days prior to your departure date so that job site preparation may begin and materials delivered on-site prior to your arrival.

**Teams -** Teams should be comprised of no less than five members and no more than 14. On-site coordinators will arrange logistics for teams. Housing and food logistics vary based on work location. Some teams may be asked to help with their food preparation. Applicants must be at least 16 years old to participate.

Living and Working Conditions - Those participating in this effort must be flexible and willing to work as a member of the team. Travel, living, and working conditions may be difficult at times. Once applications and deposits are received, team members will be given information that will answer many questions about the trip. An orientation provided for each team prior to departure.

Health Screening Ministry Identify Preventable Health Issues

he NCBM/Baptists on Mission Health Screening Ministry addresses the needs of patients who may not have access to adequate or affordable preventative health care. Many times these individuals do not know they are suffering from chronic illnesses such as diabetes, high cholesterol, obesity, and hypertension. These chronic health diseases will cause other major issues, such as heart disease, eye disease, and/or depression, if left untreated. The Health Screening Ministry is designed to identify these preventable health issues and address their underlying causes.

Within the first 2 years of this ministry, over 600 patients have been screened. One-third of these patients were identified with one or more of the following: pre-diabetes or new onset diabetes, hypertension, high risk for heart disease, and/or depression.

Currently, we are working with the North Carolina Community Health Center Association and Federally Qualified Health Centers to offer referral sources for each of the Health Screening Ministry mobile clinics. It is necessary that those diagnosed with chronic preventative illnesses can receive treatment and follow-up care at a local health facility after the initial screening at the mobile health clinic.

It is important to involve students and collegiate healthcare programs in the Health Screening Ministry as well. Utilized as a community health instructional setting, students are exposed to the needs of rural communities, homeless populations, and povertystricken areas of the state. Students are able to see how Christians care for the poor, and are exposed to the gospel themselves, as they hear the message of Christ presented to the patients through the volunteer staff.

We trust that these works bring honor to the name of Jesus in showing love for our neighbors. This ministry allows us to meet not only a physical need, but a spiritual need as well.

hurches and individuals from all over North Carolina are receiving a blessing from being a part of the Appalachian Coalfields Ministry. Teams serve in the states of West Virginia, Kentucky, Tennessee, Virginia, and North Carolina. Projects include weeklong service in children's ministry, sports clinics, music, and construction, to name a few. Mission opportunities may also include the collection, delivery, and distribution of items such as food, school supplies, clothing, etc., which can be done in the course of a few days or over a weekend. Red Branch Baptist Church in Carthage, NC took their first mission trip to the Appalachian region in the summer of 2016. Here is an account of their experience, shared by team leader Phyllis Johnston:

"In April, 2016, several members of our church heard about the opportunity for mission trips, especially in the West Virginia area. Our group got excited, brought that excitement back to our church and the work began. After being partnered with an Appalachian congregation, we started collecting clothes, food and school supplies. Soon, a group of excited people from 9 to 78 years old, were ready to go to Mallory, West Virginia. For some this was their first mission trip. We didn't know exactly what to expect but did know that the Lord was in this endeavor!

After a period of communication and preparation, our team arrived at the Big Springs Missionary Baptist Church in June. At the time our team served, the church had no pastor - only a few faithful members who seemed very happy to see us and to have us serve there within the church and community. After a brief tour and explanation of what was needed, everyone went to work. First, we unloaded our truck full of supplies and got to work on their clothes closet, which was in need of some tender-loving care. Some of the men began construction on the on-site apartment that the church owns. Others began cleaning yards, moving furniture, mopping floors or whatever else was needed.

On Saturday, we had an Open House, providing a hot dog lunch for all who could come. Flyers had been distributed throughout the community. Tables containing household items, bags of groceries, back-to-school backpacks were available to those who came. The newly cleaned and well-stocked clothes closet was opened, providing shoes and more household goods. On Saturday night, we invited all church members to come and join us for a spaghetti dinner and a time of fellowship.

Bonds were formed with these precious people. Our own hearts were changed as well. As we left, we felt we had made a real difference. Upon returning home, we began praying with them that God would send them an energetic, loving Pastor. We have stayed in touch through Facebook, phone calls, and texts. Recently, we rejoiced with them as they shared the news of their calling of a new pastor. We are excited about returning this summer to serve again with the church members and their new pastor. Thank God for this special blessing!"

or the past several years, Jimmy and Ashley Tucker have served as camp directors at *Pu'u* Kahea Baptist Conference Center on the island of Oahu. Owned and operated by the Hawaii-Pacific Baptist Convention, the camp provides a place for people from all over the islands to come and enjoy a time of spiritual retreat. North Carolina teams and couples have provided valuable service in keeping the camp operational since 2004. Following are some thoughts from the Tuckers:

"Pu'u Kahea means "hill of calling," and several North Carolina couples have answered the call on their lives to serve at this beautiful facility located on the west shore of Oahu in a town called Waianae, Hawaii. Pu'u Kahea Conference Center is the state Baptist conference center of the Hawaii Pacific Baptist Convention. With only three full time staff, continued ministry is highly dependent upon our volunteers. North Carolina Baptists supply over half of our yearly volunteers.

Long time volunteers, Chuck and Mae Copper from Spruce Pine, North Carolina, are currently serving their fifth consecutive year at the center. They enjoy serving in areas such as landscaping, laundry and meal service for our guests. They have served several different types of group during their stay at Pu'u Kahea, such as youth groups, private school retreats, public school band camp, churches, and ministries on the island of Oahu. Each of these groups of guest are always very complimentary on their stay and often thank the volunteers through a written note or kind word. On Chuck and Mae's days off, they enjoy hiking and seeing sights around Oahu. Without volunteers, Pu'u Kahea would not be able to serve our guests with excellence in every aspect of their stay."

Couples serving at *Pu'u* Kahea commit to a minimum of one month and do a variety of tasks. Flexible couples who are willing to jump in and do whatever is needed can be utilized year-round. Housing, some meals and local transportation is provided for couples who commit to this service. One-week teams are also needed (primarily in the fall, winter, and spring) to do maintenance and other special projects. There is a cost for one-week teams to stay at the camp.

orth Carolina Baptist volunteers are serving throughout the state of Pennsylvania this summer and reaching people for Christ in a variety of ways. Since 2008, North Carolina Baptists have made a big difference to the work of many church planters in the Keystone state. Because of the close proximity to our own state, some in our state express surprise that a gospel witness is needed in Pennsylvania.

Once a hotbed of Christian activity, the state of Pennsylvania, like many states in the Northeastern segment of our nation, has become less and less "churched" over the past several decades. It is estimated that more than 80% of Pennsylvania's 12 million inhabitants do not have a personal relationship with Jesus Christ. Barry Whitworth, Executive Director/Treasurer, and the staff at the Baptist Resource Network of Pennsylvania/South Jersey are working to change all that. The multiplication of healthy, growing churches is something that is near and dear to his heart. Pennsylvania utilizes eight Church Planting Catalysts who are committed to the furtherance of the Gospel through new church starts. Recruiting energetic, dedicated couples to serve throughout the state is the starting point. Getting them there is just the first step. Pennsylvania utilizes a system called Multiplying Church Centers. A Multiplying Church Center (MCC) consists of a pastor, with an established church, who either is an experienced church planter or has a heart for church planting, who is also competent of the ins and outs of church planting. These pastors are extremely knowledgeable in the area of church planting and have a heart for advancing the Kingdom and spreading the Gospel to everyone. Once a potential church planter successfully completes our assessment process, they are placed in an MCC for further hands on training.

Another key element that helps church planters succeed in Pennsylvania is the utilization of volunteer mission teams. Each year, North Carolina churches are making great contributions through sports outreach, Backyard Bible Clubs, construction assistance, music outreach, and more. Rev. Whitworth says about the ministry of NC volunteer teams, "It helps us have a presence in the community. The heart that you bring to Pennsylvania is the same heart our church planters have and that is to love people and to share the love of Jesus Christ. Any time you put those two together you have chemistry, and when you have chemistry, something explosive can happen. That explosion is people coming to faith in Christ!" He goes on to say that "you (NC Baptists)

#### **How Can I Help?**

Current Needs: Construction is a big part of what we do as we help hurting people. We need skilled help with roofing, plumbing, HVAC and electrical. Help is also needed for building wheelchair ramps, floor replacement, painting or yardwork. Whatever your skill level we have a place for you.



# FOCUSE DIHE KEY WORD

hurches throughout the state are beginning to see how focused prayer is a key component to revitalizing the church and the importance of unified prayer teams starting within their church. Many churches have requested a time of training for focused prayer and prayer walking with a desire to start or refocus prayer teams in the church. Those that have been a part of this are seeing the Power of an Almighty God through focused Prayer...key word is FOCUSED.

God is calling men into the ministry right out of our local congregations and placing them as shepherds' of the flocks He has chosen. Salvation reports are coming in as well as increased mission involvement. People's hearts and lives are changed. Barriers are torn down. People are more outwardly focused and less inwardly focused. In one association relationships are being built among the people as churches are uniting together to help each other with construction projects, bible studies, prayer and encouragement, prayer meetings becoming prayer walks, church parlors are now intercessory prayer rooms. Pastors are coming together in phenomenal numbers doing study groups, praying together for churches as they have committed to do whatever it takes to revitalize the church... not their church but **The Church**.

Encouragement received from NCBM/Baptist Convention staff about the monthly Baptist Building prayer walks:

There has been an increased openness among staff in sharing prayer requests and answers to prayer. Several significant prayers have been answered, i.e. a staff member's father surrendering to Christ, a staff member's son getting a long-awaited job, and a difficult pregnancy resulting in the birth of a healthy child. The NCBM staff, especially, is excited to see the team come the first Friday of each month and receives a breath of fresh air and encouragement. Another team in the building has repeatedly underscored how they are humbled to be included in prayers from servant-hearted prayer warriors. Overall, I feel that the prayer team has helped generate a greater sense of community among staff members whose assignments do not necessarily overlap on a regular basis.

Prayer walkers learn to pray beyond their own concerns and needs and intercede for the needs and concerns of others. Have you ever thought of how it would be to walk alongside Jesus like the Disciples did and witness His

Miracles first hand? Well let me say that prayer

walking is just that ... Walking with Jesus and experiencing His Miracles. Ephesians 6 tells us to pray for others with persistence and the power of the Holy Spirit. In Joshua 6 where God directed the Israelites to march around the city of Jericho a number of times and yield a loud shout, their obedience brought down the wall.

Intercessory prayer walks for the North Carolina Missions Conference and all ten Mission Rally sites from the coast to the mountains unleashed God's power through the presence of the Holy Spirit. Consider answering the call to prayer and join us... we need more Prayer Warriors!

ohnson Baptist Church in Warsaw is a small congregation with a couple of dozen people in attendance on Sunday morning. You could presume that a church as small as that could not make a huge impact and was just surviving. When they collected 100 backpacks this past Christmas to take to West Virginia as part of the Appalachian Christmas Outreach things began to change. Enthusiasm spread throughout the church and people in the community began to talk, positively, about what the church had done. New people are beginning to visit to see what was going on, to meet Rev. Buck Grady who is leading his first church, and in 2017, they plan to deliver many more backpacks. It started small but it is getting very big!

The "average" church in NC is struggling, but your church does not have to be one of them. Your church's revitalization could actually start with you! It is tempting for us to focus on whatever will satisfy our own wants or needs, but that brings stagnation

and eventually death to a church. An external focus breaks our cycle of self-centeredness and opens us to the movement of God in our

#### WHY HAVE A MEN'S MINISTRY IN YOUR CHURCH?

Why should your church have a men's ministry? So guys can get together and talk about the game last night or tell their latest fishing stories? In a word, NO! Not that those things are bad, of course, but if that's all you do, the time could certainly be better spent elsewhere. As indicated in the resource booklet "Men's Ministries in the Local Church" (found on website at http://baptistsonmission.org/church-programs/men-s-ministry):

Men want their lives to be productive, to have real meaning and purpose. The benefits of an effective men's ministry include that it reaches unreached men, develops leaders, involves men in service, helps men grow in Christ, develops mentors and strengthens families.

Also, consider what surveys have shown. If the first person reached in an unchurched family is a child, the probability of reaching the rest of the family is three to four percent. If the first person is the mother, the probability increases to 17%. But if the first person is the father, the probability of reaching the rest of the family is 93%! Men are on average the most difficult to reach but also the most strategic.

One of the problems we face is that there is no man in so many households today. Does that make men's ministry less important? Of course not. In many cases, the man still has some contact with (and therefore some influence over) the children. And whether that is the case or not, those fathers need to be reached. Many of them need our love and support in helping them put their lives back together. They need Jesus! We know THE WAY, THE TRUTH AND THE LIFE and we need to share Him with those men who also need to know Him.

An effective men's ministry also helps to prevent the break-up of families that leads to single parent households. As men grow in the Lord,

as they are discipled, as they grow closer together, and as they learn how to be better husbands and fathers, they will be more likely to fulfill their commitments and keep their families together. Obviously, there is no guarantee with this, and most of us will almost certainly have some divorces in our groups, but every marriage and family that can be "saved" is worth the time and effort.

Not only will families be held together and strengthened, an effective men's ministry will strengthen your church. As men grow closer to the Lord and each other, they will have a passion for Christ, they will grow in their love for Him, and they will want to serve Him. An effective men's ministry will give the men opportunities to use their gifts, abilities and passions in serving God and others, and it will encourage them to be involved appropriately in the life of the church.

An effective men's ministry will help men recognize that they cannot "go it alone" through life, at least not effectively. We all need Jesus and we need each other. God made us that way and He designed the Body of Christ that way – to be interdependent and united. The love, support, acceptance and accountability demonstrated among Christian brothers is a beautiful thing to observe, a beautiful thing to experience, and essential to our spiritual journey.

There is not room is this space to also address HOW to start an effective men's ministry or to revitalize an existing one, but our men's ministry team would love to help you do exactly that. Please do not hesitate to contact us. No doubt, you want to see the hearts of your men ignited for Christ, and so do we!

### NC STATEWIDE CHILDREN'S MISSIONS PROJECT

The NC Statewide Children's Missions project for 2017 will be to support the NCBM/Baptists on Mission partnership with Cuba by providing clean water to villages and towns throughout Eastern Cuba. After Hurricane Matthew hit the eastern side of Cuba in the fall of 2016, NC Baptists sent a large water purification unit to the town of Nibujón, Cuba to provide over 10,000 gallons of clean water per day. In the days after, it was realized that clean water is often not available (unless purchased) even when a hurricane has not hit. And



with the poverty of Cuba, purchasing water is not a viable option. Our plan is to provide water purification units that will purify up to 5,000 gallons per day to as many towns as possible. Churches in Cuba often serve as community centers for the towns in which they are located. If we can

put a water purification unit in one church in a town then the community can have clean, safe water to drink. If we raise the same amount of money as 2016, we will be able to provide over 11 churches with purification units. Can you imagine, 11 churches and 11 towns being able to provide safe drinking water to their people? Can you imagine the impact that clean water will have for the gospel message? What would it be like if we could put water purification units in 20 or 25 churches and towns?
