Pastor's Ponderings

A New Day for Our Lady of Hope Community

Some of you may remember when Our Lady of Hope Ordinariate Community began holding their Masses at OLOS. Previously, they had been hosted at St. Therese Little Flower Church.

Our Lady of Hope Ordinariate community began as a group affiliated with the Anglican Use Society, formed for Catholic who came from an Anglican (more commonly connect with the Episcopal Church) background or Anglicans exploring the possibility of entering the Catholic Church. Originally under the pastoral leadership of Fr. Ernie Davis, OLOH later became a part of the Personal Ordinariate of the Chair of St. Peter.

The Ordinariate is a non-geographical diocese established by Pope Benedict in 2012 for groups of former Anglicans who desire to come into full-communication with the Catholic Church. Ordinariates were also authorized, upon approval from Rome, to ordain former Anglican priests and bishops as Catholic priests. (Personal note: I was one of the first 10 ordained in North America for the Ordinariate in 2012.)

In 2015, Our Lady of Hope received new pastoral leadership from within the Ordinariate when I was reassigned to Kansas City from my previous position in Northern Virginia, just outside of Washington, DC. In addition, I was also assigned by Bishop Finn as an Associate Pastor at St. Therese North. One year later, Bishop Johnston consolidated my pastoral work with the Ordinariate by placing me as pastor of Our Lady of Sorrows.

When I was given the additional assignment as President of St. Michael the Archangel Catholic High School, Bishop Lopes of the Ordinariate knew that I had too much on my plate and appointed newly ordained Ordinariate priest, Fr. Ed Wills, as the new administrator. Fr. Ed was one of my priests when I was an Anglican archbishop and we had known each other for more than 20 years, so this was a great delight!

Bishop Lopes and Bishop Johnston have been working together for a while to find a more permanent home for the Ordinariate Community. Last week, it was announced that Our Lady of Hope would be moving to Guardian Angels Church with Fr. Ed as pastor of GA as well. This is called an "entrustment," where a parish is now being supported by clergy other than from the diocese. Fr. Ed's successor at GA, in future years, will also be from the Ordinariate. With this arrangement, OLOH will now be able to settle in. The transition will take place June 4th.

It has been wonderful to have our brothers and sisters from Our Lady of Hope with us for the past several years. They have done so much to enrich our lives as brothers and sisters in Christ and have done a lot to make our church better. In fact, the Ordinariate

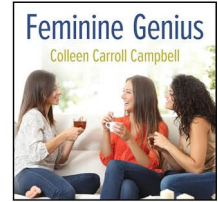

The development of traditional Marian dogma in the light of the present day bears the Pope's unmistakable personal stamp.
